1	(The Meeting was Called to Order at 6 p.m.)
2	MAYOR STUESSI: I'd like to make a motion to
3	open the regularly scheduled Board Work Session for
4	the Village of Greenport. May I have a second?
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Second.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
8	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Aye.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Aye.
10	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Aye.
12	Thank you. Please stand for the Pledge of
13	Allegiance.
14	(Pledge of Allegiance)
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Please be seated. David, are
16	you here in place of the Chief this evening?
17	MEMBER NYCE: No, sir.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: No?
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: He's a Chief.
20	(Laughter)
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is Albie here?
22	MEMBER NYCE: I'm just the delivery guy.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is Albie here, Dave?
24	MEMBER NYCE: I think he's on his way back from
25	the south side.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
2	MEMBER NYCE: Is there is there no Chief
3	here this evening?
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. We were expecting his
5	report, but if he joins, we will
6	MEMBER NYCE: All right.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: we will bring him in.
8	MEMBER NYCE: I will give him a call now.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Otherwise, we can do it next week.
10	MEMBER NYCE: All right.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: All right. Carole, you are
12	first up, if you'd like to go to the podium and
13	MS. MONSELL: I am? Okay.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: State your name and address,
15	please, for the record.
16	MS. MONSELL: My name is Carole Monsell,
17	525 First Street, Greenport. I'm president of the
18	Stirling Historical Society, and we would like to
19	replace the bricks in the front of the Ireland House,
20	the museum. It's a Buy a Brick fundraiser, and this
21	is what it's going to look like. Very simple, that's
22	about it.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Carole, is it going to have
24	the names engraved in the bricks, is that what
25	you're I can't

1	MS. MONSELL: Yeah, just like this.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I can't see that's.
3	That's okay. All right.
4	MS. MONSELL: I can show it.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: And so do you have a sense of
6	how many you're looking to sell, and how much you're
7	going to sell them for
8	MS. MONSELL: Well, there's about
9	MAYOR STUESSI: and what you're looking to
10	raise?
11	MS. MONSELL: There's about 350 bricks.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
13	MS. MONSELL: If we do half of them, I think it
14	would look nice staggered, and, you know, you can put
15	in memory of so and so.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
17	MS. MONSELL: You know, your parents' name on
18	it. That's what I plan on doing, whatever.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And they'll be imbedded in
20	mortar, right? They're fixed and not in
21	MS. MONSELL: They're not going to be in
22	mortar. They're going to be in sand, because we have
23	maybe 15 going out and coming back from the company.
24	We're going to redo all those bricks.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Uh-huh.

1	MS. MONSELL: Right? And so it's going to be
2	in sand.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right. You will have a little
4	bit more of a maintenance issue with them being in
5	sand versus mortar.
6	MS. MONSELL: Well, we plan on putting the
7	black cloth on.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
9	MS. MONSELL: Yeah.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
11	MS. MONSELL: And so it should look good. I
12	mean, we're improving your land.
13	(Laughter)
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: What are
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Our land, we all own it.
16	MS. MONSELL: Yes, our land.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: What's what are you hoping
19	to get for donations for the brick?
20	MS. MONSELL: One hundred dollars.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: One hundred dollars.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Here you go, Patrick, I'm
23	not going to throw it.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Please, don't, you might miss.
25	(Laughter)

1	MAYOR STUESSI: And I know you're scheduled to
2	go in front of Historic as well.
3	MS. MONSELL: Yeah.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: I know the meeting earlier was
5	cancelled
6	MS. MONSELL: Yeah.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: as we didn't have a quorum
8	due to a few folks being out with COVID
9	MS. MONSELL: Right.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: unfortunately, which is
11	going around.
12	MS. MONSELL: Right.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: But you'll be on the next
14	meeting with them.
15	MS. MONSELL: So, hopefully, if you can approve
16	that, I think it will look grand, and, hopefully, we
17	can make some money.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Anybody from the Board have any
19	additional questions or concerns?
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, not really.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: No?
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think it's a great idea.
23	MS. MONSELL: Yeah, I like it a lot.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It kind of accomplishes two
25	things at one time.

1	MS. MONSELL: Yeah.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. So I think what we could
3	do, unless anybody has any additional questions
4	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Go ahead.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So I had a question. How do
7	you plan to advertise the initiative?
8	MS. MONSELL: Facebook. We're getting a
9	website soon.
10	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay.
11	MS. MONSELL: So, you know, anything that we
12	can do, social media.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes. I think what we could do,
14	then, is for next week's meeting, we could put a
15	resolution on that our Board could approve it
16	conditional upon receiving approval from Historic, of
17	course
18	MS. MONSELL: Great.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: who has, you know, purview
20	for design decisions
21	MS. MONSELL: Okay.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: in that area. But it
23	certainly seems like it would be a wonderful thing
24	for the museum to raise money and have
25	MS. MONSELL: Great. Thank you so much.

1	TRUCTEE DORING. Nevel de very lêbe verye brêdele
1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Would you like your brick
2	back?
3	MS. MONSELL: I would like the brick back.
4	This is my prop.
5	(Laughter)
6	MS. MONSELL: Thank you.
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. Next up, we have the
9	Deer Management Program. Candace?
10	CLERK HALL: Coming.
11	CLERK HALL: Sorry. Give me one second. I'm
12	going to put
13	MAYOR STUESSI: We need to see the screen,
14	right?
15	CLERK HALL: Yes, you do. You're going to need
16	a better seat.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, on that note. I'm
18	going to a walk.
19	CLERK HALL: Unfortunately, it's a little bit
20	blurry, but that's a little better. Okay. All
21	right.
22	So let's see. Actually, I'm going to start
23	with I'm going to start here, and then I'll go
24	back to the map that was just on the front page. You
25	guys will have to bear with me, I'm sorry about the

1 size of it.

So we do have a guest here that will -- he'll come up in just a moment. I don't want to put too much pressure on him, but he is the expert here to answer some questions. Craig Jobes from Southold Town, he is an Environmental Analyst, and he runs the Southold Town Deer Management Program. So, first, I'd just like to thank him for sharing his knowledge with me and taking the time to educate me to make our program a little bit better.

So the way I'm kind of approaching these -this addition to our Deer Management Program, as you
guys all know here, we have a Deer Management Program
and it's -- in the past it's been on a lottery. It
will still remain a lottery, but in the past we've
only allotted one hunter per zone. So we have five
zones in the Village of Greenport, they're all in
Moore's Woods. So Moore's Woods is split up into
five zones, and the Village of Greenport has only
awarded five hunters each year.

So one of the biggest changes that we're going to adopt this year is opening it up to more hunters. It will be on a first-come-first-serve basis so that it's safe, obviously. So the way it works is we'll --we will run a lottery and award up to 15 hunters.

The way that process would work is we're going to give them all tags. So they already get tags -- hold on just a moment and I'll show you exactly what I mean. Sorry, everyone.

So each hunter will be given a tag for their designated parking spot. I'm jumping around a little bit. I'm jumping to this, because this, I feel, is the biggest change of these, these updates. So each hunter will be given -- this is an example of what Southold Town uses. Each hunter will be given this, in addition to the tags that they already would receive from the Village of Greenport. This tag will hang at the designated parking spot. So if this tag is there, that means someone is already in and you are not welcome to hunt at that time.

So this, again, I believe is the biggest change, which is why I started here, but I'll go through the report that I have prepared for you all.

Okay. So for Phase I, the 2024-2025 season, we're going to expand our rules. So the Village of Greenport, our rules is just -- it's just a one-page document that it does encompass the rules that are necessary. But the way it's done in Southold Town, which I would like to mimic, each hunter receives a whole packet, so it encompasses DEC rules, as well as

local rules. So our rules are going to expand quite a bit. Obviously, this would go through Board approval, and I have -- still working on this document to share with the Board to, hopefully, get approved either this month, or maybe even next month, because the season will not open until October.

Let's see. Awarded hunters, because it is -it's a group of people that usually apply for this
lottery every year, as we see repeat people from even
looking at years past before I was the Clerk. It
seems like the same group of people are using our -utilizing our program. So awarded hunters will be
required to sign an acknowledgment copy of the
revised Village rules and regulations.

Another big change -- and I would like if you can come up, Craig, to help me just explain a little bit about this program. So this year we're going to adopt a reporting system. So the way that works is each year that it's harvested, the hunter -- it is, it is based on an honor system. Each hunter will have to report what they harvested to Village Hall. So we'll have a spread sheet there with necessary information such as the name of the hunter, where it was harvested, and a couple of other pieces of information that I'll allow Craig to just explain a

little bit more about the Earn a Buck Program.

So, again, the Village Clerk's Office will be tracking. I don't know if you want to jump in here and just explain a little bit about how the Earn a Buck works.

MR. JOBES: Just to elaborate a little more on the tracking and why it's so important, this is going to help show the Village Board and all the residents the areas that are more productive than other areas. It will also kind of show everybody how many deer are coming out of that area of woods, show you the success rates of it, and then tying that into the Earn a Buck Program.

So Town of Southold utilizes an Earn a Buck Program. We ask -- well, we enforce that hunters harvest at least two female deer, two does before they're allowed to harvest a buck. That eliminates hunters that are just out there for the trophy hunt. It helps promote harvesting of more deer, therefore, making the overall herd population healthier.

This is something that it is difficult to enforce without law enforcement out there. And, you know, obviously, you know, you can't have somebody out there patrolling the woods making sure that they're following this. For the most part, hunters

do follow it. That being said, there are some that don't. When we do catch them on Southold Town properties, they do usually get suspended, and then we go from there and handle it accordingly.

But, basically, in a nutshell, the Earn a Buck Program, the biggest thing is just to help promote the harvesting of the females to help promote a healthier deer herd.

CLERK HALL: Thank you. I don't know if you want to hang out for a little bit.

MR. JOBES: Yeah, I well.

CLERK HALL: Okay. So we have -- I'm going to flip to the map. This is something else really exciting, or at least it is for me. I have recreated our map with Craig's guidance. So this is the area where you are able to hunt in Greenport. I'm sorry that it's a little blurry, but I'll point just so you can see a little better. So this is, this is 48, this is Main Road, and then this is Moore's Lane here. So this is all of Moore's Woods. So as you could see, it's split into five zones. This area here is prohibited, because this is where -- the mini train is about here. Obviously, you could see the baseball fields there.

So this zone has been amended, actually. So

this used to -- Zone 2, which I wish you could see better. This will be published on -- actually, it is part of this agenda, so it's actually on the Village website. So Zone 2 and 3 both have been amended to push out the hunting area further away from where the mini train is. I believe that it will sit -- it kind of sits in this area here and the actual train goes in this area. So that's been amended, which I think is great to allow for both things to happen at the same time, and just for the sake of scheduling.

Hunting season is October 1st through January 31st, so we'll, obviously, have the mini train running at the same time. And for the sake of scheduling on and not having to send out alerts to the hunters that are participating, we felt it was best to just amend the zone and push it further out.

I'm going to hop on over. Okay. So, again,
Zones 1 through 5 have all been amended just to make
the overall program safer, and to accommodate our new
mini train.

I've touched on this already to just start, because, again, this is one of the bigger changes of the season. So 15 hunters will be awarded hunting permits in the 2024-25 season. Southold Town residents and Suffolk County veterans can participate

in the Village of Greenport Deer Management Program.

All hunting zones shall be available to permit holders on a first-come-first-serve basis, which is, again, something we -- I started with in this presentation. Again, they will receive three different tags from the, from the Village if they are awarded. This is the main new tag. So there's two tags. There's one that sits in the vehicle from the Village of Greenport, there's one that the hunter has to carry on them while they're hunting, and then this is, again, the new third tag that they'll be issued that will be hung, so that it's indicating that someone is hunting in that zone.

MR. JOBES: Do you want to elaborate a little bit why you're upping the hunters?

CLERK HALL: Yes. I'm going to let you go for it on that one.

MR. JOBES: Just to elaborate a little bit on why Candace is looking to up the hunters from five to 15. Basically, you know, if you have just the five hunters that are awarded the license, hunters that are awarded, they may not be a hunter that's going to get out there and harvest a lot of deer. That's nothing against them, everybody's got their own personal preferences. But if you have just five

hunters that are just hunting those areas, you know, say they harvest 70, a total between the five of them, if you have 15 hunters, we now have some more hunters incorporated that are going to spend the entire season hunting, they're going to spend more time in the woods, and you may see your harvest go up from that seven up to probably about I would say 20 to 25 on that Village property. So, basically, it's just getting more people out in the woods, the different, different levels of hunters out in the woods. I believe Candace said you guys had 12 people apply last year.

CLERK HALL: Yeah.

MR. JOBES: So, I mean, upping it to 15 really isn't anything crazy and it's controllable. I mean, in the Town of Southold, we have 138 hunters, I think, last year as part of our program. Obviously, we have a lot more acreage. But a lot of these things that Candace is talking about you guys -- talking to you guys about tonight are mimicking the way that we have done on our Town property in the past.

Knock on wood, we started in 2008, we have never had a safety issue on this program, and we do use a lot smaller properties than the Moore's Woods

area. One good example right here in Greenport would be the Cedarfields property that we have right next to the Village-owned campground. That property has been in use now for, I want to say, about eight years for the Southold Town program. So that just really shows, you know, the close proximity that you could have and still have a safe program, being that it's archery only.

CLERK HALL: All right. So to touch on the next few bullet points here. Again, the permits, each hunter will be given three tags that they have to either hold, display. Thank you. It's probably a bigger issue than what we're viewing, it's okay.

Increased signage: So we are looking to increase our signage in all surrounding areas. We do about 50 signs, is what we've been doing in the past in the Village of Greenport. I personally think that we should -- we shouldn't put a number to it, we should just put necessary signs. So I would imagine that may look more -- at least 75 signs.

So some of our -- some of the area backs up to Vineyard View Apartments, so Vineyard View is one area that we'd be in touch with them to just remind them. And we'll also ask for permission to put signage, you know, at least closer on the trees to

1 their property.

Another is the campsite, the RV and cottages campsite on 48. They have been in touch with us. Last year they even helped put signage up, so I don't imagine we'll have any issues with -- I'm sorry, it's North Fork Cottages and RV Resort. Again, they reached out to us last year to help us out and put signs up, so I don't imagine we'll have an issue there.

And then just wrapping up here, one of the -another big change for this year is just enforcing
designated parking. This is incredibly important,
just because we're increasing the numbers of hunters.
So designated parking will be required for anyone who
is participating. Zones 4 and 5 will share a parking
location, just because of logistics and just
accessibility.

And then we're also going to just encourage the hunters to use Southold Town coolers to donate the harvested deer. That is something that's already available to them, but it is -- you know, we'll just encourage it and make sure that they're aware that that option is available to them.

And then, finally, for Phase II, if you will, for the 2025-2026 season, Craig brought it to my

attention that there are Village parcels that are not being managed for deer management, but they are being hunted. And just like any other code or law enforcement within the Village, if we are not putting up signage and if we're not going to address it, there's really no way to enforce stopping hunters from going in there. If we do call the police, what really -- the only thing that could really happen is us just asking them to leave the property, but there's no further action that can be taken from that. So I personally think it's important for us to just be aware of this opportunity, and maybe explore this for next year, for next season, for 2025-2026.

And then Southold Town, also, they allow junior hunters, so I think that's something else that maybe we should consider for 2025-26 season. I think we have more than enough changes on our plate for this current season. I don't think it's something that we can't manage, because most of our hunters, Craig is familiar with them, since he manages Southold Town. These are people that are already hunting within Southold Town.

The last thing I want to show you is just the areas that could be utilized. If I'm able, I will do so. My apologies, and I appreciate your patience.

1 Sorry, everyone.

So this is the first possible or possibility of an additional zone that Craig brought to my attention. So this is -- I have the tax map number here, but up at the top, that's Washington Avenue, just to give you perspective of where this zone is. And then here would be potentially Zone 7 for us. So this encompasses McCann Campground.

Much of this land over to the right, you can see the outline of the zone. If you see the difference in the density of the trees, the lighter color on the right side, that's a lot of swampland, marshland, so they probably wouldn't be able to go there. It really would be that darker green area on the bottom left that would be able to be utilized in this potential zone. So it would really only open up one zone here, depending on Craig's suggestion. With this one, it is possible that we could break this up, so it may even be three new zones for the Village of Greenport. Obviously, this is just for everyone's knowledge, and that's it.

MR. JOBES: Just to put it into perspective a little bit on the size of the properties that could be safely hunted, the darker section there on the bottom left that Candace is referring to, you could

see that's the same size, if not larger, than that rectangular piece just outside the campground to the upper left, and that's a property that's already being utilized and hunted by the Town of the Southold. So just -- that's just to kind of show the perspective of the size of the property that can be safely utilized in hunting.

CLERK HALL: All right.

MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you both. I'm going to ask the Board to return to the table, and if you could just stay there for a second, if anybody has any questions.

Candace, great work. Craig, really appreciate all the help you've given, it's been wonderful to see you at Village Hall. And I know you bring a lot of expertise to this. And that was great to hear how you guys manage, you know, much smaller properties than the Village does right now with a lot of success.

Are there any questions from anybody on the Board on this?

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I have an observation. The tag that you're showing to go in the vehicle, is it going to be a little bit larger than that?

CLERK HALL: This is -- if you give me one second, I can show you what our tags actually look

1	like.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, that's okay, that's
3	fine.
4	CLERK HALL: This is not the tag for the
5	vehicle.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
7	CLERK HALL: Hold on one moment. This will be
8	the hanging tag that will go on their parking spot.
9	So they'll be responsible to have
10	MR. JOBES: So like what Candace said, that
11	Zone 4 and 5 are sharing a parking area.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
13	MR. JOBES: There'll be a post there that will
14	have two places to hang the tags to show if they're
15	in Zone 4 or Zone 5. And then they you guys have
16	already had an established parking permit that goes
17	in the window.
18	CLERK HALL: Yeah. So this is
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
20	CLERK HALL: This is what they're already
21	issued, so one half of it is for them to hold, the
22	other half is for their dashboard. Sorry.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right. The other
24	question I had is the Bay to Sound Trails. Where
25	do some of them flow through some of this area?

1 MR. JOBES: I don't know where John is at with 2 this right now, but I will say that we already utilize 3 multiple properties that encompass the Bay to Sound 4 Trails. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 5 Okay. 6 MR. JOBES: When those trails are put in place 7 and they get to that point, it's possible to then 8 revisit and based -- you know, and remove the zones 9 based on those trails, because we already use many 10 properties like the Sills property, Mashomack 11 Preserve. 12 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. 13 MR. JOBES: All those already encompass 14 Bay to Sound Trails and are hunted. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: 15 Okay. That --16 MR. JOBES: So what we do is usually when we get to that point on the Town, Town and -- Town and 17 18 County properties is John and I will sit down together and we'll kind of work together on moving 19 20 hunting zones, you know, and trails, so that it's in 21 a safe place. 22 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It would be great if John 23 could come and give us an update on the Sound -- the 24 Bay to Sound, because it's been a long time since the 25 first inception back in 2009.

1	MR. JOBES: Yeah. Unfortunately, I had no part
2	in that, that's not
3	MAYOR STUESSI: I've got a meeting being set
4	up
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: in regards to that, Mary Bess
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: because I know that it's
9	been on sort of hold for a while with the Village.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. Well, it started
11	back in 2009, and then it just kind of morphed into
12	something else, so I'm just curious, that's all.
13	MR. JOBES: Yeah. No, unfortunately, I don't
14	have any part in that project, so that's something
15	John would have to come.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But it's interesting to know
17	that you do encompass both the hunting, the archery
18	and the
19	MR. JOBES: Yes. Yeah, that's going on on many
20	properties. And then there's many Town and County
21	co-owned properties out here as well that are both
22	hunted and have hiking trails.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And then as far as near the
24	two recreational activities, the boundary that you
25	pushed back for the mini train, you also pushed it

1	back far enough for the skate park as well?
2	CLERK HALL: Yeah, it was already far enough
3	back. It already accounted for the skate park.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
5	CLERK HALL: We pushed it back even further
6	just to account for both.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	CLERK HALL: One more thing I just wanted to
9	show you. This is the only rules that our hunters
10	were getting in the past.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I know, I pulled it up.
12	CLERK HALL: So just in comparison, it's
13	theirs encompasses a lot, because they have
14	significant more property to manage. And while Craig
15	did review what we give out to hunters and said that
16	it's it encompasses what's needed, I think it's
17	better safe than sorry to just encompass more,
18	especially with the new guidelines, and so on and on
19	so forth.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: DEC has jurisdiction?
21	MR. JOBES: Yes. So that's another thing
22	Candace and I have talked about, and I gave her the
23	contact information to reach out to the local DEC
24	officer. I do work with him almost on a daily basis
25	during hunting season. The Town his given him

1	permission to access any of our properties at any
2	time to monitor things. And I had suggested to
3	Candace that you know, that she do the same, reach
4	out to him and say, "Listen, you know, our door is
5	always open for you to"
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's ECO Zullo, isn't
7	MR. JOBES: Zullo, yes.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Zullo, yeah.
9	MR. JOBES: Yeah.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I've met him a couple of
11	times.
12	MR. JOBES: Yeah. So like, like I said, we've
13	given him permission through the Town to access any
14	of our properties at any time.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, that's another thing.
16	0kay.
17	MR. JOBES: If he wants to do a routine check,
18	you know, if he doesn't have a lead, we've given him
19	the permission to, you know, kind of do what he feels
20	fit. So, you know, and that's one way to help to
21	have the property monitored
22	CLERK HALL: Yeah.
23	MR. JOBES: and watched over.
24	CLERK HALL: That is something if, you know, we
25	want to add that for the approval, once we I give

1	you, you know, the updated rules. It's probably
2	going to be next month where I would, you know,
3	want to share the rules and the updates with you all,
4	so that you can vote on adopting them. And then, at
5	that point, it probably would make sense to decide
6	whether the Board would like for me to invite him to
7	just monitor.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Be able to observe over the
9	property.
10	CLERK HALL: Exactly.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Because the licenses aren't
12	issued through DEC, correct?
13	CLERK HALL: No.
14	MR. JOBES: The State licence.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The State?
16	MR. JOBES: They are State hunting licenses.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: All right. So they do have
18	jurisdiction over it?
19	MR. JOBES: Yes.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. So
21	MR. JOBES: If they did have a lead with
22	something on the property, they can go right in. You
23	know, they do have that jurisdiction. Like I said,
24	we kind of just we give him free rein, just to
25	kind of keep

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Just checking.
2	MR. JOBES: When the hunters see more eyes,
3	they you know, they make sure they stay in line.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, you and I
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Any questions from anybody else
6	on the Board? Lily?
7	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I just had a
8	question about how it worked before, because I don't
9	know. Was it only Village residents that could get
10	the licenses?
11	CLERK HALL: From my understanding, not
12	Village, Greenport residents.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Greenport 11944.
14	CLERK HALL: Yeah
15	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Okay. And was
16	there any reporting? Like do we have an idea?
17	CLERK HALL: No, they didn't.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: No. I thought so.
20	0kay.
21	CLERK HALL: They didn't track anything.
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: And maybe you'll
23	get this. Or you have a copy of the old rules, just
24	so we can see them?
25	CLERK HALL: Yeah, yeah, sure.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: We do. This is significant.
2	She'll share it
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: with the new set, but it's
5	significantly more.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Right. I'm just
7	curious
8	CLERK HALL: Just for
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: to see the old
10	ones, too.
11	CLERK HALL: Exactly. I'll share them for you
12	to be able to compare, and then plan to have it for
13	you all to vote to adopt it next month.
14	This month I am hoping to have a resolution, or
15	is actually in my Work Session report, to vote to
16	allow me to start the lottery. Since, you know,
17	hunting season will start on October 1st, I'd like to
18	get that started and leave it open for at least three
19	weeks. But that's it for now.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Julia, did you have a question?
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Just, you know, I think I'll
22	hold my questions until we get a little bit into this
23	in a little more depth. But I am thinking about
24	I'd like to see some statistics, this program has
25	been in effect for a long time, how effective

1	actually is it in terms of managing the deer
2	population out here. I think it's a legitimate
3	question, you know. Are we harvesting deer simply
4	is this to feed people, or is this to kind of keep
5	the population down, okay?
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, it's at the State level,
7	and we can get something from the Town. It's been a
8	huge issue, and there's been legislation passed that
9	went through the State Assembly and the Senate
10	relative to managing the deer population
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: which has just absolutely
13	exploded.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I understand, we've all had
15	MAYOR STUESSI: As Candace said, we have no
16	there are no records from what the Village has done
17	in the past
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: so we don't know what's been
20	done and culled as part of it.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I know.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: But we could certainly get some
23	information
24	MR. JOBES: Yeah. It hasn't been
25	MAYOR STUESSI: from the success of the Town.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm more curious what the
2	Town-wide, you know, what the
3	MR. JOBES: I mean, I've spoken with Candace
4	about it, and I'm sharing all my, my statistics with
5	her. I can tell you every single deer that was
6	harvested in the Town program, what property it was
7	harvested on, what date, what hunter, and I can give
8	you their tag, I can give you everything.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I'm not looking for
10	that.
11	MR. JOBES: No. But I'm saying that's
12	something
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm looking just overview.
14	MR. JOBES: That's something that the Town has
15	always tracked.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
17	MR. JOBES: That's something that Candace is
18	looking to introduce. That was the spread sheet that
19	she was referring to earlier, is I'm giving her
20	the spread sheet that the Town uses, that I use, and
21	she's going to look to model it after that, so you
22	guys can track all of that as well.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
24	CLERK HALL: And I guess part of your to
25	partly answer your question, something else that

Craig has shared with me, because we don't require our participants to donate at Southold Town, there is no real data on the Village of Greenport with him either through the coolers that people have access to. It's something that I think hunters may know is available to them.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.

CLERK HALL: But it's not something that we've even encompassed at all in our rules, so it's not being utilized. So I don't know that we'll have specific data on Greenport, but maybe general information about the success of these programs we could share.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's more of what I'm looking for, really.

CLERK HALL: Okay.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.

MR. JOBES: I mean, our big, our big pushing point, when I go to meetings and go to property owner association meetings and everything, is our donation program in the Town of Southold. Since we started the donation program, I believe in 2015, we've donated over 76,000 pounds of edible venison, whether it be to soup kitchens, local residents. I have people that drive down from New Hampshire every year to come

1	get the deer from the Town of Southold. It's just
2	our donation program is really exploding, and that's
3	something that I told Candace, you know, to really
4	use to push these hunters to do more and to really
5	boost the program.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay. Thank you. You sound
7	like you really know your subject.
8	(Laughter)
9	MR. JOBES: Yeah. Well, I mean, my actually,
10	I have graphs, pie charts every season since I've
11	started, so.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. Thank you.
13	CLERK HALL: Patrick?
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I don't have any questions,
15	but thank you both for the presentation.
16	CLERK HALL: Thank you.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, wonderful work,
18	appreciate it.
19	CLERK HALL: Thank you.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: With that, next up, we have the
21	Maritime Museum here to speak as an added agenda item.
22	MS. ORLANDO: So my name is Tracey Orlando, I'm
23	the Executive Director of the East End Seaport
24	Museum.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Tracey, would you mind just

pulling the microphone in front of you, or moving towards it. Keep it towards your mouth, it's hard to hear you. Thank you.

MS. ORLANDO: Testing, testing. I actually speak louder without them. So Tracey Orlando, East End Seaport Museum, Executive Director. Our address, which we finally have one, is 100 Third Street, Greenport, New York 11944. With me tonight is Mike Acebo. He'll introduce himself, I'm sure.

So we're asking for an assembly permit, because there are car aficionados in Greenport, and there's a great opportunity that they would like to support our museum and create this destination to Greenport. And it's really a wonderful opportunity, because listening to the BID and the merchants, and to try to extend our season, where we bring visitors to our area.

It's the -- I'm going to butcher the name of it, Mike. It's the American Porsche Club, and it will be limited to 40 cars. It will be at Mitchell Park, with your permission. The concept is there's a reason to come to Greenport, and they'll have a packaged deal with one of our local restaurants for lunch. They'll be coming out to our lighthouse, which, of course, increases our visibility, and reaching our mission to educate people on our

1	maritime history, and give them a place that maybe
2	every year they want to go.
3	It's not an juried car show, it's not even a
4	car show, it's more of a car exhibit. These cars
5	come from all over New York, and they are very
6	expensive and very unique.
7	So we're just asking for permission for this to
8	happen, and curious if you have any thoughts. Or,
9	Mike, do you want to add anything?
10	MR. ACEBO: I'll add something.
11	MS. ORLANDO: Okay. I'm going to step aside.
12	MR. ACEBO: Hello.
13	MS. ORLANDO: Much different perspective.
14	MR. ACEBO: I'm Mike Acebo, I'm from East
15	Marion. The it's the Metro New York Porsche Club
16	of America. The first sports car Porsche was
17	designed in 1948 by a fellow named Ferry Porsche,
18	Ferdinand, they called him Ferry Porsche. And that
19	car grew from the 356, and there's a red one parked
20	outside, if you saw it when you came in. That was,
21	that was one of the that was the earliest model
22	that Ferry Porsche designed, then it went to the 911,
23	and then it progressed to all the different Porsches
24	you see today.
25	The members of in the club of this, of this

area, it's called the Metro New York PCA, Porsche Club of America, that club was formed in 1953. That was before there was ever a Porsche dealer in New York, or Connecticut, or New Jersey. The first one came into Manhattan a year after that club was formed. They then joined the Porsche Club of America, who started up in like 1954 or '55.

The Metro Club has the -- one of the oldest events in the Porsche community, it's called the Snowflake Rally. It happens in late January, early February, and it's a time-speed-distance rally. It's a, it's a fun rally that happens on Long Island. They also run two or three other rallies during the summertime.

Ferry Porsche designed the Porsche, and his statement about the Porsche was, "We build our cars to be driven, not polished." So that follows true today in the Metro New York Porsche Club. They have rallies, they have treks, they have speed competitions, they have driver training at the different race tracks. They're really responsible people, and it is about the people, not always about the cars. The cars are a means to meet the people who own the cars. It's a very good group of people, and the cars are driven.

So there are some Porsche Club members that live on the East End, both the South Fork and the North Fork. They have expressed to the PCA, Metro PCA, that they would like to have some events out this way, because a lot of the events take place in the Hudson Valley area, New Jersey, Nassau County, and they're kind of a pain to get to from out here. So they're considering working with the museum to bring a group of people out here sort of in a trek form.

They would, they would gather together maybe in Nassau County somewhere. The trek designator person would develop a route that's off of 495, travel through some country roads, some nice scenery, with some stops at some interesting places, maybe some lighthouses, or whatever along the way, and then end up in Greenport.

And the -- Mitchell Park seems to be the best place along the ice rink area, would easily hold the number of cars that would be on a trek. They usually number 20 to 35 cars. That's not a lot of cars. When you consider the size of a Porsche, it's not a lot of cars, so they could fit in the park. And then the museum is available for feeding them. Hopefully, we could get a boat ride out to the lighthouse, so

that they could see what's out here, and become acquainted to Greenport.

So that's kind of what the -- how we're working this out with the Porsche Club, and trying to get them involved in an event out in Greenport.

MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you. And is it -Tracey, for the public record, would you mind stating what day this is proposed, and hours of operation, and anything else you might be looking to do as part of it? We -- I know this is a very last-minute application that just came to the Board, and wanted to bring it in front of everybody this evening relative to the timeline you're looking to achieve, so that the Board could ask any questions.

MS. ORLANDO: Yes, and I appreciate that. So it's going to be the Sunday of Columbus Day weekend, which is October 13th. We currently have the time from 10 to 4 p.m., which it might be -- at 4 p.m. is when they're going to come to the museum and take the boat ride.

We already have discussed that our volunteers will be watching over the cars as well, so they won't be needing to park on the street at that time. And we're just real hoping this is just another interesting way to bring more interest here into the Village,

1	while also supporting the museum.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: So when you and David called me
3	yesterday, you guys talked about a chowder competition
4	or festival, some sort, as part of it as well. Are
5	you still looking to do that or not?
6	MS. ORLANDO: So that's a separate. It
7	actually I think we called you on Tuesday. The
8	days do blend here. But the chowder fest is a
9	tradition that was always part of Maritime, until it
10	came such time that our merchants or restaurants
11	asked us to not hold it anymore, because the demands
12	of, of course, their staffing, as we had job shortages.
13	It's also busy enough. If anybody wants to take
14	something off my plate during Maritime, I'm not too
15	cranky about it. So for years we've talked about
16	once again having the chowder contest, when, where,
17	how. It seems that it's tough.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. So that's not part of
19	this proposed event?
20	MS. ORLANDO: It's not specific.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
22	MS. ORLANDO: But I do have one of the
23	restaurants has approached me and said that they
24	would run the whole thing for us, and they are
25	thinking that Saturday, but they haven't vetted it

out with the owners of the restaurant just yet. And we have been eager to get that chowder fest back. So it could be a very nice weekend for Saturday with the chowder fest at a restaurant, and then the car exhibit on Sunday, so keeping people here in this Village as well.

MAYOR STUESSI: And so the proposed car show within the park, it's anticipated this would be open to the public, and the public could go and see the car show?

MS. ORLANDO: There is no fee, right, and it's a car exhibition. I've recently been told that the Village at one time did have a car show in Mitchell Park, so this is not something that we just invented. So it's just one way that, you know, community partners, people tell us, "We want to help the museum," and they think of creative ways.

So there is no fee for the public to come. The fee is really from the car club to participate and support the museum.

CLERK HALL: Can I -- Mr. Mayor, if I could just interject. I just want to call attention to the Board, there are two other applicants looking for that same day on the 13th, and one of them is the Fire Department looking to do a car show as a

1	fundraiser. So I just wanted to maybe interject and
2	ask if there is any flexibility on the date, just
3	because, again, the Fire Department
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Where is the Fire Department
5	looking to do it?
6	CLERK HALL: They're looking to do it at the
7	Polo Grounds. And then the other really substantial
8	event that happens annually is the Oyster Festival is
9	on the agenda for that same date, the 13th.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oyster Festival?
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Oyster Festival at
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: By the Brewery.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The Greenport Brewery.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Shellabration.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, a private event?
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, the Greenport
17	Brewery.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's a commercial event.
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Greenport Brewery,
20	and they usually do it in the bank parking lot, also.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
22	CLERK HALL: Yeah. I just wanted to put that
23	out there for everyone to consider, and just ask if
24	there is any flexibility on the date for your event.
25	MS. ORLANDO: So our talks are going to get

1	more serious after this hearing

6	(Laughter)

10	again, you know, we're the museum and we're flexible,
11	for the most part.
12	CLERK HALL: Okay. I just wanted to ask just
13	to draw attention. You know, it is different locations,
14	but
15	MS. ORLANDO: And we're not here to tax out
16	anybody either. The other thing is that most of
17	their treks are on Sundays.
18	CLERK HALL: Okay.
19	MS. ORLANDO: And being that it is a three-day
20	weekend, even for my staff, it is a little bit easier
21	to have it on that Sunday, but it's a conversation.
22	CLERK HALL: Okay.
23	MS. ORLANDO: We're not that stubborn. Well,
24	he might be, we're not.
25	CLERK HALL: Just asking.

1	MS. ORLANDO: No, I appreciate that feedback.
2	CLERK HALL: Yeah. And, really, I'm asking
3	because their intention is to use it is as a
4	fundraiser. You know, so if they have another event
5	on this if there is another event of a similar
6	nature on the same day that is for free, if our Fire
7	Department is trying to raise money, just wanted to
8	bring it to the attention of everybody.
9	MS. ORLANDO: Also, I'm a car aficionado. We
10	CLERK HALL: Okay.
11	MS. ORLANDO: I built two hotrods. One is a
12	'32 Coup
13	CLERK HALL: That's pretty cool.
14	MS. ORLANDO: that's been on the Snap-On
15	Tool catalog for four times, and we were just
16	nominated again for our '69 all original Camaro.
17	CLERK HALL: Awesome.
18	MS. ORLANDO: So matching numbers, I'm really
19	proud of that one, too.
20	(Laughter)
21	MS. ORLANDO: And I will tell you that car
22	shows that are juried are much different than a
23	trek is.
24	CLERK HALL: Okay.
25	MS. ORLANDO: And the public are most likely

1	wanting to go to the car shows. There's voting
2	involved, there's competition.
3	CLERK HALL: Okay.
4	MS. ORLANDO: There's food, there's vendors.
5	We're not doing any of that.
6	CLERK HALL: Okay.
7	MS. ORLANDO: We're going to park in
8	Mitchell Park, and they're just there to talk about
9	why they like these cars, and whose wife is better
10	looking than the other one, I would imagine.
11	(Laughter)
12	MS. ORLANDO: So car shows are definitely
13	different than car exhibitions. And I hear you.
14	We'll just have to work that detail out
15	CLERK HALL: Okay.
16	MS. ORLANDO: the best I hope we can.
17	CLERK HALL: Yeah.
18	MS. ORLANDO: And I will get back to everybody
19	as soon as we get that answer.
20	CLERK HALL: Sure, sure.
21	MS. ORLANDO: Would you be opposed if we said
22	that has to be the date? Would that too much for our
23	Village to handle?
24	CLERK HALL: That's totally on these five
25	people in front of me. I just want to make sure that

19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Mary Bess, yeah, will you

21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I'll follow up.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: and see if they feel like
23	this would be a positive or negative?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's what I was going to
25	do, yeah.

1	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have question for you. Do
2	you anticipate the day of the exhibition that you'll
3	set up and break down all in the same day?
4	MR. ACEBO: Oh, yeah. They drive home, yeah.
5	MS. ORLANDO: Yeah. They put their little
6	fold-up chairs in the car and they go home.
7	MR. ACEBO: They'll drive out here to have
8	lunch, and maybe, hopefully, go out to see
9	Bug Light on a boat and then they'll drive home.
10	Most of the events that end up out here end up at a
11	vineyard. And their rallies, they start it at the
12	Park and Ride at Exit 58 and they work their way
13	through back roads. They end up at a vineyard.
14	Twelve o'clock, you have to be there at 12 o'clock,
15	that's the end of the time part of the rally, then
16	scores are taken off the score sheets, and awards are
17	given out, you get a bottle of wine, and then
18	everybody is gone by about 3 o'clock. So that's a
19	typical event sort of schedule.
20	MS. ORLANDO: The best way to keep in mind is
21	it's just a destination for them to go to, and they
22	experience our local
23	MR. ACEBO: It's a destination.
24	MS. ORLANDO: color, you know.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And just to make a notation,

1	I checked the times and not they're not all at the
2	same time. One starts at 9, one starts at 10, and
3	then the other one for Greenport Brewery starts at
4	1 o'clock in the afternoon. So, that is they're
5	staggered, it's not everything all at one time.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, it might be very
7	complimentary.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sounds like they could work
9	on they could work off of each other.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. It might be, yeah.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Just to clarify, so
13	everyone drags out pretty much together, so like
14	everyone would arrive at 10?
15	MR. ACEBO: Yeah, they would they if they
16	did it in the I don't know how they plan on doing
17	it. If they did a rally, then everybody starts a
18	rally about 15 minutes apart and they end at various
19	times, so then the arrival time is different. If
20	it's a trek, they start all together in a parking lot
21	in some store. They'll all meet at 9 o'clock or
22	10 o'clock, and then they follow the leader and they
23	all come together.
24	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I guess what I'm
25	MR. ACEBO: So I don't know exactly what the

1	club is would designate this type of an event as.
2	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Right. What I'm
3	thinking about is like driving into Mitchell Park.
4	Is that like will there be 50 cars all at once
5	trying to like enter by the First Street
6	MR. ACEBO: It won't be 50 cars. It's the
7	event will not have 50 cars. What you do is you
8	drive down
9	MS. ORLANDO: We don't want that.
10	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Okay, 30, whatever.
11	MR. ACEBO: You turn down the street towards
12	the Blacksmith's Shop and proceed in, and it happens
13	very quickly.
14	MS. ORLANDO: And we'll have it guided as well.
15	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: And then you said
16	that some people might be going out on the Bug Light
17	cruise, so the cars might stay past 4 in Mitchell Park.
18	MS. ORLANDO: That conversation with the car
19	club we haven't had yet.
20	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Okay.
21	MS. ORLANDO: And, you know, I have to be
22	respectful for how they do things. I do know that
23	it's still in the park. We can give kind of patrols
24	of our volunteers that will just love to pretend they
25	own it and take selfies with the cars, but then

1	that's the plan.
2	MR. ACEBO: But on a Sunday, they all want to
3	go home, you know.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
5	MR. ACEBO: I mean, some of these people, a lot
6	of them live might live in New Jersey, they might
7	live in Bedford. So it's a drive to get out here for
8	a lot those people, because they live west of us, you
9	know. So
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, it sounds to me, as
11	Mary Bess said, they all might be very complimentary
12	to each other.
13	MR. ACEBO: They are, yeah.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Check with the Fire Department.
15	If you guys can refine your ideas and get back to us.
16	MR. ACEBO: Right.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Does anybody else on the Board
18	have any other questions at the moment?
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: No? All right. Thank you both.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Thank you.
23	MR. ACEBO: Thank you.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: And enjoy seeing you ride
25	around in that 356 in the Village.

1	(Laughter)
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Beautiful car.
3	MR. ACEBO: All right. I'm going to take a
4	leave. I'll see you guys. Thank you.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: All right. Thank you. We
6	had we were supposed to have Mr. Joe Corso, the
7	Sandy Beach Homeowners Association, which is being
8	rescheduled. The neighborhood is looking to have the
9	Board schedule a Public Hearing to bring the
10	neighborhood into the Village Historic District. We
11	will have them pack on a subsequent meeting. With
12	that, I will turn it over to
13	MR. ACEBO: Sorry, I'm going to sit in for a
14	little bit longer.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Sure.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I did hear from the Fire
17	Chief, and he apologizes for not being here, but he's
18	on a Presidential detail at Gabreski's Airport. He
19	said the only thing that he needs to present is two
20	applications that the paperwork will be given to the
21	Village Clerk tomorrow for Susan Kostal to the Rescue
22	Squad, and a Bryce Reed to the Juniors, and that
23	those are the only two.
24	And, of course, the other question is dealing
25	with the process of the new vessel that the Village

1	you know, is the Fire Department is working hard to
2	obtain.
3	And the other question, I can answer that one,
4	that we did receive the money from the Town of
5	Southold.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that that's all been
8	taken care of. And that's pretty much it.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. And that Fire Department
10	grant is working its way through the State as part of
11	the final budget process.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: And the Governor has about 520
14	different bills, I believe it is, on her desk.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: I know this because I met with
17	her last week. I'll be talking about that a bit
18	further later on, one of the them including the CPF
19	bill we've all been talking about quite a bit.
20	Candace?
21	CLERK HALL: All right. Thank you. Can you
22	hear me? Is this thing on? Okay.
23	So my first resolution here for this month, as
24	I discussed a bit earlier with the deer management,
25	is a resolution approving, approving the beginning of

1 the lottery. So I'd like to hold the lottery from 2 September 1st through the 20th. Hunting season would begin October 1st through January 31st, 2025. 3 4 Next up, I have a resolution approving the attendance for myself and Jeanmarie Oddon, Deputy 5 6 Clerk, and other interested staff members or Trustee 7 for the Suffolk County Village Officials Association 8 Municipal Training Seminar. This seminar will take 9 place on October 9th in Riverhead. The cost is \$75 10 per person. 11 Next resolution here is something exciting for 12 the Village. We have another interested Tall Ship 13 that would like to come and visit the Village of Greenport. So the Nao Trinidad has reached out. 14 They are going to offer public visitation. In lieu 15 16 of payment for dockage, they are offering free tours 17 to students, up to 200 students a day. On --MAYOR STUESSI: This is one that visited last 18 19 year and it was a big success --20

CLERK HALL: Yeah.

21

MAYOR STUESSI: -- from what I recall.

CLERK HALL: So they're looking to arrive on September 3rd. They'll probably take rest, if they -- you know, depending on their time of arrival. So the deck tours wouldn't start actually until the

1	5th, and they'll be here until September 9th. The
2	next resolution
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Real quickly.
4	CLERK HALL: Mr. Mayor, go ahead.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: I just want to mention, you know,
6	many of these are booked years in advance, and one of
7	the things we did early last summer, actually the
8	spring, together with the Maritime Museum, was reach
9	out to all the boats and let them know, if they had
10	any availability, we'd love to have them in Greenport.
11	So I think this will be the sixth visit in the last
12	12 months of a, of a ship.
13	There's also a small chance that the Amistad,
14	which is going to be in Montauk next week, might be
15	able to make it over as well, in which case we'll
16	share with the Board and bring it up, but it's,
17	I think, great news.
18	CLERK HALL: Yes, it's awesome. The next one
19	here, I'm actually going to omit it. It is my
20	understanding, from speaking with the Mayor, that the
21	Board is going to be reviewing wages for the staff,
22	so I'm going to move past that one.
23	And then next up here, I have a resolution
24	ratifying the hiring of Cayden James Wills as a
25	Lifeguard at Fifth at the beach, pay rate of \$25

1	an hour. This person started on July 20th.
2	Next up, I have a resolution ratifying the
3	hiring of Aulis Siane Carr-Smith. Sorry to Mr. or
4	Mrs. Carr-Smith. This is another Lifeguard at Fifth
5	Street Beach at a pay rate of \$25 an hour. This
6	person also began working on July 20th.
7	Another hire, ratifying the hiring of
8	Marcus Edward Kruszeski, a part-time Recreation Aide
9	to work at the Village of Greenport Carousel at a pay
10	rate of \$16 an hour. Marcus started on July 25th.
11	Next up is ratifying the hiring of
12	Nathan Demitrius Djokic, Djokic sorry as a
13	part-time Recreation Aide to work in the Village of
14	Greenport Mini Railroad at a pay rate of \$16 an hour,
15	effective August 4th.
16	The next up is final hiring for this month, is
17	ratifying the hiring of Joseph Schoenstein as a
18	part-time Park Attendant to work at the Village of
19	Greenport Marina as a Dockhand at a pay rate of \$16
20	an hour, effective July 19th.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Candace, I'm sorry, is that
22	Joseph Schoenstein, Jr.?
23	CLERK HALL: I believe that is correct.
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I can't help it, you
25	know. Grandpa will be

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: wanting to work.
3	CLERK HALL: So next up here, I have five
4	public assembly applications that we received this
5	for this month. First up here is an application
6	received from Eagle Hose and Relief Hose for a car
7	show fundraiser to be held on October 13th, from
8	9 a.m. to 2 p.m., at Moore's Lane on the Polo
9	Grounds.
10	Next up is a public
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Sorry. Can we pause for just a
12	second on that?
13	CLERK HALL: Sure.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Are you or Mary Bess, as
15	Liaison, aware if they're looking to have alcohol as
16	part of this, and do we need to have it included?
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, I will have to ask, I
18	don't know.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
20	CLERK HALL: That wasn't included in the
21	application, but I'll certainly follow up.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. I know we had this issue
23	before, so I want to make sure that we get it covered
24	here, too.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I will, I will. As I said,

1	tomorrow I will get in touch with someone
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: and we'll take it from
4	there. Candace, and I'll let you know, okay?
5	CLERK HALL: Thank you. Sorry, I just forgot
6	that.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay.
8	CLERK HALL: Next up, I have a public assembly
9	application received from Saint Agnes to host an
10	international festival of different cultures and a
11	parade on September 15th. The parade would begin at
12	noon. The parade route would follow the traditional
13	Greenport parade route, starting on Broad Street,
14	Main Street to Front Street, and continue down to
15	Sixth Street, where the parade will let out at the
16	at Saint Agnes.
17	This date, just to note for the Board, is
18	significant, because I believe it marks the beginning
19	of Hispanic and Latino Heritage Month. So that,
20	again, that date is actually significant to them to
21	host this event.
22	Next up, I have a public assembly application
23	from Richard Vandenburgh on behalf of the Greenport
24	Harbor Brewing Company to close vehicular traffic and
25	utilize Carpenter Street from Bay Avenue to east

1	Bay Avenue east to Front Street for the annual
2	Oyster Festival, which would run from 1 to 6 p.m. on
3	October 13th.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Candace, does he have
5	alcohol being served on that?
6	CLERK HALL: Yes, that is correct, there will
7	be alcohol served there.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I'd like to thank
9	Mr. Vandenburgh, because this is the first year he's
10	been early instead of the last minute with this
11	application.
12	(Laughter)
13	CLERK HALL: Yeah. So I will make sure that
14	everything as far as resolutions are included for
15	next week, because there will be alcohol served at
16	this event.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes. So we also need to make
19	sure on there that the remainder of the property,
20	because my recollection from having attended in the
21	past, is they utilize some of the property that
22	belongs to both Chase Bank and also Robert Brown
23	offices
24	CLERK HALL: Okay.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: as well. So that will need

1	to be included in the resolution
2	CLERK HALL: Okay.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: for the open carry. And the
4	Brown office building is now owned by somebody new as
5	well.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But I believe, doesn't he
7	close is he asking to close the street as well?
8	CLERK HALL: Yes.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay, that's all right.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, that's what she said.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I didn't hear you, I'm
12	sorry.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, we need to make sure we
14	get the
15	CLERK HALL: Okay.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: limits on where it would be
17	within the totality of it.
18	CLERK HALL: Okay. I believe he did include a
19	map, but I'll make sure that that's circulated with
20	you all, if it hasn't already been included in the
21	application.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. We should just make sure
23	that we get a copy of approval of the owners of those
24	properties
25	CLERK HALL: Okay.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: as well.
2	CLERK HALL: Okay.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Especially with the one that
4	just transferred.
5	CLERK HALL: Okay, okay. Number 4 here is a
6	public assembly application from Greenport Skate
7	Park, Inc. to host a community popup event. They're
8	calling it a community popup event, but it is a
9	concert. So there'll be live music, a few vendors,
10	Rena mentioned, and then a skating contest. So this,
11	the proposed date is October 5th, from noon to
12	5 p.m., with a rain date of October 6th for the same
13	time.
14	And then, finally, the East End Seaport Museum,
15	this is not actually on here, this application was
16	received yesterday for the car show that they just
17	explained to everyone. Again, they are requesting
18	October 13th from 10 to 4 p.m. for their event in
19	Mitchell Park.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have a comment on Number 2,
21	the Saint Agnes public assembly. Just a reminder, we
22	have I think it's the same day as the Jeremy
23	Hamilton pig roast.
24	CLERK HALL: Okay.
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: That I don't see as necessarily

1	a conflict.
2	CLERK HALL: Okay, just something to note.
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It happens down at Fifth
4	Street.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, and Sixth Street.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, I don't see any conflict,
7	but good to mention it.
8	CLERK HALL: Yeah. Thank you. I do have a few
9	announcements here. One that is not included, but I
10	just want to mention it for the sake of the Fire
11	Department, this weekend is the chicken barbecue.
12	So, again, just want to mention it to promote this
13	event for the Fire Department.
14	First announcement that is outlined on my
15	report is the Village of Greenport Deer Management
16	Program. Hunting season will run from October 1st
17	through January 31st, pending Board of Trustees
18	approval or vote at the August Regular Session
19	meeting.
20	Mayor Kevin, Mayor Stuessi is going to
21	elaborate more on my next announcement here. So we
22	did conduct a bid for the North Ferry project. The
23	low bidder was Corazzini Asphalt, Inc. So, again,
24	the Mayor is going to further elaborate on details

that he's been in contact with our engineer, and the

next steps for what's going to happen with the North Ferry project.

And then this one is just -- it's been a year that I've been in my role, so I just wanted to take the time to thank the Clerk's Office team, Jeanmarie, Jacy and Andrea, for their dedicated service and hard work at Village Hall. I did list a few highlights over the last year. I'm very proud of the work that we do together. We are a really cohesive team, we work well together.

We began a State Archives Project, so we've removed approximately 300 boxes from the Village of trash at no cost to the, to the residents or to the Village of Greenport.

With that, we are preparing for -- this is part of the preparation, we're hoping to go for a grant next year. We did touch on this a little bit, but I don't feel that we were ready for the grant. And we've been working closely with the State Archives about this, so I do feel like we're going to be poised to, hopefully, receive this money next year. We're be -- we'll be able to apply for this grant as a shared service grant, so it doubles the amount of money that we potentially would get for the Village of Greenport, being able to apply as a shared service

1 with our Housing Department. 2 The State Archives views our Housing Department, 3 although for us it's under the Village umbrella, they 4 view it as a separate entity, which makes us eligible, instead of 75,000, to \$150,000 for all of our records. 5 6 The Clerk's Office is fully staffed. 7 believe it's been a long time for -- since it's been 8 fully staffed with what I believe is a productive and 9 cohesive team. We've been establishing best practices within the office. We've created together 10 11 a procedures manual for the office. So if any event 12 that we need people to cover for us, they're able to 13 do so, and, hopefully, it's seamless for them. 14 We've been working to translate various Village forms and applications to Spanish, which is now 15 16 featured on our website. And most recently, we've worked together to 17 18 revamp the Deer Management Program. 19 So I'd like to thank the Board and the Village of Greenport for welcoming me in this role, and I'm 20 21 super proud of our team. Thank you. 22 (Applause) 23 CLERK HALL: Thank you. 24 MAYOR STUESSI: You've done an exemplary job. 25 And I just want to thank you on behalf of the Village.

1	When you came in, we had one full-time employee and a
2	couple of folks from the Rec. Department
3	CLERK HALL: Yes.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: helping out, and, you know,
5	over time, now built a team of four full-time
6	individuals who have all really stepped up.
7	CLERK HALL: Yes.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: The recordkeeping alone has
9	been a magnificent improvement, and we all know how
10	far we still have to go on that.
11	CLERK HALL: Yes.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: But we can find our way through,
13	which has really been special.
14	CLERK HALL: Yes.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: And I'm looking forward to the
16	day when everything is digitized for Village Hall.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, yeah.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: And make it so easy for the
19	community when they need records to get them, similar
20	to Southold Town, and we're on the route to doing
21	that.
22	CLERK HALL: We are.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: I think the best thing, though,
24	that your team has brought to the Village is just
25	this wonderful welcoming spirit, and everybody is

1	always very helpful, no matter how busy they are, and
2	that's been really wonderful.
3	CLERK HALL: Thank you so much.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: So thank you. And I know
5	you've had great support from
6	CLERK HALL: Yeah.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: the rest of Village Hall,
8	including our Treasurer, Adam, and it's great seeing
9	you work together so well.
10	CLERK HALL: It's been wonderful.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you.
12	CLERK HALL: And thank you so much.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Candace, I've heard some very
14	positive feedback from the public who interact with
15	your office team, and so I just want to share that
16	with you, even a call I got today from a resident
17	CLERK HALL: Thank you.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: who is very happy with the
19	service there.
20	CLERK HALL: That means the world.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
22	CLERK HALL: Thank you so much.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And, Candace, you and I just
24	keep talking all the time.
25	(Laughter)

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And I just want to I want
2	to say that I have seen a tremendous change within
3	the spirit of cohesiveness, as you like to use that
4	word, but I think it's you're the, you're the
5	first section of Village government that is a
6	one-on-one with the Village residents and I've heard
7	a lot of very positive feedback.
8	CLERK HALL: Thank you. Thank you so much.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: You're welcome.
10	CLERK HALL: And that is, that is the
11	conclusion of my report. So thank you all, I really
12	appreciate it.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Mr. Treasurer? Thank you,
14	Candace.
15	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.
16	I have just a couple of resolutions this evening.
17	My first resolution is to appropriate Light
18	Fund reserves to fund a cleanup of the grounds and
19	the removal of the weather station at the power
20	plant. It's my understanding that the weather
21	station has been inoperable for many years now.
22	We're trying to tidy up that property and make it
23	more presentable.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, if I could just jump in
25	on this. If anybody hasn't been to the electric

1	plant, this is obviously a very historic building.
2	It was part of the historic report that was done
3	several years ago. It's a magnificent old building.
4	It's also part of this NYSERDA proposal that we've
5	talked about before to look at how best to reposition
6	it over time. But one of the things that we've
7	noticed over there in working with Doug is that
8	there's a lot of cleanup that needs to be done on the
9	property, because it you know, the weeds and
10	things haven't been taken care of in a long time. So
11	it's not an insignificant sum of money, but needs to
12	be this spent, and will make a pretty dramatic
13	difference to the quality of the environment over
14	there and to the general cleanliness, and then get us
15	to a point where we can look at how best to
16	reposition the plant and those old diesel generators
17	for our future.
18	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Agreed.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're talking about the extra
20	generators that we have that I think the Kapel
21	Administration obtained from government surplus?
22	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm talking about the ones that
23	are currently fired up.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, okay, 4, 5 and 6, yeah,
25	the units.

1	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. But this is just an
2	approval to do a significant amount of landscaping
3	work with weeding. We're going to be replacing a
4	bunch of weeded areas in the front with some nice
5	gravel. We've got a new sign going up on the front
6	of the building over there as well, just some general
7	maintenance things.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. They needed flat work
9	done big time in terms of the concrete driveway
10	there, too.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You know, pretty expensive,
13	flat work is expensive. I don't know if that's in
14	the agenda or not. I spoke about that over the
15	years.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: No. This is purely just
17	landscape cleanup, and a lot of weeding
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: and some gravel cleanup.
20	Eventually, the building also needs a lot of funding
21	towards pointing, repointing the brick work,
22	etcetera. So, hopefully, we're able to get some
23	money from the State and maybe Federal Government as
24	part of this other thing we're taking a look at.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. The last big capital

1	improvement we did there was the roof, I think, you
2	know, roof, and the trim, the coping, and everything
3	like that. And that was probably what, Mary Bess,
4	about 7, 8 years ago, that roof?
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yes. And the weather
6	stations is across the street, if I remember
7	correctly.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Yep.
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: It is, yeah.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it's in a flood area,
12	because it got it's a good thing it's not working
13	any longer.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. And the utility equipment
15	itself, as I've shared before, is on a list by the
16	State to be shut down, and has been for several
17	years, and that's part of this NYSERDA review and
18	proposal that is making it's way through the State to
19	look at how best to reposition it in the future.
20	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: My second resolution is
21	actually to amend a previous resolution from last
22	month, 07-2024-25. There was an error in the voucher
23	summary report for the July Fiscal Year '25 spending.
24	The original resolution reported spendings of
25	\$640,705.41. The correct spending for July Fiscal '25

should have been \$668,246.77, which consists of an increase of 27,541.36.

Utility billing is on time.

Moving on, I don't have anything listed under my talking point. However, I did want to briefly touch upon two subjects, the first one being the Deputy Treasurer position. As the Board and the Mayor is aware, I have been canvassing for a Deputy Treasurer, I've been conducting interviews, and we do have a candidate who I believe would be great for the position. He's actually been working at Village Hall employed as a temp since April. His name is Jake Campo.

I've been working with Jake now for approximately four months. Jake has proven to be bright, diligent, and shows interest in the Village matters. His work is accurate, and he has a knack for implementing new ways to complete tasks in the most efficient way. He is well versed in accounting, and he's interested in pursuing a career in the municipal field.

I believe Jake would be an available asset, not only to the Treasury Department, but to the Village as a whole. You'll see next week at the Regular Session there will be a resolution to appoint him as the Deputy Treasurer, and I would just like to inform the Mayor and the Board that he does have my support

for that role.

I also wanted to talk about the Housing Authority. The Board and the Mayor may recall several months ago we did grant the Housing Authority funds from our Small City Rehabilitation funding. I would just like to report that they have since used that funding to repair a roof and a bathroom at one of their properties. They're very happy with the work, and they're very grateful to the Village for the assistance. So that project is officially closed now.

Moving on to Significant Collections. Rent collected in July '24 totaled \$69,790.54. This next one, property tax collected through, that should read through July 2024. Apologies. And that was \$1,175,000, just over.

Another significant collection was the ARPA funds, which is the American Rescue Plan Act, for our Fire Department, where we received just over \$49,000, which was a pass-through, pass-through the Town of Southold. Trustee Phillips was crucial in securing these funds, so if she wanted to comment further, she's welcome to do so. But that is -- that was very, very good for the Fire Department.

Significant Payments: We did make a payment for our 2018 serial bond in the amount of 34,906.25.

1	That was for land and building acquisitions. And our
2	2017 serial bond payment, just over \$89,000. Those
3	were for road improvements. That one will actually
4	be concluding in Fiscal Year '28.
5	The rest of my report is enclosed. Let me know
6	if the Board has any questions.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Adam, who the spread
8	sheet that comes through the Recreational Department,
9	can they add the Mini Railroad activity onto that
10	spread sheet along with the other activities?
11	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Sure, yes, I can produce
12	that.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I think that would be a good
14	database to keep moving forward into the future.
15	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Absolutely.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
17	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: And if the Board or the
18	Mayor had any questions regarding the Mini Railroad's
19	revenues, I believe I actually have those figures
20	available right now.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, if you could speak to
22	them, that would be great.
23	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yeah, sure. So,
24	currently, the revenue collected through the
25	Mini Railroad is just over \$10,000, it is \$10,152 in

slightly. Certainly not unusual for a new, a new recreation service that we offer. Sometimes these things take a couple of months to catch on. But I think this is a fine trend line, considering it's only been two months, and I project that the revenues will top expenses soon, hopefully this  MAYOR STUESSI: And the staffing is right in line with your budget, correct?  TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Correct.  TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Is it about I know we kind of had like projected. Is it, is it meeting like our projections so far?  TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: In relation?  TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Like in how much it's bringing in and expenses in.  TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: I'd want to look further just to calculate.  TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Okay.  TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: I'd want to break it down on a weekly basis, depending on how many weeks are left in the season, so I couldn't say for certain.  Based on these numbers, though, I think we're on projection, yes, but I would want to confirm that.	1	revenue. Expenses currently are just over \$11,000.
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1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's weather related, too
2	right? I mean, people aren't going to ride it if
3	it's raining and then, you know
4	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes, yes, or even if it's
5	too hot out, you know.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right, right, exactly.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: His original budget had a
8	weather sensitivity to it.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It did?
10	MAYOR STUESSI: I think we actually have been
11	in pretty good shape overall relative to it. As
12	everybody may recall, last year I think it rained
13	every single Saturday.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Uh-huh.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: We've had a pretty good summer
16	so far on the weekends, Fridays through Sundays,
17	which is when it runs.
18	Relative to the building, there are a few
19	maintenance items that we are dealing with, and
20	working with the original contractors to try and
21	get some of those corrected before it's officially
22	handed over to the Village. So that's, that's being
23	worked on.
24	Harris Beach has an amended agreement as part
25	of the handover, and once we get through those,

hopefully in the next couple of weeks, we'll have it back in front of the Board from Legal, and, you know, get it signed off by the Rotary and our Board when we're comfortable.

TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: That concludes my report.

Thank you.

MAYOR STUESSI: So just touching on the Recreation Department and Mitchell Park's marinas, as you'll see in the report, we had our visits from the Health Department. All of those went great for all the facilities. As you might be aware, that is something that is a pretty strenuous exercise for the team, making certain that everything meets the standards that it needs to.

We're doing great with staffing in the Rec. Department. Have a lot of success with the summer camp with enrollment and the team there.

We've had some issues with the Marina

Department on some absences relative to some health issues, which one individual in particular, who's a great member of the team, unsure when he's coming back, so Rick has adjusted his schedule with that.

Revenues in the department are looking quite strong. Again, the weekend business has been great with this pleasurable weather.

Still some challenges with enforcement on the water with the Police Department, as we talked about with the Town and some of those issues. I see the Committee Member from the Town is here, maybe we can chat about that a bit later, but been trying to work on that. I understand there are a couple of more officers hired, but I believe they're still waiting to get somebody for the Marine Patrol out there. There was an incident last night, as a matter of fact, and Shelter Island Fire Department actually came and dealt with it.

But the Marina facilities-wise, lots of positive comments on the restrooms over there, which is really wonderful to see. Everybody knows Harry, Harry was able to use the restroom for the first time with the ADA accessibility, which is a pretty important thing as well as part of that.

As everybody is aware of, we've gotten all of the stone work replaced and fixed up around the Carousel and the main entry over there. There's a couple of minor touchups that the company is going to come back and do. They did a fantastic job with that.

Did have a minor equipment issue with the Carousel last week, that we were down for about a

1	day, as the Board is aware. North Fork Welding
2	stepped in and got a part remanufactured for us real
3	quickly, which was great.
4	One of the things that we're taking a look at
5	and getting some quotes on is potentially taking
6	apart the entirety of the Carousel this year, and
7	doing some pretty significant work that we're going
8	to bring in front of the Board. To my understanding,
9	and I don't know, maybe Julia or Mary Bess, you might
10	know better, but I'm told it's never been completely
11	taken apart since it was originally put together.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, it hasn't, no.
13	TRUSTEE ROBINS: The last time since we moved
14	it here from over on Carpenter Street.
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: We moved it from Carpenter
16	Street. Yeah, that's the last time.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It has not. It's been, you
18	know
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: intact the whole time.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And, yeah, a year or two ago I
23	think I recommended a survey of the Carousel. So
24	this would be great, you know, to take it break it
25	down completely, and inspect every single part of it,

1	you know, and do whatever service work is necessary.
2	It's an old Carousel.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: It is.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It needs tender loving care,
5	it really does.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I
7	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So this is a timely thing.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, it is timely. I also
9	happened to, and I haven't been able to find some
10	information, but Mark happens my husband happens
11	to be working out of Hampton, Virginia, and he
12	brought to my attention their Carousel down there
13	that they did. It's as old as ours, where they it
14	was a company in Connecticut that actually came down
15	and gave them an evaluation.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And they actually sent it
18	piece by piece back to Connecticut. So I haven't
19	gotten the name of the company, but it might be
20	worthwhile to have that.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, please share it. I'm
22	wondering if I want to say I think it was a
23	mid-state one, though, because Buffalo just
24	completely redid theirs.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, Connecticut may not be

1	there, because they did it like 8, 9 10 years ago.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, okay.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But it's worth looking into.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, the one in Buffalo was
5	just done in the last year-and-a-half with some grant
6	funding as well, and our grants team is taking a look
7	at, including, believe it or not, solar panels on top
8	as part of it.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. I was, I was amazed
10	when the story was that they, Hampton, Virginia,
11	raised all of the money to send it to this firm in
12	Connecticut and it took eight years for it to come
13	back. They did every detail. So it was a pretty
14	interesting story, so.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I think Dave Abatelli
17	said a company reached out to him last year, too.
18	And I have to check back in my old reports, I can
19	probably find the name of the company.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, if you have any of that
21	information
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: from the Carousel Committee,
24	it would be great to share it with Rick right away,
25	because we're actively out talking to folks about it.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I've been in touch with
2	Rick already about the Carousel this week, actually,
3	yeah.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: The goal would be to do it over
5	the winter
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Uh-huh.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: and, you know, for an
8	undetermined period of time and make certain that
9	it's reopened for springtime
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right, right.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: as well.
12	Together with that, I had a couple of
13	challenges recently in the Roads Department, as you
14	folks know, with an equipment problem with our
15	payloader, which was down and fixed, so it slowed
16	down brush pickup. We also had two folks who were
17	out for both vacation and a health related issue,
18	but back.
19	And in the September Work Session we're going
20	to be to be doing a presentation comparing looking at
21	past workload for the team versus current workload,
22	increases in brush pickup, as I touched on last
23	month, and then also looking at staffing levels,
24	because our current staffing for that department is
25	down one from what it was, I want to say four or five

1	years ago, you mentioned?
2	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Maybe five.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. So we're working on
4	graphing that and, you know, mapping out all the work
5	relative to it, and the recommendation's going to be
6	to hire one, if not potentially two other
7	individuals, potentially with somebody with a real
8	focus on, you know, some maintenance issues relative
9	to the plants and other items within the Village.
10	On that note, Lily, if I can put you on the
11	spot, I think the Tree Committee has done some great
12	work. Maybe you can just share with the community
13	what's going to be done as far as communication when
14	we do have sadly, have to take a tree down, and
15	then the work that's going to be done to really
16	proactively try and do what we can to save trees, too
17	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah. Well, I
18	think we're at the point where they can make the
19	signs just to put on trees when the trees are coming
20	down. So, yeah, for like 10 days, maybe longer, to
21	let people know that the trees are not, not saveable
22	and they'll be coming down.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. So one of the things
24	that's happened is like the Tree Committee makes a

recommendation to pull a tree down because it's not

25

1	savable, and then people who own the tree know it,
2	but nobody else in the neighborhood knows it and
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Well, they don't
4	own the tree.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: They don't own the tree.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I mean, yes.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, they know, they know that,
8	is what
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Right. Well, I mean,
10	I think they tell me, right.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. So the point being is
12	that
13	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: But not everyone
14	always gets to, yes.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: to have it similar to what
16	we do with the new Zoning signs and Planning Board
17	signs that are bright yellow and go up, is to have a
18	sign that would be in front of the tree, be up there
19	for 10 days, so that folks in the neighborhood know
20	and aren't surprised when they notice a tree down,
21	and then the Tree Committee, as part of that, will
22	work on communicating the timing relative to removing
23	a stump, which I think takes, what, a year after to
24	dry out?
25	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah. I mean, once

1	you have a stump, they have to leave it for a year
2	before they could even think about replacing it, so
3	it's a long process. But, yeah, I think the signs
4	should be good to go, so we could start putting them
5	up. And I know they have a pretty long list, not a
6	huge list, but there's quite a few trees that
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
8	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: need to be taken
9	down.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: When they cut the trees down,
11	do they grind the stumps, too, at the same time?
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Not right away, you
13	have to leave it.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: They have to dry it out.
15	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah, you have to
16	leave it for a long time.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: By example, on 4th Street, down
18	towards Clark, there's one tree that needs to be
19	removed at one house, and then next to it there's a
20	house that has a tree that was removed last year.
21	The stump's now dried out enough
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: so it's on the schedule to
24	be ground in the next, I think it's 45 days, when the
25	company comes back out.

1	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Yeah. And they
2	have a whole list, too, of trees that need to be
3	pruned. So they're trying to keep I mean, I think
4	that's been an ongoing thing.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: But like trees that
7	just parts, parts might need to come down to save
8	the tree, and the Village staff does that on occasion,
9	or we like bid it out to other companies.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I'm curious. If a limb falls
11	on somebody's vehicle or house that belongs to the
12	Village, are we liable for that?
13	CLERK HALL: No.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: No.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No. It's an act of God, an
16	act of nature, I guess, or how does the insurance
17	company call, what do they that?
18	CLERK HALL: Actually, that was my old work, so
19	I can answer that question. Unfortunately, trees are
20	acts of God.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
22	CLERK HALL: So even if your tree from your
23	house falls on my car or my property, it's my problem
24	and my insurance that picks it up.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: All right. Okay.

1	CLERK HALL: That doesn't stop people from
2	suing, you can sue anybody you want, but in the eyes
3	of insurance, it's your problem.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, okay.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Lily, I have a question. Is
6	the Tree Committee working on the application for the
7	Tree City?
8	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I'm not sure about
9	that. I only went to the one meeting that I actually
10	could make and we didn't talk about that then, but I
11	can follow up on it.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm pretty sure that was done
13	already.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't remember, that's why
15	I'm asking.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, I'm pretty certain it was
17	completed already by what's her name? Polly. And
18	the other thing was they just they ordered a bunch
19	of new flags as well, because we were out of flags.
20	Those are at Village Hall and being utilized, too,
21	as well.
22	The other item I'll mention relative to Tree
23	Committee, as one of the additional things that
24	they're taking a look at, is making recommendations
25	on some of the larger really special trees and what

1	may be done, what may need to be done to help them
2	out. So a perfect example would be when Fourth
3	Street was paved, I want to say a year and it's
4	probably been more like two years ago now, when the
5	sidewalk work was done, the existing sidewalk was
6	pulled out, and then the tree root ball was cut at
7	the edge of it, instead of looking to put the
8	sidewalk, or, pardon me, the curb out a bit. So
9	that's going to be reviewed by the Tree Committee,
10	and then the arborist that's on staff as part of our
11	agreement to review locations where we're doing any
12	paving and/or curb work where there might need to be
13	some other accommodation as part of that and how the
14	curb is poured around a tree root ball. Makes sense?
15	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: (Nodded yes).
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: (Nodded yes).
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, the new well, the
18	new trees that they're planting, a couple years ago
19	we they now put some type of a
20	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Sleeve around it.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sleeve around down into the
22	ground so the roots won't spread out. They're still
23	doing that, correct?
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.

MAYOR STUESSI: But these are existing --

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updated.

2 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I know, existing, yeah. 3 MAYOR STUESSI: -- trees that are 100-plus 4 years old, and we want to do what we can to save and help them out as part of that. 5 6 On the Sewer Department, we've had some pretty 7 significant issues with equipment and rain inundation. 8 I have noted here an update a little bit later on the 9 agenda, but I'm going to talk about it now, on the 10 study by Holzmacher. It's gone through a couple of 11 drafts in the last three weeks, with Adam working 12 directly with Holzmacher to make some edits. 13 are just a few other items that need to be updated on it in the next couple of days with Legal as well on 14 some of the existing property owners outside of the 15 16 Village lines, but within the sewer district who are connected, as well as noting some of the things that 17 18 may have been connected without Village approval,

I feel pretty comfortable. This should be to the Boards next week to review. I was hoping it might make sense to get Bob in right away, but I

So that's being

which I know the Board's aware. We've sent some

letters to the Southold Town Planning Board in

regards to some of these items.

think we'll wait until the Board has had a chance to review it.

And I'm likely going to be looking to schedule a Special Meeting on some housing initiatives, and maybe we do it at the same time, if we do have a meeting in advance of our September meeting to review it.

With that, we've had a couple of requests. I think there are two different requests for expansion of sewer. There's one individual who has a house just outside of the Village that's under construction, barely started. They're comfortable waiting until the September meeting as well.

We don't have any other connection requests outside of the two hotels, which have already been sent letters from Legal, and have gone to the Southold Town Planning Board as well, to let them know that because of the moratorium, they can't connect, but, you know, that we would be reviewing it as part of the sewer study.

I will say, just in a cursory review of it with Adam, and we had a followup phone call with Mr. Holzmacher the other day, it's interesting hearing the issues. And one of the challenges is when looking at the needed funding for all of our infrastructure, we're going to be looking at

something somewhere north of \$10 million in the relative new term, which is going to encompass a number of things, a pipe replacement in some places, some additional video surveillance of existing pipes. We've already done some of that, some additional work at the sewer plant itself.

One of the pieces in the plant, which predates the new administration, that we had challenges on, that there were DEC violations about two years ago, that we had long ago approved is still on order and being manufactured. We're now being told we're supposed to have that by early November, fortunately. But one of the challenges is we have a number of pieces of equipment that are single-source providers, which is really problematic.

You'll see in the report there's some recommendations to change out a number of pieces of equipment, including in the pump stations, the three pump stations which we've all talked about before that are most problematic, the ones at -- over by Claudio's, one over by the hospital, and then the one down Sixth Street. While the buildings are in pretty decent shape, there's some additional work that needs to be done on the structures to make sure that the weather elements aren't affecting them. There is a

good amount of work that needs to be done on a equipment.

And then the other thing that's going to be important, you'll see in the report, is monitoring. There's some additional things that can be done that are being recommended to really better monitor this as part of it.

I will say as part of all of this, I've had -- I can't even count how many meetings, I was back counting today, and then with the Governor's Office yesterday on some things, and then last week, as well as with our Congressman yesterday in Sag Harbor. There's a lot of support for us to get funding. We've just got to get this report issued and then start applying for some things immediately thereafter.

One of the things as part of this, too, is because of the amount of work that's going to be required on this over time, together with the light plant work as well, I am going to be posting a job opportunity. I know we had talked before that we were trying to evaluate things and the needs in Village Hall with administration, and it is very clear that we are going to need somebody with very strong engineering skills. We're very fortunate that

we have Holzmacher on as a consultant on that, we have LKMA on planning, and then additionally on work related to all of the engineering for all the whole ferry queuing project. We're going to be looking for some additional help on managing the sewage plant work and all of the work that's going to be associated with that.

There are a couple of individuals who have expressed interest in this, but we're going to refine the job description and get that out. Might potentially be some additional consulting work, or potentially somebody, if it's one of these two that have reached out, coming to you for approval and potentially a hire for that, but I'll know more here in the next couple of weeks relative to that.

As part of that, too, Candace had mention the status of the ferry queue project. So as she mentioned, the bid balancing was done. LKMA, who is our designated engineer for the project, has been working through that. The State has been notified as part of that. There's some additional information that has been requested of Corazzini Asphalt, who was the low bidder on this. Everything should be achievable. They're hoping to get all of this in the next week to 10 days. That's all the State is

1 working for.

And then we also need to designate an inspector for it. There's a list of State inspectors who we've already talked to. Potentially, LKMA could serve as that as well, but there's an issue with a letter that was issued by Village Administration long ago that we need to get clarified with the State relative to how it was issued originally on engineering versus inspection.

Many individuals such as LKMA do both engineering and inspections. You're able to utilize one entity versus having to utilize two, and so we're working through that with the State in order to review it.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I remember that, and maybe you and I will talk about that, because I believe at the time that the Village Administrator Pallas was told by the State that that's -- that we couldn't do what you're talking about, but maybe things have changed.

MAYOR STUESSI: Well, it was because of the way his letter to the State acknowledging, or sort of basically certifying that you were, the Village, and this was before the new administration, that you were going to be hiring LKMA to do the engineering work.

1	The way that letter was worded
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: the State didn't accept it.
4	And so we're reviewing that with the State to see if
5	we're potentially able to change it, because it might
6	be advantageous to have the same team of people
7	there.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is LMKA well, I can never
9	say it.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: LKMA.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Are they going to be
12	overseeing the project for us as
13	MAYOR STUESSI: From an engineering perspective.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: an engineering perspective?
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Unknown on the inspection
16	certification, which is a State required item.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: But who's going to be
18	actually doing the project work? In other words
19	MAYOR STUESSI: It would be a combination of
20	LKMA and this other entity.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Or potentially all just LKMA.
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. That's what I wanted
24	to know.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're not talking about the

contractor, now, you're just talking about the
engineer?
MAYOR STUESSI: I'm talking about the engineer
and the construction inspection services.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Oh, the inspection.
MAYOR STUESSI: Not the contractor.
TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
MAYOR STUESSI: The contractor will very likely
be Corazzini, again, who was the low bidder on the
project, and would be a great benefit to the Village,
because they're located on Shelter Island.
In addition to that, which I'm going to
interject in a moment and have Adam just touch base
on, they are also the County paving group
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Group that have a contract,
yeah.
MAYOR STUESSI: that we typically turn to to
do roadwork within the Village. So their potential
mobilization within the Village would end up being
very significant this fall, winter and spring,
between doing both of the ferry queue work and all of
the Jitney lot, as well as a whole number of roads
for us as well.
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That brings in the bulkhead
for Mitchell Park at some point. Can we

1	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. So
2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There's paving over there, too.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, the two different
5	things. So there's the paving within all of the
6	biddable work that's that has been bid out and
7	Corazzini has, which includes everything up to the
8	ferry landing, around the railroad pardon me,
9	around the Maritime Museum, includes the Railroad
10	Museum as well, and paving over there, it goes up to
11	the edge of the bulkhead.
12	And so what's being looked at with the State is
13	potentially breaking out the bulkhead project into
14	two pieces, and including the piece along the grassy
15	area over by the Jitney parking lot, all the way over
16	to the edge of the ferry queuing. This is the spot
17	that's collapsed and we've got all the barriers on.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: As part of all of that work,
20	and then separating it and utilizing you know,
21	timing-wise, this would be part of that project, and
22	then the rest of it would be done as a separate
23	project, likely very much overlapping, and likely
24	with the same potential bulkhead contractor. But

phasing-wise, it needs to be incorporated as part of

1	doing all of the asphalt work that's going to be done
2	over there.
3	The other thing I would mention on that
4	pardon me, if I could just finish the thought
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: is over in the grassy area,
7	just above the visitors dock, I know that two
8	three of us have chatted, over time we've lost a
9	number of benches on those tables. The Road Crew has
10	tried to reattach things.
11	Early in the administration last year, we
12	pulled off a number of the seats, because they, you
13	know, deteriorated. We cut out one table, we cut out
14	two tables from Fifth Street Park. We would be
15	budgeting as part of all of this to add in new tables
16	for next spring when this project's completed, just
17	within the grassy area for folks that are, you know,
18	at the top of the visitors dock.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Larry Tuthill Park, I think it is.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, it's Larry Tuthill Park.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. It's in memory of
23	him, yeah.
24	I did have a question. I'm assuming that the
25	plans aren't drawn yet for the bulkhead repair?

1	MAYOR STUESSI: Pardon me?
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The plans aren't drawn yet
3	for the bulkhead repair?
4	MAYOR STUESSI: No. So that's all being looked
5	at as part of this with the DEC and engineers.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I would like to, when you do
7	get to it, bring up some information that when they
8	do these, these new plans, the ferry company, with
9	their new, their new boats, and because they have
10	extended out, we have
11	MAYOR STUESSI: The boats are new?
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The ferry boats? The ferry
13	company boats?
14	MAYOR STUESSI: You said the new boats?
15	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, they have
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Aren't they old boats?
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: What, the ferry? Those
18	the enlarged ones are
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: There's a new.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: There's a new one, yeah.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, okay.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. Well, anyway
23	MAYOR STUESSI: How new is it?
24	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The last what, three years,
25	four years, maybe.

1	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah. I think I don't
2	know, maybe four years.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. Anyway, there's an
5	issue over there with the sand moving around and
6	it's it weakens the bulkhead. And I just would
7	like to bring that to whoever is drawing, that we
8	need to put some type of and, I'm sorry, I can't
9	remember the term. Maybe you remember it, Patrick.
10	Deter the sand from moving around. I have to I'll
11	have to find my notes. I don't remember what it's
12	called, but it's a problem where it's undermined.
13	That's part of the reason why that bulkhead was
14	undermined a little bit over by the railroad dock.
15	So it's the sand
16	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I think that may also be
17	related to the shoaling of the Glass Beach area.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, part of that's
19	well, I'll talk to you about it.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Could be the same sand.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It is the yeah, it is.
22	I'll talk to you about it and I'll show it to you,
23	okay? I have notes. But I think we have the
24	opportunity to fix that, because I'll be honest with
25	you, there used to be eelgrass over there for years

and years and years, and now it's all been sanded over, so -- and that's from the continuous motion of the ferry boats coming in and out. So if we have the opportunity to environmentally take care of that, I think it would be a plus.

MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. So one of the interesting things you're also going read -- brings up a good point that you're going to read about in the sewer report is the water infiltration into our groundwater, which is pretty significant. And it's noted in there as being a big issue in particular as it relates to stormwater throughout the Village.

And as part of that, and I think as everybody here knows, we're seeing this more so with these nor'easters and then the tidal flow that we are necessarily with the rain inundation. Although, the rain is a huge problem, too, because where it used to rain two inches over 30 hours, it's now two inches over a few hours, which is causing a lot of issues over at the plant. And then, you know, there might be some issues related to some of our different road ends and beach ends --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.

MAYOR STUESSI: -- possibly even over here as well, that it will be taken into account.

On that note, I will make mention, because I know the Board's been aware of some permits that were granted down at Widow's Hole. And so we had approved adding more stone work on private property off of Widow's Hole. And then there is State property at the end of the road there that the Village owns between those private properties and then the Osinski Family down at the end.

I'm happy to share that the Osinskis and the other property owners are talking together with former head of Regional DEC here, and we're doing a followup together. We're likely going to be bringing something to the Village Board that would incorporate looking at filling in the spot as well with additional stone between each of the private property owners, so that we don't end up potentially creating a trough where all the storm surge would literally come in through the work that's going to be done with both of the property owners.

One of the other things being considered is some -- a good amount of planting, to your point in talking about eelgrass, but maybe some other native plants at the edges of some of this work as well. So there's going to be a meeting here in the coming weeks, and we'll be bringing something, I think, by

1	our September Work Session in regards to that as well.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So going become to the
3	infiltration of fresh water into the sewer plant, we
4	haven't received any additional violations to the
5	Wastewater Treatment Plant, have we?
6	MAYOR STUESSI: We have not.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: We still have the open one
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right, a few years ago.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: from two years ago that
11	we're dealing with, but they have been, by the grace
12	of God, somehow managing things
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: with a lot of real challenges.
15	I will say Adam has done a fantastic job, and there
16	have been many a nights where he and the crew were
17	working overnight in dealing with these issues, and
18	have really been monitoring it very closely, and in
19	touch with every State entity that they need to be,
20	and we do watch it carefully.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Those were County violations,
22	right? It was the County that
23	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, they were the County.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And that's

MAYOR STUESSI: Well, the open one is a State  DEC.  TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's a State one?  MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, from two years ago, which

14 for a while.	
15 MAYOR STUESSI: Front? You mean behind Port	
16 Restaurant?	
17 TRUSTEE ROBINS: You're talking about cleaning	
18 the drains, actually?	
19 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, no, no, no, along Front	
20 Street, the ones that are	
21 MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, they were done about four	
months ago.	
TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Were they here? Were they	
24 done here?	
25 MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.	

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. I didn't see them.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, they were there, because
5	I had a conversation with the State on it. Did you
6	want to say something, Patrick?
7	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, I just had a comment on
8	the ferry queue project. I guess my feeling is I'd
9	recommend that we use a third party inspector, rather
10	than using the consulting engineer that we currently
11	employ. Not that there's anything wrong with the
12	work of LKMA, it just seems more prudent to use an
13	arms-length inspector.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
15	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I think it would be in the
16	Village's interest.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. Well, I'm getting
18	pricing from both of them as part of it, and we'll be
19	able to review it here pretty quickly, but it should
20	be pretty similar. It looks like it's going to be in
21	the neighborhood of about \$220,000 just for that
22	service, which is a County, our pre-negotiated County
23	rate based on of the certain factor of how many
24	hours, and layout time, and how many men are on the
25	job, which we already have with Corazzini.

1	Mary Bess, do you have I know you are
2	there any updates from the Transportation Committee
3	with the Town? Last I had heard, the State is
4	supposed to start the roundabout work right after
5	Labor Day.
6	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: My under
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Have you heard anything further
8	from your last meeting?
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The last I heard from
10	Dan Goodwin was they were proceeding with their
11	markings, and that they plan on proceeding supposedly
12	the same, at the same time period as we may be
13	contemplating the North Ferry project. I'm assuming
14	that we're going to be on track for after, after
15	Maritime Festival, I think.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, that's the goal. We'll
17	know in the next couple of weeks.
18	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. I do know that,
19	that's that I was going to bring that up. I think
20	I brought it up the last time that that's still in
21	the works. Transportation Commission isn't until
22	next week, so we're our meeting is a little bit
23	earlier this month.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Same way with the Fire

1	Department's Wardens meeting is next week, so okay.
2	Other than that, the only other thing, that the
3	Town of Southold is working on streets for rising
4	tides. They're going through and doing an evaluation
5	of all local, local streets and highways, and
6	checking to see which ones that they're going to
7	start trying to build up so that the flooding stops.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. I've been in touch with
9	the Supervisor on that and we've talked about a few
10	areas in particular in addition. You know, really,
11	one of the areas that's most problematic is leaving
12	the Village and heading towards Sandy Beach, that
13	way.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: The beach way, yeah.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, exactly, and going over
16	the creek.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So there's a couple of them
18	around the town, so that's part of it. But the
19	biggest question is when the two projects are going
20	to start. My one understanding is that the circle,
21	there will not be a close-down or a detour. They're
22	going to create it so there's one lane that continuously
23	keeps going east and west
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: while they do the other

1 part of the work. We did have a -- some concerned citizens from Madison. Is it Street or Avenue? 2 can't remember. That were concerned that the tractor 3 4 trailer traffic would be detouring down their way 5 going out Washington Avenue to get back on. 6 understanding is that they're keeping the roadway open for the commercial traffic to keep flowing 7 8 through and getting into the town. MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh. 9 TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: So that's, that's it from 10 11 the Town of Southold, okay? 12 MAYOR STUESSI: And then just a couple of other 13 items from the Electric Department. I want to thank 14 Doug and his team. We had an emergency down at -- by Safe Harbor with a transformer that blew last night. 15 16 They were down there first thing this morning, got it 17 replaced and dealt with really quickly. Sean from 18 Safe Harbor reached out to thank them for what a 19 fantastic job and how quick they were able to -- how 20 quickly they were able to take care of it. 21 We did have a power outage earlier this week. 22 Julia and I talked about it very briefly when it happened. Still looking into what exactly happened, 23 24 don't have a determination on that yet. 25 The microgrid project, we had Haugland back out

last week on this. There's just a couple of very minor issues that need to be signed off on, and it sounds like we should have full signoff on both of those here within the next couple of weeks, and they'll be put to bed.

The only other item I have is I am going to be sharing an old document with the Board. Mary Bess, you and I talked about this briefly. There is a parcel at the end of Ludlam Street on the --

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Oh, okay.

MAYOR STUESSI: -- southeastern side of the street immediately abutting the condo property over there that the Village owns. We have had a couple of different individuals, surrounding property owners express interest in purchasing this property.

The Village acquired it many years ago. It was surveyed, and the Village Board had considered listing it, I want to say five years ago, but didn't move forward with it at the time. I believe you had said you didn't have any recollection why the Village Board didn't move forward.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I --

MAYOR STUESSI: There was some concern that there might be utility issues there, but there is nothing that goes under there. It's not utilized by

1	the Village in any way, shape or form. If anything,
2	it just becomes the next door property owners spread
3	out on that. It would seem very prudent for us to
4	get an appraisal on it and consider selling it and
5	put it on the open market, because the Village has no
6	need for it, and it would be a way to bring some
7	needed funding into the Village.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Is it a buildable lot? And
9	what's the size of the property, do you know?
10	MAYOR STUESSI: I don't recall the square
11	footage. I'll send that through. It is a small lot.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: It's more valuable to
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Julia.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: either one of the immediately
16	adjacent property owners.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If I remember correctly,
18	there was discussion, and that the price that we were
19	asking didn't meet with the the discussion stopped
20	after the price that we quoted them. I believe
21	that's what happened, that that you know, so if ${\bf I}$
22	were to remember it correctly, it was a lot of
23	there was a lot of back and forth and then all of a
24	sudden it stopped, so.
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Is there a lift station right

7	but that's over okay. As you go into 123 Sterling
8	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
9	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: that's we have a
10	right-of-way into that and that's closer to Sterling.
11	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Right.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Sterling Street.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Right.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
15	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It's not in this lot.
16	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: The lot is on the south side
18	of Ludlam at the end?
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
20	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: The tennis court?
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: So it's like the
24	tennis court and parking lot.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, yeah. Also, there was a

1	survey done, so I'll share that with everybody from
2	years back.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I'd like to see the
4	survey.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, where the owners of both
6	of the adjacent properties had expressed interest in
7	purchasing and said they hadn't heard anything back
8	long ago, so.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Do we know why the Village
10	acquired?
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Haven't been able to determine
12	that.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Originally, the project
14	that's down Ludlam years and years ago was a
15	housing it was a housing project, because the
16	zoning for those houses along there are all connected
17	to one zoning amendment. So that may have been the
18	piece that was part of that overall project at one
19	point. I'm guessing, okay? I'm just going by having
20	been on the Zoning and having to deal with some of
21	those buildings, because the zoning agreement for
22	that says there's supposed to be a manager on site.
23	There's a whole which I don't think exists.
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I don't think it's being

1	done anymore, but there is a zoning amendment to that
2	area down there. So it could have been purchased
3	with that in mind at one point.
4	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's one of the biggest
5	multi-family housing projects in the Village, maybe
6	with the exception of Lakeside Gardens.
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: But it's very, very poorly
9	managed and not in good condition. I remember doing
10	work down there as a contractor at the time.
11	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And they're not well managed
13	and they're not well maintained.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, and it's been sold
15	several times.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: But it's been providing needed
17	housing for a lot of people, so it's an important
18	asset.
19	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: And it's been sold several
20	times over, so, you know.
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, yeah.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: So then we'll send that
23	through, and there'll be a resolution next week to
24	get an appraisal and then consider listing it, and
25	then getting some interest on it.

Before we get to paving and sidewalk work, just wanted to briefly update on my meeting with the Governor last week. Obviously, we've got that big fake check down at the bottom over there. This is wonderful news for the Village. The Governor has pulled some discretionary funding and is giving the Village a grant of \$1.2 million. Don't have the particulars of it yet, but they're supposed to be sending paperwork through shortly.

This is really as part of the State's effort to focus on downtown revitalization to help business, and bring back new business, as well as create housing in the Downtown District. Our Pro Housing designation that we all voted for many months back really played into this.

I was at a meeting yesterday of all of the East End Mayors and Supervisors. This was post my meeting with her on Friday of last week. It was with just a couple of -- I think there was four mayors, four other mayors, and then I met with her separately. She is very much committed to the eastern end. We talked about infrastructure, all the needs that we have out here relative to huge climate resiliency things. So her team is looking forward to us getting them more information on our needs here.

We will be scheduling a time in September as well, as I had mentioned prior, with McBride, our other grants team, to really focus on the whole downtown revitalization initiative. The application process is opening right now, and so we're going to need to have a discussion, share some things with the community and get some thoughts on it, so that we can get an application in. Because of the Pro Housing designation, we qualify for this as well, in addition to some other potential grants, which they'll be talking about. McBride was a big help with some of the relations with the Governor's Office and helping to get us this grant.

As part of that, there will be some additional funding needed. This would be for building a permanent rink that would be in the ground and then covered up and utilized for summertime, you know, walking, strolling, etcetera. You know, the hope would be that we should get four to five months out of it. The way they are designed now, the newer engineered once, there's no issues with that. You can even engineer them to work in the heat of the summer, as I've shared, you know, from my daughter's experience where we used to live in Idaho with the rink there that somehow managed to make it, I think,

60 years, including working throughout the summer before it was renovated last year.

The interesting thing is one of the companies that utilize and do all the engineering is right here in Pennsylvania and does a lot of work in New York as part of it.

We're also talking to the engineering firm that helped out with the complete renovation and restoration of Wollman Rink in Central Park, which was just done I want to say two years ago now. And we'll be bring forward a proposal to the Board to hire an engineer and get somebody on board to start studying it.

I will say, too, that SHoP Architects, who did the design of Mitchell Park, have already graciously offered to assist with working with the engineer and doing placement of all this. There's going to be a lot of work over the coming months to bring in front of the Board, review it.

Friends of Mitchell Park are excited and want to participate in the process, too. As I shared with a few, we've already had somebody from the community who has graciously offered to donate \$25,000 as sort of one of the -- hopefully, a few lead gifts to, you know, potentially fund the rest of what's going to be needed as part of it. I'm getting a followup

meeting set with Friends of Mitchell Park, and it would be great to get them involved, too. They've been very helpful with helping to manage the funding for Dances in the Park, and I know that's gone really well, and lots to do. It will be fun.

We'll be in a position where we can hold a big celebration for the 25th Anniversary of Mitchell Park with 2026, which aligns perfectly with the 250th Birthday of America and signing the Declaration of Independence, and have a big celebration as part of it. A really wonderful thing, which a few of you know from, you know, being here for many years, is that rink started, as I understand, with what's her name who owned the Rhumb Line? Jackie.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Jackie.

TRUSTEE ROBINS: Jackie Copas.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Jackie Copas, actually, as it was --

MAYOR STUESSI: Worked with Mayor Kapell and Dave Abatelli, and they set up hay bales out there and a hose and filled it with water and let it freeze. And so that became some of the energy, and then eventually a used ice rink was purchased and rolled out. Sadly, we've outlived that time, but we got a nice check to get started on funding the vast

1 majority of what's going to be needed to rebuild it, 2 and rebuild our wintertime business, which would be great, too. I can imagine a day where you'll be able 3 4 to come from elsewhere and go ice skating in the afternoon, and grab lunch, and do some shopping, go 5 6 see a movie at the theater, or maybe a music performance there, and it should be wonderful for 7 8 downtown 9 TRUSTEE ROBINS: Don't forget the roller skating, too. 10 11 MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, you can do, you can do 12 everything. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, I also think, and I'm 13 14 hoping that we are looking to help the skateboard park group looking for funding as well. I'm assuming 15 16 that the grant company is doing that, too. 17 MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, that's a -- as I have 18 explained to Rena several times, and she knows, 19 because I've been to every event they do, and used to skateboard, my daughter still does, it's a more 20 21 challenging one, because it's not part of the 22 Downtown District, and a lot of the funding is coming in for downtown specific items, and revitalization of 23 24 downtown, building housing, etcetera. But I'm 25 hopeful over time we will, A, potentially find a lead

donor, much like Montauk did with their new skate park, and then maybe piece together some funds from the County, and maybe even Southold Town, because it is an amenity that's utilized for, you know, the whole Town.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, that, that was one of my thoughts, is that we perhaps, because the residents, you know, the children that live in the surrounding areas of the Village of Greenport do use the skate park, perhaps we could discuss with the Town Board doing a joint effort in trying to find funding for that.

MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. Maybe the ice rink, too. TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah.

MAYOR STUESSI: So last item I have on here is the paving and sidewalk work. Firstly, a couple of things.

So Sixth Street has been talked about a lot for many years. I know when I was a private citizen, I had asked about it a few times and was told the Village was holding off because of work that was going to be done by Verizon, was supposed to be coming, and coming, and coming, which I think the Village has been told that for a long time. I will say Verizon finally cut the cable, the old one, going

over to Shelter Island. This is the first one, not the one that's currently there, and they're removing that. And they're doing work down at the bottom of Fifth Street by the old cable house to get it off the beach, which is a huge endeavor, it's taken a lot of work to get that done.

But, as the Board's aware, we approved them doing some core sample drilling down at the end of Sixth Street, which was done, I want to say, two months ago now, and I just followed up with them again. They are just reviewing those core samples.

So relative to the state of things, it's pretty clear that best case scenario is that thing's not going to be engineered, approved, or anything for at least 24 months. And so as part of that, what Adam has shared with the Board, relative to our paving plans and sidewalk work, is pushing Sixth Street up to the top of the list, instead the bottom of the list, because it's one of the worst streets as part of it.

And I'll just ask Adam in a moment to talk high level about this, but he has done an absolutely masterful job of figuring how to manage all of the funding, because between the bond we did, and then a whole bunch of additional funding through the State

and CHIPS work as well, he's been able to piece this all together, so that we're going to be able to develop this schedule that will start this fall, right after Maritime as well, and I think it's going to end up being the largest amount of sidewalk and asphalt work that's ever been done in the Village at one time. Really significant, whole number of streets that we've all talked about before, in addition to some sidewalk work, curb work, too, which is going to take many months. But funding-wise, he's been able to manage it relative to inflow of money and outflow of money.

And with that, I'll turn it over to Adam to talk about it high level.

TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. So I have been working with closely with Bill, the Principal Office Assistant, and I've met several times with yourself to discuss the plans for the paving of the roads.

As most people are aware, we did receive the 700,000 in bonding to repave these roads. But I do have good news as well, that I have been in talks with the Department of Transportation, and our CHIPS and our PAVE-NY money for funding of the roads.

The streets that we plan to pave are eligible

to use these funds for. I believe currently we have approximately a million dollars of State Aid to help us repair these roads, reimbursable. So our plan is to break it into sections, as Mayor Stuessi said, likely starting this fall. We can use our bond money we received for the initial payout, and then we can get reimbursed through the State through our CHIPS money and just keep cycling it and cycling it until all the streets are done.

There are a couple not related to the sidewalk projects on the list that you all received. Some of the roads that we will be redoing do require some additional ADA compliant ramps on the ends of the streets to make us eligible for these funds. The ADA compliant sidewalks are also included in the CHIPS funds and the PAVE-NY funds as reimbursable.

So I did provide a map and a list of the streets and sidewalks to the Board recently for their review. But it does look like it's coming together, and we're looking forward to redoing these roads as soon as possible, as Mayor Stuessi said, as early as this fall.

MAYOR STUESSI: And so one of the things that's being worked on as part of this is putting together a schedule of work, together with Corazzini on the

asphalt side of things, and then DeAl on what needs to be done for sidewalks and curbs, because in certain cases there's both sidewalk, curb, and ADA accessibility on corners happening, together with repaving. And we need to make sure that we do the sidewalk and curb work first, because otherwise what's happened sometimes is asphalt's been done, and then the curb work's done, and then you need to go back and patch asphalt, so you're spending more money than you need to. So that's being worked through with both of the contractors, together with his funding schedule.

And so when that's all finalized, Adam will share with the Board again, together with a schedule of when this is all going to happen. And we'll be looking to Lily and the Communications Committee to help share this with the community in the Village newsletter, too. But it's pretty, pretty incredible how much work is going to be done.

TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: If you don't mind, I'd like to sit down with Adam and Billy and discuss the area around the hospital, and the amount of tractor trailer and straight traffic that we have on Atlantic Avenue and Manor Place. I took a look at the plans, and between the hospital parking that is spread out

1	all along Atlantic Avenue, I would just like to know,
2	get a clearer picture as to where the curbing is
3	going, what they're planning for the curbing, because
4	they need they may need to make some accommodations
5	for the trucks coming around the corner. So I just,
6	I just want to let you know.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: I don't think in that area we
8	have curbing, but I'll join you for that meeting, and
9	let's all walk through that together.
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, I would like to go up,
11	yeah.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No curbing right now. I don't
13	know if they're planning on that.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: No, there's no curbing,
15	yeah, and it yeah. No, I just as I said, I
16	know the amount of traffic from the trucks that goes,
17	because they come off the North Road down Bailey
18	Avenue and come across to Atlantic Avenue to go to
19	the hospital.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, you've got a lot of
21	trucks, that's an issue, too.
22	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah. I have my own trucks
23	that come in and out, yeah. So, as I said, most
24	people don't realize.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, I don't think there's any

1	curbing contemplated over there, but we can review
2	all that carefully.
3	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I want to double-check.
4	Okay. All right. Thanks.
5	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah. I appreciate the
6	diagram that Adam, that you provided. When I
7	looked at it, that was my first question. I couldn't
8	determine what was paving, what's curb, and what's
9	sidewalk from what you highlighted, I guess.
10	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: I'm happy to redo it and
11	make it more clear.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
13	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Just circling back, Adam, did
15	you say that we could use the 700,000 that we bonded
16	for as basically seed money to kind of set off the
17	cycle of reimbursement?
18	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Correct, yes.
19	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's really good.
20	TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yeah.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, no.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's like brilliant.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: This has been like a brilliant
24	economic package that's been put together.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, I love it.

1	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I
2	MAYOR STUESSI: And the other really exciting
3	thing pardon me
4	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: That's okay.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: for interjecting, because
6	this one I love, is there's money at the State to do
7	paving in areas of parking lots where there's big
8	climate resiliency issues. And so the entirety of
9	all of Adams Street behind the Arcade over to the
10	Op Shop, and then all the way down on first, all the
11	municipal parking over there, we think we're well
12	qualified to get additional funding to redo all of
13	that, including new medians, new bio-swales, new
14	sidewalks over there, so we're very carefully looking
15	at that. And that's why all of that, we didn't even
16	have all of it being done, but you'll see on the list
17	it's moved down to the bottom of the list, because if
18	we're able to get all this funding, we'll be able to
19	do twice as much work there and potentially not have
20	to pay a penny for it.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: I just want to make a
22	notation that I understand Sixth Street is, is one of
23	the roads that needs to be fixed. But I hope Bridge
24	Street might be the second one, because that's
25	been

1	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, it's one of them, yeah.
2	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Okay. All right.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: It's just it's a matter of
4	looking at the way we need to manage the funding.
5	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: And then Sixth has a whole
7	bunch of sidewalk, and curb, and ADA accessible work.
8	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Whereas Bridge
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Bridge is
11	MAYOR STUESSI: is just pure paving.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Well, it's got to be
13	resurfaced.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: So that would fall in with
15	paving, but we've got to get the concrete work on
16	Sixth Street done first.
17	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Right. No, I'm not, but I'm
18	just the I think we're going to
19	MAYOR STUESSI: No, Bridge and Monsell, that
20	whole area is terrible.
21	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Bridge, Bridge is going to
22	be, I think, down to the surface, to be honest with
23	you.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
25	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: It's already down to the

1	surface, so.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. And there was, I recall
3	in a conversation long ago, a belief that Bridge
4	Street was half owned by the Village and the Town.
5	That is not the case. Even though the north side of
6	Bridge Street is Town, the entirety of the street
7	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is ours.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: including a buffer on the
9	north side of the street
10	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Is ours.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: is owned by the Village.
12	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Interesting. I didn't realize
13	that.
14	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Yeah, no.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I thought it was kind of a pact.
16	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So you could do curb work if
17	you needed to. You could do the curb work on both
18	sides of the street.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Potentially, but we don't have
20	the funding to do curb work over there, so we're
21	going to focus on that, yeah.
22	With that, is there anybody from the public
23	that would like to address the Board?
24	MS. WADE: Oh, my gosh, that was a lot of work.
25	Thank you. (Applause)

1	(Laughter)
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Chris, nothing? Would you
3	can we chat for just a second? Would you mind
4	approaching the podium, just so we could
5	MR. NORTH: No problem.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: chat about a few things
7	police related? Thank you. I'm sorry to put you on
8	the spot.
9	MR. NORTH: No problem.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: But I guess I gave you about
11	45 minutes or an hour warning when I brought it up
12	earlier.
13	So the Village had a joint meeting, as you
14	might be aware, with the Town Board, what was it,
15	three weeks ago, folks? I think so.
16	MR. NORTH: About right.
17	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I thinks so.
18	MR. NORTH: So, like I said, I think Joe might
19	have sent you an email a couple of weeks
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, what I was going to say
21	was in the course of the meeting, one of the things
22	the Village talked about was the need for additional
23	enforcement in the Village. And I had brought up, as
24	I have in some prior meetings with the Supervisor and
25	the Board, that we feel that it's time to do a study

to look at staffing needs for -- well, we're going to focus on the Village. It sounds like it needs to be done for the Town as well. And it was brought up that you're the new Chair, which I had known, because you had shared it with me, of the -- what's the official committee name?

MR. NORTH: It's the Police Advisory Committee. As the Town -- as the Chairman of the Police Advisory Committee, we are -- our charge is to be advisory to the Police Commissioners, to Town Board, and our charge is with direction where they come, whatever direction they give to us.

So based on the conversation with Joe, and I said to you and I said to Joe to you, if you could send me a detailed email of what your concerns are, the Police Advisory can look at it and give the recommendation to the Town Board as Commissioners.

MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. So our Board shared a number of those things with the Town Board. We'll be glad to reiterate it and send it over. But one of the things that was mentioned during the course of the meeting, Brian Mealy very rightly suggested when we were talking about making sure the Village has representation, "Well, you've got Chris North." I said, "Fantastic. Let's reach out to Chris and let's

1	have a conversation." So it was a little bit
2	circular. But we will put that list together of
3	different items and share it with you guys. But I
4	understand the committee is also a public meeting.
5	When is that next meeting?
6	MR. NORTH: So our next meeting is at the end
7	of the month, it's I'll look at my calendar now.
8	I just I'm just putting the agenda together now,
9	actually, so.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Great.
11	MR. NORTH: It's going to be August 26th, 4:30,
12	in the Supervisor's conference room.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Wonderful. Perfect. Well, we
14	will get that list together and share it based upon
15	the conversation.
16	MR. NORTH: Yeah, because that's where the
17	direction goes from. The Town Board
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Uh-huh.
19	MR. NORTH: we make the recommendations
20	towards them and well, part of that conversation,
21	as Brian and Joe probably is to part of that
22	conversation, that item about manpower, we'll add
23	that conversation to part of the Village of
24	Greenport, basically, and give a detailed report to
25	the Town Board as Commissioners to come up with

1	recommendations.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Right.
3	MR. NORTH: So that the adequate overall for
4	the whole Town itself, basically not just the
5	Village, Southold, Orient, all the way out to
6	Mattituck and Laurel, basically, looking overall to
7	make sure everybody has the adequate safety for
8	their for the whole Town of Southold, basically.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, as you know, we're the
10	downtown of the whole North Fork, and we've just been
11	overrun by folks, and so we need some more help.
12	TRUSTEE PHILLIPS: Chris, if it's my
13	understanding it's budget, it's getting near budget
14	time in the Town of Southold, so now is the time to
15	bring a lot of these concerns from that committee to
16	the, to the Commissioners or to the Town Board.
17	MR. NORTH: Correct, because that's our
18	charge is we're an advisory to the Town Board as
19	Commissioners. The committee, that's the charge,
20	basically. We get the directions from the Town
21	Board, and we they give us a direction or a
22	concern they bring to us. We make them a
23	recommendation and they go forward, basically.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, we've got I mean, I'll
25	reiterate again publicly, as I have many times

1 MR. NORTH: Yeah. 2 MAYOR STUESSI: -- we have an amazing police I'm thrilled with the new Acting Chief 3 4 Grattan, who I've gotten to know really well over the last year and few months in office, because I worked 5 6 very closely with him and Chief Marty as well, but it 7 just comes down to manpower, and that's I know a big 8 issue for the Department. 9 You know, there was even an incident last night 10 on the water. I happened to be on a boat for the 11 first time in I don't know how many years, and the 12 boat who had an emergency situation made a call, and 13 it ended up being the Shelter Island Fire Department who came over and assisted them. And so just, 14 15 you know, things have changed a lot in the last five 16 years, let alone the last couple of decades. 17 MR. NORTH: Yeah. 18 MAYOR STUESSI: And got to support our police 19 force. 20 MR. NORTH: Look, as the committee person and 21 as the Chairman, at the end of the day, what I want 22 to make sure, that our Town stays safe, the Village of Greenport, Orient, all the way out to Laurel, 23 24 basically, and making sure our Police Department is

adequate with manpower, basically, making sure

25

1	everybody gets what they need, basically.
2	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah. And I think we've got to
3	fund more police officers, as I've shared.
4	Any other comments or questions from the Board?
5	I think we'll put this sort of list of items together
6	and share it with the Board, again, to give to you.
7	MR. NORTH: Yeah.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: And I'll look forward to
9	attending the meeting, and anybody else from the
10	community that wants to I think would be great.
11	MR. NORTH: The public is welcome, and just
12	bring your concerns, and we'll deliberate and come up
13	with a recommendation for the Town Board as
14	Commissioners.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Great. Thank you for your
16	service.
17	MR. NORTH: You're welcome.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Anybody else from the public?
19	No?
20	(No Response)
21	MAYOR STUESSI: All right. With that, I'll
22	make a motion to adjourn the meeting. May I have a
23	second?
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Second.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
