19	Dennis McMahon has arrived. Thank you.
20	Good evening. Would you say your name and your
21	address, please.
22	MR. PERROS: Hi. Of course. Alexander Perros.
23	The address of the business or my home address?
24	COURT REPORTER: I'm sorry, can you just speak
25	into the microphone?

1	MR. PERROS: Alexander Perros. The address of
2	the business is 218 Main Street.
3	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. Would you
4	give us a brief overview of the plans? Thank you.
5	MR. PERROS: Sure, I'd be happy to. I think
6	all of you have just the printout copies of this.
7	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yes, thank you.
8	MR. PERROS: Okay, great. So everything is,
9	honestly, pretty simple and straightforward. We're
10	keeping the cafe as is, it will be running as a cafe.
11	The plans we submitted are for some exterior
12	modifications, specifically new exterior sign to
13	replace the old sign, and then new exterior paint, as
14	well as replacing the damaged exterior lights, pretty
15	much we're replacing them in kind, and then proposing
16	some hanging plants for the front of the property.
17	If you look at the first exhibit, which is the
18	new exterior sign, it's this page here.
19	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you.
20	MR. PERROS: The color palette. So, in
21	general, the color palette, obviously, it's the color
22	from the street, we tried to be consistent with that.
23	Our color palette is blues, gray-blues and whites
24	with a small red accent. The sign is a simple white
25	with red lettering

If you look at Exhibit 2, it gets into the actual color details of the facade.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Uh-huh.

MR. PERROS: We'll be using kind of a sea blue as the main facade color, with an accent of a gray-blue and white. Again, really, the sea blue is replacing the green facade, and then the gray-blue is replacing the kind of white interior brick.

And then the exterior lights have been damaged, so there's two exterior lights hanging off the top that were illuminating the sign, we would be replacing those in kind.

We also propose removing this awning, just removing it altogether, and we would patch the brick, and, instead, we would probably just use umbrellas or not have any -- necessarily any shade out there at all.

And then Exhibit 4 is proposing -- we would propose painting the fence, the existing wrought iron fence, in our white color. And then we propose some planters, some hanging planters off the front of the -- off the front of the storefront. Pretty simple, so.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. And I'm happy that the store is going to be filled and in the same sort of a genre, so thank you.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: 3 Okay. 4 MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, and I agree, that 5 sample is --6 MEMBER DEGEN: Yeah, this is nice. MEMBER BORRELLI: Just non relevant, whatever 7 8 kind of question, but are you the owner? 9 MR. PERROS: I am. MEMBER BORRELLI: And what kind of -- what is 10 11 it going to be like on the inside? Like where are 12 you going to -- what is it going to be about? 13 MR. PERROS: It's going to look pretty much the 14 same layout. Different color scheme. 18	MR. RISHE: Good evening. I'm Marc Rishe. My
19	home address is 315 Sutton Place.
20	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you, Marc. You
21	come a few more times and you're on the Board, you
22	know that?
23	MEMBER BORRELLI: Marc.
24	(Laughter)
25	MARC RISHE: Take up a residency, at least.

1	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah.
2	(Laughter)
3	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Would you give a brief
4	description, please, of your project?
5	MARC RISHE: Sure. So the I believe you,
6	the Board, should have received a new rendering.
7	There's two design changes being proposed to the
8	project from the original. So you'll see you have
9	and we're focused on the left elevation, which is the
10	eastern elevation of the property.
11	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right.
12	MARC RISHE: So the first one is to take the
13	two win the two large double-hung windows on the
14	second story that were previously connected together,
15	and then they would be to spread them apart and
16	center the right one underneath the ridge of the
17	roof. And the reasoning for that is that's on the
18	Main Street side. I have, I have an extra copy if
19	you want one.
20	MEMBER MC MAHON: That's okay.
21	MARC RISHE: So that's on the Main Street side.
22	That seems to read much better from, from Main Street
23	on the second story.
24	The second one is a request to remove the
25	previously proposed small window on the bottom of the

rear of the house. That is a functional purpose. 1 2 That's actually in the kitchen, which is a small kitchen as it is. So by having that there, it 3 4 removes a lot of the upper cabinet space. And the thought is that there'll be -- as we discussed last 5 6 time, there'll be plantings around the house, so you 7 won't really read that window as much, you know, from 8 Main Street as you do the second story windows, which 9 will be more prominent. So the thought is that it shouldn't have much of a negative impact on that 10 11 facade. 12 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. I totally understand the idea of making room for cabinets. 13 if I'm correct, looking at your drawings, you'll 14 definitely have enough light coming in from the rear 15 16 of the house to -- for that kitchen area. MR. RISHE: Correct. That's, that's the attempt. 17 18 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: So that's not an issue. Does anyone want to discuss the windows? 19 MEMBER MC MAHON: No, I'm good with it. 20 21 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. 22 MEMBER BORRELLI: No. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: On the ground floor, on 23 the east side, you have two smaller windows, also, 24 25 one on the upper story, one on the lower.

RISHE: Because we'll be -- you know, there'll be, there'll be planting -- there's no fence 9 in here, so there'll be some sort of border planting 10 11 between our property and the neighbor's property. 12 And then there'll be, obviously, something sort of 13 there along the edge of the house, and probably, you know, across the lot as well to sort of screen the 14 backyard from the front. 15 16 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: You have a large wall there now, so it will be -- you know, you could take 17 something, like a small tree and --18 19 MARC RISHE: For sure. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: You know, I think that 20 would be very attractive. 21 22 MARC RISHE: Yeah, I think that's -- we actually did speak about that, something there, so, 23 24 you know, and, truthfully, even if the window 25 remained there, we would probably put a tree there or

something anyway, so you -- you know, you probably 1 wouldn't see it as much. 2 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. Is there any 3 4 other discussion? 5 (Shook Head No). So it's just some stone 8 work, and a pergola, and some landscaping that we're 9 proposing. We're proposing to remove the existing concrete pavers, which are existing as the driveway 10 11 and the walkway, and replace them with Belgian block, 12 Jeep track and ground cover, as well as fractured 13 bluestone with ground cover as the walking path. And the -- we're proposing to extend the driveway so they 14 can park two cars, rather than one, which is what 15 16 it's currently. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: That's because it came 17 before another Board, correct? 18 19 MS. WILCENSKI: What's that? CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Was there -- was that 20 21 from -- asked for by another Board here? 22 MS. WILCENSKI: No. Well, I think the clients 23 wanted to just expand --24 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: The parking. 25 MS. WILCENSKI: -- the parking.

22	MR. MACRINA: One second. Here are the
23	drawings that we submitted.
24	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you.

MR. MACRINA: I brought all new materials as well.

1 MEMBER MC MAHON: Lovelv. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: You want to share this? 2 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 3 4 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: So could you, please, 5 state your name and your address? 6 MR. MACRINA: Yes. 7 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you, for the 8 record. MR. MACRINA: Hi. 9 My name is Michael Macrina, I'm the Architect at 97L Main Street, Stony Brook, 10 11 New York. 12 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. So please 13 share with us your proposed project. 14 MR. MACRINA: Sure. So my clients are proposing a renovation to this existing home. 15 The 16 original home was built around 1840s from the 17 historic inventory, and over the years it had 18 plenty -- it had several additions put on on the rear side of the home, extremely poorly built additions 19 20 with insufficient -- no foundations, just very, very 21 poor in the back. So we are proposing to remove 22 those poorly built additions and build a proper 23 addition to work with the home and maintain the 24 existing 1840s home footprint as is. 25 With that, we are proposing to maintain the

street facade with replacing windows in the same 1 2 loca -- same locations and same size, and with bringing back the two-over-two light pattern that was 3 4 on the previous home, from the inventory that I saw. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: To bring what back? 5 6 I'm sorry. 7 MR. MACRINA: The two-over-two grille pattern 8 on the windows --CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. 9 Thank you. MR. MACRINA: -- on the double-hungs. 10 11 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. 12 MR. MACRINA: Currently, the home has no -it's just the -- no grilles. 13 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. 14 15 MR. MACRINA: Just the one-over-one, I guess I 16 would say. So we're looking to, you know, try to 17 bring it back. 18 And then with that, we're also proposing a porch along the front, which seems to work very well 19 with that faux Greek, Greek Revival style. With the 20 gable and the wing, having that shed roof porch kind 21 of works really well, it's very common to see that. 22 A modest size, it's a nice porch. 23 24 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right. 25 MEMBER BORRELLI: I have a quick question.

1 MR. MACRINA: Sure. MEMBER BORRELLI: I see that you have the three 2 different -- you have 141 Bay, 147 Bay and 165 Bay. 3 Did you include anywhere 160 Bay? Because I've been 4 5 looking. You know, I drove by --MR. MACRINA: Well, I --6 7 MEMBER BORRELLI: -- and I can't --8 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: I don't see it in here. MR. MACRINA: I don't know if it was submitted, 9 10 but we do -- I did prepare this. This is a street view on each side of the street. 11 12 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right. That's what I was 13 looking at, right. 14 MR. MACRINA: I don't know which house its is. I'm sorry. 15 16 MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay. No. We have these 17 photos, which was included. 18 MR. MACRINA: This is, this is the subject home. 19 MEMBER BORRELLI: That is the house, yes. 20 MR. MACRINA: And that's one, and these are the 21 two on the other side, and this is across the street. 22 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right. 23 MR. MACRINA: So I don't know, I don't know the 24 house numbers, I apologize. 25 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right, okay.

1	MR. MACRINA: Which one do you thing it is?
2	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Here. You know what
3	MEMBER BORRELLI: No, the house.
4	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: This is the house.
5	MEMBER BORRELLI: The house itself. Okay.
6	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: This is the house.
7	MEMBER BORRELLI: I didn't get that photo, yeah.
8	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: I took it.
9	MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay.
10	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: That photo, so.
11	MR. MACRINA: Okay. We're also proposing to
12	remove the existing detached garage. It was built in
13	the 1960s, there's nothing special about it
14	whatsoever. It's not the prettiest looking garage.
15	And, you know, with the additions and everything, we
16	just felt like it was it would be nice to open it
17	up and you'd see more of a garden, you know, instead
18	of seeing this structure in the back, so it would be
19	a lot more inviting without it, you know
20	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Plus you're bumping out
21	the east side a little.
22	MR. MACRINA: Correct, yes.
23	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: So
24	MR. MACRINA: With the footprint of the
25	addition, yes, and it would get too close to the

1 garage. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: 2 Right. 3 MR. MACRINA: Yeah. So I just want to keep it 4 open, very simple, keep it nice and very natural, that's the idea. 5 6 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. 7 MR. MACRINA: And with the proposed home, all 8 the materials are going to be -- you know, we're 9 going to try -- what we're going to do is we're going to bring back the real historical, you know, details. 10 11 What's great is my clients are in tune with the 12 details of an historic home, and it's important to them, as well as to me, to kind of work out some nice 13 details. And I incorporated the details in the plans 14 that you have in front of you, including the rake 15 16 trim, you know, with the nice blue molding on it, frieze board trim with moldings on that, half-round 17 18 gutters, copper gutters. You know, I brought a 19 sample here, a nice half round gutter. That will be a very similar color to this. The copper, this is 20 showing the copper, the aged copper with the 21 22 brackets. MEMBER BORRELLI: Could I just stop you for one 23 24 sec? 25 MR. MACRINA: Sure.

1 MEMBER BORRELLI: Just a quick question, because I'm a little confused. You said Greek 2 Revival, right? 3 MR. MACRINA: Yeah, faux Greek Revival. 4 5 MEMBER BORRELLI: I don't, I don't see it as 6 truly a Greek Revival. 7 MR. MACRINA: No, a --8 MEMBER BORRELLI: I see it more like farmhouse. MR. MACRINA: Well, a faux Greek Revival was 9 10 very common. It was a simplified version of the Greek Revival in the 1840s. 11 12 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right. So my second question 13 is do you have any photos of the actual original 14 house? 15 MR. MACRINA: Yes. Well --16 MS. MOORE: There's a historic --17 MR. MACRINA: We have a historic inventory. 18 this what you're looking for? 19 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah, exactly. 20 MR. MACRINA: I have this. This is all I have. 21 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: From the Cultural 22 Resources. 23 24 MEMBER BORRELLI: Right. So I'm just 25 wondering, like I don't know, Greek Revival, all your

Okay? 13 The siding, we're going to be using a smooth 14 I don't know if you're familiar with the Hardie. Hardie board product. 15 16 MEMBER MC MAHON: Uh-huh, yes. 17 MR. MACRINA: I have it. That's the clapboard 18 siding. These are not the right color. The colors are over there, but I just wanted to show you, you 19 know, with appropriate exposure. We'll do a nice 20 21 like four or five-inch exposure, nothing too big. 22 More -- you know, working with the historical 23 exposure. The color of the siding is going to be 24 this. 25 MRS. KORAKIS: Right.

1 MR. MACRINA: Grav. 2 MRS. KORAKIS: Edgecomb Gray. MR. MACRINA: Edgecomb Gray. So that's the 3 4 actual color, so very soft. All the trim is going to be left white, which we have right here. All the, 5 6 all the trim boards, like these aren't the right size, but it will be this material. 7 This is the VERSATEX product, it's solid PVC. And then the rake 8 9 is going to have some imperial rake trim on top of it, just to give it a nice, nice look. 10 11 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Nice detail. 12 MR. MACRINA: But not overdo it. Just kind of keep it simple, but just give it a little bit of 13 shadow. The --14 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: It's a nice detail. 15 16 MR. MACRINA: Yeah, thank you. And then underneath the eaves will be a frieze trim, and that 17 18 will have a little smaller molding. I like to use this thing called a ram's crown, just enough to give 19 it a little detail, you know, just underneath the 20 soffits. 21 The soffits, I'm going to use a board and --22 board and batten -- a beadboard soffit, so it will be 23 underneath, you know, this is underneath there, just 24

a nice, nice look.

1 All of the window casing, five-quarter-by-four trim with a historic sill. 2 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: 3 Good. MR. MACRINA: You know, it will look like that, 4 5 that whole --CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: 6 It looks nice. 7 MR. MACRINA: And I think I even put a little 8 extension on the side, a little three-quarter-inch extension on the side, you know. 9 10 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Great. I love how 11 chunky it is. 12 MR. MACRINA: Right? Yeah. 13 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah. 14 MR. MACRINA: It's two inches thick, really And all the corner boards will be the same PVC 15 nice. 16 product with the -- you know, for the Hardie to tie 17 So it will be a little bit wider, I'm going to 18 go with six-inch, give it a little more bolder look. 19 Four inch is a little small for the size and scale of 20 the house. 21 And I'm proposing -- and then all the columns, 22 the porch columns are going to be custom built out of 23 the same product. I do have a blow-up detail on my 24 plans, so you can see exactly how I'm going to build 25 it. So it looks like a nice -- it's got a nice

KLESSE: I'm a Licensed Architect in 25 New York and New Jersey, and appeared before, I don't

1 know. 40 Historic Commissions, sort of across the U.S., so I kind of have been through this before a 2 little bit. 3 This house -- can I start, or did you -- do I 4 5 need to be called? 6 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Oh, please start. would like --7 MR. KLESSE: I didn't know if I needed to be 8 qualified or something. 9 10 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: No. Thank you. 11 MR. KLESSE: No? Okay, good. 12 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: You may start on the 13 project. 14 MR. KLESSE: All right. You know, it's 837 Main Street. It's a house that my client bought 15 16 I think about three years ago, and extensively 17 renovated. MR. SAMPOGNA: 2017. 18 19 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: When? 20 MR. SAMPOGNA: 2017. 2016, actually. 21 MR. KLESSE: Oh, I'm sorry. And they 22 extensively renovated it. It was a two-family, or 23 maybe it was a three-family. We're not really sure 24 what was going on. But if you had a chance to look 25 at the house, they did an unbelievable job cleaning

1 the house up. And they came in front of you, or whoever was here at the time, and presented to add a 2 front porch to the primary building. 3 4 MR. NOONE: I'm sorry, I don't mean to 5 interrupt, but there's another meeting that's going 6 to be starting in 10 minutes, and people are going to be coming through. 7 8 MR. KLESSE: Oh, okay. MR. NOONE: Could you move the illustration? 9 10 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Could you move the --11 we have this, so it's in our plans, so we could take 12 that down. MR. NOONE: If you could just move it to the 13 other side of the podium. 14 MR. KLESSE: Oh, I'll bring it -- yeah. 15 16 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Sure. MR. KLESSE: So -- oh, so I don't need to go 17 through the plans, yeah? 18 19 MEMBER MC MAHON: Not necessarily. 20 MR. KLESSE: Well, I'll do it quick. 21 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. So what you're doing is --22 23 MR. KLESSE: What we're doing today is removing 24 a pool and removing a detached garage, which was 25 constructed in 2006, I think. Inside the application

packet there's a photo of the slab dated 2006, and 1 2 the construction looks to me to be about 2006, you It's plywood, actually, the sheathing. And we 3 4 want to build a new pool, a new garage, and this cabana space. And I'll just walk you right through 5 6 what we're doing. 7 If I -- on my site plan, that would be exactly 8 the same as your site plan, we come up the driveway 9 from Main Street. The primary building is here. 10 There's a secondary building that was cut off the 11 back some time later. And if you come into our 12 primary building, into the driveway, there is a 13 detached garage right there. 14 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Uh-huh. MR. KLESSE: That's the garage I think was 15 16 built around 2006. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: 17 Right. 18 MR. KLESSE: There -- if I want to go through the historical documents, I can see a lot of 19 different stuff that was back here in this backyard, 20 21 and those documents are included in your packet. 22 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right. 23 MR. KLESSE: So if you want me to, I'll run you 24 through them, but if you don't want me to bother with 25 it, I won't bother with it. And then what we're

asking to do tonight is to demo that existing garage, 1 2 construct a new garage, and this what I'm going to call like a pool cabana, an accessory structure here. 3 4 We took the existing pool that was located closer to the building and we've pulled it back --5 6 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right. 7 MR. KLESSE: -- closer to the cabana. 8 balance of my drawings are just really architectural drawings of the building, but I'll show you what it 9 looks like. This is the actual cabana. 10 11 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. 12 MR. KLESSE: If I come down the driveway, 13 remember, I came up the side. 14 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right. MR. KLESSE: I keep going, I go on, I bang a 15 16 left, I come into the, into the garage, and then here is the actual accessory building, which is part of 17 18 the garage itself and there is the new pool in the foreground. 19 20 MR. SAMPOGNA: It's really just a -- the actual 21 accessory structure is just an overhang with a 22 garage. 23 MEMBER BORRELLI: With a garage. 24 MR.
