2	MS. ISAACS: Thank you.
3	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Item No. 4, 434 Main
4	Street, Suffolk County Tax Map #1004-4-7-25 (sic)
5	(1001-4-7-25). Discussion and possible motion on
6	the application of Andrew Aurichio. The applicant
7	proposes a renovation to the exterior of the
8	building. These renovations would include:
9	Replacing existing asphalt shingle roof with
10	Cedar Impressions Perfection shingles on the north,
11	east, and west sides of the angled and turreted
12	roof in all areas visible from the street.
13	Replace the existing flat rubber roof with
14	new rubber roofing and install skylights on the
15	flat roof area of the roof.
16	Restore any broken or missing windows and
17	doors, using antique wavy glass.
18	Install solar panels on the south area of the
19	roof.
20	Restore existing soffits, fascia, and
21	window/door trim. Replace in kind if necessary.
22	Restore existing gutters and storm management.
23	Replace in kind, if necessary, with copper gutter
24	system.
25	Remove two chimneys.

1	This is Suffolk County Tax Map #1001-4-7-25.
2	Is there someone here to represent this?
3	MR. NICHOLSON: I was here to accompany Lucy,
4	I don't know where she is. Can I try and call her?
5	MEMBER CLAUDIO: Sure.
6	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yes, you may, but you
7	just have a few minutes.
8	MR. NICHOLSON: Yeah, I'm not sure where she is.
9	MEMBER MC MAHON: I mean, all the materials
10	are on point. I mean, cedar
11	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah.
12	MEMBER MC MAHON: Cedar roofs, you know, the
13	Perfection shingles. EPDM roofing is a flat roof
14	material that is necessary when you don't have a
15	pitch on a roof.
16	We can wait for this person to return, but,
17	so far, the materials make perfect sense, and I'm
18	not sure where else we want to go with that.
19	MEMBER BORRELLI: I think
20	CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: All of our yeah.
21	MEMBER BORRELLI: I'm like wondering, like
22	the solar panels on the south side of the roof.

BARNES: My name is Lucy Barnes, and I'm 7 here to present the 434 Main Street Auditorium 8 project. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. Pull the 9 microphone down, would you, please, Lucy? BARNES: I have one picture that I could 13 send to you --14 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Do you have pictures? MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 15 16 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Can you share? MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah. 17 MS. BARNES: -- of Mr. Webb's house. 18 MEMBER BORRELLI: I have the a picture in my 19 book, actually. I put that picture in my book. 20 21 MS. BARNES: Oh, really? 22 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Okay. 23 MEMBER BORRELLI: I think it's in there, yeah. 24 MS. BARNES: Yeah. Someone said it used to 25 be like a taxi rank there for Greenport.

1 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes, yes. 2 MS. BARNES: Everybody used to come and --3 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes, yes, yes. 4 MS. BARNES: -- you know, get a horse and 5 buggy to get to the train. 6 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yep. And in the back by 7 the livery where the horses were, there was like a 8 barnish type of -- obviously, for the horses, but that's where the International Order of Odd Fellows met. 9 MS. BARNES: Yes. 10 11 MEMBER BORRELLI: And then they moved from 12 there over to the T-shirt shop now. 13 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Yeah. MEMBER BORRELLI: Upstairs, but they used to 14 meet back there. 15 16 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: There's a symbol on 17 the door. 18 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah, yeah. 19 MS. BARNES: And for a while it was called 20 Odd Fellows Street, in one of the old maps I have. 21 MEMBER BORRELLI: Yes, it is, exactly. 22 MS. BARNES: I think there might be one that 23 I put there that says Odd Fellows Street. 24 MEMBER BORRELLI: Exactly, yep, yep. And 25 then they moved it all, but yeah.

1 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Well, thank you very 2 I appreciate you coming before us, this is 3 very exciting. 4 MS. BARNES: No, thank you. And if you have 5 any input and suggestions or anything you find. 6 CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. We'll 7 send it to you. 8 MEMBER BORRELLI: Okay. Good luck. CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Thank you. 9 There is nothing else on the agenda, but there's a gentleman 10 11 here who would like to -- Joe, would you like to? 12 Please say your name and address. Thank you. 13 MR. CORSO: My name is Joe Corso, and I'm at 4 Sandy Beach Road in Greenport. And thank you for 14 taking the time. I know I'm not on the agenda for 15 16 today, but some of the things, just what's going on 17 with Sandy Beach. 18 I'm sure you've heard that we've been trying 19 to get a sewer line run into the district, because there are people who would like to do some work on 20 21 their homes, but Suffolk County regulations forbid 22 any major work being done, unless you have one of 23 these I/A systems put in. 24 Because the beach is so narrow, we don't 25 really have a lot of space to put in some of these

systems, so people are kind of stuck, they can't really do much with their, with their homes. But one of the things we've been trying to discourage is people putting in glass boxes, these huge monstrosities, it just doesn't fit with the beach.

A lot of these homes have been in families for generations, and the beach was originally, as you know, scallop shacks, so some of those homes have been there for probably over 150 years old.

Anyway, the Mayor approached us, and he had mentioned back in -- I guess it was 2017 it started. There was this Greenport Reconnaissance --

MEMBER BORRELLI: Yeah.

MR. CORSO: -- Level Survey --

CHAIR RATSEY WILLIAMS: Right.

MR. CORSO: -- that was done. And we got a copy of that, looked through it, and he had said part of the suggestions in there were something with Widow Hole, and there was another property, and then Sandy Beach. Now Sandy Beach is a very different animal, it's not one -- we're not coming in with one project to say, "Okay, this is one house we want to work on," there are 28 homes on that strip of land right now.

So his suggestion was that we try to become a

Historic District as part of the Village. It gives us some protections on the flavor of the beach, that we're going to be able to keep it that way.

And, also, God forbid, there is something catastrophic where you lose a house or two, we might even have some protection there to be able to build as such, again, not to be putting up, you know, these big houses.

So one of the things we did with all of the homeowners, we sent out a copy of that survey, and also the guidelines for what the Historic District looks for. You know, we wanted to educate ourselves and all of the homeowners.

Last Thursday we started a voting process where we just wanted to get, you know, what the beach wants. You know, we wanted everybody to have an input in this. So, anyway, as of Tuesday -- we had cut off voting on midnight on Tuesday. Well, Wednesday, we tallied everything up, and we had -- out of the 28 homes, 19 of them voted yes to try and join the Historic District. We had six no votes, and we had three no response votes. So we got the majority, the majority of the homeowners are on board with this.

And we didn't try to sugar coat it that --

because one of the concerns that people had is, you know, what are we going to be able to do? You know, we hear these horror stories that, you know, everything's got to be, you know, approved by the, by the district, and we tried to see. You know, we said, yeah, yeah, there may be some issues related to that, but it doesn't mean 8 that nothing happens, that you can't do anything, you just have to go through another layer of 10 transparency. So we weren't sugar coating anything, and we still got -- like I say, 19 of the homeowners have voted to pursue this and go for this.

> So I guess the question becomes now, is what's the next step? How do we handle this? You know, the Mayor came and spoke to the -- at our annual meeting on the July 4th weekend, so, you know, we've, we've done our due diligence that, yes, we really think that this is something we should, we should pursue. So, really, at this point now is what, what are the next steps, how do we, how do we become part of the Historic District. It's not part of the contiguous Village, it's a little bit different, but, you know, we're the -we're part of Greenport Village.
