1 (The Meeting was Called to Order at 7 p.m.)

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Call the meeting to
3 order with the Pledge to the Flag.

4 (Pledge of Allegiance)

5 MAYOR HUBBARD: Please remain standing for a
6 moment of silence for Joseph Patrick Kane, Miriam
7 P. Khan, Douglas M. Latney, Sr., Carla Marie
8 McMann, Edna Quatroche, and Brian A. Staples.

9 (Moment of Silence)

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Thank you. Okay. Under
11 announcements, I talked about this at the work
12 session, but for the regular meeting, Patrick
13 Brennan has been appointed to the Village of
14 Greenport Planning Board.

15 Also, I'm moving this up from down lower.
16 This is a new category we created to welcome
17 people that open up new business and do new
18 transactions in the Village. So I'd like to
19 welcome Lori Panarello from Craft Hair, Kathy
20 Lofrese from North Fork Bikes, Anna Dubin and
21 Rosanna Fiedler from The Arc Room. We're just
22 going to do that, let people know, let them know
23 they're welcomed to the Village, come and see us
24 any time. And then anybody knows, they're looking
25 for a new hair salon or something, there's a new

1 place in town. So that's something we're going to
2 try to do, any new businesses that open up.

3 TRUSTEE ROBINS: And, Mayor, I might
4 mention, the BID has a welcome packet for new
5 businesses. So if anybody would like to reach
6 out, I'd be happy to share that information with
7 them.

8 MAYOR HUBBARD: Sure.

9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: With the new businesses
10 owners, okay?

11 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, very good. Thank you.

12 TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're welcome.

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. We'll move on to
14 Public Hearings.

15 *A public hearing regarding the Wetlands*
16 *Permit Application submitted by Cole Environmental*
17 *Services on behalf of Paula Casey for the property*
18 *located at 20 Beach Street (aka Sandy Beach Road).*

19 I'll open up the public hearing. If you
20 wish to address the Board, come up to the podium,
21 your name and address for the record for the
22 Transcriptionist and --

23 DENNIS COLE: Okay. My name is Dennis
24 Cole, Cole Environmental Services, for Paul Casey,
25 I'm the agent. Address, 215 Horton Court,

1 Manorville, New York. And the business office is
2 425 Montauk Highway in East Quogue.

3 Our understanding is that there were some
4 issues that were outstanding on the plans that
5 needed to be addressed. I don't know if we've
6 adequately satisfied you at this point.

7 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There are -- if I
8 may, Mr. Mayor

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yeah. I was going to say,
10 the CAC could do that first thing.

11 DENNIS COLE: Okay. I'm sorry.

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, that's fine.

13 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: So we did another
14 look at the plans just now with the applicant. It
15 appears that some of the information we just
16 didn't notice on the plans. There's just a few
17 minor things related to the fill and excavation
18 that's missing. That's the only -- it looks -- at
19 this point, it looks like the only outstanding
20 piece of information.

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, that's fine. Okay,
22 thank you.

23 DENNIS COLE: So we're very happy to, you
24 know, open the hearing and keep it open, and we'll
25 get this information back to you as soon as

1 possible.

2 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, very good. Okay.

3 DENNIS COLE: Is there any other questions?

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. Thank you.

5 DENNIS COLE: You're welcome.

6 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish to address
7 this topic?

8 (No Response)

9 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I'll offer a motion
10 to keep the public hearing open for one month to
11 get them to supply the additional information that
12 the CAC had talked about with the Village
13 Administrator.

14 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Second.

15 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I'll second.

16 MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?

17 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Aye.

18 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.

19 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.

20 MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.

21 Opposed?

22 (No Response)

23 MAYOR HUBBARD: Motion carried.

24 We have a *public hearing regarding the*

25 *Wetlands Permit Application submitted by Costello*

1 *Marine Contracting on behalf of Nathaniel and*
2 *Emily Ewing for the property located at 230 Fourth*
3 *Street.*

4 Paul, you want to go through the CAC report
5 on that?

6 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: Yeah. We had a
7 site -- Mr. Mayor, we had a site visit on this
8 application. We didn't find any issues at all.
9 The CAC has no comments on this application.

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Any comments from the
11 public?

12 JACK COSTELLO: Hey, Board. Jack Costello,
13 Costello Marine, Fifth Street, Greenport. Just
14 here to answer any questions. The application is
15 very simple, we just want to move it along as
16 quickly as possible.

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Any questions?

18 TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.

19 MAYOR HUBBARD: I think it was all
20 straightforward. I don't think there was any
21 issues or any questions about it. We had talked
22 about this a while ago and there was change that
23 just got put on. Didn't we already do this, but I
24 don't think we officially approved the
25 application; is that correct, Paul?

1 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: There was actually
2 two right next to each other. I think we got
3 confused because the addresses were almost the
4 same. And they were -- literally, the bulkhead's
5 kind of joined --

6 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, it's all --

7 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- so I think we
8 thought we had done it.

9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's all --

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, it's all together.

12 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: It's one continuous
13 piece, so --

14 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.

15 ADMINISTRATOR PALLAS: -- that's where the
16 confusion was.

17 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I don't see any
18 issues, so we should be able to move this forward
19 for you.

20 JACK COSTELLO: Thank you, guys.

21 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. Any other comments on
22 that Public Hearing?

23 (No Response)

24 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay. I offer a motion to
25 close the public hearing, and we'll take a vote on

1 that next week.

2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second

3 MAYOR HUBBARD: All in favor?

4 TRUSTEE CLARKE: Aye.

5 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.

6 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.

7 MAYOR HUBBARD: Aye.

8 Opposed?

9 (No Response)

10 MAYOR HUBBARD: Motion carried.

11 All right. Continue -- *Continuation of the*
12 *public hearing regarding a proposed local law*
13 *amending Section 150-12(C) and amending Sections*
14 *150-12(A), 150-16(A)(1) and Section 150-16(G) to*
15 *amend the parking regulations of the Village of*
16 *Greenport.*

17 This is a continuation of a public hearing
18 we had last month. If there's anybody that has
19 additional comments towards that, the Village
20 Attorney has worked on including the Planning
21 Board members' comments and stuff into that
22 proposed Local Law. And we'll take public
23 comments on that.

24 MR. PROKOP: So, as you said, I have -- I
25 have a draft that's incorporated the comments that

1 were received from the Planning Board. I have to
2 review it with Management and then it will be
3 distribute -- it will be distributed after that.

4 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay.

5 PATRICIA HAMMES: Hi. Patricia Hammes,
6 603 Main Street. I'm a member of the Planning
7 Board, but here in my personal capacity. This is
8 a little bit about the parking, but it kind of all
9 relates to other things you've been discussing
10 around it. So I didn't know if I should talk now
11 or talk at the general public to address the Board
12 thing, but maybe on the parking stuff, I guess.

13 I appreciate that you guys are doing work on
14 it, and I look forward to seeing the revised
15 draft. I guess I just wanted to say I was not at
16 last week's work session, but I watched the tape.
17 And I think I wanted to emphasize that I was in
18 total agreement with the statements that Deputy
19 Mayor Martilotta made at the last meeting about
20 the importance of identifying specific or keyholes
21 for moving forward and developing solutions to
22 address a lot of the current and potentially
23 future challenges affecting development in the
24 Village, including this, this parking issue.

25 I think the Deputy Mayor was entirely

1 correct when he stated that it seems like
2 different Board Members had different goals in
3 considering the proposed parking code amendments
4 over the last six-plus months, and that in some
5 instances, the issue that some members of the
6 Board are seeking to address isn't even, I don't
7 think, parking per se, but really relates to --
8 and this is where it feeds over into probably
9 comments that would be better in the next session,
10 public comments. But the discussions have been
11 taking place about a moratorium and potential code
12 changes on the -- on the Waterfront Commercial and
13 the Commercial Retail District uses and the like.

14 And I -- and I use as an example, I mean, in
15 fact Trustee Clarke at last week's meeting
16 specifically stated that his key focus in
17 reviewing the amendments wasn't really on impact
18 on the parking resources in the Village, but,
19 rather, as a tool for kind of calming, or
20 quieting, or addressing development in the
21 Village.

22 And a lot of the discussion that's taken
23 place by this Board around parking in the last six
24 months has really degenerated back into that
25 conversation about uses, proper uses, maintenance

1 of the Waterfront Commercial area, what the -- the
2 intense -- for lack of a better word, everybody
3 likes to use the words intensification of use in
4 the downtown area is.

5 And I guess I just think that in moving
6 forward with further discussions on this, it would
7 be really important for this Board to kind of
8 identify a core objective that we're trying to
9 achieve with this, these amendments, and this
10 would go for, frankly, any other amendments that
11 the Board proceeds with on these. Because it's
12 really hard, both as a Planning Board member and,
13 frankly, as a -- as a community member to really,
14 you know, provide kind of input, or think about
15 things if you don't know what the ultimate goal
16 is, because you don't know how to measure it in
17 terms of what it's trying to achieve.

18 I think it's a perfect example that, you
19 know, if we're trying -- I mean, if the goal of
20 this is to address parking, I think there's been a
21 lot of discussion. There's not -- there's not a
22 place right now that's obvious to put parking. We
23 could talk about Moores Lane all we want, but I
24 can use the example of one of the pending
25 developments, right? This is before the Planning

1 Board, this is the hotel proposal, right? I mean,
2 they've made it clear, they're more than happy to
3 make the payment in lieu of provision. And,
4 frankly, you could probably increase it and they
5 would still be happy to do it, but that's not
6 going to create parking spaces. It's not going to
7 actually delay development of that spot, unless
8 it's turned down for other reasons. So it doesn't
9 meet either of those goals, from what I can tell,
10 if you change this.

11 So I guess I just -- I continue to kind of
12 struggle on this parking, this, you know,
13 abolition of the exemption, and whether that's
14 really -- what that's really going to accomplish,
15 and if it's really the goal that everybody's
16 trying to get to.

17 I guess related to that, I did hear you all
18 say at last week's meeting that the genesis for
19 this was the Planning Board asking for input and
20 guidance. And I guess two thoughts I had on that,
21 one was when I go back and I look at the last six,
22 nine months of Board meetings among you all, I
23 trace this all back to when Julia Robins --
24 Trustee Robins, sorry, brought this up at last
25 September's meeting, and she had started her

1 discussions about wanting to look at a moratorium
2 because of concerns about development in the
3 downtown area, and the response, well, this would
4 probably be an easy way to address that. So I
5 don't really view this as directly responsive to
6 the Planning Board.

7 And what I can tell you, as a member of the
8 Planning Board, is that prior to COVID, for sure,
9 there were discussions on the Planning Board about
10 the fact that almost every proposal that came
11 before the Planning Board, somebody raised
12 parking, like what are we going to do about
13 parking? What are we going to do about parking?
14 And, frankly, the then consultant to the Planning
15 Board would always put it in their discussion
16 points. And from the Planning Board's
17 perspective, it was a little frustrating, because
18 it was clear that in most instances, buildings
19 were exempt from requiring to provide parking.

20 So in terms of like why are we sitting here
21 talking about parking when there's nothing, our
22 hands are tied, we can't do anything about
23 parking. This change isn't going to make us still
24 do anything about parking, let's just be honest
25 about that, right? And so I think one of the

1 conversations we did say at that meeting, in some
2 of the Planning Board meetings at that time, was
3 like, look, this parking conversation, we can't as
4 a Planning Board do anything about that. If
5 there's a view that there's a parking problem in
6 the Village, that's a code issue, and that needs
7 to, in the first instance, go before the Trustees.
8 And maybe that's where you all are getting this
9 genesis coming from the Planning Board, but I
10 don't think the Planning Board ever thought that
11 necessarily, or we never discussed whether the
12 right answer was eliminating the grandfathering
13 exemption.

14 And moreover, I think if you read the report
15 that we wrote on the original draft of the law, it
16 was pretty clear that we weren't sure that this
17 law will accomplish any of the possible goals that
18 you could identify for it.

19 So I guess I, again, was just very concerned
20 about where this is going and whether this is
21 going to accomplish something. And wouldn't we
22 all be better off using the time to do some of the
23 other things that have been mentioned that might
24 have a greater effect, including looking at the
25 permitted uses in the WC and the RC Districts?

1 Sorry, I just want to make sure I'm not
2 missing anything here. Again, I guess I go back
3 to, you know, you need to state an objective, and
4 then you need to like look at what you're changing
5 and really think about it, and think about
6 concrete examples, which is kind of what the
7 Planning Board did in terms of whether you're
8 going to achieve that example, and I would just
9 hope this Board can do that.

10 I do think that the idea of having a Code
11 Committee to help on these things I understand may
12 not have worked in the past. But I think there
13 are people that, including myself, frankly, would
14 be more than willing to help and have time, and
15 could help, you know, take some of the burden off
16 of people that have a lot of other things that
17 they need to take care of that are really
18 important in this Village.

19 So I know the Planning Board specifically
20 said in their memo that we would be happy to help
21 in any way that we could. So I would encourage
22 you to consider that as a resource that you could
23 tap into as you discuss some of these things in
24 terms of moving forward on the parking amendments.

25 And, again, even though it's not related to

1 the parking, on the moratorium point, without
2 getting into discussing whether I support it or
3 not, I know there's a lot of discussion about
4 timing on that. I would just note for you all
5 it's not that easy. You can't just next month
6 make some code changes and pass it, you're going
7 to have to go back through the 45-day review
8 process for the Planning Board if you do anything
9 with the zoning chapter or change the zoning map,
10 and also have public comments. So you're talking
11 at least two or three months, no matter how minor
12 the change probably may seem to do that. So, from
13 that perspective, I think you should take that
14 into account in determining whether or not you
15 think some kind of a temporary moratorium might
16 make sense in that period of time.

17 And I guess that's really it. I mean,
18 again, it's not specifically just related to the
19 parking proposed amendments, but it's partly a
20 process issue and concern. And I get the
21 frustration that you all feel. I've sat through
22 these meetings. I've sat through the meeting on
23 the noise ordinance, which, you know, stalled out
24 because of COVID. And I probably was one of the
25 reasons that that stalled out, because I thought

1 there were a lot of issues with the drafting of
2 it. It's just that unless you substantively say
3 this is what we're trying to achieve, and then
4 carefully draft it to achieve that, it creates all
5 kinds of ripple effects, and, frankly, may not
6 work and may not -- may not resolve anything.

7 So I appreciate you listening to me, as
8 always. And if there -- again, if there's
9 anything that I can do to assist, I'm more than
10 willing to help. And as I said, I have, as you
11 can tell, too much time on my hands.

12 (Laughter)

13 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, thank you.

14 PATRICIA HAMMES: So thank you.

15 MAYOR HUBBARD: Anybody else wish to address
16 the Board? Yeah.

17 MR. SALADINO: John Saladino, Sixth Street.
18 We're talking about the parking?

19 MAYOR HUBBARD: Yes, the public hearing on
20 the parking, continuation of the public hearing.

21 MR. SALADINO: The first thing I was going
22 to say is the first thing we should do is separate
23 the parking code change from everything else that
24 was suggested by other -- by other people. We
25 should -- we should separate it from the

1 moratorium, we should separate it from
2 development, we should separate it from that. It
3 should be what it is. It's a code change to
4 change the rule, a 32-year-old rule that exempts
5 people from having off-street parking. And if you
6 change that portion of the code, what it will do
7 is provide revenue for the Village that's not on
8 the residents' backs, but on the people that
9 actually need the parking to pay for those parking
10 things.

11 To say that there's a -- there's a new
12 business in town that's willing to pay for that
13 and that will do absolutely nothing for parking,
14 that's not true. What it will do is it will
15 provide "X" amount of dollars for this Village to
16 use to develop parking elsewhere, other -- are you
17 going to develop parking on Front and Main Street?
18 Absolutely not. Can you develop parking
19 elsewhere? Perhaps you can, whether it be Moore's
20 Woods, or through eminent domain for a piece of
21 property that's -- that belongs to an oil company
22 in Southold and use that. That piece of property
23 is 29,000 square feet, it would provide 100
24 parking spaces, and it's a lot closer than Moores
25 Woods, but you can't have it for free. You have

1 to pay the guy, you have to pay -- I believe it's
2 Romanelli that owns it. You would have to pay him
3 to buy it.

4 So to say that payment in lieu of parking
5 does nothing for parking is kind of -- is kind of
6 like disingenuous, because now it provides you
7 funds to pay for parking.

8 I think -- I think -- and I believe this was
9 on the Village Board's plate long before last
10 September, when Julia proposed it. I know as a
11 member of the Zoning Board and Chairing 50, 75, 80
12 public hearings, this topic always came up, and
13 the response, it was, "Well, what are going to do
14 about parking?" And the response was, "Well, you
15 know, we have this portion of the code that says
16 you can't do it." And the Zoning Board's response
17 was always, "Well, you got to go on Thursday
18 nights and talk to the Village Board and maybe
19 they'll do something about parking." So it is on
20 people's minds. It is on -- it is, it is a
21 question that's raised for every time a new
22 business or a new property is developed.

23 We can't go with the status quo. I heard
24 people say like, "Well, that's the deal in
25 Greenport." You know, it's too late for that. So

1 I think the property that was mentioned was Brent
2 Pelton's property. "It's too late because it's
3 already done." Well, that doesn't mean you should
4 stop looking for a solution. That doesn't mean
5 that that it's like, "Well, that's done, so we'll
6 just live with it forever." No, that's not the
7 way it should be. It should be -- it should be
8 that that was then and this is now, that was able
9 to happen then, and now we want to correct that
10 situation.

11 I don't see how. I don't see how. And I
12 don't see how ignoring this situation makes things
13 better. I don't think how linking this problem to
14 an updated comprehensive plan, which I believe we
15 already have. Some of the Trustees don't believe
16 we have that, I do, an LWRP that is codified by
17 New York State Department of State. I don't
18 believe linking this to that, to updating that, or
19 linking this to a -- to a proposal about a
20 moratorium about new development has anything to
21 do with the issue. The issue is should new
22 businesses that intensify their use, or should new
23 businesses that have a change of use, or
24 established businesses, because of a 32-year-old
25 law that in my mind is outdated, should be

1 changed.

2 I mean, it seems -- and to say, "What's the
3 goal of this," I mean, that seems -- I don't want
4 to be too simplistic, but the goal is give us some
5 money to serve your need that every other
6 municipality on Long Island has to pay.
7 Ninety-nine and nine-tenths percent of the
8 municipalities on Long Island have to pay this
9 fee, not tax, fee, and we'll use that money to
10 provide parking somewhere down the line, provide a
11 service to your business, so your customers can
12 park, without putting it on the backs of the
13 residents.

14 I shouldn't have to pay if -- and I love
15 this restaurant, so don't think I'm -- it's the
16 only one that came to my mind. I shouldn't have
17 to pay if Noah Schwartz' customer needs a place to
18 park. I have a place to park, and if I want to go
19 to Noah's Restaurant, I will. I shouldn't have to
20 pay, the way Noah's customer shouldn't have to pay
21 to pick up my garbage or mow my lawn. To me,
22 again, maybe I'm overly simplistic, that just
23 seems fair. That just seems fair that the people
24 that need the service pay for the service.

25 I would -- I would suggest to this Board, I

1 would urge this Board, you've heard the rhetoric
2 pro and con. You've heard -- you've heard --
3 you've heard me whine about it, you've heard the
4 BID whine about it. I've been whining about it
5 for five years, so I'm sure you're all sick of it
6 by now. But what you have to do is step up. And
7 I'll use a -- you've got to fish or cut bait.

8 (Laughter)

9 JOHN SALADINO: You got to step up and you
10 got to either vote it up or vote it down. You
11 can't let it die on the vine. You can't let it be
12 like the leaf blower thing, or the noise
13 ordinance. You can't let it go -- kick it down
14 the road for months and months and months and it
15 just dies on the vine. Vote it up, vote it down,
16 vote yes, vote no. Your vote is recorded.

17 I don't know what the Trustees perhaps are
18 apprehensive about. When it comes time for
19 re-election, whether it be for Mayor or Trustee,
20 you defend your vote. It's like, yeah, I thought
21 this was the best thing to do for the Village, or
22 no, I thought it was stupid. I mean, it's not
23 that hard, but you can't let it die. You can't
24 let, you know, over and over and over, new
25 comments, new comments, new comments, link it with

1 something that's totally unrelated to the issue.
2 The issue is who is going to pay for parking in
3 the future in Greenport?

4 The code was changed in 1990, it went into
5 effect in 1991 for businesses prior to 1990. And
6 I said this, and I'm going to repeat it, because
7 it makes a difference. We have a problem with the
8 LWRP. Some people have a problem. Whether it be
9 audience members, whether it be Trustees, have a
10 problem with a 10-year-old LWRP, that if the
11 people in this room have read it, they're going to
12 see nothing much is going to change about it. We
13 have a problem with that, that it's outdated, but,
14 yet, we want to propagate, we want to keep in
15 effect a law that's 32 years old that was passed
16 for an entirely different reason in an entirely
17 different time.

18 So I just don't understand. First, I don't
19 understand about dragging this out. Just we want
20 to keep the public hearing open for what? For
21 more comments from people that are opposed or in
22 favor of? We want to keep it open because the
23 Attorney has to accommodate people that want to
24 keep it open or closed?

25 My suggestions to the Trustees are we have

1 to vote. Close the public hearing. Vote it up,
2 vote it down, but get it off your plate. You
3 can't let it linger, because guys like me are
4 going to keep reminding you, "You know, you let
5 that die on the vine." You know, that's crazy.
6 How long are you guys going to kick this around?
7 You know, it's -- so I was on a little rant here,
8 I apologize.

9 (Laughter)

10 JOHN SALADINO: So thank you, thanks for
11 listening.

12 MAYOR HUBBARD: Okay, thank you. Just to
13 clarify that, John, it is going to stay open now,
14 because the Village Attorney was away on vacation.
15 He has not finished the updates on it. He has
16 taken the comments we had last month, he's
17 updating all of that. When we have that out, it's
18 going to be circulated amongst the Board and the
19 public, and then, hopefully, we can close the
20 public hearing next month with the updates and
21 then try to move it forward. Tonight, we're
22 still -- he is working on it, I said that earlier.

23 MR. SALADINO: I didn't suggest you close it
24 tonight.

25 MAYOR HUBBARD: No, I know, but I'm just

1 saying.

2 JOHN SALADINO: I understand Joe's got to
3 look and talk and revise and stuff, but we get it.
4 And I apologize to the public and to whosoever
5 here, but we can't let it -- we can't -- we cannot
6 talk about this in December

7 MAYOR HUBBARD: No. It's going to be done
8 before the end of the summer. We're moving this
9 forward one way or another. Okay.

10 All right. Any other comments on the public

18 with the LWRP, I don't find that a particularly
19 useful exercise at this point. I would, though
20 encourage this Board, even though it may take
21 several years to do a comprehensive plan, to start
22 that process at some point. There's a lot of
23 resources out there, there's sometimes money
24 available, and I don't think the fact that putting
25 a comprehensive plan together is going to take

1 some extended period of time as a reason not to
2 start it.

3 I think that there are things besides the
4 points that have been raised on parking and use,
5 but related to things like affordable housing, and
6 Airbnbs, and things like that, that need to
7 ultimately be addressed. And I agree they can't
8 all be done wholesale, but I think a comprehensive
9 plan might help identify and pinpoint those. And,
10 frankly, good input from Planning people may help
11 you come up with ideas for ways to encourage
12 certain types of development that you might
13 otherwise miss out on.

14 So I would -- I would encourage you all to
15 put that on the agenda to start the process on --
16 separately from all of these other things that are
17 going on. And, you know, that -- I guess that's
18 it. I'm not going to go back on the parking
19 thing. I'm not going to go into a back-and-forth
20 with Mr. Saladino. I don't agree with everything
21 he says, I agree with some things that he says. I
22 think if the point is that the law is supposed to
23 address parking, because we have a parking
24 problem, then that's what the law should do. And
25 I don't think that's what the last draft of the

1 law that I saw did, so -- and, you know, so I
2 guess I'll just leave it at that.

3 Actually one more thing, sorry. Airbnbs, I
4 would encourage you to think about that seriously.
5 I think everybody has passed Airbnb legislation
6 10 years ago is starting to rethink it and putting
7 much stronger limitations and restrictions in. I
8 don't think the current code is enforceable the
9 way it is. I know there was a reference to
10 litigation or legal issues at the last meeting, I
11 don't know what those are. But I don't believe,
12 as currently drafted, it's particularly an
13 enforceable code because of the reasons that have
14 been discussed by this Board, but I think it's a
15 big problem for this Village.

16 And if the -- and if you're worried about it
17 becoming a quagmire, like some of these other
18 things are, then I think actually the suggestion
19 that was made at last week's work session about
20 thinking about maybe doing in the first instance a
21 referendum to see where the community is on it
22 might not be a bad suggestion. Thank you.
