17	Ernestine Marie Sells Roye, and Marion Kruszeski.
18	(Moment of Silence)
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Please be seated. I have a
20	few announcements this evening. First off,
21	Village Hall will be closed this coming Monday,
22	May 27th, in observance of Memorial Day.
23	Village Hall will also be closed on
24	Wednesday, June 19th, 2024 in observance of
25	Juneteenth.

The Greenport American Legion will be hosting this year's Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 27th, followed by light refreshments served at the Legion Hall. All are welcome and encouraged to attend.

And I'm also pleased to share that the brand

And I'm also pleased to share that the branch new water machines that the Village purchased, replaced the old ones, are up in service and working over at the light plant. They're only accepting exact change until June 1st, and then they will offer quarters at will.

With that, we are going to immediately move to our first Public Hearing of the evening. We have a Public Hearing regarding the Wetlands Permit Application submitted by Costello Marine Contracting as agent for the property located at 222 4th Street, Greenport, New York, 11944, Suffolk County Tax Map #1001-7-3-19.2 to perform the following work: Install +/- 205' of rock to existing rock barrier spit consisting of 1-2 ton stone. Top of stone not to exceed 24" above Mean High Water line (MHW). Public Hearing remains open from the May 16th, 2024 Work Session.

Is there anybody from the public that would like to be heard on this application?

MR. COSTELLO: My name is John A. Costello

1	with and I'm with Costello Marine Contracting,
2	one of the principals, and we are the ones that are
3	the agents for this application. And we made the
4	application for Mr. and Mrs. Ewing, and we I'm
5	here to answer any questions the Board may have.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Great.
7	MR. COSTELLO: Or the public.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: The only thing that the Board
9	had a question about in our last meeting that we've
10	clarified with both Costello and the State is some
11	of the rock does encroach upon the State waters.
12	The State looks at that just as it does if there
13	were a new bulkhead replacement in front of an
14	existing bulkhead, and has approved it through the
15	DEC, so there's no issues there.
16	Are there any other questions from the Board
17	or anybody from the audience that would like to
18	speak on this? Mary Bess?
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. I think the CAC
20	pretty much
21	MAYOR STUESSI: CAC approved both of them,
22	correct.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Approved it, right.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I read it, yeah.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.

1	MR. COSTELLO: Let me, let me try to correct
2	one comment you made, Mayor.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Yep.
4	MR. COSTELLO: The State did the State,
5	and we have a permit from the Department of
6	State
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Yep.
8	MR. COSTELLO: which controls the State
9	waters, and the rocks and docks mostly, all of
10	them, including Mitchell's Marina, is over into
11	State waters, but they all proceed to go out.
12	That's
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Correct. That's what I
14	that's all I was trying to clarify
15	MR. COSTELLO: Yeah, yeah. No, but they
16	MAYOR STUESSI: that it does extend it
17	beyond Ewing's private water rights.
18	MR. COSTELLO: Okay, good.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. So with that, I'll
20	make a motion to close this Public Hearing. May I
21	have a second?
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.

1	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Aye. Motion carries.
3	Next up is the adjoining property.

10	spit consisting of 1-2 ton 1-2 ton stone. Top
11	of stone not to exceed 24" above Mean High Water
12	(MHW). Public Hearing remains open from May 16th
13	Work Session.
14	Is there anybody from the public that would
15	like to be heard on this?
16	(No Response)
17	MR. COSTELLO: The only thing is the Board
18	has any questions, or the public has any questions,
19	my name, again, is John A. Costello, and I'm the
20	President of Costello Marine Contracting, and have
21	been for 65 years, and I will try to answer any
22	questions.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: Great. Any questions from
24	the Board on this one?
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Did the CAC review this one?

bulkhead with single 10 foot linear foot return
and 113 linear feet of single wood bulkhead (383
linear feet total). Dismantle stone and concrete
wall and store on site. Remove 25 square feet of
wood landing. Construct new vinyl bulkhead in
place of seaward existing wood bulkhead (130 linear
feet) with 10 feet return along the northerly
property line. Construct new vinyl bulkhead in
place of existing wood bulkhead (113 linear feet)
along southerly property line (253 linear feet
total). New vinyl bulkhead is set at same elevation
As existing wood bulkhead.
Reconstruct stone and concrete wall in same
location.
Replace wood landing in kind in same
location.
Restore disturbed vegetation and backfill

1 with coarse sand as necessary.

The Public Hearing remains open from the May 16th, 2024 Work Session.

I'd like to invite the representative for the homeowner up. I will for the benefit of the public make note that there was a change in representation regarding this application due to the unfortunate passing of the gentleman who was managing it. As a consequence of this, the Village Conservation Advisory Committee has not been onsite yet.

The applicant is aware that they need to follow up with Village Hall tomorrow, and has agreed to do so, with Village Clerk Candace, and we'll be scheduling the CAC onsite.

So we will let you talk to us about the project. We will take any public comment tonight, if there is any. And, of course, this will need to stay open until we get CAC to comment back to us the next meeting.

MS. SETCHELL: Okay. My name is Pam Setchell from Taplow Consulting, and we've taken over this permit for Mr. Kimack, who just recently passed away. It's always a little difficult when you jump in in the middle of something. My apologies for not knowing about the CAC, I thought that was taken

1 care of.

The project is as you mentioned down to the last letter. The bulkhead, the original bulkhead will be removed. There's no seaward expansion. There is no change in elevation. The stone wall will be removed and it will be put back as it was, only in far better condition than it is right now.

The stone section is 39 feet long, located at the southwest end of the property, and it will be dismantled, and the stones will be stored upland on the site to be used to be rebuilt in place.

The remaining wood bulkhead, as you know, there's actually two bulkheads there, it will not extend anymore seaward than the most seaward bulkhead that exists.

The footage of each bulkhead that you just mentioned is exactly the same as I do, give or take a foot. Sorry about that. And as we mentioned, all bulkheads will remain at the same elevation. All disturbed vegetation will be completely replanted after the backfilling and a little bit of settling. Approximately 20 yards of backfill will be needed and obtained from an upland source.

I am here to answer any questions that anybody has. I've walked the property extensively,

1	photographed it, in addition to Mr. Kimack.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just have one question.
3	Did you just say that the bulkhead is going to be
4	at the same elevation that it currently is at?
5	MS. SETCHELL: As the existing bulkhead,
6	correct.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Do we not have newer
8	regulations dealing with the DEC with higher
9	bulkhead?
10	MS. SETCHELL: We have there are permissions
11	that exist that you can ask to raise it 18 inches.
12	It is my understanding that Ms. Gutwillig and Mike
13	Kimack agreed that it would not be raised.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, considering the
15	tides that we're currently having, I am concerned.
16	I am concerned about that, considering I also,
17	you know, have the same scenario in my own, my own
18	property where I'm considering raising it, because
19	I'm tired of it flooding, so.
20	MS. SETCHELL: Personally, I wouldn't
21	disagree with you. I as I just said, I just
22	picked this up about 10 days ago. If it was my
23	property, I would raise it.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Jared, do we have the
25	ability to request that it get raised?

1	MS. SETCHELL: I would have to make an
2	amendment to the DEC permit that but I don't
3	foresee a problem with that.
4	MR. KASSCHAU: I don't know off the top of my
5	head. I could research that and get back to the
6	Trustees, yeah.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Could we research that,
8	please?
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. And we're leaving it
10	open and looking for the CAC to make comments as well.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: So we could have Jared take a
13	look at it.
14	MS. SETCHELL: I'm even happy to bring it up
15	to Ms. Gutwillig
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I
17	MS. SETCHELL: by all means.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just because I you know,
19	she's wide open into the bay.
20	MS. SETCHELL: She's in a vulnerable area.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Our tides are higher than
22	they've been and they continually get higher, we're
23	all concerned about it. It's well known in the
24	industry, or those who have bulkheads, that we
25	should go up, but if you could, that would be

1	appreciated.
2	MS. SETCHELL: There is a very gradual
3	elevation on the property.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is any of it in the flood
5	zone? I haven't had a chance, I didn't notice.
6	MS. SETCHELL: I think the whole thing is in
7	the flood zone.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, that answers that.
9	MS. SETCHELL: It can certainly go up a foot
10	and be it can certainly go up a foot. I would
11	prefer to see it go up the whole 18 inches, but we
12	might have a little bit of a drainage issue when
13	you get close to the house where the concrete wall
14	is. I can certainly readdress that.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Thank you.
16	MS. SETCHELL: I will, I will speak with the
17	CAC and we will definitely hammer out something.
18	But I'm actually in your court.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Julia, any questions for the
20	applicant?
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Just that the CAC is
22	expected to go there tomorrow, is that their visit?
23	MAYOR STUESSI: No, not tomorrow. They're
24	coordinating tomorrow
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh.

1	MS. SETCHELL: I'm going to call tomorrow,
2	yeah.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: to set a time before our
4	next meeting.
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, that sounds good to me,
6	okay? Let's get a little more information and see
7	what
8	MS. SETCHELL: Absolutely, absolutely.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Is there anybody from the
10	public that would like to comment on this this
11	evening?
12	(No Response)
13	MAYOR STUESSI: And, again, it will remain
14	open until our next meeting.
15	MS. SETCHELL: Okay.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: All right. Thank you. So
17	I'm going to make a motion to keep this Public
18	Hearing open until the next Village meeting, which
19	is on Wednesday, June 5th, at 6 p.m. It is at the
20	Little Red Schoolhouse on Front Street at that
21	time.
22	MS. SETCHELL: Okay. One quick question.
23	CAC would be able to meet. Do we have any idea
24	when?
25	MAYOR STUESSI: You're going to check tomorrow.

3	attention earlier that prior Planning Board
4	approval site plan was for a microbrewery, and this
5	application would need to be referred back to
6	Planning Board for site plan approval
7	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yes.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: for any changes on it.
9	MR. VANDENBURGH: Okay.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: I would appreciate maybe if
11	you could share with the Board any history
12	MR. VANDENBURGH: Sure.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: of what was done back
14	then. And I see it was November of '08.
15	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yes. We are still a
16	microbrewery. We are actually expecting a new
17	system to come in to replace our prior system that
18	was there, but we are still brewing beer there on a
19	weekly basis.
20	This is simply to afford us the this
21	application for the full on-premise license. It's
22	simply to afford us an opportunity to accommodate
23	requests for gatherings of you know, we have
24	rehearsal dinner requests and other things where,
25	you know, they would like to have a cocktail in

addition to a beer. But, you know, up to this point, we've been a microbrewery. We have the adjacent tasting room license and ability to serve pints. And, you know, that will, that will continue.

This is really just something that allow us to continue to be innovative in a very expensive part of Long Island, and afford an option for people who are interested in potentially having their event at our location.

Our hours would not really change. We still are open until 9 o'clock, sometimes 10 o'clock at night. We don't see that changing at all. You know, we're still seasonal, very seasonal. In the off-season, we're only open Friday through Sunday from approximately Columbus Day through July, end of June, beginning of July. So then from July until Columbus Day we're open 7 days a week.

MAYOR STUESSI: Great. The other thing I will make note of for the benefit of the public and remind everybody on the Board is this property in our recent zoning change went from Waterfront Commercial to Commercial Retail, which allows for a lot of other uses, as opposed to being a grandfathered use. But, again, we will refer that back to

1	Planning.
2	Is there anybody from the Board that has any
3	questions for Rich, anymore questions?
4	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I just have a
5	question. So this wouldn't just be for events, you
6	would have
7	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yeah, we have the ability
8	to serve a cocktail.
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Right.
10	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yeah.

22	not able to generate as much farm brewery product
23	out of that location that's necessary. So we by
24	allowing that to just as a matter of function
25	and economics, letting that license lapse, we now

1	need to apply for this license in order to kind of
2	pick up where we left off there.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So, Rich, this is just
4	this isn't just event related, in other words, it's
5	a general liquor license, right?
6	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yeah. If somebody comes
7	in, I mean, we don't feature that as our primary
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
9	MR. VANDENBURGH: you know, thing. But
10	it's when somebody comes in. In the world of craft
11	beer, and, you know, a facility like ours, it's no
12	longer just beer, people are looking for options.
13	You know, we still have the ability to sell wine.
14	But, yeah, we're looking for cocktails. So, yeah,
15	it would anybody comes in at any time, they want a
16	gin and tonic, then we would be able to serve them
17	a gin and tonic with this license.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So it's not just the
19	the business plan is not just for catered events,
20	it's is it going to be open hours during the
21	weekend upstairs or
22	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
24	MR. VANDENBURGH: It's going to be just same
25	hours, same format, it's just instead of also

1	getting a beer, you could also get a cocktail.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I just wanted to
3	check, that's all.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Did anybody in the public
5	wish to speak in regards to this?
6	MS. WILHELM: I missed what you were
7	MR. VANDENBURGH: We're applying for a full
8	liquor license
9	MS. WILHELM: Oh, at the brewery?
10	MR. VANDENBURGH: Yeah.
11	MS. WILHELM: Yeah. Okay, good.
12	MS. LOPER: I support it.
13	MS. WILHELM: Yeah. All right.
14	(Laughter)
15	MS. KESSLER: I second the motion.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: And before you step down,
17	thanks for everything you've done for the Village.
18	This has been a bedrock corner of our downtown
19	district for long time now, the rehabilitation of
20	the firehouse.
21	I hope your partner, John, mentioned that
22	I spoke to him the other day about taking a look at
23	the old jail next to you, which, as I understand,
24	you guys had brought a proposal at some point to
25	the Village. I've been talking to the State

1	Historic Preservation group and looking at some
2	funding towards rehabilitating the jail and there
3	is some money there. So I had mentioned to John
4	that I would love to sit down with you guys
5	MR. VANDENBURGH: Oh.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: see how we might be able
7	to potentially, you know, work together on it and
8	then bring something in front of the Board.
9	MR. VANDENBURGH: Sounds good. Okay, great.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Great.
11	MR. VANDENBURGH: Okay. Do you need me to
12	stick around or
13	MAYOR STUESSI: No.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No. But I think
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you. We will this
16	will be referred over to Planning and Mike Noone
17	will be in touch on scheduling something.
18	MR. VANDENBURGH: Okay, great. All right.
19	Thank you.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you, sir. Everybody's
21	leaving. All right.
22	MR. COSTELLO: I put that sign on the chair.
23	(Laughter)
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you, sir.
25	MR. COSTELLO: When are they going to act on

17	motions to allow her the ability to speak when she
18	does arrive. She had an issue with her granddaughter.
19	So if there's anybody from the public that wishes
20	to speak on any other matter? Randy Wade, you're
21	going to make up for last night, huh?
22	(Laughter)
23	RANDY WADE: Randy Wade, Sixth Street. What
24	is Local Law 9, Traffic and Parking Regulations?
25	And then there's another one, Local Law 7, No

1	Overnight Parking. Do we just have I could do
2	that, wait until the it's posted, whatever this
3	is that's being proposed, but I wondered if you'd
4	do a nutshell of what's being proposed.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: So we've been discussing
6	these in the past few meetings. One of them, I
7	don't recall which of the two, is to have no
8	overnight parking at the road ends of our beaches
9	on Fifth and Sixth Street and Fourth Street, as
10	well as Clark. And I believe somebody can correct
11	me if I'm looking for it right now. It is

21	would be an issue on Clark Street.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: We're only looking to do it
23	at the very road ends.
24	RANDY WADE: The very end? Okay. Yeah,
25	great. So that's the overnight one. And then

1 Local Law 9, to adopt traffic and parking 2 regulations. TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: That's the stop 3 4 sign on Johnson Place. RANDY WADE: Oh, it's referring back to that 5 6 that other thing that -- okay, great, thanks. 7 And then at the last Work Session you 8 mentioned that you were thinking of hiring a 9 consultant for the property where the McCann 10 Campground is and up by the water. And then we had 11 had a casual conversation and you mentioned that 12 you thought the outflow sewer pipe was putting out 13 very clean water now. So can we, the public, have access to that beach? Because it used to be one of 14 the most spectacular places, I loved going there. 15 16 Could we unlock the gate and let people go down there, then? 17 18 MAYOR STUESSI: That's going to be for a future Board hearing. What we've discussed at a 19 couple of meetings is looking at all of the 20 21 potential uses for that site, which may include, 22 you know, making it a park and opening it to the public, potentially for affordable housing,

7	order to have a healthy conversation about the
8	potential uses of it.
9	RANDY WADE: Okay. So but so they will be
10	charged with looking at environmental solutions as
11	well, and public recreation solutions as well?
12	MAYOR STUESSI: What do you mean by
13	environmental solutions?
14	RANDY WADE: Well, it's right next to Inlet
15	Pond Park. I mean, that is, that is, you know, a
16	wildlife refuge. So where should it be a wildlife
17	refuge? Where should it be a place where the
18	public can enjoy it?
19	MAYOR STUESSI: So the consultants would
20	purely be brought on to look at the potential for
21	community housing on that site, in addition to the
22	campground. That would be some information we
23	would have as part of a larger Board and community
24	discussion on potential uses for the property.
25	RANDY WADE: Right. It's just that being an

Urban Planner, planners are only as good as the problem that's been identified for them to solve. And if it's -- if you're giving them specific directions, it's like you're saying that, you know, here's a hammer, every problem is going to look like a nail kind of thing, unless you charge a planner with saying we'd like to look at our assets comprehensively, and we want to consider all of these things, including wildlife preservation, including access to beaches by the public, including needs for our infrastructure, including affordable housing.

MAYOR STUESSI: So if your suggestion is to potentially bring on a planner to look at a variety of different uses, that would be something entirely different than the focus of this particular group and what they would be tasked with as one piece of many different potential options for it. So we'll take that into account.

RANDY WADE: Okay. Then I guess it's just whether to do that one piece of it first and then -- I mean, you might want to appoint, for instance, a Task Force if you don't want to pay for a planner to do these things to come up with, you know, how the different assets of the Village

1	might be best utilized. Just a thought.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you.
3	RANDY WADE: Thank you.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Is there anybody else from
5	the public that would like to speak this evening in
6	advance of yes, please, sir.
7	MR. WHITTLE: You can hear me from here,
8	probably. Ed Whittle, 164
9	MAYOR STUESSI: We need you to go up to the
10	podium and state your name and address, please, for
11	the benefit of our stenographer.
12	MR. WHITTLE: Ed Whittle, 164 Sixth Street.
13	I'm just inquiring as to whether or not there's
14	been any discussion concerning repaving Sixth
15	Street.
16	(Laughter)
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Absolutely. So it is on a
18	priority list for the Village to get done. One of
19	the challenges is coordinating with some drilling
20	that is going to have to be done at the end of the
21	street to bring cable over to Shelter Island.
22	For about a year-and-a-half, the Village,
23	predating our new administration, had been working
24	with the Town of Shelter Island and the provider to
25	get the testing done. I'm pleased to report that

1	testing was finally done two weeks ago.
2	MR. WHITTLE: Yeah, it's
3	MAYOR STUESSI: We're awaiting the results of
4	it. In addition to that, we are bonding and in
5	process of that we've approved it, for a
6	significant amount of street work in the Village
7	and sidewalk work. We have priced it out and we're
8	looking to coordinate all of this together. So I'm
9	very hopeful we'll have some news on when that
10	might be within the next 45 days.
11	MR. WHITTLE: Does that mean that there's
12	also going to be a cable run from the end of the
13	Sixth Street, is that what you're saying?
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Correct, yep.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Underwater, you know, under
16	the sea bed.
17	MR. WHITTLE: And when is that supposed to
18	happen?
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Don't know. That you know,
20	the testing was just done and we're working with
21	them on it.
22	MR. WHITTLE: So this is going to hold off
23	repaving
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Not necessarily. But that's
25	what I'm trying to say

1	MR. WHITTLE: Right.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: is that we're awaiting the
3	results of the testing and when they're looking to
4	schedule. It would make a lot of sense to coordinate
5	it all together, rather than repaving. And we've
6	also priced out curb work in places where it's
7	needed, rather than doing all the work and then
8	having it torn up and having to be replaced again.
9	MR. WHITTLE: So this project, this is going
10	to involve PSEG again?
11	MAYOR STUESSI: It's not PSEG, it's Verizon.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Verizon.
13	MR. WHITTLE: Oh, Verizon.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Yep.
15	MR. WHITTLE: Okay. And presumably, then,
16	you'll also be discussing repaving Johnson at the
17	end, because that's in really bad shape as well.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Hopefully. There's a,
19	there's a number of areas in the Village that we've
20	got on this priority list that are very problematic.
21	MR. WHITTLE: Good, great. Thanks
22	MAYOR STUESSI: You're very welcome. Is
23	there anybody else from the public that would like
24	to speak this evening?
25	(No Response)

1	MAYOR STUESSI: All right. Nancy, welcome.
2	MS. KOURIS: Thank you all for coming.
3	Everyone else must have known I was coming today.
4	(Laughter)
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, I made a point to say
6	you were taking care of your lovely grandchildren.
7	MS. KOURIS: Had I known it was going to be
8	grandchildren, grandchildren last minute, and sixth
9	grade dance, last lacrosse game, and no one was
10	I had to do all kinds of stuff.
11	Anyway, Nancy Kouris, Blue Duck Bakery, and
12	BID President. Hi everyone. Welcome. I just
13	wanted to take this opportunity. Thank you,
14	Mayor Kevin, for allowing me to speak to try and
15	reintroduce the BID to everyone. And I want to
16	thank you for having the Trustees, and, obviously,
17	community people.
18	So there is a reason for every season in
19	Greenport, and this season we are very, very happy
20	to announce that this is the 30th Anniversary of
21	the Greenport BID, which is the Business Improvement
22	District. We will be celebrating that with some
23	special guests in our annual meeting on June 20th.
24	I'd like to introduce our volunteer Greenport
25	BID Board, of which I have a few people with us

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today, Kim and Linda, okay? And because it's the holiday weekend, a lot of people are very busy with business, so that's why they couldn't make it. But I will go through the BID Board.

So I, myself, Nancy Kouris, I'm the BID President. I own the Blue Duck Bakery Cafe in Greenport and Southold. Brendan Spiro is our Vice President, and he is, I believe, a General Manager of the Green Hill Group. Deborah Pittorino is a property owner and current Treasurer. David Serure is our Secretary, and he is the Managing Partner of 37 Properties, LLC, and the President of Ralph's Italian Ices. We have Linda Kessler, who is a property owner and the proprietor of Kessie. Linda Sweeney is the Stony Brook Eastern Long Island Hospital Vice President of Foundation and External Affairs. Stephen Karl is a Real Estate Salesperson of Daniel Gale Sotheby's International Realty. Mario Corrado is the General Manager of James Shuford is a Resident Board the Menhaden. Member, and is a Project Manager for Sun River Kim Loper, who is here, owns Harbor Pet in Greenport and Montauk. And our support staff is Lisa McElroy, who is our Administrative Assistant, and Steve Benthal, which is our Tech Support and

Media Administrator.

These are all the people that make the BID run. And not only do they -- be on the BID, but many of them are on other boards. They are on the Greenport Skateboard Park, the Revitalization Board, they're on the East End Seaport Museum, they're on the North Fork Promotional Council, the East End Tourism Alliance, the North Fork Festival Board. So these are all volunteers who not only volunteer for the BID, but they volunteer for all these other groups that help Greenport. These are people who live, eat, sleep, probably drink a lot for about -- for Greenport, so they're very important people.

But what I want to do is just give a brief history of the BID. It's not very long, it is very brief, so please let me do this, I appreciate it.

Okay. A Steering Committee was formed in 1993 in compliance with the New York State Article 19-A of the General Municipal Law, and was adopted by resolution by the Incorporated Village of Greenport in 1994. The Village formed a Special Assessment District in a designated area to finance improvements to restore and promote business activity. A District Management Association was

formed, of which all property owners and tenants are part of. Downtown Planning Associates created the report, the plan and the map with the Steering Committee.

The Greenport Business Improvement District, or BID, is a 501(c)(6) not-for-profit organization. As such, we are a separate entity from the Village of -- Village government. The BID works closely with the Village, and is subject to oversight by the Village Board of Trustees. We are funded through the special assessment tax, paid by all taxable property owners within the designated district. The funds are collected and disbursed to us by the Village of Greenport, and these funds create our Operating Budget for the year.

Our primary goal of the Greenport Business Improvement District is to promote it for a good place to live, work, shop and visit. We achieve this goal through annual efforts and projects that will improve the overall appearance and quality of the district. They include planting, lighting, decorations, signage, improve sanitation and other advances. We encourage businesses to work together to achieve the common goals of driving commerce to the district and beyond. Our efforts are in

support of the Village of Greenport's responsibilities, but not as a substitute. Together, we can achieve great things for our Village of Greenport community.

How we do our work and get our projects done is by committee. We have four committees. One is Marketing, and that's how we get the word out, Social Media, our new website, advertisements, email blasts. Our Events Committee, they're responsible for events for residents, children and visitors for fun, entertainment, and education. That's our Egg Roll, our Halloween events, scavenger hunts for the kids, and also lighting -- and the lighting.

Our Beautification is responsible for keeping our Village beautiful with planters, which new ones are being constructed as we speak. So we have some new planters on the way. We do lighting. And yes, the BID did create and finance the holiday lighting of the Village, which I think is, bar none, the best in the North and South Fork. When this Village is lit up, it is absolutely -- it's magical, it's phenomenal, and I am very proud to say the BID was responsible for that. We're looking for additional lighting from the Village, helping us in Mitchell Park, so that's something

1 else to look for.

We have an Advocacy Group, which is a governmental meeting with the Mayor and Village representatives who move shared goal and ideas forward.

Our open monthly meetings are on the third Wednesday of the month, everyone is welcome. They are predominantly on Zoom, and they are listed on the Village calendar. We hold separate committee meetings and executive meetings all through the month and year. Our new BID website will be a great resource to communicate with our members about those meetings, as well as about the Village of Greenport Special and Regular Meetings. The ability to better exchange information and topics of importance to our members is vital to our mission.

I cannot express how important communication is to any organization. Without it, one is left with a lack of response, a perception of apathy, and impression of disorganization. Communication between two or more parties on a consistent basis is key.

We depend on stakeholders in the Village of Greenport to reach out to us, as well as our

efforts to reach out to them for information concerning events, issues, code changes, anything that affects the BID District and its membership, business and residents. We depend on our Village Liaison, the Mayor, and the Village Trustees to keep us abreast of Village matters and steer us -- and steer those in search of us appropriately.

As much as we -- as much as we would like to be able to attend all Village Trustee meetings, we are not always able to do so because of business and family matters, such as grandchildren and stuff, but I am here.

(Laughter)

MS. KOURIS: Many of us watch the live feed or watch the video later. This channel of information is one way of communicating with the BID.

Recent efforts have been made to impart some important issues with us, but we all can do better. I respectfully ask that the Trustees reach out to the Greenport BID to alert us of anything that may, in your opinion, be of concern to the BID District. In turn, when a situation arises in need of our attention and position, and we cannot comment in person, we will communicate with the Board and --

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I'm sorry -- with the Board of Trustees by letter, individually, and/or with the Village Clerk to be read into the minutes. Many times we are seeking clarification on how -- if an issue will affect our over 200 businesses and residential members.

We encourage our members to voice their concerns to us. The Greenport BID needs your input for proper decision making and position on important matters that affect us in the BID District community. We can be reached currently at, wait for this, hellobid@greenportvillage.com. Okay? The BID is .com, the Village government is .org, but we are greenportvillage.com. what I said, because I will be saying it yet again, okay? So you can contact us currently at hellobid@greenportvillage.com. Okay? Or by contacting any of our dedicated Board Members. Ιf the Trustees would like their contact information by request, I'd be happy to send it, send everyone's contact information to you.

To our community partners, if you or someone you know would like to serve on the Greenport Business Improvement District, if you're in the district, or volunteer, you don't have to be in the district for that, to be on one of our committees,

5	attention. It's my great honor to serve on the
6	Board with an amazing group of professionals, and
7	trust me, Greenport is in good hands because of
8	their tireless efforts. So thank you very much.
9	Thank you. Thank you, Town Board, thank you,
10	Mr. Mayor, I appreciate your time.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you, Nancy. As a
12	public service, I will mention those new flower
13	planters, if anyone is available to help us, 9 a.m.
14	tomorrow at Mitchell Park. There's a group of
15	people getting together to help assemble them. So
16	if you're able to, please join us.
17	Thanks for everybody's work on the BID. Kim,
18	it's been a real pleasure working on lighting with
19	you, and I'm excited about what more we're able to
20	do with you and Betsey this coming winter.
21	And I'm really, really excited to see the new
22	website that the team has been working on for the
23	BID and how we're going to link that up with the
24	Village.
25	MS. KOURIS: Yeah.

9	wanted to discuss something, I believe.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I'm very concerned
11	about the street closure. I think that that
12	you know, a full road closure from Third Street to
13	First Street is going to have a significant impact
14	on the businesses downtown, and I think that there
15	could be a public safety issue involved in it as
16	well. It's a very busy time of day, and, you know,
17	there's a lot of traffic coming off the ferry.
18	That traffic is going to be diverted. Third
19	Street, they'll probably go up to Center Street
20	into a residential neighborhood, so I'm concerned
21	about that.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: So the reason the road
23	closure is being done is because of the public
24	safety issue. This is the one time that the
25	Theater anticipates having an event that would

1	utilize every seat there. They have 600 people
2	arriving and departing at one time, which is not an
3	ordinary part of the Theater business.
4	You know, the recent ballet event, which was
5	on Saturday, they had the large theater fully sold
6	out and occupied, doing 250 individuals, which is
7	what the upstairs theater seats. I think it's 280,
8	pardon me, in the afternoon and then again in the
9	evening. In the ordinary course of business
10	CLERK HALL: Excuse me, Mr. Mayor. Can we
11	just are you okay?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Are you okay?
13	COURT REPORTER: I'm okay.
14	CLERK HALL: I just wanted to make sure she's
15	okay.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Do you need a break.
17	COURT REPORTER: No.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. So in the ordinary
19	course of business, by example, like this weekend,
20	with movement, how it historically operated, each
21	one of the theaters will be operating at different
22	times, everybody is arriving at staggered points.
23	In reviewing this with both the Theater and
24	the Police Chief, there was a lot of concern about
25	having that many people arriving and departing at

exactly the same time, which is why we agreed to do 1 2 the street closure with them for a limited period. 3 As you're aware we -- parades, we just 4 approved a couple of others, and street closures and manage it. The Police have walked this with 5 6 I've talked about it with both the Chief and us. the Captain, and together with the Theater itself, 7 8 and believe it makes a lot of sense, and, frankly, 9 would be dangerous otherwise not to do it because 10 of the large arrival and departure. 11 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, then I have a 12 question about where, where -- if that stretch is being closed, where will the people attending this 13 function actually enter from the closed street? 14 Are they going to be entering off of First Street 15 16 to come into the area or --17 MAYOR STUESSI: Well, there'll be walking in 18 from wherever they park or walk from, just as anybody would. 19 20 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 21 MAYOR STUESSI: There's not any type of preferred 22 parking. 23 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. 24 MAYOR STUESSI: They'll be parking, you know, 25 anywhere somebody would be park in the Village,

like for Dances in the Park
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So there is
MAYOR STUESSI: whether it's the Jitney
lot, or wherever. So the only, the only traffic
that would be going down would be the hotel guests,
which the Police Department will manage for the
Harborfront Hotel.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But what about the patrons
for the other retail businesses?
MAYOR STUESSI: They'll be parking there's
only a limited number of parking spots in that
length. I want to say it's like 20 that would be
impacted for those few hours.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So their, their
customers will be packing will be parking on the
back at Adams Street?
MAYOR STUESSI: Or wherever they might park,
just as they would during a parade, when we close
the streets for Halloween Parade or Washington's
Birthday Parade.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But this is, this is
you're telling us, you know, that there's 600
people coming at one time. Don't get me wrong, I
think it's a great event, but I just want to make
sure that it's clear as to that the business

- community in that area realizes what's going on. 1 2 And I'm hoping that there's an interaction between the Arts Center -- I really preferred the first 3 4 version that was sent to us that was really a closure that was from Third Street to the movie 5 6 theater. But in thinking it through, in thinking 7 it through, that still would bring traffic -- there 8 is no way to bring traffic further up that street 9 to turn around. MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, you'd have to have a 10 11 corner in order for cars to turn. The Police 12 Department's never approved a closure that's less 13 than, you know, a block when cars are moving If you only did it to the hotel, people 14 through. would end up down there and have nowhere to go. 15 16 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. Well, that's why I'm saying, is that in thinking it through, it 17 18 didn't -- the vehicle traffic needs to be stopped. 19 As I said, I'm just concerned that the business 20 community there is aware that this is going -- you know, 4:30 to 7. The dinner hour probably, Lily, 21 22 starts what, after 7 down in that area?
 - TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I mean, I think it starts on a Friday in the summer, almost summer, people -- people still start earlier then, that,

24

25

too. But, I mean, I understand like the -- I understand people's objections, but I also think it's bringing a lot of people to town, and it's a couple of hours on one block, which, you know, yeah, there's not -- either -- those parking spots would be taken anyway, so most of the people are going to park elsewhere. I think a lot of those people are going to be walking in anyway, because a lot of them are locals.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, as I said, I think -TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: But I do agree
that like, yes, the communication needs to be there
and people need to be made aware, not just
businesses, residents, too. I wouldn't want to,
you know, be driving through town and have no idea,
which is going to happen anyway, but we can do our
best to try to let people know.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: As I said before, I think that this particular group of people, which you've been very involved with, Mayor, have brought something to the Village that will continue to grow, and will continue to create some activity in the winter months, where the movie theater previously closed in the winter months, and all of a sudden there was nothing to bring back.

You know, Mitchell Park, the Carousel, the ice rink, when get that back running, the movie theater, I think that for the business community, it will be a economic drive for them. And they're starting to think about that in their meetings as to what to do in January, February and March.

MAYOR STUESSI: No, you're right. It's been a very scary winter for many years now with an ice rink that hasn't been functioning and not much happening. And I think that -- I think we all think that the theater is going to be a tremendous boon for the downtown district.

TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I would just say that the ballet was amazing, like that, it was -- I was so happy to have something like that here, and that's the type of -- that's the type of event that doesn't have to be in the summer.

MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.

TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: You know, like -MAYOR STUESSI: And with all that, they -Phase II of some of the work that they need to do
in the theater, they have purposely planned to
schedule that for September, October, rather than
the depths of winter, because the theater very much

wants to be open in the depths of winter to help

add to the livelihood of downtown Greenport from November onward.

TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I was thinking about it, too, and like we've had movies shoot, right, and the streets been closed.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.

TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: And, you know, like things get disrupted and there -- it is annoying, and, you know, people can -- like it's not always going to benefit everyone at the same time. But I think, yeah, I think there are benefits to things like that, to having filming here, or to having a premier, and it's not all the time, and I think it can all balance out, hopefully.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: My feeling on this, and I think the theater is a great asset to the Village, and I'm happy that they're here and they're going to be doing events, but we don't need an event, you know, in two weeks. I mean, we are in high season right now. There's already so many people coming here. We're going to be having -- the farmers market is going to be going on a block over, you know. And so, you know, I mean, wouldn't something like this be more appropriate in October, in a little bit slower season, rather in -- rather

than the height of the season? I mean, I really don't feel that we need to draw that many more people here right now, so, you know --

MAYOR STUESSI: Well, this is the --

TRUSTEE ROBINS: I just think this is a block party, basically, is what it is, you know.

MAYOR STUESSI: It's not a block party. It is a world premier of a movie that was written by a Greenport local, who is the founder and Chairman of the Arts Center, and they're bringing in the stars from the film as part of it. And so they've been selling tickets for a couple of months now, and they are utilizing every single theater, which would be all three of them at the same time, to show it, and then have a lecture with the artists as part of it. So it's a one-off special event, and on an ordinary basis, as I shared, they would be operating the theaters at different times.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So let me -- okay. And part of it is, is the request coming two weeks before, which I think is probably what Trustee Robins is discussing. But I'm catching a little piece of information, that they now know how many tickets that they've sold, and this has created the reason why they want to make sure that it's spread

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1	out enough, so that it's not all congregated in the
2	street and on the sidewalks. How many? Do you
3	know how many tickets they've already sold?
