I own a 7 couple of restaurants in the Hamptons, and hotel, 8 never had any issues. But in this particular 9 Village, I've been having a hard time to do any 10 business. I lost quite a lot of money in the 11 last two years trying to keep my business running. 12 But it's really hard to make business without 13 liquor, and we're still working on our -- getting 14 our liquor license. Once I started making some money, I would definitely make the progress to make 15 16 the building --17 MEMBER BORRELLI: Good, okay. 18 MR. ERDEM: -- look much better. 19 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 20 CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: We would welcome you 21 back when you come -- when you're ready to do it. Thank you. Thank you very much. 22 MR. ERDEM: 23 CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Okay. My other 24 sign -- my other thing, Zach, in this presentation 25 there's no light over this sign. And will it be

1 visible in the evening with only those two lights on either side of the door? 2 MR. ERDEM: We do have the patio, the string 3 4 lights. 5 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: There are --6 MR. ERDEM: Yeah, that basically goes all 7 around the patio, so it will be easy to see. 8 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: But will the sign be lit? 9 10 I see that, yes, I know what you MR. ERDEM: 11 So there's no exact -- I mean, I think it's 12 going to require a permit for that to get a light 13 there. 14 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: It will, yes. MR. ERDEM: But we basically will work on it. 15 16 If it's not going to be seen through at night, then 17 we're definitely going to get a light on top of the 18 sign. 19 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. 20 MEMBER DEGEN: Is there any other color that 21 you -- like a second color for the sign? Because 22 the orange really has nothing to do with the whole 23 town. 24 MR. ERDEM: Anything you -- what would like 25 to see there, sir, what kind of color? What color

18	discussion and possible motion on the application
19	of 526 Main, Suffolk County Tax Map #1001-4 did
20	I get this one right? Dash 3-27.
21	MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes.
22	CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: I've been informed
23	that the owner of this project will be out of state
24	and not coming this evening. As the presentation
25	was very clear, our Secretary, Mike Noone, let him

know we didn't see any problem with that. If I am wrong, or someone else is here to represent this project, could they come forward, please?

MEMBER BORRELLI: If there's --

CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Noted, no one else is here. So I'd like to open it up for discussion, please.

MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay.

CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Roselle?

MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. I have some kind of thoughts, and I was going to ask. Jim, you know, I don't know whether he is fortunate, or whether he is unfortunate, to be next to the house that to me is one of the most enchanting and beautiful homes that we have on Main Street in Greenport, and to the house to the right of that house, which is -- it's Vincent's house. It's the purple house to the left, the Italianate gorgeous house to the left of his house.

So this house, after a little bit of research, I know that the front porch is not original. And the problem I have with the porch as it is now is that I do think that whoever put it on, although it looks okay, I was wondering if Jim were going to change the columns, in which case I was going to

suggest that he change them from an oval-round column to a square column, which would be more in keeping with the framing around the front door. That was number one. I was going to suggest that if he -- but I'm not are sure if he's changing the columns or not, or if he's just doing railings.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: I think he said the columns were being replicated.

MEMBER BORRELLI: So if he might consider thinking about that, because, to me, it strikes me as it's wrong. So if my front door columns are square, then my columns in my porch ought to follow this same architectural design, I would think. Not that they're ugly, but it just would be one consideration.

My second consideration to Jim would be does he want to reconstruct the porch and do that?

Because what I would do, possibly, is match it to the house next door. And, also, there seems to be a repetitious of -- a repetition of those homes all throughout Greenport. It's -- even the Ireland House that we have the Stirling Historical Society is the same three windows on the top, two windows on the bottom, and the same exact front doors. And no -- none of those homes actually have a front

porch, so he's the only house that's like that that has a front porch.

And I did take photos, and I think I did make -- print out photos of what I'm actually talking about, if he wanted to consider that. So before he actually, you know, goes and makes the investment of spending the money to put in and redo a porch, maybe the consideration is to take it away, which might make -- I'm not sure. It's just that -- to me, it's just a suggestion, to bring it back to actually what it should look like.

So if you look at the Ireland House, it's the same front door that he should have. And if you look at a house with square fronts, this is just a really old house in Greenport. It's the same setup, but it's the square columns, which I think go more than the square front door with round columns.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: I think this is typically because of the spacing with the shutters.

21 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: But --

MEMBER BORRELLI: The Berger House

has the same front door, and here's the Ireland
house. And then the house next door is the exact

1 copy of his house without the front porch. was just wondering if he thought that maybe he 2 would do not a front porch. Just to put it out 3 4 there, I mean, just a thought. And if he were going to do the columns, maybe have the columns, 5 6 instead of round, have them actually square, which I don't know, just a thought. 7 8 CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: MEMBER BORRELLI: You know? 9 MEMBER DEGEN: I kind of like the porch. 10 agree with the square columns matching the door. 11 12 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 13 MEMBER DEGEN: I think it does make a big difference. 14 MEMBER BORRELLI: And the house next door has 15 16 the original windows, which is two-over-one, and he's got, I mean, you know, just changes that maybe 17 18 they weren't made with the best of -- at the time, 19 you know, but that those replacement windows with the fake mullions, and it's just -- I think the 20 21 house could look really cute and very pretty with 22 just a little bit of work to restore to back to 23 maybe what it should look like. 24 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. 25 MEMBER BORRELLI: Just ideas.

1 CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: Yeah, no. I, too, 2 like the porch, but -- and I have to be honest, I didn't think about matching the columns up to the 3 4 square ones or the rectangular ones by the door, and it totally makes sense. 5 6 My concern was they're putting a lot of work into new floor, new columns, but there's no mention 7 8 of any roof work or gutter work. MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 9 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: And I think, because 10 11 of all these suggestions, I -- I'm going to make a 12 motion. Excuse me, let me -- I'm going to make a 13 motion that we not issue -- that we do -- that we 14 ask --MEMBER BORRELLI: Table it? 15 16 CHAIR RATSEY-WILLIAMS: I make a motion that we don't vote on it this evening and we ask the 17 18 gentleman to come in and discuss it with us. These are a lot of comments.
