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2 (The meeting was called to order
3 at 7:00 p.m.)

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Call the meeting
5 to order.

6 Let's pledge to the flag.

7 (Whereupon, all stood for the
8 pledge of allegiance.)

9 (There was a moment of silence for
10 James R. Foster, Robert Bouldin Howard,
11 Jr., William Randall Hulse, James Mark,
12 Ekaterini Sakarellos, Ismael M.
13 Santiago, Raymonde Stankevich, and Judy
14 Marshall.)

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: We got a list of
16 announcements here.

17 The Halloween Parade will begin at
18 the carousel at noon October 29th,
19 that's a Saturday. All parade
20 participants will be treated to a free
21 carousel ride beginning after 11:00
22 a.m.

23 The annual Fire Department hydrant
24 testing will take place on October 30th
25 starting at 9:00 a.m., so everybody

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1 just refrain from doing laundry from
2 8:30 'til noon, especially your sheets
3 and your whites. The discoloration
4 will go away pretty quickly, just run
5 your tap for a while and it will clear
6 up.
7

8 The Village offices will be closed
9 on November 11th in observance of
10 Veterans Day. November 21, 2016 is the
11 first day that the Village Clerk may
12 accept absentee ballot applications for
13 the upcoming Village of Greenport
14 Trustees Election to be held on March
15 21, 2017.

16 The Village offices will be closed
17 on November 24th and 25th in
18 celebration of Thanksgiving.

19 The November Regular Meeting of
20 the Board of Trustees will be held on
21 November 28th, owing to the Village
22 Hall being closed for the Thanksgiving
23 holiday.

24 Also, the curbs and paving project
25 that we had talked about at the work
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1 session, something that's been in the
2 works for several months, is going to
3 be starting on Monday, Monday morning
4 on Carpenter Street. They're going to
5 be doing curbs, the sidewalks, and
6 aprons first with paving to follow.
7 They're also doing it on Monsell
8 between Main and Stirling, curbs and
9 sidewalks there, and then that will be
10 repaved also.
11

12 So that's starting 8 o'clock
13 Monday morning, just so everybody
14 knows.

15 If you park in those areas, try to
16 park somewhere else or across the
17 street. Most of Carpenter Street where
18 the work's being done is all no parking
19 anyway, so it shouldn't be an issue
20 there, but just keep the cars out of
21 the way so the guys can get the work
22 done.

23 Okay. That's all we have under
24 announcements.

25 Public hearings, we have none.

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1
2 Move to public to address the
3 Board.

4 Your name and address for the
5 record, please.

6 MS. ALLEN: Chatty Allen, Fifth
7 Avenue.

8 I just have a question about the
9 paving.

10 Was the bus company notified that
11 that's going to be done because we use
12 Carpenter and we use Main?\

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: They're doing the
14 curbs and sidewalks first. First
15 they're going to start excavating and
16 doing forms on the side of the road.
17 The roads will not be blocked, you just
18 can't be parking along there.

19 MS. ALLEN: Okay. That's all I
20 wanted to know. To make sure that I
21 can get --

22 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. The roads
23 will be open and everything, you just
24 can't park your car, they're going to
25 be doing the curb.

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1
2 MS. ALLEN: All right. I just
3 wanted to make sure because we had
4 another issue where people didn't
5 realize these were closed.

6 Thank you.

7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Paving will take
8 probably a couple weeks by the time
9 they get the curbs and sidewalks done
10 and then paving afterwards.

11 Okay. Anybody else wish to
12 address the Board?

13 MR. HARRIS: Good evening, members
14 of the Board. My name is Pete Harris.
15 I reside at 212 Knapp Place, Greenport.

16 I'm here tonight to thank the
17 Village Board for having appointed me
18 this past summer and into the early
19 fall as your Greenport Harbor Code
20 Enforcement individual.

21 I know there was some skepticism
22 about this position at the outset, but
23 I've, not just because I was the person
24 in charge, but I can tell you what a
25 difference of the way and the manner in
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1 which our visiting boaters, as well as
2 our local boaters, the way that it was.

3
4 The first weekend out there, it
5 was like a rodeo and from just
6 communicating with the boaters that,
7 you know, you're not yelling, you don't
8 yell, you don't scream, you just point
9 out to the fact that you're visiting
10 Greenport, and we have rules and
11 regulations for boaters just as any
12 other town that has a harbor front, and
13 we only would ask that you respect our
14 boating laws; and I have to tell you,
15 for the most part you only had to speak
16 to a boater once, and you would see
17 them come into Greenport Harbor and as
18 soon as they just got outside of the
19 five-mile-an-hour buoys that cordoned
20 off Greenport Harbor, they would slow
21 right down and proceed into the docking
22 area.

23 So at this time, again, I would
24 just sincerely like to thank you for
25 having given me the opportunity to
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1
2 serve this Village, and hopefully
3 you'll do it again next year, and I'd
4 like to be rehired.

5 Thank you.

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you for
7 doing the good job for us.

8 MS. GORDON: Linda Gordon, 218
9 Fifth Street.

10 I just want to speak a little bit
11 about Greenport's rentals.

12 Governor Cuomo has taken care of
13 the Airbnb as you probably know, it
14 takes effect soon, and they have to do
15 30-day rentals.

16 I think it's time for the Village
17 to step up and do their part with the
18 overcrowding that we have in the
19 rentals. There are, I don't know if
20 you all know some of these things, but
21 people are paying up to \$850 for a room
22 in a house where they share a bathroom
23 and they have no kitchen facilities.
24 The landlords are making a lot of money
25 and hence, there is no rental space for
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1
2 people who want it because you get five
3 people in there for anywhere from 500
4 to 800 which gives you a lot more
5 disposable income and they do very
6 well, so I'd like to see the Village
7 step up and do something about that.

8 I was wondering why next door at
9 214 Fifth Street, which has always been
10 an issue for the past few years, there
11 are so many children getting on and off
12 the bus from the downstairs apartment.

13 The upstairs apartment has a young
14 boy, mother, a gentleman, and a young
15 man, it's -- they're fine.

16 Downstairs -- it took me three
17 weeks to find out from the school that
18 for children to have bus service, they
19 have to either have a lease or a
20 utility bill, so next door is a
21 two-family rental, upstairs is fine;
22 downstairs, there would be, I don't
23 know if you would consider it too much,
24 but I was told there are five families
25 that are registered in the apartment

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1 that I was inquiring about. So either
2 they are making up the leases or Mr.
3 Russel from Mattituck is making up the
4 leases or people are coming and
5 changing the names on the utility
6 bills, but there are five families
7 registered in a one-family apartment to
8 take the bus and go to school in
9 Greenport, so that's one way of finding
10 out, but there's too many, too much
11 going on in that apartment space.

12 That's it. Thank you.

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

14 MR. REED: Mike Reed, 430 Front
15 Street.

16 I just have a question for you
17 guys.

18 How is the process going with the
19 new ZBA appointment; what's going on
20 with that?

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: The Board tabled
22 it last month. The Deputy Mayor is
23 doing interviews and he's going to
24 report back to me next week.

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2 MR. REED: How many did you get
3 this time?

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Four people
5 applied for the position.

6 MR. REED: They are going to go
7 for best qualified, right?

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: We're going to go
9 through the resumes, and yes.

10 MR. REED: Thank you.

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
12 to address the Board?

13 MR. SWISKEY: William Swiskey, 184
14 Fifth Street. Couple of items on the
15 agenda, just give me a second.

16 At the hospital, I guess you're
17 giving them six months to give you a
18 drainage plan.

19 What happens if they don't give
20 you the drainage plan?

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: We'll have to go
22 back after them and try to enforce it.

23 MR. SWISKEY: It's kind tough
24 after they get what they want, isn't
25 it, to enforce something?

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2 MAYOR HUBBARD: They have almost
3 got everything that they wanted --
4 they're almost completed with the
5 process, we caught them three quarters
6 of the way through it, we tried to make
7 them go backwards and go and do it
8 properly, so we're trying to have them
9 coming for compliance boards, you know,
10 we're not going to shut them down
11 because of it, but we're going to
12 enforce, I mean -- how do you want to
13 word it? Strictly enforce the fact
14 that they need to come up with a
15 drainage plan for that piece of
16 property.

17 MR. SWISKEY: What happens if they
18 don't?

19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Mayor, may I?

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes.

21 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If you read the
22 resolution, it says that their permit
23 is predicated on providing the Village
24 with a drainage plan, so they'll either
25 go out of permit, they won't be able to
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1
2 get their final wetlands permit until
3 they provide the Village with a
4 drainage plan.

5 MR. SWISKEY: For them, that's
6 nothing. They'll have the wall up.
7 You have no leverage left, you realize
8 that. When you do something -- in six
9 months, I wouldn't give them more than
10 90 days, 60 days, they could actually,
11 they got an engineer, he can come
12 up with -- you won't let anybody
13 proceed with a house, give a CO unless
14 they have a drainage plan. You put two
15 new gutters on the house, you've got to
16 have a drainage plan. These people
17 have completely changed the contour and
18 the way the water is going to flow to
19 the end of that street. That 12 inches
20 of that porous material or whatever
21 you're doing is not gonna trap that
22 much water. They got two little drains
23 along the whole route of that east
24 wall. That water rushes right by in
25 any kind of rain and it winds up as the

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2 Village's problem. You've solved their
3 MS4 problem for them, basically you're
4 going to have to pay to fix their
5 runoff solution; and irks me a little
6 bit, and you have no plug left, you're
7 giving them six months, they'll finish
8 that project in a month and then what
9 are you gonna do? You have no plug,
10 it's -- what are you, gonna fine them,
11 you gonna take them to court, you
12 gonna -- I don't know, you must have a
13 plan if they don't. What would be the
14 plan if they don't comply?

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: The plan right now
16 is they said they will comply and I'm
17 leaning on good faith that they're
18 gonna take care of what they have to do
19 being the civic-minded organization
20 that they are.

21 MR. SWISKEY: If they were a
22 civic-minded organization when they
23 started this with what they knew to be
24 necessary permits, and it was only some
25 citizens' hollering that made the

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2 Village finally enforce its own code on
3 it. I mean, I was told by somebody in
4 the Village Hall, the mayor hadn't
5 decided what we were going to do yet
6 when we were complaining about it, they
7 just started a project. I mean, I have
8 very little faith in it. I think in
9 six months, they'll just, ha ha; and I
10 think the Village Board, in order to
11 make, to enforce it on anybody else,
12 you gotta start here, because what are
13 you gonna tell the next guy, this,
14 this, when the hospital just went ha
15 ha. I mean, on good faith is not good
16 enough, George. What are you gonna do
17 if they don't do what you're telling
18 them?

19 MAYOR HUBBARD: We will deal with
20 that in six months, Bill. The Board is
21 voting on the resolution, it could get
22 changed to 90 days, you mentioned that
23 at the work session, this is what the
24 Trustees had come up with and that's
25 what we're gonna go and try to enforce.

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2 I mean, I'm sure with everything
3 they have going on at the hospital,
4 they're gonna come back with some other
5 things, if they come back for the next
6 thing, we'll say, look you didn't
7 comply the last time, you can't do
8 anything else.

9 MR. SWISKEY: I think you're just
10 giving them the shed away, but we do
11 that a lot in the Village to certain
12 people, and other people, they get
13 plugged.

14 The second item I wanted to ask
15 about is \$140,000 just on one bill for
16 Stago Supply (phonetic) for Number 4
17 Engine, you had a previous bill from
18 them for 25,000 so that brings it up to
19 165,000, you add total labor charges
20 and everything else, this was a
21 half-a-million dollar breakdown; how
22 did it happen?

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: There was a crack
24 in one of the cylinder heads. Paul,
25 you can --

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2 MR. PALLAS: There was, initially
3 there was a crack in one of the
4 cylinder heads. When we had ordered
5 the contractor to effect that repair,
6 they examined the entire engine and
7 found other issues on the engine which
8 were not directly related to that
9 issue.

10 MR. SWISKEY: Those issues weren't
11 there last year; how did they get
12 there? Did something happen to the
13 engine, was it improperly operated?

14 MR. PALLAS: Bill, to be honest, I
15 don't know if those issues were there
16 last year or not because you couldn't
17 see them unless we took the engine
18 apart.

19 MR. SWISKEY: No. I'm talking
20 about these things, you know, they just
21 don't happen. That engine was rebuilt
22 in the early 1990s, it's got less than
23 1,000 hours on it; for it to wind up in
24 this -- this was basically
25 almost-trashed condition; what happened

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2 to it? Was there -- I mean did you
3 overload it, did you overheat it?

4 MR. PALLAS: There was no
5 overloading; there was no overheating.
6 These were long-term issues that were
7 discovered on the engine.

8 MR. SWISKEY: Like the
9 intercooler, come on, Paul, I know
10 better than that. You can feed that to
11 them, but not to me.

12 What happened to the engine?

13 MR. PALLAS: I'm not feeding
14 anything to anyone, Bill, there were
15 several things found as part of the --

16 MR. SWISKEY: An engine block just
17 don't crack like that, something
18 dynamically happened to it to -- you
19 have been running it for tests for
20 years, even under the previous
21 administration, previous engineer and
22 previous -- in other words, this water
23 problem never showed up, now it shows
24 up. Something happened to that engine.

25 MR. PALLAS: Bill, I've answered
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1
2 your question; I don't know what more I
3 can say.

4 MR. SWISKEY: The truth maybe.

5 MR. PALLAS: I gave you the truth.

6 MR. SWISKEY: I don't believe your
7 truth, Paul, it doesn't happen that
8 way.

9 It's a quarter-of-a-million
10 dollars, this Board had better start
11 looking serious at what's going on.

12 Do you have another problem with
13 Number 5 Engine?

14 MR. PALLAS: Not that I'm aware
15 of.

16 MR. SWISKEY: You don't have leaky
17 heads?

18 MR. PALLAS: Again, I don't --
19 I'll find out and let you know.

20 MR. SWISKEY: You're the
21 superintendent, you should know.

22 MR. PALLAS: I'm not aware of
23 anything specific.

24 MR. SWISKEY: What are you aware
25 of?

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2 MR. PALLAS: Nothing specific, so
3 I'm not aware of any specific issues
4 with Engine Number 5.

5 MR. SWISKEY: That's a lot of duck
6 and dodge, but if you're willing to
7 accept it, fine.

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
9 to address the Board?

10 MR. SALADINO: John Saladino,
11 Sixth Street.

12 Just if you could, when you vote
13 on the two wetlands permits, if you
14 could put the time limit on them, the
15 two-year time limit.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: I though that had
17 become standard procedure.

18 MR. SALADINO: Until it's
19 codified.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, but it's not
21 on there.

22 MR. SALADINO: Until it's
23 codified, I'm going to kind of keep
24 asking you, so we don't wind up with
25 20-year-old wetlands permits.

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2 MAYOR HUBBARD: We had talked
3 about that previously, and I didn't
4 catch that it wasn't on there, but that
5 is the intention.

6 MR. SALADINO: Thank you.

7 MR. REED: Mike Reed, 430 Front
8 Street.

9 Paul, when the heads were take
10 off, were they magnaflux.

11 MR. PALLAS: I don't know, I'd
12 have to check the report.

13 MR. REED: I'm just curious about
14 that because usually you have bad
15 heads, if they're not visible, you have
16 them sent out to be magnafluxed for
17 verification of crackage [sic] in the
18 heads.

19 MR. PALLAS: They weren't sent
20 out, they brought a lot of equipment in
21 to do a lot of different testing, so I
22 have to check, I honestly don't know.

23 MR. REED: Okay. I just wanted to
24 check on that.

25 Thank you.

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2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish
3 to address the Board?

4 MR. McSHEA: I'm sorry, I was a
5 few moments late. Chris McShea, 149
6 Fifth Street.

7 Is this just a general addressing?

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, address the
9 Board on any topic.

10 MR. McSHEA: Hello. I just want
11 to see if there had been any updates,
12 again, I apologize if I missed it
13 because I was late, on the PSE&G
14 project at all; has there been any
15 progression or anything?

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: We haven't had
17 anything new that happened from the
18 work session from last week 'til today.

19 MR. McSHEA: Is there any
20 progression chart or flow that you guys
21 have with PSE&G going on or is there
22 communications like, daily, weekly?

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: We haven't had
24 anything new that came up with them
25 yet. I'm hoping to hear something from
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1
2 them shortly. I've got nothing new
3 that I can say besides what we had at
4 the work session.

5 Hopefully we'll hear something, I
6 mean the DEC is, I believe by the
7 beginning of next month, they're
8 supposed to have their answer on the
9 issues, but right now, we're just
10 waiting to try to finish negotiations
11 to see if we're even doing anything.

12 MR. McSHEA: Has there been any
13 specifics changed with the financial
14 portion of the compensation for the
15 project. We're talking about \$1
16 million at one time, I'm just wondering
17 if there has been any increase, many
18 residents have requested an increase to
19 that number. Has that been proposed to
20 PSE&G?

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: A proposal went
22 back in to them with an increase of the
23 value of the contract and they have not
24 given a firm answer back on that at
25 this point.

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2 MR. McSHEA: So that's based on
3 the \$30 million total portion of the
4 contract or what was the value of the
5 contract.

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thirty million
7 dollar contract, that's what they're
8 paying their contractors to do it. The
9 Village's portion, the Trustees had a
10 meeting, they came back with a
11 proposal, put it in and said this is
12 Village demands at a higher dollar
13 amount than what was originally talked
14 about last month, and they have not
15 responded back yet.

16 MR. McSHEA: Is there a number of
17 --

18 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. It's ongoing
19 negotiations, I really can't say a
20 number on that.

21 MR. McSHEA: Is it based on a
22 certain system or a certain evaluation
23 or is this just a number that you came
24 up with?

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: It was a number
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2 that was done through good conscience
3 through meetings and talked about and
4 it was a number that went back out to
5 them.

6 MR. McSHEA: Okay.

7 There hasn't been, no one has
8 reached out to a private assessing firm
9 or anything for further --

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: The Village
11 Attorney talked to a couple, they
12 didn't have anything going on that, he
13 has nothing to answer back on doing the
14 independent appraisal because at this
15 point, we're in negotiations, but it's
16 not a really strong feel anywhere, and
17 we didn't want as a Board to go and
18 spend a whole lot of money to find out
19 that we're not getting anything, so we
20 don't have a written contract, we don't
21 have -- no additional paperwork has
22 come from them that we've been asking
23 for a couple months and at this point
24 it's kind of like beating your head
25 against a cement wall, so we made an
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2 offer back to them and said
3 eye-in-the-sky number, they haven't
4 responded back and they have also given
5 no paperwork pending to us.

6 MR. McSHEA: You have made a
7 pie-in-the-sky number offer?

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: I would say it's
9 close to that, yes.

10 MR. McSHEA: Would that number be
11 above or below \$10 million?

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: I can't get into
13 specifics. It's just -- there was a
14 number that the Board felt more
15 comfortable with than what had been
16 there before. I'm not trying to be --
17 a number was thrown back to them, they
18 haven't responded back with a number.

19 MR. McSHEA: At this point, would
20 you say that the project would probably
21 be terminated or postponed to a later
22 date and would not really have a
23 successful starting point of, even from
24 now on to the spring?

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: The problem is,
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1 the mayor really gave all the
2 information that there is to give at
3 this time, and if anything else was
4 said -- I would recommend against
5 anything else being said, other than
6 general questions about what's
7 happening. There really isn't anything
8 to update you on.

10 MR. McSHEA: I just want to
11 express my concerns that there are
12 people working on the State road for
13 PSE&G, it's a private contractor;
14 they're getting all their ducks in
15 line. It seems like this is just
16 imminent to happen.

17 ATTORNEY PROKOP: When was the
18 last time you saw somebody working
19 there?

20 MR. McSHEA: Probably nine days
21 ago.

22 ATTORNEY PROKOP: So you haven't
23 seen anybody in nine days, right?

24 MR. McSHEA: No.

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: That was

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1 mentioned to them.

2
3 MR. McSHEA: Of course.

4 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Every time we've
5 gotten a report about somebody working,
6 whether it was inside the Village or
7 outside the Village, it was mentioned.

8 MR. McSHEA: My concern is that it
9 is greatly undervalued. Obviously
10 you've heard this prior. I do have the
11 right to be here and speak. I just
12 would wish whatever your personal
13 feelings, do any of you feel that this
14 may be worth upwards of \$10 million or
15 upwards of \$5 million?

16 I don't understand why there would
17 be such hesitance to talk about the
18 project.

19 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Because it can
20 hurt the Village's negotiating
21 position. We can't talk about it,
22 we're in negotiations.

23 MR. McSHEA: Okay.

24 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: I appreciate
25 what you're trying to do, but we have
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1
2 to protect the Village.

3 MR. McSHEA: Okay.

4 That fact that you have leverage

5 --

6 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I wanted to
7 point out to you that this meeting is
8 televised, we're not in a closed
9 session here, and it was pointed out to
10 us by LIPA that they actually watch
11 these meetings, so I don't think that
12 for several reasons and that being one
13 of them, I don't think it's a really
14 good idea for any of us to discuss
15 anything that has to do with the
16 negotiation.

17 MR. McSHEA: Granted.

18 ATTORNEY PROKOP: By saying that,
19 I don't want to say that there is
20 negotiations, but I agree with Trustee
21 Roberts.

22 MR. McSHEA: I'm just trying to
23 speak here and just gather some
24 information, and you're just obviously
25 not going to offer --

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MAYOR HUBBARD: I didn't say that.

You're trying to gather information. We don't have a project. Before we vote on anything, the public will have more than enough time to review anything we're going to do.

MR. McSHEA: Okay, great.

MAYOR HUBBARD: We're not going to sneak something in on the last page of the agenda. We're not voting on anything this evening.

MR. McSHEA: What would be the lead time for you to come to us, I don't know, is it your idea that you can just vote on it without the public or will you be coming to us and throwing it out to us?

MAYOR HUBBARD: The public would know about it. We have letters from your attorney that says they want to be informed before we take any other actions. We've got all that information. We're not going to sneak something in, that's not the way I

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1
2 operate and none of the Board would
3 operate the same way, so before we vote
4 on anything, the public will know about
5 it.

6 MR. McSHEA: That's excellent to
7 know. I appreciate your candidness and
8 that's really what I wanted to hear
9 from day one.

10 Thank you very much. Have a good
11 night. Thank you.

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you.

13 Anybody else wish to address the
14 Board?

15 (No response.)

16 Okay. We'll move on to the
17 regular agenda.

18 Offer resolution number 10-2016-1.
19 Resolution adopting the October 2016
20 agenda as printed.

21 So moved.

22 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Second.

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?

24 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.

25 TRUSTEE ROBERTS: Aye.

Proceedings 10-27-16

1 TRUSTEE ROBBINS: Aye.

2 TRUSTEE MARTILOTTA: Aye.

3 MAYOR HUBBARD: Opposed?

19 not involved in the wetlands permit, is

22 outside, the plan is encompassing the
23 foundation that's actually outside the
24 flood plan.

25 ATTORNEY PROKOP: I think the
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2 generator should be taken out of this
3 resolution. It doesn't have anything
4 to do with the wetlands permit.

5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's the
6 first question. The second question
7 is, I'm the one that brought up about
8 the drainage plan, which I think is a
9 strong requirement for the hospital to
10 do; but in the meantime, we want to
11 give them a two-year approval on the
12 permit, so how does that play out to
13 the Village attorney?

14 ATTORNEY PROKOP: Well, one of the
15 things about this permit is the portion
16 of the wall that is subject to the
17 wetlands permit has actually already
18 been constructed, only about 20 feet of
19 the full wall is subject to the
20 wetlands permit, as I understand it.

22 meanders in and out for that I don't
