The Village system's a little unusual in a couple of ways. Most cities, when you go and look at their sewer system, water flows downhill. So they take the prime spot right on the water, build a sewage treatment plant, and have all the pipes there by gravity. Unfortunately, probably more by accident than planning, Greenport was built the other way around.

The early history of the sewer system is a little murky. I've been here for a long time, but not long enough for that. But it sounds like the first sewage systems probably were some pipes back into the 1920's and they

section of sewer and then that

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25

on a lot of the system, including the central pump station, which is just up the block here. And about 90 percent of the flow of all the sewage in the Village ends up going throughout central pump station. And then that has a set of big pumps and they pump all the way across to Moores Lane treatment plant.

And that force main there is also from the 1940's and we've had that break with some increasing frequency the last couple of years.

And then the treatment plant
itself, prior to 1975, the plant
was pretty much a disaster. There
were a lot of upgrades done
incrementally to that. The
standards, the requirements for
sewage treatment have escalated
over those years. So things that
were acceptable in 1970, were not

               the right amount of flow. One of

               our problems is there's something
               called infiltration and inflow.

                 The Village has had some issues
20
               over the years that the DEC has

               been involved with where if we get
22
               a storm, particularly a high tide
23
               with an east wind, a lot of our

               coastal streets flood. We had

                one -- you know, some of the

manholes, we've been replacing the covers so that they have gaskets and bolts so that the water doesn't flow in. We actually have one plumbing fixture, it took us a while to find, that was letting in about 600,000 gallons a day, which is actually the rated capacity of the entire Village. So when have you a flood, that was, obviously, a problem.

The other part of the problem is the plant is biological. We're basically growing bugs. We're using bacteria and viruses and little microphona that are eating the stuff that's in the water, turning things are dissolved into something that can be filtered out and we filter it out.

So basically we're bringing
water with solids in, we're trying
to take the solids out, and just
have water going back out to the

3	some of them appear to have been
4	connected to the sanitary sewer.
5	We don't want that. We want to
6	get them to the storm sewer so
7	that clean water, rainwater, we
8	don't want it in the sanitary
9	sewer. We don't want to pay to
10	convey it, we don't want to pay to
11	treat it, and it also, there's
12	just too much pollution.
13	One of the things that we've
14	been doing with this study, which
15	we're working on trying to get
16	this finalized, we've reviewed
17	each of the components and there's
18	a number of areas that all can use
19	improvements.
20	The reality is, over the next
21	number of decades, you're going to
22	replace in one fashion or another,
23	almost the whole thing. Most
24	things are not going to service

beyond 90 or 100 years, so we're

25

2	going to end up replacing. You
3	know, some of the pipes, we may be
4	able to do spot repairs. We may
5	be able to have liners that we put
6	in to do things more economically.
7	The manholes that are leaking,
8	we may put sealers, we may grout
9	around them. There's a number of
10	processes that can be done
11	relatively cost effectively. We
12	don't want to rip up entire roads
13	and start where people started in
14	1932, and we won't have to do
15	that.
16	The challenge we have at hand to
17	a large degree is going to be to
18	prioritize what the improvements
19	are. What has to get replaced
20	with what priority, and this will
21	be skewed by a couple of things.
22	One, when things break, we're
23	going to have to fix them. You
24	mentioned you've had recent
25	experience with that. There can

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25

be little things we can do to improve maintenance. You know, we had the recent plug I think was a grease plug. We need to talk to some of our restaurants and say don't put grease in the drain; the little things we can do to help ourselves.

And certain things we may be able to apply for funding from the State EFC. We have to be a little creative with this. Because you do capital projects, generally will get a score for funding. If we describe it as a replacement in kind and it was maintenance deferred, we're really not likely to get a good score on that. So we need to apply for whatever we can apply for so to some extent if you get a grant for a particular piece of work, even if that particular item hasn't broken down, well you do it when you have

2	the money. So that will skew our
3	work.
4	One of the things that we're
5	trying to do with this too, and I
6	know this won't mean much to
7	people, but this is a graph of the
8	flows going into the plant or
9	actually it's a graph of the flows
10	leaving the plant.
11	And can you see there's some
12	lines here (indicating). It's
13	pretty hard to see from a
14	distance, but you can see the
15	average is down here and this is
16	where we typically run. And then
17	you can see there are some points
18	a little higher, but there's a few
19	points, we got one or two a year
20	where we have a crazy flow, two or
21	three times the normal flow.
22	That's our I/I problem. Typically
23	those are associated with storms,
24	east winds, high lunar tides.

So the other set of

prioritization is to find where
that leakage is coming in so when
we have particular projects that
will reduce that inflow, those
will also have to be priority
projects.

So one of things we're using,
this, this is a plot from an Excel
graph (indicating). So we're
using our data, our operating
data, which we collect anyhow, to
try to understand, you know, where
our problems are. On this graph,
and, again, I apologize, you can't
see from the back, but there's a
little pink line which is our
monthly average line, and that
line right now is sloping up.

Now that can mean a couple things. It can mean that the demand or the generation of sewage within the Village is going up.

Our population is certainly higher than it was 10 or 15 years ago.

1 Modern plumbing fixtures generally 2 use less water, so we would have 3 4 other localities where you don't 5 get an increase. You can have a 6 slight population in order to not 7 have that increase. And that upslope could also be our 8 infiltration and inflow problem. 10 So the first step that we're 11 doing is trying to use our data 12 better, generate it, and also look 13 at it to figure out where we are 14 and also to assess the 15 effectiveness of each of the 16 projects as we go forward. 17 So a little bit and rehash, we 18 discuss things with people, we 19 have some potential projects, and 20

we also had some -- we're working on cost projections of what various projects would cost. We can use all of that information for the funding application, but we have an old system. We're

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up on the operator's computer, so
that we can say, hey, all of a
sudden the pumpage today on Sixth
Street is double what it aught to
be. So we can run out and see, do
we have a problem, is something
inundated, or do we have one
manhole that's letting in a lot of
water? So we're going to try to
use our data to find those
problems.

You know, part of our problem
here is, if I could make analogy
to a boat, if you have a boat with
ten leaks, you can fix eight of
them and it's still a leaky boat.
So we can fix things and not see
an immediate benefit, but if we
take the long term data, we could
actually start to see a change in
the slope of that line and maybe
it will start dropping down, down,
down, and that will tell us we're
being effective.

2 MAYOR STUESSI: And then I know one of the things that you've 3 4 mentioned is us, as a Village, 5 needing to take a look at what's 6 sort of our build-out capacity is 7 within the Village and then look at potentially outside of the 8 Village within our existing sewer 10 district and will ultimately need to sort of rank and make 11 12 determinations on what our, you 13 know, call it maximum build-out 14 capacity is within the Village 15 versus out in the district. How 16 might that be addressed in, you 17 know, looking at priorities and 18 what we're seeing in other places? 19 MR. HOLZMACHER: Well, that's 20 a very good question because, you 21 know, the slight uptrend in the 22 chart -- and I know it sounds 23 ridiculous, but engineers love 24 charts. And, you know, we analyze 25 this data and for some years, the

So we have to tighten up the system and maybe even go through a few storms and say that, okay, we don't have -- you know, this graph, I can come and have a graph with no points that are double and

the plant, that could be done and we had showed some things here.

We were looking at an equalization tank, which would give us a way to absorb the big slug of the water on some of those storms and that equalization tank would theoretically eventually be used one of the steps of increasing the capacity.

But you have the issue too,
there's something we usually
develop key money charges or
developer charges. You usually
sell that on a gallon per day
capacity. So if we needed to
spend, you know, \$4 or \$5 million
to upgrade the plant, you want the
developer who's getting the
benefit of that to pay for that
and not put that cost on the
existing rate payers. So it gets
into a more complicated issue.

18	at I know you can't see it from
19	over here, but we have some
20	typical daily flow numbers and the
21	flows there are so much lower than
22	the big stations. We've been
23	focusing on the big stations
24	first.
25	So one of our challenges has

been getting repeatable data from the meters. Ideally, once we can get them debugged -- because they just don't work well with sewage is our problem.

Numbers on the flows and see how much flow is coming in, then I'd like to put meters on those other stations, but right now they're kind of in the second tier of things to worry about.

So we will eventually look at that, but just the fact they're not subject to inundation ever, most of the manholes are in the crown of the roads that a puddle doesn't sit on it. I know there are exceptions, but, you know, those are issues we will address, but they're really not on the first level of things to apply, not just the money but the manpower.

NILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: So notwithstanding the limitations raised by the engineer as to the Village's consideration or the Board's consideration of those requests, procedurally, you adopted in December and then continued it in June the so-called moratorium that provides for an out, a waiver, under certain circumstances. A number of

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property owners have got -- for properties, as I understand, from outside the Village -- have asked for the Board to process those waivers.

There are certain predicates with respect to that including steps that need to be -- have been taking prior to your adoption of the moratorium. I believe you have a predicate requirement that the application had to have been submitted in advance of the moratorium and if the sewer hookup applications to the Village were not submitted in advance, I don't know that you'd have any jurisdiction to even consider those applications at this point. Again, notwithstanding, it

sounds like even if you were to consider them, based on this substance, you'd still have the concern by the engineer.

2 MR. HOLZMACHER: I'd 3 recommend no, but that's just me. 4 MAYOR STUESSI: Would you 5 mind speaking to some of the issues -- you sort of touched on 6 7 it earlier -- of commercial uses versus residential uses. And I 8 know that some of the discussions 10 we've had, you know, the levels of 11 flow can be dramatically different 12 for a restaurant than a single 13 family house with three people 14 living inside of it. Just to sort 15 of give an overview to the public 16 to understand how a hotel or 17 restaurant might impact the system 18 versus --19 MR. HOLZMACHER: Well, it's 20 really, it's a matter of flows. 21 The strength of the waste from a home verses from a, you know, food 22 23 processing plant would be very 24 different. You know, hotel's 25 really are going to be about the

The brewery waste, they 19 20 can actually being good for the 21 treatment because the bugs like 22 beer, but all the breweries that I 23 deal with, they all want to dump 24 it on Tuesday afternoon.
