1	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay?
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Anybody have anything for
4	Mary Bess to rely on the Chief to relay to the
5	Chief?
6	(No Response)
7	(Siren Sounded)
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Paul, if you could give your
9	report when the siren ends in a second, please.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Thank you. So just a
11	couple of items that were no not on the printed
12	version.
13	For the bathrooms, the handicapped
14	conversion of the bathrooms here to handicapped
15	accessibility, we've got everything all finalized.
16	We will be advertising the bids next week, and
17	scheduling it to open the bids on July 6th. My
18	hope is that we'll be able to award, award that on
19	the July meeting.
20	The antenna site, the generator, we got the
21	transfer switch all set, and then we discovered
22	that the generator has some issues with it with
23	the there's a control board and some general
24	maintenance. Not a big deal to fix. I believe
25	it's scheduled for Friday. It should be noted that

we don't actually own the generator, so that's not a cost to us. It's owned by the radio station and we're sharing it. We provide the transfer switch for both, both them and us, so they're willing to keep the generator operational for both entities.

On the microgrid project status, the only open item, as I've reported, is the batteries, which are now ready, they're in California.

They're -- they've gone through the preliminary testing for Underwriters Labs. They are nearly read to be shipped. Once they arrive here, the final field UL testing will take place, and then we can start the process of putting them in service.

I anticipate that all will probably take about two months total, so we should be fine. We have spoken with the granting agency from the State and they're okay with that schedule, as we discussed with them today.

The ferry queue, the only open item at this point is the MTA lease agreement. I believe that may be a work agreement, but both MTA. I did the -- there was a 90-day waiting period for the lease agreement in Albany, that just finished within the last couple of days. I have sent a request to the MTA to get an update on that. So,

hopefully, I'll get a response from them in the next week or so, and that will move that along.

For the net metering tariff, I did send that to NYPA. I'm just waiting for them to get back to me with what their actual process is, and if there's any additional information that they need. In my preliminary discussion with them, they didn't think it was heavy lift on their part, but there is a formal process that they go through to run it by the NYPA Trustees. So I don't believe it requires a hearing on their end, but they are going to let me know.

On the NYSERDA grants, as I have been reporting, we do have -- we have one grant that we have a -- we already have a contract with them, and that's a small grant to study using our micro -- microgrid -- sorry -- equipment as a way to minimize costs. The impact, if it works, would be negligible on our part, it's really just a study. We're part of a larger group of folks that's got some of these grants and that's our piece of it.

The other one has to do with street lighting, conversion of all of our street lights to LED, but the grant component is to use those street lights as an outage management system. The newer street

lights, you can purchase them with smart street lights, essentially, and the software that they can communicate with, and we would use that as an outage management system.

For an outage manage -- a true outage management system is in the hundreds of thousands of the dollars. We don't need this sophisticated system. So my thought was to try to use this in lieu of spending that kind of money, since we're going to convert the streetlights anyway. The cost differential is minor. And if that's work -- that works, then we have a basic outage management system.

On my resolutions, I know I only have one, but I actually have four. The pad mount switch purchase, I should be able to get a resolution prepared by -- in time for the meeting next week.

I did send out to you to ratify the Juneteenth as a holiday as part of the CSEA contract. I haven't heard anything, so I'm assuming everybody's comfortable with that as written.

I have another -- I think I sent an email on this, too, the Pride event road closure. In addition to the parade route, we had originally

said we were going to close Front Street from Main to Third. After speaking with a couple of Business Improvement District members and the Police Chief, it really makes more sense to close the lower -- lower Main Street as well, so that traffic doesn't go all the way down to Main and try to turn around. They can go down Carpenter if they need to. That's my other resolution.

And the last one, but I haven't sent anything out on, the Mayor and I met with representatives of the Sandy Beach Homeowners Association regarding the sewer extension. They're aware of our efforts to try to get additional grant money, but it is taking a lot longer than we ever anticipated. And the agreements with them we amended once to run through the end of this year. It makes sense to have it run to the end of 2024 at this stage. So I will have a resolution, which will be the same resolution as we did last year, but just extending it to 2024.

And if there's no questions on any of that, that's all have.

MAYOR STUESSI: Did you have something for the ship that we were allowing to come in?

25 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I didn't have. I know

1	there's a contract that I wasn't I didn't
2	MAYOR STUESSI: I thought you were putting
3	something out and there was a resolution being
4	drafted on it.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Not from me. I know
6	there's a if I did, I apologize.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. Well, I know Joe's not
8	here, so we let's make sure we address that and
9	get it taken care of.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Because they're going
11	to be here in a few days.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So I don't you
14	know, I apologize if I was supposed to prepare
15	that, I didn't realize.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Any other issues?
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, we might as well
19	name it. The Trinidad is coming in, correct?
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that's the
22	that's the ship?
23	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, the Nao Trinidad,
24	right.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, all right. And

1	they're supposed to dock, what is it, on Friday or
2	Saturday?
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I haven't gotten a
4	confirmation, but it's either Friday or Saturday.
5	They were originally going to come today, but they
6	didn't. And I had Rich wasn't in today, so I
7	couldn't ask.
8	TREASURER GAFFGA: Rick said yesterday Friday
9	was the anticipated day.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Friday, correct.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But that's what the emails
12	were, that Friday was the anticipated day.
13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Okay. I don't know
14	procedurally what we need to do, and the contract
15	is already prepared and they're coming here.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Let's ask Joe when he gets here.
17	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Okay.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: He's running late
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: because he was just
21	dealing with an issue in New York State Supreme
22	Court, which we'll be talking about later.
23	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And that's all I have.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Anybody have any other
25	questions for Paul?

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Stephen?
3	TREASURER GAFFGA: Good evening. In addition
4	to my work session that I submitted, I'm going to
5	be requesting three additional budget amendment
6	resolutions to be added for next week. I
7	circulated an email with them all attached so that
8	you guys could see them ahead of time, but I'll
9	just briefly go over them.
10	I have one resolution for a budget amendment
11	that's going to fund the ladder truck purchase for
12	the Fire Department. It's taking we got the
13	bond proceeds, it's in our wire account, but we
14	need to set up the budget for purchasing this
15	truck. So I just need to pass this so that I can
16	move the money around.
17	We there was a discussion with the Fire
18	Department. We're going to be using \$300,000 from
19	Fire Apparatus Reserve to go towards this purchase,
20	so that budget amendment will take care of all of
21	that.
22	I have an additional budget amendment that's
23	going to fund four additional cylinder heads for
24	Engines 5 and 6. This is from a resolution that

was passed in November. We had done a budget

25

amendment in January for the first four of the smaller cylinder heads. This is for four of the larger cylinder heads that were approved at the same time. Budget amendment wasn't done at that time, so this is just getting that together so a purchase order can be made, because according to Doug, our head lineman, he said that they're almost ready to start making them and be able to ship it. So that will be on for next week.

And lastly, which I think you all were talking about, there'll be one more additional resolution to appropriate reserves from the General Fund for the demolition of 224 North Street, and for the cleanup of the property at 229 Third Street. So that's -- that dollar amount that I circulated, that's what that's for. It's just about 26,000 or \$27,000.

And in listening to Paul's work session, it looks like I'm going to be adding one additional one for the pad mount switch for the radio tower, but I'll other get the dollar amounts from Paul and I'll circulate that as soon as it's ready, so before the meeting next week.

Other than that, that's all I really have to add on to my work session.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The contract for our
2	auditors, are we on the second year for Cullen &
3	Danowski or the third year?
4	TREASURER GAFFGA: This is the third year.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: This is the third year?
6	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yes. It's the engagement
7	letter just authorizing them to start and set up
8	the dates, and, I mean, I have preliminary dates now.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Because
10	traditionally, in the past, every three years we go
11	out to do a new RFP for accountants. So I just
12	think we need to be thinking about that.
13	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yep.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
15	TREASURER GAFFGA: That will be something
16	we'll want to do, I mean
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: After?
18	TREASURER GAFFGA: Not during the summer
19	while they're here
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no, no.
21	TREASURER GAFFGA: you know, but over the
22	winter, yes.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Winter right, yeah, but
24	it's I mean, it may be fine, but we've always
25	done that to make sure that the residents feel

1	secure that we have an accounting company that
2	checks us.
3	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah. And I need to
4	double-check anyway to make sure it was three years
5	and not four years.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Well
7	TREASURER GAFFGA: I have to verify that.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We did three years, but
9	then we extended one year for the previous
10	accountants. But I think we set a policy for every
11	three years, but check.
12	TREASURER GAFFGA: Uh-huh.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah, I plan on doing it,
15	it's on my radar.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I had a question about the
18	purchase order for the engine cylinder heads.
19	That's the Electric Department?
20	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It's for one of the trucks
22	with the lift or something?
23	TREASURER GAFFGA: No, it's for the engines,
24	the actual the diesel engines that
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Oh, it's the actual

1	engines?
2	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah, that can run. We
3	need replacement cylinder heads for them. If you
4	want to take it.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. These are just
6	really for stock material. Those engines are
7	virtually obsolete, so whenever we have an
8	opportunity to purchase them, we try to take it.
9	So that's what that was for.
10	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So you're not actually
11	changing the heads or
12	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: No, no.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay.
14	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: But it's about time,
15	they do have to be replaced. They crack, they have
16	leaks sometimes, and we just keep these as spares.
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: And how is that funded, the
18	purchase?
19	TREASURER GAFFGA: Through Light Fund
20	reserves. There's a Light Depreciation Account
21	that has enough money to cover this and amongst
22	you know, it's for capital improvements.
23	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thanks. And the
24	demolition, how is that funded, the demolition of
25	North Street, Third Street?

1	TREASURER GAFFGA: That's going to be through
2	General Fund Reserves, but the anticipation is, is
3	that we will get a resolution to approve it being
4	liened onto the property taxes for those
5	properties, which we will then be able to recoup
6	the money when either of those property taxes are
7	paid or that they're sold at a tax sale.
8	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
9	TREASURER GAFFGA: No problem.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: And I believe, as everybody
11	is aware, the house that's on Johnson, we're back
12	in court on that one. Unfortunately, there were
13	some issues that came up, so that's going to be
14	held over.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I guess my next question
16	is on the MUNI investment pool, the investment
17	savings that you put aside.
18	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yes.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What has the rates been on
20	that?
21	TREASURER GAFFGA: They it's been
22	continued climbing up. It's around 4.7 right now.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right.
24	TREASURER GAFFGA: That's the daily, you
25	know, the daily yield.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
2	TREASURER GAFFGA: If the Federal hikes
3	interest rates again, it will go up a little bit
4	more. At some point in the very near future, it
5	will plateau and probably stay stable for a while,
6	so take advantage of it while we can.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Have we had any
8	information from our LOSAP investment from
9	anywhere?
10	TREASURER GAFFGA: I mean, I get I get the
11	reports monthly, so I actually just got one today
12	that came in.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	TREASURER GAFFGA: I haven't had a chance to
15	dive into it yet, but
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Because I know
17	periodically there were transmittals that explained
18	their investment policies and whatever that I
19	haven't seen in a while. So I'm assuming that
20	perhaps the email needs to be changed to someone
21	else.
22	TREASURER GAFFGA: Probably.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Could you
24	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah, I don't know. I
25	mean, I

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Paul?
2	TREASURER GAFFGA: They know that I'm the key
3	point for that.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
5	TREASURER GAFFGA: But there hasn't been a
6	whole lot. I mean, I had a webinar with them back
7	in February, where they wanted to go in a slightly
8	more conservative investment manner.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	TREASURER GAFFGA: And it's kind of shown out
11	that way. They did you know, over the course of
12	2022, you know, stocks didn't do so great, so the
13	investment pool kind of lost a little bit, but, you
14	know, it's kind of climbing its way back a little
15	bit.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Usually, once yearly, a
17	representative from that investment for the LOSAP,
18	which is the firemen's retirement fund
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Right.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: comes out and gives us
21	a presentation. So do
22	MAYOR STUESSI: When does that typically
23	occur?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Usually February and March
25	or before.

1	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah, it's they did it
2	via a webinar.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: It's not on a fiscal year
4	report, end-of-year report
5	TREASURER GAFFGA: No.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: a calendar year?
7	TREASURER GAFFGA: No, they do they send
8	it out. It's a yearly like it's a calendar year
9	report that they send out.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: So if that's the case, we're
11	overdue for it and we should go ahead and schedule it.
12	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah. No, they already
13	I already had the meeting. They don't
14	MAYOR STUESSI: No, but I'm saying if it's
15	typically done in front of the Board, is what I'm
16	saying, right?
17	TREASURER GAFFGA: No.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, yes, it has. It
19	should be
20	TREASURER GAFFGA: I don't remember them
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, we yes, it should
22	typically, because we're the investment, they
23	should be presenting something for us in front of
24	the Board.
25	TREASURER GAFFGA: I'll reach out to Dave

1	Rogers and I'll see what what can set up.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If it was ceased, it was
3	ceased on perhaps COVID, or some other things. But
4	we have always in the past, since I've been on the
5	Board, there was some representation of explaining
6	the LOSAP, as we're the we're the governing body
7	that controls it, okay? All right.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: If you could reach out and
9	see when they're if they could make it to a
10	meeting.
11	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah, I'll find out when
12	the last time they were here. You know, I'll
13	find
14	MAYOR STUESSI: But more importantly for them
15	to come and go through
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that would be good.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: the numbers.
18	TREASURER GAFFGA: Okay.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm less concerned about when
20	they last presented.
21	TREASURER GAFFGA: All right.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Stephen, I have a question.
24	You manage our Housing Authority budget, too?
25	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yes.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: For the Federal Government.
2	Can you tell me about how many vouchers we
3	currently have that are being used in that program?
4	TREASURER GAFFGA: Last check, it was 79.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm sorry?
6	TREASURER GAFFGA: Seventy-nine.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Seventy-nine, okay. And do
8	we still have people that are looking that can't
9	find anything?
10	TREASURER GAFFGA: Not really, no.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
12	TREASURER GAFFGA: We're having you know,
13	we're lucky to be able to fill the ones that you
14	know, that we lose, so we're maintaining right now.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So then I guess the
16	next I'll ask the next question on that. Since
17	the property owners are advertising, I believe
18	they're called the boathouse properties, they're
19	advertising the five units?
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, they're doing that at
21	the specific request of the Village. They were
22	sent a legal letter, requested to come in. We met
23	with them and they put them on and
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We have a process that has
25	to continue with the Housing Authority?

1	MAYOR STUESSI: Right. So that they are in
2	the process of soliciting all the interest, and
3	then be needing to come in front of the Housing
4	Authority to review submissions.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
6	TREASURER GAFFGA: My
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Stephen, yeah.
8	TREASURER GAFFGA: My understanding is that
9	once all the applications have been submitted, and
10	that they were just going to verify through the
11	Housing Authority that they meet the actual
12	criteria for either working or living in the
13	Village. So that's the only role that the Housing
14	Authority would have.
15	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: On the income?
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'm sorry, what?
17	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: On the income,
18	are they going to verify it?
19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: There's no there's no
20	income
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's no income.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: criteria in that
23	agreement.
24	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I thought there
25	was, you know, like

1	MAYOR STUESSI: That's below 140,000.
2	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah, it's a
3	very pretty high number.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, it is. It's in the
5	hundreds, if I remember correctly.
6	TREASURER GAFFGA: I think it's 139,000 or
7	138,000.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But the reason I bring it
9	up is it might be might be to let the Chairman
10	know that this is in the works, and at some point
11	they're going to be receiving something, and they
12	may want to set a process how they're going to
13	review stuff. I think, you know, I don't I feel
14	that it's not fair to them to just say, "Oh, here,
15	you have to do this." I think they should be made
16	aware that it's going to be coming.
17	TREASURER GAFFGA: Yeah. No, I've had a
18	discussion
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, okay.
20	TREASURER GAFFGA: with Asha about what's
21	going to be coming down the pike. I mean, the
22	application itself is not really the way it should
23	have been set up, because they're not really
24	supposed to be coming to the Housing Authority to
25	get verified to submit their application, that's

1	supposed to be the process down the road.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, my understanding is
3	that they were supposed to be reviewed by the by
4	the Housing Authority Board, not Asha, so that's
5	why I'm asking the question.
6	TREASURER GAFFGA: Right.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, so
8	TREASURER GAFFGA: By the whole Board, but at
9	the end of the process; not during the process, but
10	at the end.
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: They were the way
12	it was structured is that they were going to
13	receive the the owners were going to receive the
14	applications and vet them, and then when they were
15	done with that, they were going to bring them over
16	to us to verify that what they did was correct.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's the way it was
19	structured.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So but I
21	still
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I wasn't if I may.
23	I'm not sure. Maybe that's on me or whoever else
24	was involved. I didn't realize that that meant the
25	Board, per se. It just said the Housing Authority.

1	Asha manages the Housing Authority, so
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My understanding, it was
3	supposed to go before the Board.
4	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's fine. I mean,
5	just we'll
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We will alert them of
8	that tomorrow
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: and let them know
11	that it will be coming their way at some point.
12	It's probably going to take some time anyway, but
13	just so that they're aware.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. At this point, I think
15	they're scheduling
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Interview I mean,
17	the
18	MAYOR STUESSI: They're giving tours
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: at the site, according to
21	the notification.
22	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I just feel that the
24	Board needs to be the Chairperson especially
25	needs to be involved, as I've had the newspapers

1	reaching out asking for a phone number, and I have
2	not really given it to them, because I wanted to
3	I'm not going to give it to them, but I told them
4	to call Village Hall, so that's why I'm bringing it
5	up, okay?
6	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: And we yeah. As
7	Stephen mentioned, in their advertisement, they
8	incorrectly said to go to the Housing Authority to
9	confirm something.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes, I know they did.
11	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It was very vague
12	wording, but that should never have been in there.
13	It created a lot of confusion for us. And we told
14	people, if they do call, that that is incorrect.
15	They're at this stage dealing with the realtors,
16	and then we will be involved, but not directly with
17	the applicants, only with the owner.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. Well, that's what
19	I've been telling them when they call me.
20	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yep.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: What is the best way for
23	interested people in the community to get on the
24	list here?
25	MAYOR STUESSI: There's an email address. I

1	could forward you a copy of the ad, and they're
2	supposed to email.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Email them.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: And it's going to one of the
5	partners in the development company who owns the
6	project.
7	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: And he has been I have
9	been talking to people and he has been responding
10	directly with the application and working to set up
11	times to review them.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Anything else for Stephen?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Nope.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Jeanmarie? Thank you,
16	Stephen.
17	TREASURER GAFFGA: No problem.
18	DEPUTY CLERK ODDON: Good evening. So we
19	have a new application was received for LH 326
20	Front Street Tenant LLC that's located at 326 Front
21	Street, which is also known as the Greenporter. We
22	received that on May 30th. It was published in
23	the today's paper.
24	There's two resolutions that are on the work
25	session meeting for the public assembly permit for

1	the Greenport High School, the graduation parade of
2	2023, that will be occurring on June 25th.
3	We have another one for the Clinton Memorial
4	A.M.E Zion Church and the Come to the Table
5	Committee for using the Village streets, and that's
6	going to occur on June 17th, which that is also on
7	the work session to be voted on tonight.
8	Additionally, we have a new application
9	was received from John Kramer/Central Ave 2nd
10	Annual Block party for an event date of July 30th,
11	2023. And an email I distributed that
12	notification to everyone.
13	I have several resolutions for Margo, and
14	then Margo had added a few more late this
15	afternoon, and I don't may not have all the
16	names. She had a few add-ons.
17	So first we have Ainsley Williams as a Summer
18	Camp Counselor at the wage of \$15.00 an hour.
19	She'll be effective June 26th.
20	Ratifying the hiring of Annie Antonucci,
21	she's a Summer Camp Counselor, and that wage is
22	\$15.00 an hour, and that was effective, June 1st.
23	A resolution hiring Brianna McElroy as a
24	Summer Camp Counselor at the rate of \$15.00 per
25	hour, and that's effective June 26th.

1	And one other one. Amelia Woods as a Summer
2	Camp Counselor, same rate, \$15.00 an hour, and it's
3	effective, June 26th.
4	And then I'll circulate tomorrow. She has a
5	few other two or three other ones that were able
6	to confirm that they would be able to work for us.
7	We have public hearings to be scheduled for
8	the July 27th, 2023 regular Board meeting, and
9	those are the two wetlands permits. One was
10	submitted by En-Consultants for Stirling Cove
11	Condominium on behalf of Robert Ward, the President
12	of the property located at 49 Stirling Cove,
13	property located at the eastern end of Central
14	Avenue.
15	The second one is a wetlands permit
16	application submitted by Greenport Yacht and
17	Shipbuilding Company, Inc., on behalf of Stephen
18	Clarke. He's the owner of the property located at
19	201 Carpenter Street, Greenport, New York
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Can I ask a question? Paul,
21	both of those are for maintenance only, correct,
22	nothing being rebuilt, obviously, within the
23	moratorium?
24	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct. The
25	Greenport Shipyard was an obvious one. The

1	condominium one was not quite so obvious, because
2	they were rearranging the docks. But as it turned
3	out, they're not changing the number of slips
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, okay.
5	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: they're just
6	reorganizing it, so since that would not
7	constitute an expansion, so it would not be brought
8	into the moratorium.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Jeanmarie, it's my
10	understanding that you need this Board to pass the
11	two resolutions that you mentioned before tonight.
12	DEPUTY CLERK ODDON: Yes. We have an
13	additional one, which is the demolition of the
14	bid demolition bid, so I have the two.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Does the Mayor have
16	a copy of that one?
17	DEPUTY CLERK ODDON: Everyone has a copy on
18	the front.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, it's underneath it?
20	Oh, okay, okay.
21	DEPUTY CLERK ODDON: And I added and then,
22	as you all notated before, when Joe arrives, we
23	have to ask about the Nao Trinidad resolution, that
24	should be tonight.
25	And then the only other thing I have is that,

1	Mayor Kevin, you had said that you were going to
2	announce several different appointments tonight.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Not tonight.
4	DEPUTY CLERK ODDON: Not tonight?
5	MAYOR STUESSI: We're still working on them.
6	DEPUTY CLERK ODDON: Still working?
7	MAYOR STUESSI: And they will be for next
8	week. I'm going to be circulating something for
9	the team. I am pleased to say we have somebody for
10	legal representation for Planning and Zoning, which
11	I'll send some information out to the Board. I'll
12	get it added to next week's meeting. So should we

18	great.
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: They're at
20	Gull Pond.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes.
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: So I had reached
23	out. A community member mentioned it to me and I
24	

article. And I reached out to them, and they'd

1 actually been in contact with the Village previously, so they were excited to hear from us 2 again. 3 4 And I attached -- they make it very, very 5 easy. 6	think that would be important to take a look at
7	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: on a map and everybody
9	could pick the feel comfortable for a spot,
10	yeah.
11	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I mean, the Glass
12	Beach area is pretty small.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
14	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I think it should
15	probably be by the stairs. But Fifth Street you
16	could go multiple ways, so yeah, we could
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, like I would think at
18	Fifth, you could have one at Fifth and one Sixth,
19	and somewhere in the middle of the park.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I haven't really
21	walked down Fourth Street recently, and I know the
22	Peconic Land Trust and you frequent it. Is
23	there garbage
24	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm there twice a day every day.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is there garbage along

TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah.

I mean,

especially in the summertime.

there it's very easy, and I think it
really encourages people to help clean up, so I
think that's a that's a good thing.
TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Maybe Sandy Beach as well?
TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Down, like down
by the monument?
TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's private property,
isn't it?
TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It's all private property?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the only
MAYOR STUESSI: That's a State park, isn't
it, I believe?
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sandy Beach.
TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It's our park, isn't it?
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, it's our park, but
most of the time the only access is through on the
waterfront, because you have to go through Sandy
Beach's private road to get to our section of it.
So most of the time the only time I see really
people that are on Sandy Beach
MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: is either they have
kayaked over, or have taken their boat over, or
MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: some who swim over the

1	channel, which makes me nervous, by that's okay.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: I know it's a good idea in
3	the sense that it's right at the edge of the
4	Village. Paul, could you send a note to the Sandy
5	Beach Association, I just met with on the sewer,
6	and ask them about it? Because I'm sure there's a
7	lot of people there that walk that beach frequently
8	who pick up trash. That would make it easier.
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Sounds good.
10	That's all I have.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you for all your work
12	on organizing everything for the Greenport Vision.
13	It was a big success, I appreciate it. Mary Bess?
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have been busy with the
15	Code Committee for the waterfront planning process.
16	We've been meeting every week, and it's getting
17	it's been rather intense for each meeting. And
18	we're coming to coming to the end of it, where,
19	hopefully, we will, by the July 6th presentation,
20	have our suggestions to present to the full Board.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Fantastic.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So I've been concentrating
23	on that.
24	As you know, I have been helping the Deputy
25	Clerk on some things, and have discovered some

1	processes and I.T. things that I believe we need to
2	update, and one of them is the Granicus account,
3	the IQM2, which is our streaming capabilities.
4	Today we ran into an issue trying to upload the
5	Vision.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, I'm well aware.
7	(Laughter)
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, I know. But I just
9	want to let everybody know that
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, yeah.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: part of the reason is
12	we're having some technical problems with it. Part
13	of the technical problems, I think, in reading some
14	of the new programs that Granicus has put out for
15	governmental streaming and governmental
16	information, we need to update. And I believe that
17	when we renewed the contract, we just renewed
18	whatever we had for the last couple of years. So I
19	would really like to have the opportunity to work
20	with the management team, to reach out to them, and
21	perhaps have a representative come out and give us
22	some ideas as to how to update things, and what the
23	cost would be at some point.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. No, I definitely think
25	it's worth getting into, and just making sure we

1	schedule the time when we have the right people in
2	the room.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that's
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, that's what I wanted
6	to talk about.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: It's one of the challenges,
8	is staffing at Village Hall, as you know, and
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: everybody's working
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, no, I
12	understand that, but I
13	MAYOR STUESSI: hard to just get the
14	basics done.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I think we need to
16	reach out to them to get some ideas and information
17	flowing to us to review, so we have some idea when
18	we have discussions.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Yep.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't like to waste
21	time, so I think the more, the better information
22	we have, the more options we can look at, and the
23	more Stephen can look at the costs and tell me yay
24	and nay, and no or yes, or whatever. But I do
25	think we want to update my understanding is that

1	we're looking, trying to get an encoder into the
2	Schoolhouse, so that meetings can be recorded in
3	there when they can't meet in the Firehouse here.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. Well, there's been
5	discussions with Altice as part of the contract
6	proposal. Paul and I have a followup with them a
7	week from tomorrow, I believe.
8	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Correct.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: And that is one of the
10	locations that we're looking for additional
11	equipment.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So in thinking that
13	through, if we're going to be putting equipment in
14	there, I would prefer to put updated equipment and
15	not not
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, it would be it would
17	be brand new.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, then we need to talk
21	to
22	MAYOR STUESSI: And we're looking at a
23	replacement elsewhere as well.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. But, you know, as
25	I said, the encoder, if I understand it correctly,

1	the encoder that we have can no longer be updated,
2	so I think it's time that we look at it.
3	My other question is, is the server, which I
4	wanted to ask Paul, the server for the Village, are
5	we on track on having that updated, or are they on
6	their way?
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yes.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah?
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: I don't have the
10	schedule of this. I don't have the schedule yet.
11	There are two different components that they are
12	they are unfortunately, they're having trouble
13	getting getting them. It's not just us, and not
14	just this, there's nothing unique about it. The
15	suppliers are just that far behind, but they're
16	prepared to do it as soon as those parts come in.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, all right. As I
18	said, most of my work has been concentrating on the
19	Code Committee and helping the Deputy Clerk.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay?
22	MAYOR STUESSI: And our new Zoning and
23	Planning Counsel has very deep development
24	experience as well.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: So we'll be inviting them to
2	attend
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: the Code Committee
5	meetings, which I think would be enormously
6	helpful.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, great, that's
8	fantastic.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Patrick?
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I didn't prepare work for
13	this work session. I'm mostly focused on the work
14	of the Harbor Management Committee
15	MAYOR STUESSI: You've been busy.
16	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: and continuing with
17	that, so nothing to report tonight.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Julia?
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just wanted to talk a
20	little bit about the fact that we, with the Mayor,
21	had a Gate meeting on June 1st at Village Hall, the
22	beginning of what we hope to be a much more
23	interactive, collaborative effort on the part of
24	that committee.
25	At the meeting I brought a sample of a

1	welcome packet that Deborah Rivera did a couple of
2	years ago, and she's going to be working on
3	revising that and bringing that up to date. That
4	will be offered to any new business to come to
5	Village Hall. It will be on a rack, and possibly
6	on probably online as well.
7	We just kind of highlighted topics that we're
8	going to be discussing over the coming months of
9	meetings in terms of sidewalk encumbrances, trash,
10	employee parking is a big one, truck parking, and
11	also updating the tax map numbers for the BID.
12	They want to look into tax map numbers, and they're
13	hoping that by revised assessments, that they will
14	be able to increase their budget and do more things
15	for the Village, more events.
16	I went to I went to their annual meeting
17	yesterday, as did the Mayor, and I think Lily and
18	Patrick.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Everybody was there, all of
20	us, yep.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We were all there.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We were all there.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There was a it was a
24	wonderful presentation. Really a lot of things
25	that the BID had done this past year, they had a

1	great slide show, and they're hoping to do even
2	more things in the future. So, you know, I
3	think I look forward to that collaboration.
4	And the only other thing I did want to
5	discuss as a Board discussion, possibly later on,
6	is the fact that I've been concerned about the
7	electric bikes on the sidewalks and on the
8	boardwalk. I've had several encounters where I've
9	observed dangerous behavior. I my feeling is
10	that there should be signage up in the Village that
11	states that electric bikes and scooters are not
12	permitted on sidewalks or the boardwalk. How do
13	you feel about that?
14	MAYOR STUESSI: My personal opinion is I know
15	there are children that are young children using
16	some of these electric scooters that don't go as
17	fast. But on the opposite side, some of these
18	bicycles they have go extremely fast. I've never
19	seen one on the boardwalk or had an issue with
20	them, but I have on the streets
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The streets.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: you know, walking and
23	riding my bike.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Anybody else have any

1	experience?
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, yes, I they don't
3	stop for stop signs and they
4	MAYOR STUESSI: I can say the same thing
5	about most drivers in the Village, being somebody
6	who's always on his bike.
7	(Laughter)
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes. Well, it's a
9	common thing, it's a common thing, but I've seen
10	too much I've seen quite a few scooting through
11	on the roadway, where they have no regard for
12	vehicles at all, and scoot around. If you come to
13	the stop sign, they just keep scooting around. I
14	don't know if it's thinking they're under the
15	impression, because they're an electric bike or the
16	scooters, that they have the right-of-way, which I
17	don't think they do. I don't know what the
18	legal you know, what the Police Department would
19	say with them being on the vehicle with them
20	being on the road. I don't know what the law says.
21	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I mean, are
22	regular bikes supposed to be on the sidewalk?
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Not on the sidewalk, no.
25	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: No. So, I mean,

1	I would think electric bikes also are not really
2	supposed to be on the sidewalk. It's a question of
3	enforcement.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You know, I mean
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, Paul.
6	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: If I could just
7	mention, not about the sidewalks or the roads, but
8	the marina does have signs. So I just wrote myself
9	a note to double-check that they're all refreshed
10	for no bikes, no skateboards. All those things are
11	listed on a several locations throughout the
12	marina. I'll get with the Marina Manager and make
13	sure we get those refreshed.
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I'd just like to add a
15	comment to Trustee Robin's report. I thought the
16	BID presentation and all those things were very
17	impressive, and all the work they're doing, and I
18	found it very encouraging.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I agree, yeah.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. I think when you start
21	looking at bicycles and things like this, this
22	would be great to bring to the community in
23	different ways with some additional work and
24	feedback from people.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Topic for discussion at the

1	Gate meeting about the bicycles?
2	MAYOR STUESSI: No, no, I mean as part of the
3	Waterfront Advisory Committee and their subcommittee.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, okay, yeah, yeah.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Absolutely, yeah. Just by
7	the way, after we had that meeting the other night,
8	I've had five people approach me about serving on
9	my committee.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, congratulations.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. No.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: Let's get the list together
13	and review it.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And we're going to try for
15	other committees right now, too, we'll put it out
16	there, but I don't see anybody here. But we're
17	also really looking for some new people, new
18	younger people, maybe, to come onto the Carousel
19	Committee. I know Dave Abatelli and I have both
20	spoken about the fact that it would be great to get
21	some younger people, maybe somebody that has kids,
22	or whatever, to get a fresh perspective on that
23	committee, so.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: You should bring it up at the
25	next Vision meeting.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I will. Okay, thank you.
2	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Trustee Robins, does your
3	Gate Committee discussion include anything on the
4	sandwich boards, the sidewalk signs?
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: We will. They're part of
6	sidewalk encumbrances, we consider that, yeah,
7	because they're kind of expanding and spreading
8	throughout the sidewalks.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: It's an interesting subject
10	you bring up, and one that hasn't been enforced,
11	I'd say, equally throughout the Village a number of
12	different ways.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yep.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: But not just sandwich
15	boards
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, it is.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: but other things that
18	people are placing in front of their stores. And
19	we've had a number of BID meetings that I have
20	attended, and then the Gate meetings as well. What
21	I was waiting for was the new Board to be
22	established, and then my hope was, as part of Gate,
23	we would have a meeting with them and have a
2.4	
24	discussion about what's allowed and what's not

1 to everybody across the Board, because the rules 2 are in place for a reason. And another one that's problematic is trash 3 4 dumpsters that aren't screened the way they should be. TRUSTEE ROBINS: 5 Right. 6 MAYOR STUESSI: So that over time hasn't been 7 managed the way it should. We have certain places 8 that do a great job of -- a great example would be 9 Green Hill, where we were for that BID meeting, and 10 they built a nice enclosure, and then we can walk 11 along the back and there's a whole number of others 12 that don't. TRUSTEE ROBINS: On South Street. Actually, 13 14 about four or five years ago the BID had established a sidewalk policy --15 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes. TRUSTEE ROBINS: -- of sandwich boards, you 17 know, where there had to be like 5 feet of clear 18 19 sidewalk space. They were pretty good at enforcing 20 It kind of fell apart a little bit during 21 COVID and parklets, and everything like that, so 22 it's definitely time to reeval -- you know, 23 reevaluate all of that. But they were pretty 24 effective in coming up with a policy, and, you 25 know, they were kind of self-policing it.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: No. I think that's the ideal
2	way to do it
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: is to get them to work
5	together.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Because it's always better if
8	one could say to their neighbor, "Hey, by the way,
9	did you read the" you know, this is the rule,
10	rather than the Village having to take Code
11	Enforcement out to
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: For sure, for sure.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Because we're strapped as it
14	is on dealing with Code Enforcement, so we get
15	somebody else on board.
16	Paul, do you want to give a quick update on
17	where we are relative to bringing on another Code
18	Enforcement person in the process?
19	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. We have an
20	advertisement. We posted on the website, and we
21	have an advertisement going in the paper, I think
22	it went in today. It closes in two weeks. I've
23	gotten a number of resumés. We're going to start
24	doing interviews even before the ad closes, and,
25	hopefully, we can get someone in quickly. That's

1	where we are with that. That was just to be
2	clear, those are both part-time and full-time.
3	That's how the advertisement ran.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, yep.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I will ask the
6	question that I've been asked a couple of times.
7	When will we be starting the timed parking
8	enforcement?
9	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's up to you all.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I'm just I'm
11	just
12	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Whatever direction you
13	provide.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The only reason I'm asking
15	is I've been asked by a lot people, I'm sure,
16	Julia, you have, too, you know, when is the parking
17	enforcement going to start, so.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: We're going to get some
19	people on board.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, that's
23	MAYOR STUESSI: That's the biggest issue.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think you can't run Alex
25	ragged, you know.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: He already is. I mean
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: He his.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: He is.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: If anybody deserves kudos in
5	this Village at this moment, it's Alex, who I wish
6	was here, has done a stellar job in dealing with a
7	whole lot of work over, you know, a good amount of
8	time, so.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have a question about
10	parking enforcement. Does the Village enforce
11	parking in the post office parking lot?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, that belongs to the
13	post office.
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I mean, does the Village
15	have any part of that parking lot, like the access
16	down to the park?
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I believe my
18	understanding is that they allow us to go across it
19	to get there, but the United States Government owns
20	the property.
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I mean, the Postal Service
23	owns property.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, it is a fire access for
25	a truck.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: For that, yeah. For
2	there, yeah. But I'll be honest with you, we
3	really should perhaps, and this is a thought, start
4	some type of negotiations to have first rights of
5	refusal refusal if they should decide to sell
6	that property, because it is important to Mitchell
7	Park. So I don't know how you would go about that.
8	That's something
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Why don't we discuss that
10	at
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, but it's a thought.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: our session with Joe
13	later, yeah.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You know, I do notice when
16	they're doing the setup for Dances in the Park that
17	vehicles come up that access road. I saw one the
18	other day, actually, it was a private person who
19	parked there, you know, and went down to their
20	boat, and they did leave eventually. But that
21	technically is a fire lane, it should be kept
22	clear.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, it should be.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I mean, there should be
25	signage, and then park on the grass, you know, if

1	you have to.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Since we brought up that
3	area, the fencing that went up, are we going to
4	paint it the same color has the rest of what
5	Mitchell Park is?
6	MAYOR STUESSI: It's going to age
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: like that, because it's
9	cedar, the same.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: What I'd like to do at the
12	right moment is potentially get some additional
13	planting
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: in front of it.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: We removed two dead trees, as
18	well as what else, Paul? There was an old
19	electrical box and then a propane tank that was
20	buried there too, right?
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. The propane
22	tank was removed. The electric equipment there is
23	still active. We're going to try to clean it up a
24	little bit. There's no it's really just a
25	shell, it's not structural in any way, and it's

1	really now behind the fence, which has
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
3	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: really been an
4	eyesore.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did you say there's an
6	active transformer in there?
7	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah, there's a
8	transformer and two transformers and a switch.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, when I walked around
10	it, there was no opening to get in there. Is
11	there how are they
12	MAYOR STUESSI: There is a gate on the
13	easternmost end.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, is there a gate?
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, there is, okay.
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: We're making
17	additional provisions if we have to operate the
18	switch and use it. For whatever reason, it was
19	neglected, what we put in, so we'll be providing
20	access.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay. I mean, when I
22	walked around it, I Mark, the Captain brought it
23	to my attention
24	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Sure.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: when we walked around

1	the question of requesting of them to get emergency
2	striping done so that nobody parks there.

13	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Right where the at
14	the end, at the end of the parking lot?
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
16	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yep.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: And, frankly, it might even
18	make sense to suggest to them that we could provide
19	something that would work, and if they want us to
20	paint it and
21	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: That's yeah.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Otherwise, we might be
23	sitting here nine months from now and still not
24	have an approval.
25	ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Kind of what I plan

mean, I think it's -- when is -- at 5 o'clock, you know, it kind of changes over. It's not limited to customer parking, then it's kind of open, because this -- in other words, that's their tow timeline. It ends at 5, right, whenever -
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. Well, it closes at 5. But I do know that there's been -- over the last year, I have observed when I've gone in, and the parking lot's been full and there's been no one in the post office.

TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yes.

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TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And the Postmaster, the

1	previous Postmaster, he did post new signs and they
2	did try to control it a little bit. But I think
3	they're just as short of staff as everybody else
4	is, so but I've seen many people just do park
5	and walk across the street, because they think it's
6	a you know, it really should have a signage that
7	says "Post Office Private Parking"
8	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I think the new
9	signs have helped, actually, because I work across
10	the street and it's worse than it used to be.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is there a sign? Like
12	what is
13	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: There's a sign
14	that says, "Post Office Parking" and it says you'll
15	be towed. And not always, but I think it helps. I
16	think it's helped some, because some people are
17	scared.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It says for postal customers
19	only.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, but I know that's
21	on there, but it's just some people don't read it.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: And my only other thing was I
23	just wanted to thank everybody on the Board for all
24	their effort as part of the Waterfront Advisory
25	Committee. I know there's been a lot of hours put

1	into it, and there's a lot more going into it, and
2	to those in the community that are participating.
3	Mr. Saladino in the audience put a lot of time into
4	it as well, and then, Randy, you have as well,
5	anybody else who might be listening and watching.
6	With that, I will open it up to the public to
7	address the Board. Is there anybody who would like
8	to be heard?
9	MARY YOURCH: I do.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Fantastic.
11	MARY YOURCH: Is that active, or should I
12	stand here?
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Head over, please. Nobody is
14	in your way, fortunately, so you won't knock them
15	over, I know how fast you are.
16	(Laughter)
17	MARY YOURCH: Randy sat over there, so I'm
18	fine.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: She made a point of that,
20	anyway.
21	MARY YOURCH: Okay. I'm Mary Yourch,
22	15 Stirling Cove, Greenport. I had two things.
23	The first thing you brought to my mind by talking
24	about Sandy Beach.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes.

MARY YOURCH: I live across from Sandy Beach.
There's a jetty that extends out, and a lot of
people fish there. Last year there was on a
Sunday morning, there were I counted 65 people
there. I texted Scott Russell, and by the end of
the day, where actually pretty quickly he had taken
care of that. I questioned him, do they have
fishing licenses, where they park their cars, and
what do they use for bathrooms.
MAYOR STUESSI: So I could answer this
question
MARY YOURCH: Okay.
MAYOR STUESSI: for you because of one of
my recent meetings with the Police Chief. And he
had discussed with me that they had be on an
operation. They've done it a couple of times going
throughout Southold Town, including that specific
location, specifically looking at this issue. And
so they are working to cite people for fishing

use, they change the license plate on it, so a

illegally without a license, parking in a place

that they can't park, etcetera, and it's a problem

throughout the community. One of the challenges is

some of the cars even that certain individuals will

ticket is meaningless, but they are taking a look

1 at it. 2 MARY YOURCH: Yep. And I think I texted him 3 again this year. 4 MAYOR STUESSI: And as you know, that jetty is in Southold Town, not in the Village of 5 Greenport. 6 7 MARY YOURCH: Right, that's why I involved 8 Scott Russell. But what we notice is that when 9 there's a lot of people out there, we have a lot of 10 garbage on our beach, and so that's part of the 11 problem. When there's less, there's still garbage, 12 but it's less. 13 The other thing I wanted to say is that I am very aware of the work that a Trustee puts in. 14 Paul knows, and several of you know, my husband was 15 16 a Trustee of Rockville Centre for 18 years, and I 17 know what it's like to be a Trustee. 18 I want to thank you guys for all you're doing on this Waterfront Committee. That was incredible 19 20 on Tuesday night what I saw, and you're all doing it on your own time. And I wish that I had been 21 22 able to speak there, because I wanted you to get 23 applause from everybody there, because this is 24 incredible, and it's because you love Greenport.
