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2 Regular Session 5/25/23 1 (The Meeting was Called to order at 6 p.m.) MAYOR STUESSI: I'd like to make a motion to 2 3 bring the meeting to order. May I have a second, 4 please? TRUSTEE ROBINS: Second. 5 MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor? 6 7 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye. 8 TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Ave. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye. 9 TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: 10 Aye. 11 MAYOR STUESSI: Aye. 12 Any opposed? 13 (No Response) 14 MAYOR STUESSI: Motion carries. Please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance. 15 16 (Pledge of Allegiance) 17 MAYOR STUESSI: Please stand for a moment of 18 silence for Marie Louise Pizzarelli, John Giannaris of the Hellenic Snack Bar, Peter B. Stevens of the 19 20 Book Scout, Paula Shengold, and Joseph A. Conway, Sr, retired Southold Town Police Chief. 21 22 (Moment of Silence) 23 MAYOR STUESSI: Please be seated. I'd like 24 to welcome everybody to the May 25th meeting of the 25 Board of Trustees. This is our regular meeting.

1 I have some announcements to make. The first 2 one is I'm very happy to report that the carousel remediation and restoration efforts have been 3 4 completed. We will be opening the carousel to the 5 public on Saturday morning. Tomorrow afternoon we 6 will be doing some testing. And if the public happens to be there and wants a ride for free, we 7 8 will gladly give them a ride tomorrow afternoon, 9 and then, of course, be welcoming everybody 10 Saturday morning.

11 Together with that, the Greenport Fire 12 Department Star Hose Company's annual fundraiser 13 carnival is this weekend, May 25th through 28th, 14 with fireworks on Saturday, the 27th. The rain 15 date is on Sunday, but as of now, knock on wood, 16 everything is looking good.

17 The Village Hall will be closed on Memorial 18 Day, May 29th, in observance. And on Tuesday, the following morning, we will be having a special 19 20 joint meeting with the Southold Town Board together 21 with the Greenport Village Board at 10 a.m. in the 22 morning. There is a link on the Village website, it's also printed here on the agenda as well. 23 24 In addition, the Friends of Mitchell Park and 25 James Morrison are hosting a short film screening

1 Saturday, June 3rd, from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. 2 Greenport Fire Department's memorial service will be June 11th, 2023 at 11 a.m. 3 4 And, additionally, I'd like to make mention of the Waterfront Advisory Committee, which is tied 5 6 to the moratorium on commercial development in the 7 Village, will be hosting two sessions in the 8 historic Greenport Theater, soon to be known as the 9 North Fork Arts Center. Those will be on Thursday, June 13th, and Thursday, July 6th at 6:30 p.m. 10 11 There are cards in Village Hall with 12 save-the-dates, as well as at the IGA grocery 13 store. To members of the Greenport Business 14 Improvement District, on Wednesday June 14th, the 15 16 annual meeting will be held at Green Hill Kitchen from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. There are voting going on 17 18 right now. Please go to the BID website for any information on that. 19 On Thursday, June 29th, the Southold Town 20 21 Police Anti-Bias Task Force event, SYNERGY, will be 22 hosted from 6 p.m. to 7:20 at the Southold Recreation Center at 970 Peconic Lane, Peconic. 23 24 The Juneteenth celebration and community 25 picnic will be Saturday, June 17th, from 10 a.m. to

1 2 p.m. at Clinton Memorial AME Zion Church. 2 And Dances in the Park will be starting on 3 Monday nights, July 3rd, running through August 28th. 4 Additionally, for any Village residents who are interested in the workings of the Southold Town 5 6 Community Housing Fund, the half percent tax established by the Peconic Bay Region Community 7 8 Housing Fund, there is a link and we welcome any 9 participation. This will be one of the subjects 10 that will also be talked about in the joint meeting 11 together with the Southold Town Board on Tuesday, 12 which I would encourage anybody to attend, please. 13 At this moment, we are going to welcome the applicant for 443 Greenport LLC, Zeytin, and the 14 application for Zach Baba at 314 Greenport LLC, to 15 16 please join us at the podium. If you could state 17 your name and address for the record, please. ZACH ERDEM: 18 Sure. MAYOR STUESSI: And tell us about the 19 20 businesses that you intend to open in these 21 historic buildings, and give us some information on 22 hours of operation, etcetera. 23 ZACH ERDEM: Absolutely, yes. 24 MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you. 25 ZACH ERDEM: Good evening, everyone. I am

1	I am Zach Erdem. I am from the Southampton, but
2	originally I'm from Turkey. I arrived in the
3	United States in 2002, and worked all the way up
4	from dishwashing, bus boy, serving, managing, all
5	the way up to owning my restaurants. I have been
6	in Southampton since 2002, when I arrived in the
7	U.S., and living in the beautiful community, and
8	opened a couple of restaurants, and hotel as well.
9	Lately, I got the opportunity by my landlord,
10	that he owned multiple units over here, and he
11	asked me if I was looking for anything else close
12	by. I wasn't sure about the Greenport. I did
13	come here a couple of times and walk around, and I
14	loved the Village and everything else about it,
15	more like nature was my main thing.
16	I was a little boy, back in Turkey I was a
17	shepherd from 11 year to 17. I was in the mountain
18	with my animals 7 a.m., 7 p.m. every day, that was
19	my schedule. Greenport gave me goosebumps when I
20	seen all those sheeps and all the animals all
21	around the Village, it was incredible for me. I
22	enjoyed it, being around all day long, going to
23	back my old days, and became really interesting
24	for me.
25	When I heard about these two places, it was

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unbelievable, and I said I love about -- what I
like about Greenport is nature and all other stuff.
I didn't think that I was going to do a restaurant
here or anything else. I had more than enough in
Southampton, and having enough for me, and I wasn't
looking forward to it.

7 When I came in, the place was gorgeous, 8 beautiful, and it was ready to go. Didn't spend 9 any money on it, didn't touch or anything. The 10 place are the way it is, I didn't do any work or 11 anything. For me, it was opportunity. And I like 12 to express myself and be part of this community. 13 And I'm here to meet with new friends and welcome our old friends. And I'd like to open these two 14 places, and I want to make sure that everyone 15 16 welcome and be part of this community as well.

I do have my other place in the Hamptons. I will split my time more often between these two places. It's two nice place, restaurant, and one is a hotel. There's 10 rooms above the restaurant, it's 21 seats, which will be serving more breakfast, lunch, 443 Main Street.

And the other one is 314, it's a freestanding
building. It's right next to American Beech.
That's going to be the lunch and dinner, 7 days

There will be Mediterranean food. 1 operation. We 2 do have dishes from Israel, we have dishes from Turkey, we have dishes from Palestinian, we have 3 It's a mixed menu from 4 dishes from Morocco. Mediterranean, lots of seafood, and some special 5 6 other dishes that we're known for in the Hamptons 7 area.

8 I know a lot of people are concerned about 9 the neighborhood, that the place is going to be nightclub or anything. I do not want to run 10 11 nightclub in a beautiful village. This will not be a new nightclub. I know our friend, I met him, 12 very nice person, I mentioned him in the beginning. 13 It's a restaurant, it will be a restaurant. 14 And I'd like to make sure that everyone understand this. 15

I'm not here to make any problems or cause any problems. I want to work with the Village as much as possible, to help the Village as much as possible with any kind of fundraiser, any kind of -- anything that needs it, that people or the Village needs it, that I'll be supportive more than anyone else.

The place, the way it is, as I mentioned
before, we're not changing anything, we're not
touching old historical buildings or anything. The

seating is same exactly what it was before. We did
 not do any increased seating or changing the
 layouts or anything.

4 The both places are going to be run very professional, local manager who own this restaurant 5 6 in Cutchogue, and I think called East Grill, East 7 End Grill, Tony. You probably know him or you know 8 his place. Lately, he closed his place and he 9 joined the team. He's going to be my General Manager, working on my both projects. He will be 10 11 here more than I will. As I said, I have my other 12 restaurants, that I'm going to focus on all my I will be here once in a while, check 13 places. 14 things and make sure everything is okay, and make sure that we are doing the right things for our 15 16 neighborhood. I want to make sure that neighborhood 17 is happy with us.

18 If anyone has any question, any concern about 19 the places, you're always more than welcome. I'11 give my -- I'll share my personal cell phone. 20 If 21 I'm not here, then you can always call or text. 22 Then I will respond it and I will personally make sure that issues been taken care of it. 23 24 As I said before, I'm not here to make 25 anybody upset or make the Village upset. I want to

1	work with everyone else, and I want to hope I'm
2	hoping the Village will welcome us, and we'll have
3	a beautiful summer, and we'll continue as long as
4	it goes. If anyone has any question.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you. We're going to
6	open it up to the Board for questions, and then
7	we'll take public comment afterwards.
8	ZACH ERDEM: Okay.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Trustee Robins, do you have
10	any questions?
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Did you say that you the
12	Village has livestock, sheep and herd and
13	animals wandering around?
14	ZACH ERDEM: No. This was
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, I thought that's
16	what you said. I mean
17	ZACH ERDEM: No. This was when I came first
18	time a couple of years ago, walking going all
19	around the North Fork.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Really?
21	ZACH ERDEM: Not just at Greenport.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay, all right.
23	ZACH ERDEM: There was a lot of farms,
24	there's a lot of good stuff that are around here
25	that took me back to my old days.

11 Regular Session 5/25/23 1 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay, okay, I understand. 2 Okay. That was my only question. ZACH ERDEM: Okay. Thanks for asking. 3 MAYOR STUESSI: Trustee Brennan. 4 5 TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I just want to clarify. At 6 443 Main Street, that's the hotel and a restaurant? 7 ZACH ERDEM: It was, yes, it was hotel and 8 restaurant, and it will be the same. TRUSTEE BRENNAN: The same. And 314 is a 9 restaurant only? 10 11 ZACH ERDEM: It's a restaurant, yes, sir, 12 it's a restaurant. 13 TRUSTEE BRENNAN: All right. Thank you. ZACH ERDEM: You're welcome. 14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: On the site for the 314, 15 16 if I remember correctly, there's a patio in the back with tables. Is that still in existence? Is 17 18 that something you're going to utilize? 19 ZACH ERDEM: No, the back is a parking lot. 20 I didn't see any --21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's a parking lot? I 22 thought at one point they did have some activity. 23 ZACH ERDEM: No, not in my -- not in my 24 plans. I do not want a restaurant behind a 25 restaurant.

12 Regular Session 5/25/23 1 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. 2 ZACH ERDEM: The front is better, a beautiful 3 looking patio. Okay. All right. That --4 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: as I said, there was some -- the previous owner did 5 6 have music in the background at some point in the 7 backyard, so I'm not quite -- I'm sure the 8 neighborhood will appreciate that you want to 9 keep --10 ZACH ERDEM: No, there are houses right behind it. You won't be able to open the -- any 11 12 radio or anything. 13 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okav. ZACH ERDEM: But they will come, I mean, 14 hammer in the back, so it's no need to make people 15 16 at the back door. 17 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, all right. Thank you. ZACH ERDEM: You're welcome. 18 19 TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah, my only 20 question was going to be about music, but I 21 think -- I think the site is not -- you're not 22 allowed to have recorded like speakers outside. 23 ZACH ERDEM: There is no speaker outside. 24 There's only a couple of stuff inside. Look, it's 25 a restaurant. You want to go to a restaurant have

1	soft background music. I think it's the way to go.
2	We are not looking for any crazy music or anything
3	to make the neighborhood upset.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: And could you clarify what
5	your intended hours of operation are going to be in
6	the full service restaurant?
7	ZACH ERDEM: The hotel site will be
8	breakfast, 8 a.m. until 4 p.m., breakfast, brunch.
9	If I can find more staffing, it will be a small
10	tapas menu, wine bar, if it's if we can get the
11	staff. If not, it will be more like breakfast,
12	brunch thing all day. And the hotel will be open
13	24 hours, check in, check out. It's only 10 rooms.
14	At 314, it will be seven days starting July and
15	August. It will be lunch and dinner only.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: And what hours do you intend
17	to serve
18	ZACH ERDEM: The lunch will be served, start
19	at 12, but someone will be there at 8, 9 o'clock in
20	the morning, take the deliveries, clean the patios,
21	all anything is around, set up the dining room
22	stuff, deal with the delivery. And then the staff
23	will come around 11, 11:30, set up the patio, all
24	the restaurants and everything else, and start
25	serving 12 to and during the week, I will say

1	10 p.m., and the weekends, probably 11 p.m.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. And I'm intend I'm
3	assuming you intend to name them both at some
4	point, and I would just remind you that you need to
5	go in front of the Historic Board for any signage.
6	ZACH ERDEM: We did not get a sign approval
7	yet, we are working on it.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
9	ZACH ERDEM: We haven't have any chance to
10	come to you guys to get the permit application, but
11	it will be in a couple of days. My attorney,
12	myself, and my sign company are working on the
13	specific sizes and everything else.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: And when are you intending to
15	open?
16	ZACH ERDEM: Hopefully, very soon. I mean,
17	as soon as we get the green light, we'll like to
18	open. We don't have a liquor license yet.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Right.
20	ZACH ERDEM: We're probably going to just
21	open with the food only. And then if anyone like
22	to bring some wine, serve for free until we get our
23	license back in the building.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. Thank you for being
25	here, and thank you for investing in the Village.

With that, you can be seated. We're going to take 1 2 public comment from anybody that wishes to say 3 anything. And then I would encourage, if anybody 4 wishes to talk to you separately, for them to do so 5 outside. 6 ZACH ERDEM: That's fine, I'm here to answer. I mean, I was going to -- I wasn't going -- I 7 8 wasn't going to make it today. I told my attorney 9 to join. And I'm like this is my lifetime, I think I should be there to meet the people that I want to 10 11 meet before anything else happens. So I'm here to 12 introduce myself. 13 MAYOR STUESSI: Okav. 14 ZACH ERDEM: And I'm here to take all the questions, and comment and concern you have, I'll 15 16 be happy to answer. Please, I'm here to work 17 with you. 18 MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. Please be seated. 19 Thank you. 20 ZACH ERDEM: Thank you. 21 MAYOR STUESSI: Are there any comments from 22 the public regarding this applicant? Please state your name and address for the record. 23 24 CHARLIE KULSZISKI: Charlie Kulsziski, 433 Main Street. So I'm across from 314 and next 25

door to the hotel. And I just wanted to bring up
 the history of the place, which I think everybody
 knows.

It's been for the past three or so years very loud, and a place with outside speakers, deejay, live, you know, bands. The codes have pretty much been disregarded over there in the previous business, and it was difficult to get any kind of code enforcement on any of that. And so now they have the permit to be outside, so I don't know.

I did a little Google search and I really --I just did for a minute, but I see 75 Main, it's got like 100 people in front of it all blocking the sidewalk, with cocktails in their hands and stuff. And then I see Blu Mar, the liquor license was suspended at one point, because it was being operated as a nightclub.

18 ZACH ERDEM: That was not like that, sir, it19 was about COVID restrictions.

CHARLIE KULSZISKI: Okay. The article did mention COVID restrictions, but it also said it was operating as a nightclub with exotic dancers. So I just want to make sure that this business model is not the same as those business models, and that it's not the same as the business models that have

1 been going on there.

2	And I want to be able to have quiet solitude
3	in within my house. I don't want to have to
4	speak over the noise that the business next door
5	and across street are making just to have a
6	conversation with someone in my living room. And
7	that's it. I mean, I just saw those two things
8	just on my right before I came here, so I wasn't
9	sure if we're going to go right back to all of
10	that. So
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, I can assure you, as a
12	Village, we will not. And Mr. Erdem has rules on
13	the places and how they need to operate, and
14	there's no outdoor music allowed, per the
15	guidelines that have already been established.
16	CHARLIE KULSZISKI: Yes, Yeah.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: So I would encourage you
18	you've met him.
19	CHARLIE KULSZISKI: Yeah, it seemed great.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: He can be your it can be
21	your first call, and you have my cell phone number
22	and I can be your second call, and we will
23	enforce
24	CHARLIE KULSZISKI: Yeah. I know a lot of
25	the time

MAYOR STUESSI: -- and issue violations if
 there's any problems.

CHARLIE KULSZISKI: -- staff or guests will 3 4 incrementally turn the music up, and it's not a conscious thing to make it loud. But like in the 5 6 hotel, sometimes the whole place will be rented 7 out. And once or twice it's great to have a big 8 loud party. But when it's, you know, every single 9 night of the week, going to the maximum decibel level, it gets to be a lot, you know, to be next 10 11 So, okay, thanks. to.

12 ZACH ERDEM: May I answer those questions? 13 MAYOR STUESSI: No. You're welcome to have 14 conversations afterwards. We're going to take public comments. We heard you speak and we know 15 16 what the rules are that are applied to it, and so we will -- we'll trust you that you're going to 17 operate it effectively. I would encourage you two 18 19 to speak separately since you're close neighbors. Would anybody else like to speak? 20

21 ZACH ERDEM: He's a nice guy, we met and chat 22 a couple of times.

23 MAYOR STUESSI: Please.

24RUTH SHANK: Ruth Shank, 320 Carpenter25Street. I'm on the corner of Carpenter and

1 Central. So my house does not really back up on 2 you, but the parking lot, which you're probably glad you have parking. But my concern is the 3 4 lighting in the parking lot. I know you need lighting for safety, probably, issues. There is a 5 6 streetlight there that provides lighting, and you don't need a lot of other downlighting for people 7 8 that -- coming and going. It's really annoying. 9 So that lighting is a big concern with me, as well as noise, which you've mentioned. I'm sure it's, 10 11 hopefully, going to be fine.

12 And my other issue is trash. I've dealt with 13 American Beech for like five years, and the garbage truck and the trash, every single time they come. 14 Trash in the streets, they leave it behind. They 15 16 were coming at 4:30 in the morning for a year getting the trash, so it's unacceptable. The code 17 is after 7 a.m., I think, for garbage pickup, so I 18 19 hope that you'll abide by that. And if your employees can check after the trash comes, to 20 21 remove what is left behind, I would appreciate it. 22 ZACH ERDEM: You're saying that the garbage 23 truck comes at 4 a.m.? 24 RUTH SHANK: They did for like a year. 25 ZACH ERDEM: So you want them to come 7?

1 RUTH SHANK: They did for about a year. 2 Finally, between the Mayor and the trash company and American Beech, they -- now they come at a 3 4 respectable time, but it took a lot of time to get 5 that in place. 6 ZACH ERDEM: I wasn't aware of that, but I 7 will address that in case. 8 RUTH SHANK: So no pickup before 7, and pick 9 up all the -- I mean, the guy picks up that big 10 garbage thing, he flips it over the top, and four 11 or five bottles, and whatever else, fall out on the 12 street, and he willy-nilly drives away and there 13 it is. ZACH ERDEM: Okay. 14 RUTH SHANK: And it's disgusting. And I'm 15 16 sure the neighbor that --17 ZACH ERDEM: I will address that immediately. 18 RUTH SHANK: Okay. So thank you and good luck. 19 ZACH ERDEM: Thank you. Thanks a lot. 20 MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you. 21 ZACH ERDEM: Thank you. 22 MAYOR STUESSI: Would anybody else from the public like to be heard? Nobody else? 23 24 (No Response) 25 MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. With that, we will

move on, and I will be reading the Village of Greenport Tree Committee report. This is the 2022 Annual Report to the Mayor and Trustees.

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The Village of Greenport Tree Committee is
pleased to present this report of its activities in
2022, a year in which we were able to resume all of
our normal activities after the retrenchment
brought on by the pandemic and resulting shutdown.

9 We are happy to report that the Village has 10 been granted its 17th Tree City USA award for 2022. 11 Our Advisory Committee Members are appointed, and 12 our actions are governed by the Tree Ordinance of 13 1991, which requires an annual report and public 14 outreach regarding the importance of our trees.

Main Missions: The removal of hazardous 15 16 Village trees is part of our first mission, safety. 17 There have been more than 352 trees removed since 18 the reestablishment of the Tree Committee in 2007, including 27 removals in 2022. We have the Village 19 20 Road Crew to thank for removing the majority of 21 these trees. Trees and stumps beyond their 22 capacity were put out to bid for pruning or removal 23 and stump-grinding.

The Diversification of Species: Since 2007,
we have vigorously upgraded and diversified the

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public trees we planted in the Village, having
 overseen the planting of over 537 trees, including
 24 in 2022.

4 The majority of the new trees planted in 2022 were acquired through the New York Power Authority 5 6 Tree Power Program, a program in which we ordered 7 order trees and NYPA matches our order with an 8 equal number of trees. This very valuable 9 programming is now emphasizing the use of native 10 species to diversify and sustain our tree canopy, 11 so it can better weather a changing climate.

12 One of the new species of native trees we 13 were happy to introduce to the Village is the 14 Black Tupelo, which is a prized source of nectar 15 and honey for local bees, in addition to having the 16 best fall color of any tree. Our tree census work 17 continues as we chart new gains and losses.

18 Maintenance and Pruning: Maintaining proper 19 pruning and care for the existing trees that grace 20 our Village is a huge task. By supporting 21 judicious pruning, we can help preserve our 22 existing canopy.

Again, in 2022, dozens of street trees were
pruned by Village crews. We continued monitoring
our ash trees, and consulting with the DEC Forest

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Health Diagnostic Lab regarding any suspected
infestation by the emerald ash borer. Two infested
ash trees were identified by the Village in 2022,
but we were able to have the diseased parts of the
trees removed at the recommendation of a certified
arborist in the expectation they will recover.

7 Community-wide Events, Outreach and 8 Education: In our annual Arbor Day Program, we 9 provided and helped plant 33 annual senior trees, a 10 Crimson King Maple at Greenport High School. 0ur 11 other regular out -- effort, distributing tree 12 seedlings to 4th Graders, and a talk on the 13 importance of trees was held in May of last year, when each student received a seedling of the 14 15 American Sweetgum tree. We have also helped to 16 provide trees in honor of remembrance of family and 17 The memorial trees are currently being friends. 18 recorded, cataloged and mapped.

19The Committee thanks Mayor Stuessi and the20Board of Trustees for their continued support of21our mission.

No, he's not. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 10 TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: He's available by text, if 12 you had some questions. 13 Okay. Well, no. TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I thought 14 maybe his -- so I had asked some questions in reviewing the InvoiceCloud proposal and by email, 15 16 and Treasurer Gaffga responded to those questions 17 and comments. I thought maybe they should be 18 incorporated, but that's okay. Did everyone see 19 them, or anyone have any questions about them? 20 MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. No, I did, I did read 21 them, and I think there's --22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I did, too. 23 TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah, I did, too. 24 MAYOR STUESSI: I think there's a couple of 25 things that can be tweaked. And, you know, when we

EASEMENT

THIS INDENTURE, made this _____ day of _____, between the **Village of Greenport**, a municipal corporation of the State of New York having its principal place of business at 236 Third Street, Greenport, NY 11944. (hereinafter referred to as "Grantor"); and the **County of Suffolk**, a municipal corporation of the State of New York with offices at Suffolk County Center, Center Drive, Riverhead, New York 11901 (hereinafter referred to as "Grantee"):

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Grantor covenants that it is seized of certain premises (the "Subject Premises") described in Schedule "A", attached hereto and made a part hereof, of which a Map or Survey is also attached hereto and made a part of hereof, as Schedule "B", and further the Grantor also covenants that it has good right and title to convey the Subject Premises; and

WHEREAS, the Grantor desires to participate in the Grantee's Downtown Revitalization / Beautification and Renewal Program, which will consist of a joint project in which the Grantee shall agree, pursuant to an intermunicipal agreement between the Grantor and the Grantee, to assist in the financing of the construction of certain infrastructure improvements on land not owned by the Grantee; and

WHEREAS, in conformity with the Grantee's Downtown Revitalization / Beautification and Renewal Program, the Grantor is required to grant an easement to the Grantee, comprised of that portion of the Subject Premises upon which such infrastructure improvements will be built, along with the real property necessary to gain access to such infrastructure improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Grantor desires to convey an easement, for the time period stipulated in paragraph 6 of this Indenture, on, over, across and in all or a portion of the Subject Premises to the Grantee, and its successors and assigns, for the purposes as set forth below:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Grantor does hereby grant and convey unto the Grantee, and its successors and assigns, an easement on, over, across and in the Subject Premises (hereinafter referred to as the "Easement," described in Schedule A, of which a map or survey is also attached as Schedule B).

Said Easement herein granted includes the following rights and privileges:

1. The right and privilege, but not the obligation or duty, to ascertain site conditions and/or inspect, build, operate, maintain, remediate and gain access, as necessary, to the following infrastructure improvements (the "Infrastructure

Improvements") at the Subject Premises without limitation, along with the real property necessary to gain access to such Infrastructure Improvements:

A) Installation of light sculptures along the wall of the alleyway connecting East Main Street and the Town-owned parking lot (on Peconic Riverfront), pursuant to Suffolk County Resolution 750-2022

2. Such right and privilege is for the purpose of protecting the Grantee's interest in this Easement only, and is not for the purpose of ensuring the safety of persons on or near the Subject Premises.

3. The right and privilege shall be deemed to include, but not be limited to, ingress and egress over the Subject Premises in order to accomplish the rights and privileges granted in paragraph 1 of this Easement; and

4. The right to clear and disturb, in any reasonable manner, form or way, without limitation, the Subject Premises to effectuate the terms of this Easement.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD, the rights and easements granted herein unto the Grantee, and its successors and assigns, and which shall run with the Subject Premises for the time period stipulated in paragraph 6 of this Easement, said Grantor and Grantee mutually agree and covenant as follows:

5. All Infrastructure Improvements as identified in paragraph 1 above, constructed by or on behalf of the Grantor, and its successors and assigns, upon the Easement, shall be and remain property of the Grantee, and its successors and assigns, until such time as this Easement is terminated.

6. a. This Easement shall commence upon its execution by the Grantor, and is deemed a condition precedent for the Grantee's participation in the funding of the Grantor's Infrastructure Improvements via the Grantee's issuance of its notes and /or bonds.

b. This Easement shall terminate upon the condition precedent of written notice given by the Grantee to the Grantor, upon the occurrence of either of the following events:

(i) That the subject notes and/or bonds issued to finance all or part of the costs of the Infrastructure Improvements are fully paid and retired.

(ii) Upon full payment by the Grantor to the Grantee, of an amount comprised of the outstanding principal amount of the Grantee's notes and/or bonds issued to finance all or part of the cost of the Infrastructure Improvements, plus all of the Grantee's issuance costs, interest costs, redemption premiums, and penalties, if any, and administrative soft costs therefore, should there be any failure to comply with the terms and conditions of the Capital Project Agreement between the Grantor and the Grantee of even date herewith.

7. The Grantee shall have the right of quiet enjoyment of said rights and easement.

8. The Grantee agrees to reasonably restore any Easement area(s) or other areas on the Subject Premises disturbed by the Grantee to a condition similar to that which existed prior to the disturbance.

9. The Grantor agrees that the terms, conditions, covenants, restrictions, and purposes of this Easement shall continue for the time period stipulated in paragraph 6 above, and the same shall be incorporated by reference in any subsequent deed or other legal instrument by which the Grantor divests itself of either the fee simple title to, or other possessory interest in the Subject Premises, or any portion thereof, specifically setting forth the date of this Easement and also the date that this Easement was recorded in the Suffolk County Clerk's Office, and the Liber and page thereof.

10. Except as set forth in paragraph 11 below, any rule of strict construction designed to limit the breadth of the restrictions in the use of the Easement shall not apply in the construction or interpretation of this Easement, and, this Easement shall be interpreted broadly to effectuate the purposes of this Easement as intended by the Grantor and Grantee.

11. The Grantor and Grantee acknowledge, agree and accept that this Easement shall be deemed to have been made pursuant to and in accordance with Suffolk County Legislative Resolution No. 808-1998 and the Rules and Regulations promulgated thereunder, and the Grantor shall be, and remain in compliance therewith.

12. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, the Grantor, and its successors and assigns, agree that anyone who legally uses the Subject Premises, shall have the reasonable right to reasonably cross over the Easement, so long as the Grantee's rights, privileges and usage, as stipulated in this Easement, are not obstructed thereby.

13. The Grantor shall maintain the Easement in good repair at its sole cost and expense.

14. The Grantor shall, at its sole cost and expense, secure any and all permits or licenses which may be lawfully required by, and shall abide by all laws, rules, regulations and codes of, each and every municipality and/or department and/or agency, whether federal, state, or local, having jurisdiction in or over the Easement.

15. It is intended by the parties to this Indenture that the Easement is necessary for the issuance of bonds in connection with the Grantee's Downtown Revitalization / Beautification and Renewal Program and the Grantor's participation in such program, and is not intended to establish any liability to the Grantee regarding any construction, building or work performed at the Subject Premises. The Grantor agrees that it shall protect, indemnify and hold harmless the Grantee and its officers, officials, employees, contractors, agents and other persons from and against all liabilities, fines, penalties, actions, damages, claims, demands, judgments, losses, costs, expenses, suits or actions and reasonable attorneys' fees, whatsoever, arising out of the acts, omissions or the negligence of the Grantor in connection with any construction, building and work performed at the Subject Premises, the use of the Subject Premises and this Easement. The Grantor shall defend the Grantee and its officers, officials, employees, contractors, agents and other persons in any claim and/or suit, including appeals, or at the Grantee's option, pay the Grantee reasonable attorneys' fees for defense of any such suit arising out of the acts, omissions or negligence of the Grantor, its officers, officials, employees, subcontractors or agents, if any, in connection with any construction, building and work performed at the Subject Premises, the use of the Subject Premises and this Easement.

16. The Grantor represents and warrants that neither the Grantor nor any official, officer, or employee of Grantor, has offered or given any gratuity to any official, employee or agent of Grantee, Suffolk County, New York State or any political party with the purpose or intent of securing favorable treatment with respect to the awarding or amending of an agreement, or the making of any determinations with respect to the performance of an agreement, and that Grantor has read and is familiar with the provisions of Suffolk County Local Law Number 32-1980.

17. The Grantor, in compliance with Section 13 of the Lien Law, hereby covenants that the Grantor will receive the funding provided by the Grantee under the Grantee's Downtown Revitalization / Beautification and Renewal Program and will hold the right to receive such consideration as a trust fund to be applied first for the purpose of paying the cost of the improvements and will apply the same first to the payment of the cost of the improvements before using any part of the total of the same for any purpose.

18. This Easement shall run with the land and shall be binding upon the parties thereto, their heirs, distributees, executors, successors, and assigns for the time period set forth in paragraph 6 above.

- We will assist the designated MS4 Coordinator to identify information on past village activities performed by other village staff familiar with stormwater control and administration activities during the permit year. This information will be incorporated into the draft report.

- We will draft the annual report on the fillable forms required for filing with the NYSDEC, and provide them for your review and comment.

- Furnish soils data including but not limited to reports, test borings, test pits, probings, subsurface exploration, soil bearing values, percolation tests, ground corrosion and resistivity test, all with appropriate professional interpretation, as may be required.
- Guarantee full and free access for Engineer to enter upon all property required for the performance of Engineers services under this Agreement.
- Hold all required special meetings, serve all required public and private notices, receive and act upon all
 protests and fulfill all requirements necessary in the development of the contracts and pay all costs incident
 thereto, including special application or regulatory fees for review of Project documents.
- Provide the Engineer with standard bid documents required and advertise for Proposals from Bidders, open the Proposals at the appointed time and place and pay costs incidental thereto.

Insurance

Engineer shall maintain insurance coverage throughout the duration of this contract of the following types and limits of coverage:

- Professional Liability / Errors and Omissions in the amount of \$2,000,000 per claim. Client agrees to limit the Engineer's liability to the greater of the Engineer's fee or \$50,000, except for liability arising solely from negligent acts by the Engineer.
- · Workmen's Compensation and Employer's Liability in amounts as required by law.
- General Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence / \$3,000,000 aggregate.
- Automobile Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence.
- Umbrella Liability Insurance in the amount of \$5,000,000 per occurrence / \$5,000,000 aggregate.

Client agrees to require, prior to the commencement of the construction work, that the Contractor and all Sub-Contractors shall submit evidence that he (they) have obtained for the period of the Construction Contract and guarantee period:

- Comprehensive general liability insurance coverage (including completed operations coverage). This

Billing and Payments

A retainer as specified in this proposal is required with the submission of the signed proposal. Only after receipt of such retainer will work commence. Payment on invoices for professional services or expenses incurred from outside contractors will be due upon receipt. Payment is not conditioned upon the Client's securing of mortgage monies, financing, or affirmative insurance coverage. Interest will accrue at the rate of 1 ½ % per month for overdue payments. Client acknowledges that payment of Engineer's invoices is not dependent on Client's securing of mortgages, financing or sale of assets. Any sales tax, value added tax, or similar tax levied on services or materials provided by the Engineer will be paid by Client in addition to all fees due to the Engineer.

Ownership of Documents

All Drawings, Specifications and other work product of the Engineer for the project are instruments of service for this project only and shall remain the property of the Engineer whether the project is completed or not. The Engineer grants Client the right to use these instruments of service for record keeping and maintenance purposes related to the scope of this project. Reuse of any of the instruments of service of the Engineer shall be at the Client on extensions of this Project or any other Project without the written permission of the Engineer shall be at the Client's risk and the Client agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Engineer from all claims, damages and expenses, including attorney's fees arising out of such unauthorized reuse by the Client or others acting through the Client. Any reuse or adaptation of Engineer's instruments of service shall entitle Engineer to further compensation in amounts to be agreed upon by the Client and the Engineer.

Delegation of Duties

Neither the Client nor the Engineer shall delegate his duties under this Agreement without the written consent of the other.

Termination

This Agreement may be terminated by either party by seven days written notice in the event of substantial failure to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement by the other party through no fault of the terminating party. If this Agreement is terminated, Engineer shall be paid for services performed to the termination notice date including Reimbursable Expenses due plus Termination Expenses. Termination Expenses are defined as Reimbursable Expenses directly attributable to termination plus 15% of the total compensation earned to the time of termination to account for Engineer's rescheduling adjustments, reassignment of personnel and related costs incurred due to termination.

Governing Law

Unless otherwise specified within this Proposal Statement, this Proposal Statement shall be governed by the law of the principal place of business of Engineer. Any dispute arising under this Agreement shall be resolved in the Courts of the State of New York.

Arbitration

Should litigation or arbitration occur between the parties relating to the provisions of this Statement, all litigation or arbitration expenses, collection expenses, witness fees, court costs and attorneys' fees incurred by the prevailing party shall be paid by the non-prevailing party to the prevailing party. Arbitration shall be non-binding on either party.

Unavoidable Delay

Neither party shall hold the other responsible for damages or delay in performance caused by acts of God, strikes, lockouts, accidents, or other events beyond the control of the other or the other's employees and agents.

Severability

In the event any provisions of this Statement shall be held to be invalid and unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall be valid and binding upon the parties. One or more waivers by either party of any provision, term, condition or covenant shall not be construed by the other party as a waiver of a subsequent breach of the same by the other party.

Interpretation of Subsurface Conditions

Client recognizes that subsurface conditions may vary from those observed at locations where borings, surveys, or explorations are made, and that site conditions may change with time. Data, interpretations and recommendations by the Engineer will be based solely on information available to the Engineer. The Engineer is responsible for those data, interpretations and recommendations, but will not be responsible for other parties' interpretations or use of the information developed. Services performed by the Engineer under this Agreement are expected by the Client to be conducted in a manner consistent with the level of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of the engineering profession practicing contemporaneously under similar conditions in the locality of the project. Under no circumstances is any warranty, expressed or implied, made in the connection with the providing of engineering services.

Construction Cost Opinions

Any opinion of the construction cost prepared by the Engineer represents its judgment as a design professional and is supplied for the general guidance of the Client. Since Engineer has no control over the cost of labor and material, or over competitive bidding or market conditions, Engineer does not guarantee the accuracy of such opinions as compared to contractor bids or actual cost to the client.

Construction Site Safety

Intermunicipal Agreement

This Agreement ("Agreement") is between the Town of Southold ("Town"), a municipal corporation of the State of New York, having an office at 53095 Route 25, Southold, New York 11971 and the Village of Greenport, a municipal corporation of the State of New York having an office at 236 Third Street, Greenport, New York 11944.

Term of Agreement: Shall be from May 20, 2023 through October 31, 2023

Total Cost of Agreement: As provided in this Agreement

Whereas, the Town presently employs individuals to operate pump out boats in the various Southold Town Waterways; and

Whereas, the Village would like to utilize those Town Pump Out Boat Services in Village Waterways during special events, when their Village Pump Out Boat is inoperable or as other emergency need arises; and

Whereas, the Town needs to have locations available to it for the offload of effluent waste from the Town Pump Out Boat;

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the mutual provisions and covenants hereafter set forth, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The Town will provide Pump Out Boat Services in Village Waterways when requested by the Village on an emergency basis and during special events in the Village from 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m., upon advanced seven (7) days written notice beginning May 20, 2023 through October 31, 2023, conditioned upon the availability of the Town's Pump Out Boat's regular duties, and as may otherwise be agreed by the Town and the Village.

2. The pump out boat and staff thereon provided by the Town under this Agreement shall have all appropriate certifications as required and appropriate for employment as a pump out boat operator during all times that they are providing services under this Agreement.

3. The individuals that are provided to the Village by the Town to work at the Village waterways shall at all times be and remain employees of the Town, and covered by all required and respective Town insurance and benefit plans, and have all salary and other compensation and other payments that may accrue or be due to them paid to them by the Town. The individuals shall at all times remain and considered to be employees of the Town.

4. In consideration of this agreement the Village shall waive any and all pump out boat offload fees for the Town at their Village pump station at Mitchell Marina during a period of special event service and/or emergency service. All other times the Town shall be permitted to offload, and the Village shall accept, effluent waste from the Town Trustees' Pump Out Boat at the Village Pump Out Station at a rate of fifty-five cents (\$0.55) per gallon. The Mitchell Marina Dock Master or his/

her designee and the Town Pump Out Boat Operator shall jointly agree on the amount of waste off loaded and shall note their records accordingly.

5. Indemnification: The Village agrees to hold harmless and indemnify the Town and its employees for any final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction to the extent attributable to the negligence of the Village or its officers or employees while acting within their scope or capacity of this agreement. The Town agrees to hold harmless and indemnify the Village and its employees for any final judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction to the extent attributable to the negligence of the Town or its officers or employees while acting within their scope or capacity of the Town or its officers or employees while acting within their scope or capacity of the Town or its officers or employees while acting within their scope or capacity of this agreement.

6. The Village of Greenport agrees to carry appropriate insurance coverage from claims of bodily injury, death or property damage that may arise from the performance of services under this agreement in limits of \$1,000,000 and \$1,000,000 aggregate liability for bodily injury and property damage. The Town shall be named as additional insured and a certificate of insurance shall be provided to the Office of the Town Clerk within 48 hours of execution of this Agreement.

7. It is expressly agreed that if any term or provision of this Agreement, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance, shall be held invalid or unenforceable to any extent, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term or provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and every other term and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and shall be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

8. It is expressly agreed that this Agreement represents the entire agreement of the parties, that all previous understandings are merged in this Agreement. No modification of this Agreement shall be valid unless written in the form of an Amendment and executed by both parties.


