My suggestion is that you go to the 9 Building Inspector the second you have an issue that is causing a leak, animals coming in, a window 10 11 fell out, something like that, and then the 12 Building Inspector will direct it to Mike and get 13 it on the agenda. 14 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Okay. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay? Thank you. 15 16 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Yeah, no problem. Thank you. 17 MR. then in place of the railings that were there, he wanted to -- I would -- I describe them as fancier railings. They were supposed to be at the same height as the previous. And then a portion of that current decking is made of like a brick layout, and he wanted to replace that brick layout with wood to match the rest of the deck, patio area.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. Anyone have questions?

MEMBER CLAUDIO: So it looks lovely. It's already in place.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yes, yeah.

MEMBER CLAUDIO: You did need to come here, and it's a -- some of the elements of it, I think -- I'm happy that our Board like has the flexibility to take a raised bed and put the bamboo in it, and basically make a fence type of structure that would certainly be exceptions to code or bending the code, but it does look great. I can't deny that it's a creative buffer, and that kind of thing.

It does show, I don't know, an un -- lack of awareness of what we do here and what we're trying to achieve with our Historic District, so that's kind of a big caveat for me, but the work is

a pretty important historic one. It's like one of 1 the oldest on Main Street, and it was owned by 2 S.T. Preston, so the chandlery shop that's all the 3 4 way at the end of the dock, and the man lived right 5 And he lived next to S.W. Wells, who was in 6 the house, that purple house right next door. 7 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: The purple house right next 8 door, right. 9 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 10 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah. 11 MEMBER BORRELLI: And so your house is on the 12 map since like 1858, I spot it. 13 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Right. 14 MEMBER BORRELLI: And he always lived there, and he always owned the ship chandlery. So all the 15 16 guys, the commercial fishing guys were in there all 17 the time, chain, rope, and whatever anchors they 18 needed. 19 And I just wanted you to know that it's an 20 important house. And the porch is an addition, it 21 was never there, but -- before, but it's still old. 22 I mean, you could --23 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Right, right. Yeah, you're 24 right. 25 MEMBER BORRELLI: If you like the porch and

you want to redo it, great. My suggestion was 1 2 since the porch -- the other homes that are like your home, and there are a lot of them in 3 4 Greenport -- I took pictures, I have a bunch of different pictures. For instance, the Ireland 5 6 House that we use as the museum for the Stirling --7 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Sure, yeah. 8 MEMBER BORRELLI: -- Historic, it's the same 9 footprint, same house, and it always has those two square posts in the front, in the doorway as you 10 11 walk in. And since none of them have porches, 12 yours is the only one, I think, having had found, 13 that actually put a porch on. So my only constructive idea might have been if the columns 14 were rotted, the round ones, and you were going to 15 16 replace them, you might consider putting square columns as the two columns over the doorway arch. 17 18 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Right, because years --19 MEMBER BORRELLI: That's my only --MR. OLINKIEWICZ: 20 Because years ago they had 21 taken up the existing tongue and groove decking and 22 they put five-quarter-by-six CCA down. So when we take up the decking to repair the framing, we're 23 24 going to put the tongue and groove fir, original 25 fir decking that was there, and we were going to

OLINKIEWICZ: So if anybody did renovations, 3 4 they had to take it to 36, or insurance companies 5 did and made us do that. 6 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right. 7 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: But now, because they have 8 a 20 -- a 32-inch step off the side without a railing needed, you can lower your railings back 9 down --10 11 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah. 12 MR. OLINKIEWICZ: -- to the 18 or 24 inches. 13 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: And it's much more 14 historic. MR. OLINKIEWICZ: Right. 15 16 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: And it looks beautiful. 17 MR. I'm recusing myself, as our -- you already said. 5 6 Anyway, so starting, I decided to write. Ιf you take a look at the scope of work, I wrote 7 8 something that kind of explains the project. So, 9 my esteemed colleagues, anybody has any questions, I appreciate it. Any suggestions, I would love to 10 hear anything, any ideas, any criticisms, anything, 11 12 "Roselle, you're completely crazy." I'll take it 13 all, okay? 14 (Laughter) MEMBER BORRELLI: So here we go. The bay 15 16 window, I had a problem with the bay window, it was separating from the house. Dennis also knows my 17 18 house very well. 19 MEMBER MC MAHON: Uh-huh. 20 MEMBER BORRELLI: So it kind of separated 21 from the house, and a huge leak through the dining 22 room in the bay window area, as the water would 23 come through streaming in. So we put a foundation 24 on the bottom, dug it out, put in cement block, dug 25 a foundation, put that in there. And then I asked

them to brick it up with the old brick I had in the backyard, so that it would match the rest of the foundation in the house, which is brick, for the most part, the parts that aren't crumbling and falling down. Okay. So that was the bay window.

Now, when I did that, my windows used to look like this, literally. We jacked it up about an inch-and-a-half. It was jacked up and the foundation poured and everything. So now it's really, really nice. From the inside, the floor still goes down a little bit, but it's not perfect. But then, again, the house is 166 years old, so it doesn't need to be perfect.

But my windows, thankfully, straightened out. So my windows that used to be like this (demonstrating), you could never open or close, are now windows that are going to be functional. And I'm going to have them replace the cords and make them -- you know, fix them, put the locks back on, so I'll have my original windows. The only thing is a few of the glass on the piece, they're very ornate windows, are broken, so I'm going to have them send the glass out. Unfortunately, it won't be wavy glass when it comes back in, but I will have enough wavy glass left, that will be fine. There's like three

pieces of windows that are broken. So whatever,but it looks good.

And then the rest of the rot will be fixed.

And Joe is busy epoxying things and trying to glue it back together, and where we can't glue it together, we make it again. And that's the bay window, it's a lot of work, and that's an ongoing thing. But no windows changed, everything will stay the same. All the trim is being preserved and either fixed or remade, so, historically, it's all going to look as it is. That's one project.

Second project, the balconies, which I passed out, the balconies I studied, studied, restudied. And I'm fortunate enough to have photos of the house, the original photo of the house that was taken in 1867, right after it was built. And then the ladies that you see sitting on the porch, they also show my balconies. And then this one, the original photo also shows the two balconies. They're the Juliette balconies that are on the tower.

And then there is a 1940s photo, or early '50s photo of the Tuthill kids that are standing on the front lawn of my house that shows the actual original porch.

So the balconies, we -- when I first moved in in 2012, we actually changed the, the platform of the balcony, you know, like the things you stand on.

MEMBER MC MAHON: Yeah, the deck.

MEMBER BORRELLI: Those were -- the decks. Those were changed and those are still good. But now the balustrade is rotted. And I never liked it particularly, because I always found it to be too Colonial, the balusters themselves are too Colonial looking for the house. So what I actually did was with a loop and with a magnifying glass, studied, restudied, studied again, the -- as best as I could get those two balconies to see. They're not the same. The balustrade on the bottom is different from the balustrade on the top.

The top was handsewn like in a one piece thing, and the one on the bottom were individual balusters. So you can see that when you -- I don't know if you could -- if it's represented well, but they're definitely not -- they were not the same, and that's from the very beginning. I think this is the photo that you can see the best with the five ladies sitting on the porch in like 1922.

So what Joe did for me was get his loop out and the magnifying glass and studied exactly how

the balcony looked from the top, because I do like the idea of the sewn -- the sawn, hand-sawn, or whatever, balustrade across the top. So that is the design that we -- he has come up with in his drawing there and --

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: So the top part.

MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes. So then, of course, I have the little gingerbread, the plackets, and the little balls aren't exactly what Joe drew, but those are all originals, those are all staying. They will be fixed, epoxied, as I have done in the past, and put back on.

And the columns will stay the same, they are perfect. The only thing that's changing is the actual balustrade. I don't know what you call it when it's just one continuous piece that goes over. Ad it's going to be made in VERSATEX from -- I'm very well connected at Riverhead Building Supply, so I do mostly whatever they tell me to do. This company called Intex, the lovely girl named Catherine said they could do anything, as long as we send them the design. So Joe's design, they say they can cut it out and they can make it in like a VERSATEX, or whatever it is. And then it will be put back onto the columns that are there now, and

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everything stays the same, and, hopefully, you

MEMBER BORRELLI: All right. So that's number one and two are down. We're up to number three on the scope of work, front porch columns. So, you know, when you come home every day and you look at the house and you go, "Oh, my God, I just" -- "I can't believe it, I can't believe it"? And so for the past 12 years, or whatever, it's the front doors for me, it's the two porches, and it's the columns. The columns to me look like somebody put two matches in a matchstick box and stuck two little matchbook matches on the thing to support a roof, and it just does not grace me at all. I'm like you got to be kidding me. So I always stare at that and I always say that those are wrong. Of course, the two porches are wrong as well.

So not to get in with Jimmy Olinkiewicz, but my porches were never there. It was that one continuous porch you see from 1940 with the kids playing on the front lawn. It was a beautiful porch. But the Tuthill kids, and there were nine of them, or eight of them, I can't remember, the

1 Tuthill kids told me the porch was completely rotted and that's why their Dad took it down. 2 also, as Dr. Tuthill wanted a second entrance for 3 4 his patients to come in, they built that second 5 porch. 6 So my dilemma has always been, do I -- well, I'm transgressing a little bit from my porch 7 8 columns, but it's all related. So the dilemma was 9 do I take down the two porches, which are made of 10 brick, which I appreciate very much, because I'm 11 sick of rotted wood all over my house. 12 take down the two porches that Dr. Tuthill put up 13 in 1940-something to put one continuous porch back 14 again? (John Saladino Entered the Meeting) 15 16 MEMBER BORRELLI: Come on in, John. 17 MR. SALADINO: Can I? 18 MEMBER BORRELLI: Sure. 19 MEMBER BORRELLI: To put one continuous porch 20 back as it was originally in 1867. But then I 21 decided that maybe if I just beefed up the columns 22 a bit on the two porches that Dr. Tuthill made, it 23 might make my porches look better. So I might live

with 1940 and not go back to 1867, and the reason

being, because not only did Dr. Tuthill -- he added

24

onto the house in 1940 by putting in the second entrance, he then put in a pitched roof and a little second entrance that I don't want to lose my square footage for, I don't want to demolish that.

So if I put down a flat roof to a continuous porch from the two doors connecting them, and all of this is -- you can look at that, there's a page with the house as it is today, and you'll know what I'm talking about. There's no way to put a flat roof on a pitched roof second porch with having a little piece of porch sticking out on the top.

Dennis might understand if he looks at the pages there, because it's a little strange to -- so, anyway, so I was thinking, okay, should I do all that work and put a porch back up to the cost of over \$100,000 that I was quoted, or do I just live with my two porches, which I decided to live with my porches.

So the inside of the porches are barrel cut, which is really nicely done, they were very nicely done. And if I look at a picture of Brecknock Hall, which has a relation to my house, Brecknock Hall as a pitched roof, a pointy roof as well. So maybe my roof is not flat like the other porch roof on the side, but my porches are now pointy. There are two

of them and they match.

So going back, if I beef up the columns and put four columns, because one of them is already rotted through and it's kind of hanging, so I have to change the columns anyway. So if I beef the columns up, I am doing four 8-inch columns, as opposed to the 5-inch columns that they are now, and recessed, and those will go in.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: If I may interrupt, we have just -- you have about 10, 12 minutes left.

MEMBER BORRELLI: Perfect.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Because we have a meeting coming right after this.

MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay, yes. So four new columns that are recessed columns, and they will be Permacast, so they will be -- they're not wood anymore. And they will have the capitals on the top, and on the bottom, more in fashion with what was originally there, and any gingerbread stakes.

And then the other thing that is wrong with the house, if you look at the house, is that Dr. Tuthill changed two front doors and put front doors that he liked. He took the double front door out of my house on the main porch and put in a single porch door with sidelights. So that when

you enter in my house into the vestibule with a single door, the door is very wide, and it doesn't fit my two French doors that I have in there. So I have a small vestibule that is much more suited to French doors.

So the reason I'm changing my front door is it is going to be, hopefully, a spectacular double door to match the original 12-foot door that was there, but they cut it off at 7 feet to make it like a transom. So I'm keeping the double transom on the top, staining it to match the color of mahogany, and the door, the front door is going to be mahogany.

Then the second front door is getting changed, because I want the two doors to match. So the second front door will be a single door in the same fashion, but with just mahogany. And it's nonoperable, because that whole thing is non -- the whole second entrance doesn't go anywhere in my house, it's just nonoperable.

So the front door is going to have opera glass, which is an opaque sort of seed glass, like you can't really see clearly through, to make it look old and wavy, and the door will be made out of mahogany, and it's a double door. Ad everything is

brass and keeping with -- in fashion with all the photos that -- I'm lucky enough to have the photos that I have.

So if you look at the way the house looks, you'll see all the updates and what I'm trying to accomplish, just to make the porches a little more loved, like a little like less matchable, and make it look a little more important, and not tear them down and put up, you know, the original porch up, which I go back and forth.

And then the last project is, and it's all related, if you look at what the house looked like when I first bought it, and after I took down all the vines that made it look like the most haunted house in Greenport, I cleared it all away. If you look at the two windows that are in between the two doors, they used to go down to the front porch, down to the floor, because there was a porch there. And you could come out, like in, like in France, you open the two French doors right out onto the porch.

So Dr. Tuthill decided to cut them and make them regular sized windows, so to speak, and then put those panels on the bottom, which I think is just God awful. And stop me, anybody, if you think

that's historic, and I should keep them. And I could keep them, because I go back and forth, you know.

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The windows are nonoperable for me from the living room on the inside, because in the '50s, Dr. Tuthill put -- they changed the inside mechanisms to some kind of whacky thing that does no longer work, and has kind of destroyed the windows on the inside. So I would like to change them down, to put them back down to the floor, as they -- as the ones are in the tower, so that all the windows are then floor to ceiling windows in the front floor, you know, bottom. And then I figure if somebody comes along, buys the house after me, decides to put the front porch back the way it was in 1867, they have the floor-to-ceiling windows that touch down to the bottom. Unless vou guys like the panels that --

MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay.

MEMBER MC MAHON: You're going in the right direction.

MEMBER BORRELLI: So those are all the improvements. Columns to make it look a little

more stately. Mahogany doors, double front 1 2 mahogany door, a mahogany door on the right to match, because right now they don't match, the 3 4 doors are off. The balconies, because they were completely rotted, my bay window gets -- oh, the 5 6 roofs. 7 So the roofing, every single roof, and 8 I showed the outhouse and everything, in my house was always zinc. So they were soldered and they 9 were little zinc pieces all soldered together. I 10 11 never had copper, because everyone was like, "Oh, 12 the house deserves copper." 13 MEMBER MC MAHON: No. 14 MEMBER BORRELLI: Because my house never had copper, and it's all aluminum colored zinc and 15 16 whatever. So I have samples here. I'm going to do a 17 metal roof. I would have liked to do the 18 19 Galvalume, but I don't want my neighbors to hate 20

metal roof. I would have liked to do the
Galvalume, but I don't want my neighbors to hate
me, because I think it's going to be too sparkly,
blingy, and shiny when you wake up in the morning.

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah, yeah.

MEMBER BORRELLI: So I decided to play the

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MEMBER BORRELLI: So I decided to play the old-fashioned New York City way of doing Galvalume or doing copper when they would oxidize -- not

oxidize it, dunk it in lead. So all those cupolas and domes and all that are done in Manhattan, when they're not copper and green patina, they are a gray, a dark gray, because they are copper dunked in lead. So I don't want lead anywhere near me, really.

So I'm doing a metal aluminum that is kind of the color of -- it's not too dark gray and it's a lighter gray, but it's not the shiny Galvalume, which I love, but -- and all my windows are capped and they all have aluminum on them. They're all capped with aluminum and nailed down. So as I go along, I replace those little caps on the top, because they start to leak and the water runs through the back of the house.

So -- and as we're doing all of this, the roof, the roofs are only the bay window roof, which needs to be replaced, because that's leaking, and the two front porch roofs, which need to be done, because I'm changing them and making them pretty. So I wanted the roofs, the special roofs to match. And all the other roof, eventually, when I'll do it, I'll come back and do it, that's still okay.

And the colors are staying the same. It's just that I'm debating back and forth and back and

forth whether or not to paint the windows. 1 2 inside of the windowsills are dark color, which I know it had originally, so it would be like a 3 4 raisin color. But Joe said it's going to be a lot of work and I'm out of my mind, and so I'm 5 6 debating. So I'm not sure about the raisin yet, 7 but, anyway, the colors stay the same on the house. 8 And it will be painted, but in sections, because it's a lot of work. 9 10 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Well, I'm going to --11 MEMBER BORRELLI: And finito. 12 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: I'm going to have to 13 wrap this up. MEMBER BORRELLI: 14 I'm done. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: I -- if anyone's ever 15 16 read your book or knows you, the attention to detail that you've put into this home is -- it's 17 18 just full of love and everything. I suggest, though, that, obviously, not all is going to be 19 done all at once, so as you go to the next stage, 20 21 you maybe come back --MEMBER BORRELLI: Always. 22 23 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: -- and update us, 24 saying, you know, "These windows didn't work," or 25 "The column," you know, "we couldn't get," and just
