17	Discussion and possible motion on the application
18	of Nick Mazzaferro, P.E. on behalf of George Sarkis
19	at 717 Main Street LLC. The Applicant proposes to
20	install a new side entrance to the home with a
21	wooden covered porch. This new entryway and
22	covered porch will complement the front porch. The
23	Applicant also proposes removing any existing
24	exterior window and enclose with matching siding
25	over the area. This is SCTM #1001-2-5-38.

1	We welcome you, Nick, this evening.
2	NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: Oh, thank you.
3	CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Please say your name
4	and your address.
5	NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: Nick Mazzaferro, Post
6	Office Box 57, Greenport, New York 11944.
7	CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Thank you.
8	NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: So thanks for letting
9	me be on the show.
10	(Laughter)
11	NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: The this particular
12	property has actually been before you twice already
13	and work has been progressing quite well. We did
14	the main house over with the roof, and the siding,
15	and the paint, and the shower in the back. And the
16	garage has been jacked up, and it actually went
17	back up. And today I found as I drove by,
18	because I didn't know George found a stained glass
19	window, which he's installing in the little
20	knock-out in the second the ceiling, whatever,
21	the top of the garage.
22	CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: I saw it knocked out,
23	but I didn't see the window today.
24	NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: Yeah. He got a really
25	nice four-by it's a center panel and wrap-around

panel of stained glass somewhere, I don't know where, but it makes -- it's going to fit in the hole very nicely, so he's got that done.

So now we're here, and what the clients would like to do is they would like to convert the house into a two-family house. It's in an R-2 zoning already, and the house naturally lays out to a two-family based on the staircase position. What we need to make it the most efficient is an additional private entrance, an egress, for the second floor. So we're proposing to add a little side stoop to the house and cut an opening in the wall, install a new door, and that door is directly in line with the staircase going up to the second floor.

The interior side, we need to get a door or a wall enclosed there to get complete separation.

And it's a simple design, it's like a four-by-six-foot wooden staircase, open on two sides, a shed roof to protect it from the weather, some railing across the back, and a couple of corner posts. You know, very straightforward, not very large. We're trying to line it up with the existing walkway that's there, so you could either come straight in from the front, or if you're coming from the back, you

have the side steps to go up.

My apologies on the initial submission for not putting in more details about how we intend to enclose the porch and make the posts, okay? We drew a schematic, basically a structural drawing. I'm a structural engineer by trade, my fault. But what we're going to do is match the existing porch exactly. I dropped off some drawings on Monday, if you have copies of them.

CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: We do have them, thank you, yes.

NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: So we're going to custom-make the railing to look like the -- I don't know what you call them, the figure eight things that are existing now all around the front. They will probably be on the one -- on the back side of the porch. So from the street you'll see them, and from the other, First Street, you'll also see them, because we're trying to make an L-shaped staircase. And then George told me, the owner, that he has two of those newel posts in the garage or somewhere that match those exactly, so --

CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Wow, that's nice.

NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: Okay. We're going to put up two of the exact same posts and brackets and

we're going to match that rail exact across the back of the porch, and then it's just a flat shed roof. And the trim on the front of the house, the one-by-six, and the trim and overhang, we're going to do that around the shed roof that's going to be over the porch.

And the door is a simple grated door, you know, six -- a six-lite with a -- it's going to have an outside swing, though, okay? That's just for -- because of space restrictions, so.

CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Okay.

NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: That's about it. Is there any questions?

CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Oh, no, but I want to thank you for taking the time to think about this and add the detail of the -- to match up that beautiful railing on the -- on the front porch, and to have the columns, original columns. This is a win/win as far as I'm concerned.

NICHOLAS MAZZAFERRO: Yeah. Hopefully, they're -- I don't know if they're an exact match. He's got two detailed posts, he said, so we're going to get them to match. If he has to get ones made, he'll make them, but he said he had two already stored somewhere out here.
