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2	MAYOR STUESSI: I'd like to
3	make a motion to open the Board of
4	Trustees Work Session for
5	April 17th. May I have a second?
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Second.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
8	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Aye.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Aye.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Aye.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Please stand
14	for the pledge of allegiance.
15	(Whereupon the Pledge of
16	Allegiance was recited.)
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Please be
18	seated.
19	No Franky?
20	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Not right
21	now, but he'll be here soon.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm concerned
23	about your dog not getting enough
24	walks.
25	AUDIENCE MEMBER: He'll be
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1	
2	here soon.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: First up on
4	the agenda, our Chief.
5	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Thank
6	you.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you,
8	sir.
9	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Thank
10	you, Mayor. Thank you, Village
11	Board. Well, it's another year.
12	I'd like to congratulate our
13	elections that were taking place
14	on April 3rd. They voted me back
15	in final year as the head chief
16	for the last year and First
17	Assistant Chief is now Wayne
18	Miller and Second Assistant Chief
19	is David Nyce and we're very proud
20	with our chiefs line doing a
21	fantastic job, and as well as the
22	Village and the whole Village Board.
23	Nothing else to report except
24	for I just got the Village liaison
25	just notified me about the boat
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2	and it is what it is. And as far
3	as anything goes, we had an
4	Organizational Meeting that a took
5	place two days ago and basically
6	it's just committees. It was just
7	paperwork on our end. And no
8	applications for membership, but
9	the Greenport Fire Department is
10	looking forward to the Recruit New
11	York Project. I believe we're
12	like the second the second
13	department that's taking advantage
14	of this program and hopefully we
15	do very well with this.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: So what are
17	the dates on that again?
18	CHIEF DE KERILLIS:
19	April 26th and the 27th.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: At Mitchell
21	Park.
22	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: At
23	Mitchell Park, yep. So we're
24	looking forward.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Please share
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2	with the crowd what you're doing
3	with the 27,000 light bulbs that
4	arrived at Village Hall the other
5	day.
6	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yeah,
7	that's Dave's problem.
8	(Laughter.)
9	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: We're
10	going to delegate that, but aside
11	from that, that's about it for
12	this report.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
14	Chief, there's a couple of other
15	things.
16	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yep.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
18	first of all, the Board of Wardens
19	have passed a resolution that they
20	would like the Village to make
21	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yes.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
23	the whole area around the
24	firehouse smoke free and signage
25	be posted. I do believe we have
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2	to change it somewhere in the
3	code. They would like to have no
4	smoking. I do know that Suffolk
5	County, I think, is 50 feet.
6	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: In both
7	firehouses.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: In
9	both, Station 1 and Station 2.
10	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yes.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: The
12	other thing is just to
13	MAYOR STUESSI: So I'm sorry,
14	they want to extend it beyond
15	50 feet? So whatever is between
16	50 feet
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: They
18	want to make it the whole
19	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: The whole
20	property.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
22	the whole property smoke free.
23	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yes.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: They
25	also in the parking lot itself,
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2	the parking lot is really for the
3	fire department's members to rush
4	into when they get an alarm, but
5	at night they're starting to find
6	more vehicles being parked there
7	that shouldn't be.
8	So they're looking for either
9	signage or we need and I think
10	we need to change something in the
11	code to say that it's fireman
12	first or there's no parking after
13	such and such a time, so that any
14	vehicles that are parked there can
15	be towed, so we don't run into a
16	situation that we ran into a
17	couple weeks ago.
18	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yes.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
20	then to update everybody on the
21	boat conversation, Treasure
22	Brautigam and I had a conversation
23	DASNY, which is the agency that
24	deals with the application for the
25	fire rescue boat. The application
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2	is in. It's complete. They have
3	assigned what they call a closer
4	or a processer for it. But we did
5	find out today that we cannot do
6	any contradicting of the boat
7	until after we receive the
8	contract from the State and the
9	Village signs the contract because
10	that will constitute us purchasing
11	the boat before the grant's been
12	approved. So they assured us,
13	what, four to five weeks?
14	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
15	Four to six I belive.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Four
17	to six, but I kind of got the
18	impression, where they assigned a
19	closer to us right away at the
20	meeting, that they're planning on
21	pushing it down the road.
22	I also understand and there's
23	another application that's there
24	that I'll talk about later on in
25	the meeting, but I just wanted to
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2	make sure that the chiefs would be
3	able to get out to the membership
4	with I will write an e-mail to
5	the Marine Rescue Squad.
6	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Are we
7	waiting for the Ways and Means to
8	coordinate with them?
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: No,
10	no. No, this is DASNY is the
11	department that goes through and
12	reviews the application, comes
13	back and says, well, we need this,
14	a little more information,
15	whatever. They seem to once
16	they review the packet, today I
17	said and I think Treasure
18	Brautigam will agree with me, that
19	they had all the paperwork that
20	they needed. They were pleased
21	with what they had.
22	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
24	that it's going to move forward.
25	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Alright,
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2	so that's four to six weeks?
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
4	Sometime within four to six, but I
5	kind of just got the impression
6	that it might be sooner. I'm
7	keeping my fingers crossed.
8	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Okay.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
10	Because I do believe that the
11	Mayor did ask a question about
12	aluminum and tariffs today in an
13	e-mail?
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes. As
15	everybody is aware, there are
16	tariffs and if Munson is sourcing
17	their aluminum
18	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: I read
19	that e-mail.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: from
21	outside the country, that's a
22	separate issue. So Village
23	counsel is reviewing the bid.
24	We'll reach out to the boat
25	builder and see if there's an issue.
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2	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: All
3	right. Thank you very much.
4	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
5	Can I can a recruitment-related
6	question?
7	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Sure.
8	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
9	Just to clarify, is there a
10	residency requirement that people
11	live within Southold Town and
12	Shelter Island to be on the
13	Greenport like if you work in
14	Greenport, but you live
15	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: If you
16	work in Greenport in the Village
17	eight hours a day, you're
18	qualified to be a member of the
19	Greenport Fire Department.
20	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
21	No matter where you live?
22	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: No matter
23	where you live. But if you do not
24	follow in that regime, you may
25	live in East Marion or Southold,
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2	one district east or west.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
4	the bylaws that's the topic that
5	you needed to bring up that was
6	the hie by law change.
7	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yes, the
8	bylaw change the Board of Wardens
9	did approve to remove the language
10	that stated
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
12	remove wait, it was to remove
13	the language that said had to be a
14	United States citizen to now has
15	to be a resident of the Village of
16	Greenport, the East West Fire
17	District, and what was the
18	other either East Marion Fire
19	Department or Southold Fire
20	Department, but and looking at
21	the bylaws, Shelter Island is
22	shelter also. So I'm not sure if
23	that's still true or not.
24	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: According
25	to New York State law.
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2	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Right.
3	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: And what
4	that law because we have to
5	listen to that law.
6	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Right, okay. But
7	that's been corrected so that
8	if anyone noticed a couple of
9	months a couple of weeks ago
10	there was two fire departments up
11	west that received fines because
12	they're bylaws were not were
13	not correct.
14	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: So we're
15	using the same applications that I
16	joined in 33 years ago.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Right.
18	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: The
19	language is not up to the fire
20	department to decide. It's up to
21	between the Village to conform
22	with the New York State guidelines
23	as far as warring goes.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
25	now that was my next question.
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2	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yeah.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Do we
4	have to bring those to the Board
5	to approve?
6	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yep, that
7	has to be
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: That's
9	alright, then
10	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yeah,
11	because this is something that we
12	just can't duplicate or do a PDF.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR STUESSI: I'll
14	take care of it.
15	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: It's
16	going to have to go to the Village
17	Board.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, I had
19	sent you an e-mail requesting that
20	you get their bylaws
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
22	have the bylaws.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: to provide
24	counsel. Counsel should be
25	reviewing them.
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2	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Yeah.
3	We're using the same application,
4	like I said, for three decades.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
6	Second Chief Nyce had already
7	discussed some of it, Brian, way
8	back when when we were first
9	discussing it. And I think Brian
10	did give him the language. So
11	I'll find that e-mail
12	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: Okay.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
14	and hopefully we can maybe get it
15	on the agenda for next week.
16	CHIEF DE KERILLIS: But in
17	the short note, the Board of
18	Wardens did approve to conform
19	with the New York State legislature.

18	Like is it wine and beer or it's a
19	full liquor license.
20	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: So
21	the license they're applying for
22	is liquor, wine, and beer. So on
23	premises liquor.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Where does it
25	say for
	Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107

2	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It
3	says hotel requires full on
4	premise restaurant open to public.
5	MS. KUCOK: No, there is no
6	alcohol in the public, only the
7	room because there's like mini
8	bar. So we put like
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Mary Bess,
10	let's let Brian
11	MS. KUCOK: some water and
12	some little alcohol like customer
13	can take it. Not only alcohol.
14	Just some water and like orange
15	juice, that kind of stuff. Not
16	just alcohol, but I promise there
17	is no alcohol in the public area
18	at the hotel. I promise that.
19	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
20	What sorry.
21	MS. KUCOK: Because I manage
22	the hotel. I'm the manager of the
23	hotel.
24	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: So
25	what would be the form that an

2	applicant for an SLA license sends
3	to a municipality, is just a
4	30-day notice form. There's very
5	little information. It's usually
6	a two-page document, identifies
7	the type of license. Basically
8	you fill in the blanks on the
9	form.
10	So in a situation like this
11	where there are multiple it
12	sounds like there are multiple
13	service points, it would probably
14	be helpful if the Board had a
15	plan, a copy of the plan, so you
16	can see what is being discussed
17	and what's being proposed.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, that
19	would be in the longer application.
20	It would show
21	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Right.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: where the
23	alcohol is being served, where
24	it's being stored
25	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Correct.

3	it's being used for.

10	sense to keep this open until next
11	week and get the larger application.
12	Any thoughts from the Board or
13	questions?

15	Yeah, but we could also I mean,
16	what they're asking is for is like
17	a recommendation from us. So
18	couldn't we say, like, we don't
19	have any problem with this
20	application, but just as long as

24	think we could also just specify
25	what it is.

3	application doesn't give a box to
4	check for that application.

12	clarify for the public because
13	this is an opportunity for the

20	the room. Because there's like
21	there is like a frig. Like so we
22	are going to we are not just
23	going to put like alcohol. We are
24	going to put some water, like
25	orange juice, and other stuff, not

2	Next up I'd like to welcome
3	Janice Claudio, chair of the
4	Greenport Historic Preservation.
5	MS. CLAUDIO: Hi.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Hello.
7	MS. CLAUDIO: We're very glad
8	to be here tonight. We want to
9	talk
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Would you
11	mind stating your name and address
12	for the record.
13	MS. CLAUDIO: Yes. So Janice
14	Claudio, 624 1st Street.
15	MS. WALTON: Francis Walton,
16	171 Central Avenue.
17	MS. CLAUDIO: So I am the
18	chair of Historic Preservation
19	Commission, Frances is a Board
20	member, and we are here to discuss
21	the March 20th Resolution that we
22	passed, which is to begin public
23	outreach for the idea of expanding
24	the local Historic District to
25	Village boundaries.
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1	
2	So just to recap a little bit
3	what we're what that means
4	exactly is that all of Greenport
5	would be a local Historic
6	District. All structures,
7	commercial and residential, would
8	be in that district. It would be
9	clean, easy to understand. You
10	live, you own businesses in
11	Greenport, you are a member of the
12	local Historic District.
13	So we would be coming to you at
14	some point in time to with a
15	resolution that Brian would write
16	that would extend our boundaries
17	to the Village boundaries. That
18	is the goal. That is what we're
19	exploring.
20	Should I talk about that more?
21	Is that kind of clear what we're
22	proposing?
23	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: (Nodding.)
24	MS. CLAUDIO: Okay. So in
25	looking at the outreach that we
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1	
2	began in March, March 20th, we
3	initially sent e-mails to about 40
4	people within Greenport Village.
5	We sent one to each of you with
6	our resolution, the brochure that
7	I hope everyone has seen at this
8	point in time, and our schedule of
9	question and answer seminars at
10	the library.
11	We did that to you, the
12	trustees, to real estate agents
13	that live within Greenport Village
14	that we could identify. I hope we
15	got everybody. We did the Rotary,
16	the BID, the Civic Association
17	influencers. And the comments
18	there were surprisingly
19	everybody just kind of accepted it
20	or there was very little
21	feedback from that particular
22	process. We did get some feedback
23	which I'll address at the end.
24	I'll tell you the things we did
25	and then we'll talk about the
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1 2 feedback. 3 So we have made two of three 4 library presentations in the community room in the basement of 5 6 the library. The library sent out 7 240 e-mails talking about the 8 dates, the times for this. The 9 BID used their mailing list to 10 help us on that as well. And so 11 we feel we got the word out as 12 well as we could on these 13 seminars, these Q and A's. And we 14 have one more to be held and 15 that's on May 10th at 3:00, a 16 Saturday. 17 We recorded that session. It is 18 part -- you can find it on the 19 library website and it's also on 20 Facebook. We've made a 21 presentation to the BID. We have 22 a newspaper article in today's 23 Suffolk Times that addresses the 24 topic and it's our collective 25 voice to try to explain clearly to -Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107 -

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2	the public what the goals are,
3	what the process is, the benefits
4	of the process. We also have a
5	statement stuffer in the utility
6	bills and they roll out weekly.
7	So it will take a full month for
8	the district to be the Village
9	of Greenport to be covered. And
10	if we run out of brochures, we're
11	not going to be sending them to
12	the existing Historic District, so
13	if you don't get one, that's
14	probably why. And can I ask you,
15	Adam, how we're doing on that?
16	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
17	Pretty well. I belive we've
18	covered three of the four sectors.
19	MS. CLAUDIO: Three of four.
20	So we spoke with the Civic
21	Association. We don't really have
22	a plan developed there to take it
23	further. We are a little bit out
24	of ideas on our public outreach
25	other than our one seminar coming
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2	up that remains.
3	I want to tell you that we are
4	carefully trying to understand how
5	to make this to everybody's
6	well, we know it's to everybody's
7	benefit, but stumbling blocks have
8	come up that there are
9	considerations that color, for
10	instance, is something that people
11	would prefer to not have as an
12	item within the Historic
13	Preservation in Chapter 76.
14	So we have done a lot of
15	research on that, actually months
16	of research. And we have learned
17	that Southold Town does not have
18	color restrictions. We have
19	learned that Southampton Town does
20	not color restrictions. And we
21	have learned that certified local
22	governments, our Fran Stern, who
23	is a real resource for us, has
24	said that their recommendation is
25	to not include color as one of the
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2	HPC's reviews. So we, today at
3	our meeting an hour ago, voted to
4	begin the process of procedurally
5	eliminating color consideration
6	from the COA process. So we're
7	going to investigate that further
8	and do what is necessary to have
9	that eliminated from the HPC
10	oversight.
11	We are looking to streamline the
12	application process by considering
13	major and minor applications, and
14	this is a work in progress. The
15	concept being that some
16	applications are pretty clearcut
17	and do not need to have an
18	applicant come before the Board
19	unless the applicant wanted to
20	come. But that the Board to
21	review and understand the
22	application enough to approve or
23	have further questions in the
24	minor category. So we think that
25	would streamline it for a lot of
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2	applications, a lot of people.
3	And it's one of Francis's project,
4	so
5	MS. WALTON: Just I think
6	this is an effort to make the
7	process less daunting for the
8	applicants and also to make our
9	process more efficient. So we're
10	trying and we, with these sort
11	of buckets, the concept of having
12	major or significant application
13	versus a less significant or more
14	minor application, we looked at
15	this month's agenda to determine
16	whether or not that would, you
17	know, potentially streamline. And
18	I think we need to sort of apply
19	that same thinking to future
20	agendas and see whether it will
21	actually accomplish something and
22	make sense.
23	Another concept that we're
24	looking at is a concept that I've
25	used in prior jobs where there's a
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2	consent calendar, items that
3	aren't controversial, don't
4	require questions, are straight
5	forward, could be listed on what I
6	would call a consent calendar and
7	they would get voted on as one
8	group, as opposed to requiring the
9	applicant to come before the Board
10	and talk about the project.
11	Again, this may or may not work,
12	but the concept would be to
13	streamline the meeting process and
14	also make it less cumbersome for
15	the applicants.
16	MS. CLAUDIO: And our last
17	thought in this process is to have
18	a relationship with a historic
19	expert for a period of time, maybe
20	one year, to try the idea out that
21	opinions could be asked of this
22	individual on a specific application,
23	obviously a major application, and
24	the Board would hear it and go
25	from there.
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2	The Board continues, we're the
3	only voting part of an
4	application. But we think all
5	these things, these three ideas,
6	are pretty significant in making
7	our process more user friendly and
8	we hope to put them in place. So
9	I'd like to hear your thoughts.
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, first,
11	I want to thank you for all the
12	effort with this. The whole Board
13	has put in a tremendous amount and
14	you in particular when you stepped
15	up to take the chairmanship roll.
16	So thank you for that.
17	And I know there's been a lot of
18	feedback from the community, which
19	has been wonderful. People are
20	talking about preservation, and
21	there's also a lot of confusion.
22	There's a perception by many
23	people that either the building
24	department or the Planning Board
25	is arbitrating on taste and
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2	historic character, which is
3	obviously not the case. And so
4	these meetings have been helpful
5	to clarify that with people. I'll
6	turn it over to the Board. Lily?
7	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
8	was going to ask about workload
9	for the Board, but it sounds like
10	those three things kind of are
11	what you're think about too.
12	MS. CLAUDIO: So if we are
13	successful in this, there will be
14	809 additional properties within
15	the district. We have, it's 2
16	hold on, I did the math. It's 291
17	currently, so it's about, it's a
18	little shy of three times turn.
19	So we you know, there are
20	options. You can meet bimonthly.
21	You can extend the meeting from an
22	hour. You could streamline the
23	process. And we'll do what it
24	takes. We have to figure out what
25	it is that's needed and then
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2	answer it the best way we can.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
4	Thinking about your outreach,
5	would it be helpful to put your
6	brochure on the website? I'm
7	looking at Candace because she's
8	in charge. Just so it's there and
9	then like it's shareable that way.
10	MS. CLAUDIO: Absolutely. If
11	the keeper of the website thinks
12	that's a good idea.
13	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I
14	believe HPC has their own page, so
15	I guess I can facilitate in making
16	that happen and at adding it to
17	your page that already exists on
18	the website.
19	MS. CLAUDIO: I'll be down
20	tomorrow.
21	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: We have
22	a half day, so probably closing at
23	noon.
24	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
25	also you were going to talk
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2	about some of the feedback you've
3	gotten.
4	MS. CLAUDIO: I think the
5	feedback is again, I don't
6	think there's enough information
7	out there. And that's why I
8	really feel that this article in
9	the paper is a home run for the
10	Village for us and this idea. It
11	states the facts, and I'm not much
12	of a social media person. I'm
13	only on one website, you know,
14	looking through comments because I
15	want to see what people are
16	thinking. And those comments, to
17	the best of our ability, are
18	addressed in this article.
19	The fear, I think, is that
20	there's overreach. And that is
21	it's not our intention. It's
22	certainly a understandable fear
23	when something new, something
24	government comes along. The COA
25	process is a very simple, two-page
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2	application with our two-page
3	checklist to it. It's we, as
4	you know, we meet monthly. We
5	decide at those meetings. It's
6	very open. It's very clear. So
7	in exchange for that process,
8	which could be two weeks if you
9	got it in two weeks, but we say
10	30 days. I mean, that's the
11	stated typical timeframe. For the
12	tradeoff of 30 days, you get a
13	safety belt on the compatibility
14	of new structures, renovations,
15	preserving our maritime culture in
16	our streets, which is what we're
17	trying to do.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, I know
19	demolition was a big concern with
20	a number of people.
21	MS. CLAUDIO: Yes. I usually
22	go on about demolition. So
23	demolition we, the HPC, issues
24	those certificates as well and,
25	you know, without it the historic
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2	barns, houses, they can be taken
3	down. So it's a protection there
4	as well as with new construction
5	and new renovation.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Patrick?
7	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Janice,
8	Frances, I commend you both for
9	the efforts on the communication
10	and the outreach because it's been
11	excellent. In your personal
12	presentation, the newspaper
13	article was very clear and these
14	multiple community sessions that
15	you're putting together are smart.
16	Whether this initiative succeeds
17	is going to be largely impacted by
18	the groundwork you're doing now.
19	So thank you for doing that. And
20	I just would look forward to
21	hearing more of what the feedback
22	is when you're kind of wrapping
23	this initial phase up. So you can
24	discuss it and see if there's
25	things that can be done to
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2	mitigate or ameliorate. I think
3	the idea of trying to streamline
4	part of the current process is
5	really key.
6	MS. CLAUDIO: I think
7	eliminating color might be very
8	significant.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah. So
10	there's a lot of frustration in
11	the community about things that go
12	through Village Hall. So we don't
13	want to add to that problem. We
14	want to make people feel
15	comfortable that it's not going to
16	be too much of an obstacle. But
17	you effort is also it dovetails
18	with our Village staff and
19	organization. So the Village
20	needs to do work as well in order
21	to accommodate this extra this
22	expansion of your purview. So
23	there's work be done on the
24	Village end. When I say the
25	Village, I mean our end.
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2	MS. CLAUDIO: Thank you. I
3	haven't thought that through.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Julia?
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I appreciate
6	all the work you've done.
7	Obviously, Jan, you've worked very
8	hard at this, Frances. And I
9	haven't been to any of the
10	meetings. I have yet to read the
11	article in the times today. I'm
12	sorry I didn't have time to do
13	that.
14	I am going to continue to listen
15	on this. As I builder, I do have
16	concerns about replacement of
17	things. In other words, if you're
18	replacing parts of a building,
19	siding, roof, whatever, are we
20	talking in kind or because there
21	are a lot of new building
22	materials look like, but aren't,
23	you know?
24	MS. CLAUDIO: Yes, agreed.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: And I wanted
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2	to know if you have looked at that
3	yet, if that's included in this
4	analysis that you're doing?
5	MS. CLAUDIO: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So I'm
7	watching and waiting really. I'm
8	not 100 percent sold.
9	MS. CLAUDIO: Yes, we do
10	think that. The historic world
11	thinks that and there are in
12	fact, there's a seminar coming up
13	that we have signed up for. But
14	Hardie Plank we understand
15	this. We all want it. It's, you
16	know, it's maybe asbestos shingle
17	and vinyl will not make the list,
18	but there is a list on the website
19	that gives you recommendations as
20	to materials and new materials are
21	part of the day. I mean, you
22	know, we love old windows, but
23	drafty, old windows don't make
24	sense and, you know, you want an
25	Anderson 400 window in its place,
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2	we get it.
3	MS. WALTON: And that's
4	already part of what we do.
5	MS. CLAUDIO: Of what we do,
6	yeah.
7	MS. WALTON: of what we do.
8	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay, that's
9	good. I really appreciate hearing
10	that. You know, I'm going to
11	review a little bit more,
12	obviously. We'll have more
13	questions for you.
14	MS. CLAUDIO: I think it's in
15	this article, but it bears saying
16	again that the HPC reviews what's
17	presented in the application. So
18	if you're presenting an
19	application that's looking at an
20	awning on the side of your house,
21	we are not or are not able to say
22	to you, you're front stoop is not
23	historically accurate or it needs
24	work. The HPC reviews the
25	application that is in front of
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2	it, you know, and the building
3	materials are typical. They're
4	not national standard materials.
5	Now if for the existing
6	district. I don't want to confuse
7	this because it's apples and
8	oranges. In the existing
9	district, if you are going for the
10	tax credits, those materials are
11	up to the national standards,
12	which I've seen, but I haven't
13	gone through an applicant yet, so
14	I don't actually know the process
15	that well. But they're not
16	they're not crazy materials, but
17	you get the tax credit.
18	MS. WALTON: But I think it's
19	an important point that probably
20	not everyone understands is that
21	if you come to the commission
22	for to replace a window, we
23	can't then say oh, and by the way,
24	we don't like the way something
25	else looks on some other part of
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1	
2	your house and require you to do
3	something about it. So it's
4	limited to the work that's in the
5	application.
6	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Okay.
7	MS. CLAUDIO: That's one of
8	the issues on the social media.
9	That's why it's specifically
10	many of the issues addressed in
11	there, why are we doing this now?
12	We're doing it because property
13	values are very much higher and
14	you see resources, old residences
15	particularly, being taken down and
16	newer properties put up, fast,
17	easy, sold. They're flipped and
18	it's just we're losing some of our
19	old resources. We want to protect
20	that. We think that the Village
21	is heavily built out with 1,100
22	structures in its 1.2 square
23	miles, so every structure effects
24	the neighbor. You can't be alone
25	in the Village. We're all one
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2	we're a fabric. We go together.
3	So it makes crystal clear sense
4	to put this blanket on the Village
5	and do it all. It's not a hard
6	thing, the COA process. It's a
7	simple thing. Maybe it won't
8	solve everything. It's a
9	seatbelt. I mean, it's not going
10	to survive a big car crash, but
11	it's going to get us some further
12	protection, some further voice,
13	some further review, some ability
14	input into these plans that folks
15	might have.
16	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I've looked
17	at the real estate transfers
18	today. You know, obviously, I
19	mean, everything in the Village is
20	exorbitantly high right now. I'm
21	just concerned, could this be
22	considered inflationary at all?
23	MS. CLAUDIO: So properties
24	within I don't know about
25	inflationary, but properties in
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2	Historic Districts tend to hold
3	their value when compared to a
4	similar property not in a Historic
5	District and they tend to increase
6	more than the compliment property
7	not in an Historic District.
8	Now there's reasons for that in
9	that the aesthetic or the
10	streetscape is preserved,
11	enhanced. You know, there's
12	benefits to the community,
13	obviously, in the compatibility of
14	the structures. And
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Many of us
16	moved here because of the historic
17	character of the Village.
18	MS. CLAUDIO: And stayed here.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, and
20	what's frightening is seeing some
21	of these get torn down and things
22	get built that
23	MS. CLAUDIO: We came and we
24	stayed. So, you know, you come to
25	the Village now, you stay in the
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2	Village, you're part of the
3	Historic District. It's simple.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Mary Bess?
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
6	commend both of you because the
7	information gathering has an
8	important component. I'd like to
9	go back and ask a question about
10	the expert or the additional
11	resource that you're looking for.
12	Are you looking for someone from
13	the Office of Park and Recreation
14	and Historic to be an aide in this
15	process or are you looking for an
16	application toward some of the
17	grant opportunities that will be
18	coming around from what I'm
19	reading on that website. Towards
20	years past we got a grant to do
21	the overall
22	MS. CLAUDIO: Survey.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Steve
24	Bull (phonetic) did something
25	where we have that document to go
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2	by, and I'm just wondering if that
3	is something that you're looking
4	for for assistance.
5	MS. CLAUDIO: So the idea
6	here was that by bringing in an
7	expert on historic matters, it is
8	a person I think it would be
9	always a person from Southold
10	Town. You know, we're somewhat of
11	a small pool of talent. And
12	having an architect or an expert
13	from the wider population base to
14	just I think we really want to
15	very carefully show expertise and
16	reason why we say the things we do
17	and that expert just lends
18	additional credibility. It's a
19	thought. It's just, it's
20	something in dealing with this
21	bigger population, this 809
22	additional properties that we're
23	bringing into it, to just add
24	honestly credibility to the Board,
25	which I think, you know, we're a
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2	good Board, but
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	Are you looking for that member to
5	be an advisory member to
6	MS. CLAUDIO: Advisory.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: the
8	current Historic Board now?
9	MS. CLAUDIO: Yes.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Or
11	are you looking for a person to
12	actually help you from the
13	Department of Parks and Recreation
14	and Historic, similar to what we
15	have in the Department of State
16	with the LWRP? Is that what your
17	you know, are you looking for
18	both?
19	MS. CLAUDIO: So just as part
20	of this process, we have reached
21	out to the State people and have
22	the developed relationships with
23	Fran Stern and with Jeff Iovannone
24	and they're great. I mean, but
25	they are a resource to us and
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1	
2	those relationships are ongoing.
3	I mean, there's frequent
4	communication as we develop this.
5	And I think important to know is
6	that when Brian writes this
7	resolution that the HPC will vote
8	on, before that happens, before it
9	comes to the HPC, it needs to be
10	sent to the Certified Local
11	Government.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Right.
13	MS. CLAUDIO: So that it's
14	reviewed because we don't want to
15	lose that.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: That's
17	why I'm asking.
18	MS. CLAUDIO: Yeah, and
19	that's Fran Stern. She knows.
20	She knows we're doing this.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
22	MS. CLAUDIO: She is
23	providing guidance. She is
24	she's really wonderful in the
25	educational sense. I know she
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1	
2	all those things are happening,
3	but they're separate from this I
4	think. Well, they're not, but.
5	MS. WALTON: Right. I think
6	ultimately it may help us down the
7	road, but I this in the near term,
8	the thought is having that
9	additional expertise will give
10	members of the public comfort
11	that, you know, that we have that
12	advisory assistance.
13	MS. CLAUDIO: Professional.
14	MS. WALTON: And professional
15	assistance so that any decisions
16	are made, you know, are not
17	arbitrary or personal taste.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
19	that's why I'm asking which level
20	you're going at, okay?
21	MS. WALTON: Yeah. We're at
22	least starting with trying to make
23	sure that people have confidence
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
25	MS. WALTON: that there's
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2	a professional level of expertise
3	and advisory service.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
5	all right. Okay, thank you. As I
6	said, it's a great amount of work.
7	MS. CLAUDIO: It has been.
8	So, you know, how this process
9	roles out is somewhat, it's
10	your you the elected officials
11	are the decision makers on this.
12	You know, we can only do so much
13	in getting the word out, answering
14	questions, developing the plan,
15	trying to bring it along, but at
16	some point and I don't know, is
17	it too early next month to have
18	the HPC take a look at a
19	resolution assuming that, A, it
20	can be written and, B, it can be
21	reviewed and accepted by the
22	Certified Local Government Board?
23	Is that something that you would
24	be willing to see or can you
25	suggest additional ideas for us to
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2	do?
3	MAYOR STUESSI: I think
4	you're doing a great job with
5	public engagement and the more you
6	can do on that, the better it will
7	be for us because when we vote, we
8	will only be voting after we've
9	held our own public hearings on
10	it, so it's going to be important
11	for us to hear the public say
12	whether they're in favor of it or
13	any concerns people have.
14	MS. CLAUDIO: Any further
15	ideas on public outreach that we
16	can initiate or undertake? Have
17	we are we doing enough? Is
18	there more do?
19	MAYOR STUESSI: You can
20	always do more.
21	MS. CLAUDIO: But what?
22	MS. WALTON: Continue having
23	conversations?
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, and
25	Candace can get the brochure up on
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2	the website with batch four of the
3	zone four of the electrical
4	mailers and it's going to go there
5	and the more you do with continued
6	public engagement? Any other
7	thoughts from anybody on the
8	Board?
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Well, I
10	think the article might drive some
11	turnout to you next information
12	session, so that's good timing.
13	MS. CLAUDIO: Right.
14	MS. WALTON: As well as the
15	flyers.
16	MS. CLAUDIO: The flyers
17	should be fully dropped here
18	pretty soon.
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
20	Even flyers and brochures like
21	places around town.
22	MS. CLAUDIO: They are. I
23	mean, well
24	MS. WALTON: We
25	MS. CLAUDIO: They're not
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1	
2	super saturated, but they're in
3	the library and I have some. We
4	can distribute them now.
5	MS. WALTON: The studio.
6	They're in various places around
7	town.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Great. Well,
9	thank you both for being here this
10	evening.
11	MS. CLAUDIO: Thank you.
12	MS. WALTON: Thank you.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Thank
14	you.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Next up we
16	have the Greenport Skate Park with
17	Rena and Kim. Thank you. Welcome.
18	MS. WILHELM: Rena Wilhelm
19	129 Sterling Avenue.
20	MS. LOPER: Kim Loper 120
21	Main Street.
22	MS. WILHELM: I've thrown a
23	lot at you. So I think there's
24	like sort of requests on the
25	books. So I figured I'll start
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2	with the simplest one, which is
3	National Ghost Skateboarding Day,
4	which is always held on June 21st.
5	This year it happens to fall on a
6	Saturday. In recent years we've
7	when it hasn't fallen on a
8	Saturday we've done it sort of
9	after work, after school from like
10	5:00 to 8:00. This year because
11	it's on a Saturday we wanted to
12	make it a little bit more special.
13	We already have skate lessons
14	scheduled for that morning from
15	10:00 to 12:00 so from 12:00 to
16	4:00, we wanted to kind of give
17	the event a little bit more oomph.
18	By no means are we talking a
19	festival. Typically the permit
20	application is for 50 or more
21	people. We'll be lucky if we get
22	50 people to show-up for this
23	event. So it's not a matter of
24	size. Every year we always get a
25	DJ.

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2	Most of the event is basically
3	contained within the park. It's
4	not going to extend outside the
5	park. Based on marketing efforts
6	and what kind of feedback, if we
7	get think there's going to be more
8	than 50 people coming, it's
9	possible we would invite a food
10	truck to come, a single food
11	truck. But that's it. It's a
12	very contained event. We have it
13	every year and that's it on that.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Before you go
15	on, are there any questions from
16	the Board on this? This is a
17	public assembly application we're
18	voting on next week?
19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah. Can
20	you just I may have missed it,
21	the day and time of your event?
22	MS. WILHELM: It's Saturday,
23	June 21st from 12:00 to 4:00.
24	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
25	MS. WILHELM: And even the DJ
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2	is within fenced in area. We do
3	that every year.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: This is the
5	one Mary Bess, I know you were
6	concerned about
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: With
8	graduation weekend, yeah.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: graduation,
10	yeah.
11	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
12	VILLAGE CLERK HALL:
13	Greenport graduation.
14	MS. WILHELM: I never even do
15	a parking plan for this event.
16	There's no stage. There's no
17	band. It's really drips and drabs
18	of kids come throughout the day
19	with their boards. So it's not
20	not like Sound and Skate Festival.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: No,
22	it's just that it's Saturday.
23	It's high school graduation in all
24	three schools; Greenport, Southold
25	and Mattituck/Cutchogue.
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2	MS. WILHELM: Right.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
4	Greenport's from 10:00 to 11:00.
5	I believe Southold's is from 12:00
6	to 2:00 I think.
7	MS. WILHELM: Right.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
9	Mattituck's is from 11:00 to 1:00
10	or something like that.
11	MS. WILHELM: Okay.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: That
13	was my concern.
14	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: There's
15	a parade also.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It's
17	the high school parade in the
18	morning.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: So obviously
20	the Skate Park is off of Moores
21	Lane.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah,
23	it was just a concern.
24	MS. WILHELM: For sure. If
25	it was a festival, I would say we
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2	might have some traffic jams, but
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Having been,
4	I think it's a great event. It's
5	wonderful for the community.
6	MS. WILHELM: Okay.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: You guys are
8	really building a great network
9	and these lessons, especially for
10	some of the younger kids too that'
11	I've heard from a
12	MS. WILHELM: And older.
13	I've gotten on a skateboard myself.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: I heard.
15	MS. WILHELM: I'm going pro.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Wear your helmet.
17	MS. WILHELM: Everything.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: Julia, any
19	questions or concerns on the
20	application?
21	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, it's
22	fine for me.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
24	MS. WILHELM: Okay. The
25	second one was a sort of request.
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2	As you may have heard, we've,
3	thankfully, gotten a lot of press
4	regarding a skate park builder who
5	owns a construction company with
6	his father. He's a cement
7	contractor and he builds parks in
8	his spare time. And he approached
9	us. He wants to help build our
10	park, specifically phase one,
11	which is roughly half the park and
12	we almost have the capital to move
13	forward.
14	When we were talking at our
15	board meeting that he attended, he
16	asked if it was possible, before
17	he designs the park currently
18	we're working within the confines
19	of the current footprint. What
20	would make, in his professional
21	opinion as a skater as well, is
22	that it would be a little bit more
23	dynamic if he was able to add some
24	kinds of fixtures that would
25	extend maybe five feet north and

1	
2	five feet east of the current
3	footprint.
4	It's not a make or break it.
5	It's just that if we do have that
6	extra square footage, we can
7	deliver something in phase one
8	that's a little bit more dynamic.
9	And based on I'm learning all
10	this skateboarding and the
11	flow, it's not essential, but it's
12	preferred to be able to skate
13	be able to turn around and skate
14	back almost like on a loop.
15	And the way the park currently
16	is and the fixtures that we have
17	to work around, there's a lot of
18	stopping and starting, stopping
19	and starting, just fixtures sort
20	of on their own. He would like to
21	be able to create something that
22	is more conducive to true skateboarding.
23	So if it's possible to have him
24	perhaps design something with the
25	current footprint and design
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2	something with the additional
3	square footage and then perhaps
4	present it to you to see if it has
5	any kind of impact on the area.
6	The only thing and I believe
7	I put this in when I proposed it
8	via e-mail is that currently
9	there's a sprinkler head and,
10	Kevin, I had pointed that out
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
12	MS. WILHELM: at one of
13	our events that's literally next
14	to the actual cement. So when it
15	goes on, it is literally spraying
16	all over one of our fixtures,
17	which is not safe for the kids to
18	skate on something that is wet and
19	it's metal. So I think that needs
20	to be relocated anyway. I'm not
21	sure if extending five feet north
22	would have that much impact on one
23	of the trees that is currently
24	there. If it did, he would take
25	on the responsibility of
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2	relocating that tree somewhere.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
4	That's one of the newly planted?
5	MS. WILHELM: Newly planted,
6	yeah, so it's not
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, it's an
8	easily replanted tree. From my
9	perspective knowing the area
10	really well and in the skate park
11	and everything that's done there,
12	not that I ever skated in concrete
13	parks, but my youngers daughter is
14	a good skater, it makes a lot of
15	sense to me.
16	I'm very agreeable to considering
17	an extra five feet in each
18	direction and reviewing that up
19	against the existing plan. I'd be
20	curious about other Board members'
21	perspective. I think it's worth
22	taking a look at if that's what
23	the expert's recommending.
24	MS. WILHELM: Right.
25	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
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2	You're talking five feet east of
3	park itself? Because at some
4	point you wanted to like put a
5	little bit more a pavilion or
6	MS. WILHELM: A pavilion. So
7	it's almost what we had proposed
8	and presented is like a phase
9	three with like more of a yeah,
10	a pavilion.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: That's
12	outside of the scope of what your
13	talking about now.
14	MS. WILHELM: It's the same
15	space.
16	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
17	But so the actual park would be
18	five foot. So like the fence
19	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, five east
20	and five north, but not the whole
21	five north, just one little
22	section of the north. We're not
23	asking to expand five feet
24	additionally from the back of vert
25	ramp. It's just this one little
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2	small section.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
4	don't think no, I mean, I think
5	I know that area pretty well too.
6	I don't see a problem.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: And what we
8	could easily do too is, if the
9	Board is agreeable to consider, he
10	can put both options together
11	MS. WILHELM: Right, and then
12	you could look at it.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: and then
14	we could easily spray paint the
15	grass and see what it is and walk
16	it too.
17	MS. WILHELM: Right. I know
18	that any time I do talk about like
19	any kind of expansion or skate
20	park plans, the fire department is
21	always a little concerned as far
22	as if it will have any impact on
23	their festivals or their training
24	that they have over there. And
25	it's really the same amount of
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2	space that currently the bleachers
3	are hanging out on and like a
4	little four person metal table.
5	So it's not the fire department
6	wouldn't be able to use that space
7	anyway in it's current
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
9	I mean, I also think the fire
10	department looks for it from a
11	safety point of view as well.
12	MS. WILHELM: Right.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
14	that's I mean, they're
15	concerned about the space because
16	their carnivals are there and
17	their activities.
18	MS. WILHELM: Right.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: But I
20	also think as far as the
21	pre-incident situations.
22	MS. WILHELM: The what
23	situations?
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: The
25	pre-incident. In other words,
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2	they plan out for situations at
3	fires.
4	MS. WILHELM: Right.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It
6	probably would be great if you
7	could provide the two different
8	versions so that they could take a
9	look at it. That would be great.
10	MS. WILHELM: Sure, okay.
11	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Yeah, that's
12	what I was going to ask for is if
13	you could just do a plan both
14	options, that would be useful.
15	MS. WILHELM: Right, an A and
16	B. Okay.
17	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
18	Would there still be a table and
19	bleachers or
20	MS. WILHELM: No.
21	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: not
22	in this phase, no.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: Patrick?
24	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Well, thank
25	you, both. It's important that
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2	the public remember that this is a
3	Village asset, a Village amenity
4	that we've neglected and it needs
5	a lot of attention and money. And
6	so I thank you for your efforts
7	because you're going above and
8	beyond as a citizen to try to make
9	this Village to improve this
10	Village amenity. It needs a lot
11	of help.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, I mean,
13	the last two years if I could
14	interject you guys have done
15	tremendous work on just making
16	basic improvements
17	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: for public
19	safety
20	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: to the
22	park, which has been
23	MS. WILHELM: And that's
24	pretty much been like all of
25	pocket, out of our own pockets.
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2 Anything that we've raised towards 3 renovating the park, we've been 4 very frugal with making sure that 5 as much money as possible was saved for the renovation. So when 6 7 it comes to plywood or paint or 8 that kind of thing, we've been paying for that ourselves. 9 10 The other thing that was part of 11 that proposal besides extended 12 footprint, was there is one little 13 section of the park that started 14 crumbling and we were prepared to 15 fix that with a cement builder --16 not Dominick, the one who's 17 offered to do the park. He 18 started fixing it. He had a 19 tragedy in his family and he was 20 not able to finish it. So it's 21 been this clump of half dirt, half 22 rebar, half crumbling cement. 23 We're not looking forward to 24 rebuilding that because that would 25 basically just be throwing money -Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107 -

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2	out, but we were wondering if the
3	Village would be able to help us
4	to just level that. So just take
5	that crumbing piece out?
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
7	MS. WILHELM: So that's
8	something additional.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Well, this
10	leads to an important point. It's
11	not clear to me how the mechanics
12	of this relationship work. How
13	your procuring work to be done on
14	a Village property. Do we have an
15	agreement with Skate Park Inc.
16	like we have with the mini railroad?
17	MAYOR STUESSI: No. It's a
18	if we do any new work and build
19	something there, we would, you
20	know, be doing that under an
21	agreement.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Well, it
23	seems like it's already happening.
24	So I think we need to catch up
25	here and formalize.
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2	MAYOR STUESSI: You mean on
3	the volunteer work that they're
4	doing?
5	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah. I
6	mean, you're spending time and
7	money. There's liability. We
8	have the Village has
9	procurement policy. I think it
10	behooves all of us to formalize
11	this relationship between what
12	you're doing
13	MS. WILHELM: Right.
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: and what
15	your contributing; what the
16	expectation is when it's done.
17	MS. WILHELM: Right.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Who's
19	taking care of it.
20	MS. WILHELM: Yes.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Who's
22	managing it.
23	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
24	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: All right,
25	so that seems like we have a bit
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2	of work to do there.
3	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
4	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: We just
5	kind of went through this or we're
6	going through this with the mini
7	railroad because it's similar in
8	that we had a third party, the
9	Rotary building it
10	MS. WILHELM: Right.
11	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: and then
12	it was turned over. And so I
13	think there's lot of lessons there
14	that we need to apply to this
15	situation.
16	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: What do you
18	think the timing is on putting
19	together the potential plan?
20	MS. WILHELM: He wants to
21	start the plan right away. So we
22	had our Board meeting the first
23	week of April, on Wednesday. And
24	then he knew that I was coming
25	here and it's based on what you're
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2	feedback was, which I will go back
3	and tell him, can you please
4	create a plan A and a plan B.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: And then are
6	you expending funds to pay him for
7	the
8	MS. WILHELM: No.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: He's doing
10	this gratis
11	MS. WILHELM: Yes.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: on behalf
13	of your separate 501(c)(3) that
14	you have?
15	MS. WILHELM: Correct, right,
16	yeah.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay.
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I did have
19	one question. Is he providing
20	just labor or is he going to
21	provide the concrete too?
22	MS. WILHELM: Concrete too.
23	TRUSTEE ROBINS: He is?
24	Really. I mean
25	MS. WILHELM: It's his whole
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2	company.
3	TRUSTEE ROBINS: that's
4	probably more than the labor right
5	now.
6	MS. WILHELM: This guy, he
7	built a park on an abandoned piece
8	of property that the owner at that
9	time had basically gifted him to
10	use however he wanted to. And he
11	built that all by himself, like no
12	one paid him to do it. He just
13	wanted it for the community.
14	Unfortunately he property sold and
15	they put a wrecking ball through
16	it, so that's one less skate park
17	that all of Long Island has. And
18	he's just been watching our story
19	and he knows we've been
20	struggling. And he basically just
21	came to us with like what can I do
22	to help you? And we were floored
23	when he said that he
24	TRUSTEE ROBINS: It's a
25	significant donation he's making.
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2	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, he's
3	really donating a lot. He's
4	really passionate about it, which,
5	again, it helps because he's an
6	actual skate boarder besides the
7	fact besides being a contractor.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: So what I'm
9	going to suggest, to Patrick's
10	point, to sort of preemptively get
11	ahead of where we might end up
12	once you guys have a plan, is
13	suggest that we set up a call with
14	a couple of members of your
15	committee, together with legal and
16	the gentlemen, to review what the
17	relationship might be and so we
18	understand
19	MS. WILHELM: Right.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: you know,
21	how we might be able manage that
22	with, to Patrick's point,
23	procurement, etcetera. We have a
24	standardized contract. And then
25	we'll know more so that when
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2	you're ready to present, we can
3	speak to what you might be able to
4	be done or whether there might be
5	challenges.
6	MS. WILHELM: Okay.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: And then,
8	obviously, also as Patrick said,
9	we want to make sure that there's
10	a longer term plan in place for
11	maintenance much like we've gone
12	through with the train.
13	MS. WILHELM: Well, one of
14	the donations that we did receive
15	was from North Fork Side by Side
16	who also helped fund the railroad.
17	And part of their condition for
18	generously donating a lot of money
19	to us was that there would be a
20	maintenance plan put in place.
21	Because I'm not really sure that
22	was ever done 25 years ago when
23	the park was built. I would say
24	25 years later, the condition that
25	it's in, I don't think any
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2	maintenance plan was put in place.
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It's much
4	more exciting to build something
5	than to maintain it.
6	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
7	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: We see that
8	happening. I don't want to zap
9	any energy from your work, but I
10	do want to kind of tap the brakes
11	on any kind of significant
12	construction until we have this
13	formalized.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, yeah.
15	MS. WILHELM: Yeah. I mean,
16	nothing that we've also done like
17	on our own has been significant
18	other than like a rotted piece of
19	plywood and replacing it with a
20	piece of plywood. So it's not
21	anything that we're not
22	changing anything of what's
23	currently there. Most of it's
24	been plywood and paint.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Thank you again.
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2	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I still
3	have some questions.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah,
5	I do too.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I don't
7	know what the past practice of the
8	Village has been, but if someone's
9	donating goods, services,
10	materials, concrete, there must be
11	some formal process where this
12	Board must acknowledges and accept
13	that donation to the Village.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: The only
15	thing I'm aware of that's been
16	done like that was the train,
17	which we, of course, had the
18	agreement with the Rotary for.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: No,
20	we did have some other agreements
21	when there was a group at the end
22	of on 5th Street wanted to deal
23	with putting in the sprinkler
24	system I think it was.
25	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Flail? (Phonetic)
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2	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: No,
3	no, that was the grant process.
4	But we did have a resolution that
5	accepted the donation and the
6	purpose for it.
7	MS. WILHELM: Right.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
9	if I remember correctly, way back
10	when this discussion all started,
11	I think we had some type of a
12	resolution for the skate park that
13	was dealing with the you holding
14	onto the money, but if money was
15	donated to the Village, it was
16	going to be for a specific repair,
17	if I remember correctly way back
18	in the beginning. Now I don't
19	know if that's changed.
20	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, to be
21	honest, it's been a five-year blur.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I'll
23	have to go back and look, but I do
24	remember the discussion because
25	there was concern that the
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2	donation would put into the
3	general fund at the Village and
4	then the repairs that you were
5	hoping to get done wouldn't get
6	done.
7	MS. WILHELM: Oh, yeah, yeah,
8	yeah.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, the
10	Village has never received any
11	money directly.
12	MS. WILHELM: No. Yeah, I
13	think in the past
14	MAYOR STUESSI: They have a
15	separate 501(c)(3).
16	MS. WILHELM: there was
17	another group years ago.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
19	That's why the 501 that's why
20	that started way back when because
21	I was involved with the
22	discussions back at that point.
23	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
25	it kind of goes with some of the
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1	
2	other things with some other
3	things, but I'll have to go back.
4	I think I have the copy of that
5	discussion, okay?
6	MS. WILHELM: Right.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
8	all right.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Another
10	item, so if it was expressed to me
11	at a fire department warden's
12	meeting that the wardens are
13	apprehensive about things that
14	expand or encroach further on the
15	pole ground. You mentioned
16	earlier they use it for the
17	carnival.
18	MS. WILHELM: Right.
19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I just want
20	to express that because their view
21	is fire strident that they dont'
22	want to see the polo grounds
23	encroached on. Right? They want
24	to keep it open. They have their
25	activities.
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1	
2	Now setting that aside,
3	personally I'm also hesitant to
4	build out the polo grounds because
5	any further. So I'm going to
6	look at this very carefully. I'm
7	not in favor of constructing more
8	things on the polo grounds. I
9	think we have a little bit of an
10	obligation to the future residents
11	of Greenport not to eat up too
12	much open space because we can't
13	really anticipate how the
14	community might want to use open
15	space in the future and it's
16	pretty precious.
17	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: And so we
19	should look at that sort of like a
20	circumspect I would say. So I am
21	apprehensive about expansion. And
22	you did tell us at an earlier
23	presentation that the skate park
24	was quite large and it was one of
25	the larger this was one of the
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1	
2	benefits of the skate park is it's
3	larger in scale than some of the
4	others available.
5	MS. WILHELM: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So that
7	kind of makes me question whether
8	your project needs to get larger.
9	MS. WILHELM: Right.
10	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Could you
11	work within the footprint, for
12	example.
13	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, we can.
14	It was just something that he had
15	asked us because he wanted to make
16	it more cohesive to a skateboarder,
17	that if he could expand it. But,
18	again, it's not a make or break at
19	all and it's not I totally
20	understand preserving open space.
21	The space that he's asking for
22	isn't anything that the fire
23	department can utilizes now
24	because there's bleachers there.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: And if he's
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1	
2	prepared to donate his time to
3	show us both versions, it seems
4	pretty
5	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, and we
6	also have a whole another side of
7	the park. So as far as the
8	dynamics of having more flow, that
9	can be saved for that side of the
10	park, which is totally fine. I
11	don't know when that side of the
12	park is going to get done. I have
13	to get off this ride.
14	So I was hoping to just present
15	something to the community that
16	just had was a little bit more
17	dynamic within the timeframe that
18	I'm still attached. But, again,
19	we do have another 10,000 square
20	feet to do that. So, yeah, not a
21	make or break.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you
23	for keeping that in mind.
24	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, for sure.
25	Next?
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2	MAYOR STUESSI: You wanted to
3	talk to us about a fundraiser to
4	help raise more funds for the
5	park
6	MS. WILHELM: Yeah, the dock
7	diving.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: which I
9	know we have on next week's
10	resolutions.
11	MS. WILHELM: So this is an
12	event that Kim has posted, Harbor
13	Pet with Greenport Harbor Brewing.
14	It's always been held at their
15	Peconic location. This is their
16	9th year. Kim has always sort of
17	wanted, since her business is in
18	Greenport, to take this big event
19	and bring it to Greenport where it
20	would make a little bit more sense
21	to our community and the fact that
22	we're a very, very dog friendly
23	Village and she has her business
24	here. So she can speak on what
25	the event is and why it's a
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1	
2	benefit to bring it to Greenport.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: The skate
4	park, right?
5	MS. WILHELM: Yes. Well,
6	yes.
7	MS. LOPER: It's going to
8	benefit the skate park. Part of
9	the proceeds is going to go
10	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm sorry, if
11	you mind oh, you already did
12	state your name and address. I
13	apologize.
14	MS. LOPER: Part of the
15	proceeds is going to go towards
16	the skate park. It is on June 7th
17	and 8th. It takes up the spot
18	right in front of the skate park.
19	What we are looking to do is to
20	have mass assembly. We
21	traditionally have about 1,500
22	people that come over the whole
23	weekend. The a 9:00 to 5:00
24	event.
25	What we're asking for is, due to
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2	the historic nature of beer being
3	served at the event, we were
4	hoping that you guys would waive
5	the consumption of alcohol to
6	allow us to be able to serve the
7	alcohol at the event and keep the
8	tradition alive. It is a family
9	forward event. It's not a
10	drinking event. It's just an
11	added thing to it that has always
12	been there that we're looking to
13	continue.
14	But the biggest reason why is to
15	bring it back to Greenport, have
16	other Greenport businesses
17	involved. We will have food
18	trucks, which we will be asking
19	all of the current restaurants in
20	Greenport if they would like to be
21	part of the event first before
22	going outside. But we're going to
23	try and keep it as Greenport
24	business and resident friendly as
25	possible.
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2	MS. WILHELM: There's kind of
3	two parts to the application. One
4	is the application to have the
5	event there at all, and then the
6	idea of being able to lift the
7	open consumption code. One of the
8	things with this event is that the
9	eventually costs about \$15,000 to
10	put on.
11	And one of the reasons that in
12	our own Sound and Skate Festivals
13	that we've had at the park, we've
14	missed out on sponsorship from
15	many breweries that had approached
16	us who wanted to donate money, but
17	they weren't able to participate.
18	So there's two things. Because
19	it's a fundraiser and because it's
20	a venue change, we want the best
21	chance at the event being
22	successful because, again, it's
23	nine years in the making. It's
24	just we're going to risk losing
25	some of that momentum because
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1	
2	we're moving it from a brewery to
3	Greenport. So we're hoping that
4	the benefits of the community
5	aspect of it outweigh any kind of
6	drawbacks that might occur with
7	your feelings as far as lifting
8	the consumption code. So there's
9	two things; First
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Lily?
11	MS. WILHELM: can we have
12	the event and second, can we do
13	that?
14	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: The
15	first question is like part of the
16	proceeds? Are the rest of the
17	proceeds going to just to have the
18	event or are the proceeds going to
19	something else?
20	MS. LOPER: It's just to have
21	the event. Once the
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: And
23	then what's extra is going to the
24	skate park?
25	MS. LOPER: Yes, and then
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2	there's also an adoption even
3	going on, so there's a couple
4	shelters that'll be there too that
5	are going to benefit from it.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
7	I've been to the event and it is
8	very cool and very family
9	friendly. My other question is, I
10	think you gave us like a map of
11	where stuff was and you said that
12	the area where you're serving
13	alcohol would be like fenced off?
14	MS. LOPER: Well, the whole
15	thing is going to be fenced off as
16	well, but then there's like a
17	little beer garden where it's
18	basically served, if the picnic
19	tables are available, to have the
20	picnic tables there as well.
21	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
22	guess the question is, I thought
23	it was like is that area fenced
24	off?
25	MS. LOPER: It can be if
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2	that's a requirement.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
4	But that wasn't on the
5	MS. LOPER: I don't think the
6	beer garden was specifically
7	fenced off, but the whole event is
8	fenced off.
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Got
10	you, that's fine.
11	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So are you
12	asking for a waiver for the whole
13	event or for the beer garden? The
14	waiver on the alcohol, the open
15	container?
16	MAYOR STUESSI: The
17	application says for the space
18	that they have fenced off, so the
19	whole event itself.
20	MS. LOPER: Yeah.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: What's the
22	time of the event?
23	MS. LOPER: It's 9:00 to 5:00.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Have you been
25	to it before, Patrick?
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2	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: It's
3	Saturday and Sunday, right?
4	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have not.
5	MS. LOPER: Both days
6	Saturday and Sunday.
7	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have not.
8	This was at the brewery last time,
9	right?
10	MS. LOPER: For the last
11	eight years, yeah.
12	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, I've
13	been three or four times and it's
14	always, to Lily's point, been a
15	great family friendly event.
16	MS. LOPER: It is a lot of
17	fun. We have about 15 vendors
18	that every year come and they
19	either pass out project or sell
20	project. Most everything is dog
21	MAYOR STUESSI: So there's
22	literary a pool where the dogs are
23	jumping into the pool and then
24	they do the adoptions and it's
25	food and drinks and picnic.
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2	MS. LOPER: It's just a lot
3	fun; a lot of fun.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Any other
5	questions, Patrick?
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: No, no,
7	thank you.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: Julia?
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Kim, you
10	know I'm familiar with the event,
11	right? Bill used to help you
12	promote it I think, right?
13	MS. LOPER: Yes, yes.
14	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think it's
15	a great event. My only concern,
16	okay, is are we going to be
17	setting a precedent because I
18	don't believe that we've ever
19	allowed alcohol to be served
20	before at the polo grounds. I
21	kind of checked with one of the
22	fire chiefs. He couldn't recall
23	it ever being something that we
24	did.
25	So, you know, is it going to be
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2	setting a precedent? That's my
3	only concern. But other than
4	that, the event is great. The
5	dogs diving off those platforms
6	are amazing, you know, they go
7	flying and it's a great family
8	activity. So that's my only
9	caveat. I'm not saying that I
10	wouldn't vote for it, but I'm just
11	a little concerned about setting a
12	precedent.
13	MS. WILHELM: Can I address
14	something about that as well?
15	When we had set up for one of our
16	events at the skate park, I think
17	it was after the carnival, one of
18	the carnival rides, and there were
19	cans everywhere. So part of our
20	sort of
21	MS. LOPER: Ask.
22	MS. WILHELM: ask, thank
23	you. Is that we're trying to do
24	it responsibly. Rather than
25	having people kind of show-up in
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2	droves and do their own thing,
3	which happens a lot Greenport.
4	Where we'd rather try to do it the
5	right proper way than have it not
6	be, you know, for lack of a better
7	word, just a shit show, sorry.
8	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: You're
9	talking about drinking
10	specifically being sanctioned?
11	MS. WILHELM: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Versus
13	being improvised?
14	MS. WILHELM: Yeah. Like
15	people just kind of coming in with
16	their own containers of things.
17	We'd rather it be a specific
18	designated area rather
19	MS. LOPER: And controlled.
20	MS. WILHELM: and controlled
21	rather than a free-for-all.
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
23	think what they're saying too is
24	they're going to clean it up. So
25	it won't just be cans like
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2	MS. WILHELM: No. My point
3	about there being cans thrown all
4	over was the fact that fact people
5	were bringing it anyway. So we'd
6	rather try to contain and control it.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Is
8	there only one vendor that's going
9	to be selling beer or is there
10	going to be
11	MS. LOPER: (Nodding.)
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Just
13	that one vendor?
14	MS. WILHELM: Just one.
15	MS. LOPER: Yes.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: So
17	he'll have his liquor license to
18	cover whatever?
19	MS. LOPER: Yes.
20	MS. WILHELM: Yes.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: You
22	need to go through the Department
23	of Suffolk County Health
24	Department for anything?
25	MS. WILHELM: (Nodding.)
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2	MS. LOPER: Correct.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
4	All right, so my next question is,
5	usually at Maritime Festival or
6	some festivals that are such
7	activity, do you require first aid
8	or the EMT's standing by in case
9	there's an issue? Do you do that
10	with the Town of Southold.
11	MS. LOPER: We have not had
12	that in the past, no.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	Is that something that the
15	Department of Health will require
16	because it's not on private
17	property, it's on municipality?
18	MS. LOPER: That I will have
19	to look into.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
21	That's what I was going to ask
22	you, okay. Because that you need
23	to go to the Board of Wardens to
24	ask permission to see if they can
25	help with you that.
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2	MS. LOPER: Sure.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Because
4	sometimes they can and sometimes
5	they can't. But that would be my
6	one request is that you just make
7	sure that if there is an issue,
8	that, you know, the EMT's have
9	access or there's somebody on the
10	site.
11	MS. LOPER: I'll start the
12	process tomorrow.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Other
14	than that, I've never been to the
15	event. I've seen it. I've seen
16	it as I've ridden by going to deal
17	with other issues in Cutchogue
18	over the years. But I think that
19	it's excited that the thought
20	process is to bring it back to the
21	Village to give the Village brick
22	and mortar buildings in the
23	Downtown Business District the
24	opportunity to partake in it. I
25	think that's a great idea, okay?
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2	MS. LOPER: Thank you, and I
3	want to stress that it's
4	preseason, so it also brings
5	people into the Village on a
6	weekend that's not necessarily
7	busy for us.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
9	Right, no it usually isn't. It
10	doesn't start until after that
11	wonderful high school graduation
12	weekend. Then it seems the gates
13	open up and we get flooded. Okay,
14	as I said, having had Chesapeake
15	Retrievers who happen to like
16	water, I can imagine it's quite a
17	site and I'm looking forward to
18	seeing it.
19	MS. LOPER: Thank you.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I just had
21	a thought. I want to pick up on
22	Trustee Phillips that the
23	potential request for the fire
24	department to provide a standby,
25	that would probably apply to all
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1	
2	of your events, right?
3	MS. WILHELM: Anytime that
4	we've been had a festival, we have
5	always worked with it's usually
6	David Nyce, that I'm in touch with
7	to make sure that there's an EMT.
8	Especially if were hosting like a
9	skate contest, for instance, which
10	is not part of the dock diving.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: They
12	just had their Board of Wardens
13	meeting. So the next one won't be
14	until May.
15	MS. WILHELM: Okay.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: So
17	that's why I'm just mentioning it
18	now, so that you can make the
19	connections and move it forward,
20	okay?
21	MS. WILHELM: Okay.
22	MS. LOPER: Awesome, thank you.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: I just wanted
24	to say thank you because this has
25	been a great event for nine years
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1	
2	going. And for you to consider
3	bringing it to the Village where
4	you own your business and you've
5	contributed so much time to the
6	Business Improvement District and
7	the skate park, it would be so
8	wonderful to see if over there at
9	Moores Lane and every time I've
10	been and everything I've heard
11	from everybody, it's always been
12	run so successfully. I think it
13	will be a fantastic event for the.
14	I don't have any concerns about
15	you guys partnering with a local
16	brewer to do that. We've got
17	precedent for alcohol being served
18	in the parks, whether it's
19	Maritime Festival or Dances in the
20	Park on Monday nights when people
21	do it, or even our own fire
22	department doing their picnic on
23	5th and 6th Street. So I think
24	we've got nothing to lose trying
25	it one time. If there's an issue,
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2	we address it. So I'm looking
3	forward to voting on it next week.
4	Thank you to everything you guys
5	do for the Village.
6	MS. LOPER: Thank you.
7	MS. WILHELM: Thank you.
8	Thanks for the opportunity.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Before we
10	get off this topic, I would just
11	like to ask if we could ask
12	counsel to come back to us with
13	some recommendations about our
14	relationship with Greenport Skate
15	Park Inc.
16	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
17	Yes, absolutely.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Thank you.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, yes, if
20	you want to approach the podium.
21	Before you a state your name and
22	address for the record, I'll let
23	Patrick Brennan speak. He had
24	made a motion to keep the hearing
25	open and he can explain why and
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2	then you're welcome to speak.
3	MR. ERDEM: All right, thank
4	you. This Zack Erdem, 432 Park
5	Avenue, New York City. I'm here
6	to answer the question.
7	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So your
8	manager was here earlier and there
9	was an opportunity to take public
10	comment on your liquor license
11	application and it was a little
12	unclear to us about the proposed
13	application and what was actually
14	submitted to New York State. So
15	we want to be abundantly clear on
16	what you're trying to do so the
17	public understands what your goal
18	is there.
19	Is it in-room mini bars, is
20	there alcohol being served in some
21	other part of the hotel, does it
22	impact the bakery, the outdoor
23	space? Maybe you can fill us in
24	and clarify for us what your
25	intention is.
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2	MR. ERDEM: Sure. As you
3	know, it's a town rooms hotel and
4	it's been operated for over ten
5	years, but we came in the picture
6	last two years. Previous owner
7	had their own license as well and
8	we're complying the same rules,
9	same license that applying for a
10	different name.
11	We will be serving in bakery
12	area, mimosas, Bloody Marys in the
13	morning. We will serve breakfast
14	as well and, of course, in the
15	mini room mini bars in the room
16	plus the common areas.
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: The common
18	areas?
19	MR. ERDEM: Correct.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So like in
21	a lobby
22	MR. ERDEM: Lobby.
23	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: lounge.
24	MR. ERDEM: I don't know if
25	you want to call lounge. But a
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2	lounge, we don't have any music,
3	so we're just having nice like
4	lobby seats.
5	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay. How
6	about the outdoor space in the
7	back?
8	MR. ERDEM: We do not have
9	any permit for outdoor.
10	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So what we
11	wanted to do is thank you for
12	clarifying that we want to make
13	sure that what you're telling us
14	matches what has been submitted to
15	the state. And we were going to
16	ask our counsel to come back to us
17	to just check that and we're
18	suggesting that we keep this
19	hearing open until our meeting
20	next week so that we have time to
21	MR. ERDEM: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Does that
23	work for you? I mean, is that a
24	problem for you if we extend this
25	for another week?
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1	
2	MR. ERDEM: Do I have to be
3	here?
4	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Well, it's
5	always helpful if you can make
6	time to be here because when
7	questions come up, it's better for
8	you if they can be answered on the
9	spot and it would help to move
10	things along. But if you can't
11	make it for some reason, you can
12	send a representative.
13	MR. ERDEM: Okay.
14	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
15	Can I ask a question while your
16	here? So like the lobby, is there
17	a bar?
18	MR. ERDEM: No.
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
20	So like if I was a hotel guest,
21	how would I get a drink in the
22	lobby?
23	MR. ERDEM: Sure. When you
24	go to hotel, any hotel you walk
25	in, they have the place that they
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1	
2	serve alcohol. And then you order
3	from your server, they'll bring it
4	from the place. I mean there is a
5	bar, but there's no bar seats or
6	anything that you can go sit down
7	and hang out. There will be
8	someone bringing your drink. It
9	could be a glass of wine.
10	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
11	So there's a counter or somewhere
12	to order?
13	MR. ERDEM: You won't be able
14	to
15	MAYOR STUESSI: You said your
16	server would bring it to you,
17	right?
18	MR. ERDEM: There will be
19	server bringing it to you, but
20	there is no counter. There was a
21	bar before us, but we closed it.
22	We turned it to bakery. We put
23	the expresso machine, coffee
24	machine, stuff like that. We
25	removed the bar seats. So we'll
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1	
2	have the space, keep the drinks,
3	alcohol, but they'll be someone to
4	deliver your drink.
5	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
6	But you're not talking about in
7	the bakery, in the lobby.
8	MR. ERDEM: You could have it
9	in bakery too. You have seats in
10	the bakery.
11	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Right,
12	but if you just walk in the lobby,
13	sit down, someone will come to
14	you, and can you order a drink?
15	MR. ERDEM: Correct.
16	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Got ya.
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: And it would be
18	served or prepared in the bakery area?
19	MR. ERDEM: Correct.
20	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: So
21	along the lines of what the Board
22	was asking for, do you have a plan,
23	a first floor plan that shows
24	where the alcohol will be made
25	available?
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1	
2	MR. ERDEM: Yeah, we can send
3	it to you, e-mail it to you.
4	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: I
5	think that's what we're looking
6	for just to clarify what's going
7	on primarily in the common areas.
8	MR. ERDEM: Sure.
9	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Does
10	that work?
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Works for me.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Any other
14	questions from anybody?
15	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
16	just have one question, Brian.
17	When we receive these
18	applications, is there some way
19	either we can require a copy of
20	the site plan to review along with
21	the application or is that
22	something that's an additional
23	part of the package that goes to
24	the SLA?
25	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: So
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2	the applicant only that is a send
3	you the two Page 30-day notice.
4	That's all they have to send to
5	the Village clerk. The rest is
6	if you're going to be looking at
7	every application and you want to
8	fully understand it, there is a
9	contact person on each application
10	and each 30-day notice. And we
11	can certainly ask at the outset,
12	rather than coming to a discussion
13	at a meeting where we're asking
14	similar questions to different
15	applicants for additional
16	information.
17	Every time one comes in, if the
18	standard should be, let's get a
19	copy of the plan, we can, as a
20	Board, can ask that the clerk's
21	office when one of these
22	applications comes in, immediately
23	request that plan so that you can
24	see it and understand it and the
25	questions you ask are based on
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1	
2	what you know, rather than trying
3	to fully understand how it's being
4	presented at a hearing.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, the
6	full SLA application is gigantic
7	and it also includes a lot of
8	private information that we
9	wouldn't want to share with the
10	public.
11	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
12	Exactly, we don't want the
13	financial correct.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: But it would
15	seem prudent that we separately
16	review what we would like to see.
17	And so the floor plans, the basic
18	menu hours of operation, if we get
19	that ahead of time, it's going to
20	save the applicant time and we can
21	be consistent in reviewing it.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
23	I believe it also, it wouldn't
24	frustrate the applicant as the
25	situation turned into today. And
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2	also the public would be able to
3	see it because that's part of the
4	reason the SLA applications are
5	being announced is to make the
6	public aware of the fact that this
7	is going on. And I think that
8	added information just makes the
9	communication much clearer, that's
10	all. So is that something we as a
11	Board need to put into a policy of
12	some sort or a recommendation?
13	MR. ERDEM: Don't Village
14	have every single buildings has
15	their floor plans? I assume you
16	guys all have those before the
17	I mean, every Village has their
18	buildings around here.
19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I think
20	we're asking for a plan where you
21	would designate, very simply,
22	where you're intending to prepare
23	or serve alcohol. That's what
24	we don't want
25	MR. ERDEM: Yeah, we didn't
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2	do any I mean, if you're
3	looking for the building, we never
4	touched the building. We didn't
5	do any construction or any changes
6	or anything.
7	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: No,
8	that's not what I'm asking.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: No, that's
10	not what we're asking.
11	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: So
12	if I may, so when you're
13	submitting your SLA application,
14	not what you submit to a
15	municipality, but when you submit
16	it to SLA, that requires that
17	there be a floor plan
18	MR. ERDEM: Correct.
19	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
20	that will show the areas that are
21	set for alcohol service or
22	anything related to alcohol. The
23	SLA requires that. The SLA does
24	not require that it be provided to
25	a municipality that receives the
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2	30-day notice.
3	So all we're asking for, rather
4	than a site plan, rather than the
5	floor plan that you may have for
6	your building permit, is the floor
7	plan that has been filed or will
8	be filed with the SLA. So that,
9	again, the Board can and the
10	public can understand exactly what
11	it is that's being proposed with
12	respect to alcohol.
13	That's the only reason we're
14	having the meeting and the
15	discussion, because this Village,
16	and a number of other Villages,
17	have a similar process where when
18	you do submit something to the SLA
19	and they want to take a look at
20	it, rather than just putting it
21	aside as a piece of paper, you
22	know, the two-page notice doesn't
23	do much. The plan tells the Board
24	everything. It tells the public
25	everything they really need to be
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1	
2	looking at.
3	Again, as the Board was also
4	saying, no other information.
5	Just and there is significant
6	other information, a lot of which
7	is something you probably don't
8	want to convey to or any
9	applicant wouldn't want to convey
10	to a Board or make public.
11	Because this Board or this Village
12	does post everything on their
13	website.
14	So if we get the plans, as a
15	Board going forward, once the
16	application comes in, we can ask
17	for it. You can do that either as
18	a matter of course just directing
19	the Village clerk or clerk staff
20	to request it or adopt a
21	resolution providing that every
22	time an application comes in,
23	there will be a meeting in which
24	it will be discussed and a request
25	will be made to the applicant for
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1	
2	a copy of the plan.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: It would seem
4	like we should add on a resolution
5	to standardize what it is we're
6	looking for. And then the clerk
7	can have a simple bullet point
8	that's sent out with it.
9	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
10	it's always easier to paper is.
11	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, now
12	my understanding is we are not
13	approving or disapproving this
14	applicant's request here. We're
15	aggregating public comment.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, we
17	either make a recommendation to
18	state that we're supportive, not
19	supportive, or we don't say
20	anything. It's ultimately up to
21	the State.
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Right, so
23	it's important for us that we
24	understand what you're doing and
25	if we can convey that to the
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2	public so that we can get informed
3	feedback. That's all we're doing.
4	We're getting feedback and then we
5	have the opportunity to propose an
6	opinion or feedback to the State.
7	So that would be helpful to us
8	if we could see the floor plan and
9	better understand what you're
10	doing. Because we did learn
11	something different from what you
12	were telling us than from what we
13	understood from the manager. At
14	least from what I understood.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah.
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So thank
18	you for coming in, okay?
19	MR. ERDEM: No problem.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: And we
21	would like to hold this over or
22	we had already decided to hold
23	this over another week, which will
24	give us time and give you time to
25	get us that floor plan.
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2	MR. ERDEM: I'll e-mail it
3	tomorrow morning.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, you
5	guys have done a very nice job
6	with a wonderful little coffee
7	bar. And I've been in the lobby,
8	so I understand what you're
9	trying. You know, it's for
10	somebody to sit down with their
11	laptop and have a glass of wine at
12	the end of the day, and then
13	whatever you're looking to do in
14	rooms. That makes a lot of sense.
15	And then as it relates to the
16	back patio, which used to be open
17	under prior ownership under a
18	different site plan, if that's
19	something you want to pursue, you
20	can go to Planning Board for an
21	amended site plan for their
22	consideration and potentially
23	reopen it.
24	MR. ERDEM: Okay.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Great. Thank
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1	
2	you so much for being here and
3	coming in.
4	MR. ERDEM: Okay.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: All right,
6	Candace, you're up.
7	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: All
8	right. So I have a good amount of
9	announcements, updates, and
10	reminders for the Village tonight.
11	So the first announcement here is
12	the Village Annual Organizational
13	Meeting will be held next Thursday
14	rights here, in combination with
15	our regular schedule Regular
16	Session meeting.
17	Village Hall will be closing
18	tomorrow at noon in observance of
19	Good Friday.
20	Just a reminder, again, for the
21	public, brush pickup has began.
22	The schedule is on our Village
23	website. These are reminders just
24	as we go forward with public
25	assembly applications, as you all
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2	can see, there are nine public
3	assembly applications that we'll
4	be reviewing tonight.
5	So I just would ask that people
6	remember that our Village code
7	does say that we should be
8	receiving these applications
9	60 days prior to the event.
10	That's not always possible, but it
11	is preferred and the ideal
12	situation so that the information
13	can get to the Board. The
14	applications are also shared with
15	the chief of police and management
16	throughout the Village of
17	Greenport, so that people can
18	offer opinions and call out items
19	that may be problematic or
20	conflicts.
21	The written public comment
22	submission policy was voted on
23	last month at the Regular Session
24	meeting. This new policy is on
25	our Village website for review for
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2	the public.
3	This is a very, very exciting
4	announcement or at least for me it
5	is. So the Dances in the Park
6	Committee, which Lily trustee
7	Lily and I sit on together with
8	two other members, we are hosting
9	interns for the first time, the
10	Dances in the Park committee.
11	So the interns will be working
12	to promote partnerships with local
13	businesses via social media
14	campaigns, assisting with
15	fundraising efforts and
16	advertising for both monetary and
17	in-kind sponsors. Student interns
18	will have the opportunity earn
19	school credit.
20	So we have two high school
21	interns and then we have a college
22	intern as well. And then they
23	will also have the opportunity to
24	earn customer service hours.
25	So I just want to thank Andrea
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1	
2	Malinowski from the clerk's office
3	for spearheading just the plan for
4	this internship program. It's
5	wonderful to be able to offer
6	these opportunities to students
7	and it's also just going to help
8	with the running of Dances in the
9	Park, in my opinion.
10	So she was Mary, another one of
11	the members of the Dances in the
12	Park committee, they went to
13	Greenport's job fair, which we got
14	really, really promising intern
15	applicants.
16	Next up here, this is another
17	item that Trustee Lily and I have
18	been working on diligently
19	together. The Village website
20	will be undergoing some necessary
21	updates and revisions. So there
22	was a new law that was passed that
23	requires municipal websites to
24	have a .gov, and as you all are
25	aware, our website right now has
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2	.org. I am not exactly sure when
3	this has to happen by, but we are
4	already starting the process to
5	look at how we can update our
6	website.
7	As part of this process, the
8	website will be redirected for an
9	undetermined amount of time, Just
10	so that if you type in our website
11	as it has been for many years, as
12	it is, it will redirect you to the
13	new .gov website, just to allow
14	the community to catch up with
15	this change. So that's something
16	that will be ongoing and we'll
17	keep our eyes on it.
18	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Before
19	you go on Candace?
20	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yes.
21	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: The
22	date is December 21st.
23	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Of this year?
24	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Yeah.
25	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Wow.
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2	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's ten
3	days before the end of the year.
4	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay,
5	thank you, Brian.
6	TRUSTEE ROBBING: I wonder
7	how they chose that.
8	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay,
9	so, good news is, we're already on
10	it, everybody. So the new layout
11	of the website, we're just looking
12	to make the website a bit more
13	user friendly. There is there
14	is a ton of content on our
15	website, which is all incredibly
16	important to both Village staff,
17	our community; the Board, I know
18	relies on it.
19	Being within the clerk's office,
20	we do get a good amount of phone
21	calls just for directional, how to
22	district people to find documents
23	on the website. So we're just
24	looking to, again, make the
25	website a little bit more user
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2	friendly. I think those of us who
3	use it constantly, we're used to
4	it, but our newer residents, it's
5	sometimes difficult to find the
6	information they're looking for.
7	Let's see all current content,
8	that is a top priority, that all
9	current content be maintained.
10	It's just about reorganizing again.
11	Next up I have just an update
12	about our new meeting management
13	software. So I presented this to
14	the Board a few times over the
15	last year or so this has come up.
16	But we are getting closer to
17	presenting a proposal to the Board
18	and, obviously, sharing that with
19	the public for our new meeting
20	management software.
21	So just as a refresher to the
22	public and the Board, IQM2, which
23	is our current meeting management
24	software, this is how we create
25	our agendas. It's also tied into
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1	
2	our live streaming. And those
3	things should also they should
4	blend a little better than what
5	they do now.
6	IQM2, the reason that prompted
7	this is the because system is
8	phasing out. So the end of
9	service date for IQM2 which is an
10	incredibly old system. T's
11	already a little bit problematic
12	to work with, the end of service
13	for this software is September of
14	this year. So it's ha little bit
15	concerning to be working with old
16	software where we wouldn't be able
17	to have help to troubleshoot.
18	So we are working diligently to
19	just power forward as quickly and
20	as quickly as possible, but
21	obviously this is a huge update
22	for the Village. And it will cost
23	bit of money for the Village to
24	take this on. So a new meeting
25	management software called
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2	Granicus I'm sorry, from
3	Granicus called Peak is the name
4	of the software. That it looks
5	like we it looks the most
6	promising at this point.
7	Peak is owned by Granicus, which
8	is currently our live streaming
9	platform. So the good thing about
10	going with Peak is that we
11	recently purchased an encoder. I
12	think this was purchased right
13	before maybe when this new Board
14	was voted in.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: It was the
16	after the new Board.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
18	Because, yeah, the other one
19	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: SO I
20	remember when I first got in in
21	August of 2023, the setting up the
22	software was happening. So I know
23	that purchase was recent.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes.
25	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: The
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2	prior company that I was working
3	with to just get quotes from, we
4	would have had to purchase a new
5	encoder. So just to alleviate
6	that issue, Granicus offers a
7	perfect solution for what we need.
8	I'm looking forward to showing
9	the Board and the public. I
10	probably will be sharing at next
11	month's meeting some other
12	municipalities that use the system
13	that we're looking to get. But I
14	guess the most basic way to
15	describe it is you'll be looking
16	in one place where a meeting is
17	listed and you'll have in one
18	location so right now on our
19	website where you watch the live
20	stream, that same location will
21	also have the meeting agenda
22	packet, the verbatim minutes for
23	the Board from our stenographer.
24	So everything will be in one
25	location instead of clicking
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1	
2	around to multiple places on the
3	website. So I think that will
4	also contribute to just being more
5	user friendly. Again, that is a
6	common question that I personally
7	field within the clerk's office is
8	just where to find documents. So
9	it's going to be great to have
10	everything in just one location.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
12	Candace, can I ask?
13	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I think
14	I've given a lot of information,
15	so, yes, questions for the first
16	part.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	If I remember correctly and maybe
19	Adam can refresh my memory, the
20	website for this year, the 24/25
21	budget, we had a significant
22	increase on that; did we not?
23	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
25	Particularly for this particular
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1	
2	upgrade for the website?
3	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
4	Correct. We've been anticipating
5	this for a while now, so I did
6	increase for the expense line for
7	our municipal website for this
8	fiscal year. Regarding what Clerk
9	Hall was just referencing, that
10	will be paid for by a PO cut from
11	this year as well.
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
13	That's what I wanted to know,
14	okay, the PO is going to get cut
15	before the end of the year.
16	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
18	now in reference to the Peak
19	program, is that something where
20	originally within the IQM2, we
21	originally because I was the
22	experimental trustee for it
23	could get into that program and
24	actually type in our own trustee
25	reports.
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1	
2	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
3	So that
4	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
5	Instead of having to send it and
6	then it having to be reentered.
7	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yes. So
8	this program, there are so many
9	features that I don't know. I
10	think it's going be a slow
11	rollout. And then we've been in
12	discussion with the company to see
13	what you all are quite frankly
14	what you're comfortable with
15	doing. So it will be a
16	readjustment.
17	Another beautiful thing about
18	this is it's searchable. So
19	you'll be able to search a keyword
20	and it will pull up all relevant
21	meanings with those key words. So
22	that's going to be awesome and
23	that's across Board of Trustees,
24	Planning, Zoning, and Historic.
25	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
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2	it will be within the program,
3	correct
4	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
6	not where it goes to Google and
7	then you have to because that
8	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
10	Because that was done to make it
11	searchable because originally the
12	website wasn't searchable the way
13	it was set up.
14	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
15	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: It's only
17	going to go back how many years,
18	five right?
19	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So were
20	working that out. Again, because
21	of the nature of IQM2, it's not
22	used to it's full potential. And
23	then going back and correcting
24	what was not done is probably not
25	going to be worth the time. So
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1	
2	within the system, Peak will go
3	back five years extracting
4	resolutions that have been
5	processed in IQM2. And then
6	further, it will probably be a
7	separate link for all of that
8	information.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Either
11	way, everything will ultimately be
12	in one location. So another part
13	of the imputation is also getting
14	Mike Noone comfortable with the
15	system because this will impact
16	all boards for the Village.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: SO
19	everything will be in one location.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: And then
21	obviously, if we pair not if
22	when we pair this with the data
23	library that's going to be created
24	as part of our State grant
25	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Correct.
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2	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yes.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: for
4	putting all the records of the
5	Village online, that's going to
6	put us in a very different place.
7	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
8	Yeah. It's going to be awesome.
9	I'm looking forward to it. It's
10	going to take us some years to get
11	us to that place. The Mayor, you
12	know, just touched on it. We did
13	successfully I worked with a
14	company to get our State Archives
15	Grant application submitted.
16	So right now, everybody cross
17	your fingers, whatever you got.
18	I'm very hopeful that we will
19	receive that money. We've been
20	doing all the things that they
21	would want to see for us to be an
22	appealing applicant. So that will
23	start next spring.
24	And then once we get through the
25	purging and organizing process, we
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1	
2	will be able to digitize as many
3	records as we see fit, which will
4	be great. It will alleviate, you
5	know, FOILs. So it will just
6	it's accountability; it's access
7	for our public, you know, for
8	their use of this information, and
9	it's also going to continue to
10	make the clerk's office run more
11	effectively and it will be less
12	time spent on FOILs, because if
13	the information is there, self
14	service is the goal.
15	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
16	the other question is dealing with
17	the Peak program or the upgrade to
18	the IQM2. There is no initial
19	charge for the program upgrade or
20	is there an initial charge and
21	then maintenance fee after that
22	every year?
23	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So there
24	is I'll have to get back to you
25	on the specifics of that. So
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2	there is a substantial cost to get
3	into the new system and then there
4	will be a time where we'll have
5	both IQM2 and Peak. We won't be
6	charged for both.
7	That's another benefit of
8	working with Granicus because it's
9	all the same company offering this
10	new system Peak and then also
11	helping us phase out of IQM2, they
12	own that company as well.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: So
14	within this year's budget, did we
15	have enough funding for this
16	particular upgrade?
17	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: This is
18	for next
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: This
20	is for next budget year?
21	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
22	This is included in fiscal 2026.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
24	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
25	Yes, and it was mentioned when I
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2	was speaking on the computer
3	software expense line.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: All
5	right, okay.
6	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So Adam
7	has reviewed and actually had a
8	separate meeting without me with
9	this company so that he's able to
10	ask all of the necessary questions
11	about funding. I've been kind of
12	staying in the nuts and bolts of
13	how it's actually going be
14	implemented. But if Adam needs a
15	further meeting to, you know, nail
16	down any further details, he'll be
17	able to do so. We are expecting
18	to get a final proposal within the
19	next week or so
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: to
22	present at next month's meeting
23	with more details. Because I
24	would like to keep this moving
25	forward so that we're not locked
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2	into a system where we don't have
3	help to correct things. There's
4	already a ton of workarounds that
5	I've had to create because if you
6	throw too much at the system, it
7	just stops working and
8	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
9	Crashes.
10	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah,
11	you're familiar with it. It's a
12	little bit problematic.
13	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
14	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So this
15	is it's exciting. It's a lot.
16	Next month I do plan to share with
17	the Board just how we're
18	approaching this. So the Mayor
19	mentioned, again, the initial
20	proposal is for five years of
21	extracting our data.
22	We've also just a few days
23	ago I had a meeting with Granicus,
24	as well as our IT team so that
25	they're all on the same page for
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2	some of those high level
3	conversations that I'm not able to
4	navigate about just what to do
5	with this data.
6	I've been presenting to them
7	what we want and allowing the IT
8	professionals to have a meting of
9	the minds. But it's going well.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
11	good.
12	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
13	So I'll have a significant amount
14	of details and information to
15	share with you all next month.
16	Anymore questions about this first
17	piece?
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, I
19	have a question about the website.
20	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So I'm glad
22	you were able to work with Trustee
23	Dougherty-Johnson in this
24	initiative. It's going to be
25	really great when it gets upgraded.
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2	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have just
4	two questions or comments. Will
5	the new website be something that
6	the Village staff can manage?
7	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: That's a
8	great question and a question that
9	Trustee Lily brought up as well.
10	We do not have the desire to do
11	that at this moment, but, yes, we
12	will have the ability to manage it
13	in house.
14	The reason is, is just that I
15	think the easiest thing is that we
16	are not we're not web builders,
17	you know, or web we don't want
18	to ruin anything by trying to
19	quickly upload a document. The
20	service that we have with the
21	company that we've gotten this
22	quote for, it's our current
23	company that we're using. They
24	are incredibly responsive. So if
25	we need a notice put on the
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2	website fairly quickly, we have
3	the ability to do so.
4	I think as other parts of as
5	other jobs and responsibilities
6	are alleviated with, you know,
7	speaking to our records. You
8	know, once more of that
9	information becomes more
10	available, I think it would free
11	up more time for us to maybe step
12	into that a little bit with proper
13	training. But at this point the
14	option is there, but we won't be
15	manipulating the website in house.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: So our
17	current agreement with them covers
18	that service, which is basically
19	24/7 other than overnight hours if
20	we need anything posted on it and
21	they would be proposing doing that
22	moving forward.
23	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
24	Wait, sorry; it is 24/7 and
25	overnight hours?
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2	MAYOR STUESSI: No, I'm
3	saying minus overnight.
4	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Oh.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Like if on a
6	Saturday we have a sewer break
7	on Friday night and we need to
8	post something online on Saturday
9	morning, we send an e-mail and
10	first thing in the morning they'll
11	get something posted up online.
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
13	Even on weekend?
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Oh, yeah,
15	absolutely.
16	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
17	That important to me because I do
18	think going forward so what
19	they're proposing right now, the
20	proposal we have right now is like
21	a WordPress site that isn't
22	because I've worked on back end.
23	Like they make it it's pretty
24	it's easier than you think, but
25	I also understand that the clerk's
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2	office right now like has a lot
3	going on.
4	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
5	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
6	But I think, again, just making it
7	so that if in five years
8	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct.
9	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
10	and there's different staff or
11	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
13	Or if we wanted to a trustee or
14	a Mayor wanted to get on there in
15	the middle of the night if there
16	was some emergency, you know, then
17	that's a possibility.
18	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct.
19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
20	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
21	So I think what we looked at right
22	now is that like it would be
23	possible; it's probably not
24	something we're going to be using
25	any time soon
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2	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
4	probably, in the current
5	proposal we're looking at.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I
7	understand you have a lot on your
8	plate and I do think that modern
9	website designs are much easier to
10	get into and manipulate.
11	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Now this is
13	not a criticism, but my sense was
14	there was an issue with timeliness
15	in terms of getting things
16	uploaded to the website. So
17	you're all saying it works pretty
18	well with the vendor you have.
19	That wasn't my sense of things.
20	You're happy with the relationship?
21	I mean, it goes fast enough?
22	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah. I
23	have not heard that, so that's
24	news to me. I have a great
25	relationship with our team now. I
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2	send them things throughout the
3	day on any given day. There is a
4	point person that we work with
5	daily. And if she is out on
6	vacation or out for whatever
7	reason, she redirects us. That
8	does give us a little lag time,
9	but it's not common to our
10	day-to-day activities. But
11	generally speaking, I think it's
12	working great.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: So I think
15	the one thing to mention, and
16	maybe Lily or Candace can speak to
17	this is our current website and
18	what's being proposed with this is
19	something that's bespoke for the
20	Village. That is very uncommon.
21	You look at other villages and
22	towns and they all tend to choose
23	with one of three different
24	companies of a standard template
25	website where you're just looking
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2	at, you know, different headers
3	and plug and play. It might be
4	worth one of you speaking to why
5	you've come to this recommendation
6	versus using one of those others.
7	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
8	mean, I think it's just when we
9	looked at those what the current
10	content, didn't fit very well.
11	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
13	That's basically what it came to.
14	And because we want to keep most
15	of the current content besides
16	like broken links and you know
17	what I'm mean, things that are
18	completely out of date and
19	unnecessary.
20	It just and as much as people
21	are frustrated with the website,
22	they do also it is known by a
23	certain you know what I mean?
24	So to change it like we didn't
25	want to change it completely. We
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2	wanted to like work within what we
3	already had but make it better,
4	but not just like put things in
5	boxes that didn't that aren't
6	natural to the website or how
7	people have been using it so far.
8	But I mean, we're not completely
9	we still have a meeting
10	tomorrow with of the companies.
11	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
13	So it's not it's still all sort
14	of a work in progress and we also
15	want the Board's feedback. But I
16	also like, I understand that I
17	still think if we had one of those
18	three like plug and play type
19	things, it still would be a big
20	lift for staff to be able to
21	manage that is my sense right now.
22	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
23	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I saw that
24	the proposal has seven and a half
25	hours per month I think for
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2	consultant for them to is that
3	consistent with what you do now,
4	is that an upgrade.
5	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: It's an
6	increase actually. We rarely meet
7	the threshold of what we are
8	contracted for as of right now.
9	So I think it's a two and a half
10	hour increase each month.
11	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay. So
12	if you're not meeting the
13	threshold, why are we increasing?
14	Is it a better value?
15	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So they
16	proposed the increase because of
17	the newer website. So they
18	anticipate that it will take them
19	more time to navigate the uploads
20	and our just day to day activities
21	with them.
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
23	mean, what I also see, hopefully
24	in the future, is that we use the
25	website a little more dynamically
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2	like putting the HPC you know,
3	like putting more stuff that's
4	more relevant more often.
5	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: So
7	that would be more work on their
8	part just to you know, just to
9	add things. And like as things
10	developing, like the Tree
11	Committee is making a list. Like
12	eventually that could get on the
13	website. More information could
14	get on the website.
15	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Or
16	housing authority.
17	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: So
18	that like the self serve thing
19	that Candace is talking about, the
20	things are on the website and are
21	findable and people know to look
22	for them there and it's not so
23	many phone calls to Village Hall,
24	perhaps, eventually.
25	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah, I
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2	think another thing to note is,
3	while we're talking about
4	searching the website, it is a
5	little problematic the way it is
6	now. If you search our website,
7	it pulls it from Google. And I
8	think it was multiple reasons for
9	that. I think they thought it was
10	helpful at the time to be able to
11	pull from Google.
12	At this point, I find it to be
13	problematic because we get phone
14	calls about the search pulling
15	actually Trustee Phillips pulled
16	something recently searched on our
17	website, it pulls from Google and
18	it pulls dated documents.
19	So that's something that we are
20	planning to correct with this
21	website upgrade to where it's
22	searching just on the website for
23	documents that are current.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah.
25	There are some glitches, and the
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2	reason that the Goggle was used
3	was because this website was
4	originally set up back in 2012?
5	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah,
6	2013.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
8	it really hasn't been updated
9	since then.
10	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: No.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Although
12	there has been several attempts
13	and discussions to do it, it was
14	never followed through. So I'm
15	excited to see it coming since I
16	was the biggest one to put the
17	foot down to get the website going
18	and the IQM2. But, once again,
19	the fees, the maintenance fees,
20	you know, that's part of it.
21	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: But
23	are they going to be putting it
24	all on their server as a backup or
25	is this stuff going to start going
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2	on our own?
3	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: It's
4	cloud based.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It's
6	cloud based? Okay.
7	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah.
8	Sorry, go ahead.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Go ahead.
10	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Our
11	sever can't take much more.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: That
13	was my next question, where are we
14	at?
15	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: We have
16	so much content and it's so
17	valuable. So we don't have the
18	capability, without a significant
19	purchase for a new server, which
20	it hasn't been presented that
21	that's a necessity, right, Lily?
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Not
23	that I've heard. That's a good
24	question. I'm not sure.
25	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
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2	That was my next question is, I
3	think we purchased the new server
4	in what Adam, do you remember
5	when we did it?
6	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
7	I don't recall.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah.
9	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: It was
10	within last few years if I'm not
11	mistaken.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
13	all right. And I know that we
14	pressed to have more than what we
15	needed when we purchased it so
16	that that was
17	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Well, as
18	we're all aware, the information
19	doesn't stop. So I think we do
20	need to be mindful of not taxing
21	our current sever because we're
22	going to continue creating and,
23	you know, that information is
24	already set up to be on our sever.
25	So if there is a cloud-based
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2	option, I think is the way to go
3	unless we start talking about a
4	significant financial
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
6	Contribution?
7	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: contribution
8	to our technology.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: But
10	it does raise the question of
11	and we discussed this and I would
12	like to just put this on the table
13	in the future, not now. But
14	hopefully, I think we need to
15	check to make sure that all of our
16	Village e-mails are being backed
17	up to the sever because they're
18	supposed to be.
19	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: That's
21	number one. Number two is I think
22	for recordkeeping for future
23	generations of trustees, I would
24	like to look into and I believe
25	the town over Southold and I know
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2	Suffolk County legislator does it.
3	They actually issue laptops or
4	some form of mechanism to actually
5	have their governmental activities
6	all on that laptop.
7	And then when that person
8	retires or doesn't win the
9	election or however it flows, that
10	that laptop then proceeds on to
11	the next person with all that
12	information so that there's backup
13	information for anybody coming on
14	the Board that's new. Because
15	that has been a frustration over
16	many few years of the
17	institutional history of what's
18	available and what's not available.
19	And I think, you know, it's not
20	going to be in this year's budget,
21	but maybe an idea for next year's,
22	you know, 27/28 budget.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: It could be;
24	\$1,200 bucks for four computers.
25	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
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2	Right, okay. But I do think we
3	need to check to make sure
4	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I would
5	love that because the paper is, as
6	you all know, something that I was
7	immediately, you know, alarmed.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And
9	I'm just going from my experience
10	of when the e-mails were issued in
11	2009, as I was telling both of
12	you, when I upgraded to a new
13	computer, the session of e-mails
14	in 2009 weren't they weren't
15	updated to the server. So I had
16	to e-mail to the new computer so
17	they would go onto the sever.
18	So that's why I'm just saying
19	that, for recordkeeping, I think
20	it's really important because then
21	they'll be the contracts that all
22	trustees would need to be able to
23	take a look at. There would be
24	sewer agreements. There would be
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Well all of
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2	that's going to happen as part of
3	the data entry program that we're
4	doing with the State.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
6	Right, but it also
7	MAYOR STUESSI: It wouldn't
8	be on a laptop. You would just
9	have access
10	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
11	the discussions would be on the
12	laptop to be for somebody to go
13	back in and actually see the
14	topics.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: What type of
16	I'm not understanding what type
17	of discussion you're saying would
18	be on a lap because all that,
19	theoretically, is either in the
20	cloud or on the server or the
21	Village website.
22	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I was
23	going to say, I think Microsoft
24	Office may have helped with that
25	problem. So I'd be happy to check
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2	with them. I'm pretty sure the
3	answer is yes, just because of the
4	capability of Microsoft Office.
5	So whether you use it on an app
6	or you use it on a browser, you
7	should have access to the same
8	information. So if your e-mail is
9	linked with our sever, you should
10	have access to documents shared in
11	our shared drive. So I think
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Not
13	all of us have shared drives, so
14	that's
15	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay.
16	So we'll work on making sure that
17	the Board has access to the shared
18	drive.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
20	think it's important, especially
21	if there has to be any kind of
22	subpoena hunting or anything else
23	that they're looking for.
24	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I would
25	love to set you guys up with
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2	laptops. So I'm on board for that.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
4	think it's a good point too about
5	because I remember reading like
6	in the NYCOM manual like so you're
7	supposed to get the records from
8	the last trustees.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Correct.
10	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
11	And, you know and so when you
12	do, we all have piles of paper at
13	home.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah,
15	I have piles of paper at home.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: You're
17	actually not supposed to keep
18	piles of paper at home. It's
19	supposed to belong in the Village.
20	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
21	Right, right, but that's why if it
22	was on a Village computer, it
23	would be.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Right.
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I don't
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2	really see this as like a hardware
3	issue. I don't think we need
4	computers. We just need to have
5	documents and things that are
6	virtual or on a cloud base so we
7	can get access to them. We
8	shouldn't really be having files
9	saved on
10	MAYOR STUESSI: Absolutely
11	not.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: on
13	laptops. I don't keep anything on
14	a laptop anymore. Even my own
15	business doesn't keep anything on
16	a computer. There's just no need
17	to, especially when
18	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I keep my
19	stuff on my laptop.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I wouldn't
21	recommend that for Village work.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: No, not for
23	Village work. I'm talking about
24	my other things.
25	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
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2	Yeah, well, I think the technology
3	whichever way it is, but some kind
4	of shared
5	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yes.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
7	shared drive.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
9	Shared drives, which doesn't exist
10	right now.
11	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I think
12	it's a matter of getting you all
13	proper access because we do have a
14	shared drive where Adam and I and
15	everyone in Village Hall. I have
16	a private drive. So I have my own
17	private, the clerk's office has a
18	private drive that Jeanmarie and I
19	only have access to, so on and so
20	forth. But there is a shared
21	drive in place, so we need to
22	discuss how to make sure that you
23	all have proper access to it.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: And,
25	Lily, to your point, I have a
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2	separate computer laptop that's
3	just for Village activities and
4	when and if wherever, that will be
5	given to the next trustee because
6	that way there won't be boxes of
7	paper because we just didn't have
8	that back in 2009 so
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: You already
10	answered my next question. How do
11	you choose the vendor, but it's
12	the vendor you're working with
13	already?
14	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So we
15	the initial vendor for the meeting
16	management software, is that?
17	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: No, the
18	website.
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
20	The website.
21	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Oh, for
22	the website. It's our current
23	vendor. Lily and I have done, you
24	know, independent searches. At
25	one point Lisa Gillooly was a part
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2	of our committee, but she wasn't
3	allowed to continue to work with
4	us. She helped with a tremendous
5	amount of research it our initial,
6	you know, stages of just looking at
7	what companies are available to us.
8	We looked at other municipalities
9	to see what they're using. But
10	ultimately price was a factor,
11	ease of use, and an already
12	established great relationship
13	with our current vendor.
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Alright,
15	that makes sense. Is a project
16	like this subject to procurement
17	policy?
18	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yes.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yes.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It was a
21	bid?
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yes.
23	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: It did
24	not go out to bid.
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: It didn't
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1 2 need to? 3 VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Not that 4 I'm --5 MAYOR STUESSI: No, you went 6 out for quotes. 7 VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yes. MAYOR STUESSI: Because it's 8 9 under \$10,000. 10 VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct. MAYOR STUESSI: So it only 11 12 goes out to bid if it's over 13 \$10,000. 14 TRUSTEE BRENNAN: This is 15 \$7,000 for the initial implementation? 16 VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah, so 17 there were two --18 TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: \$7,500. 19 VILLAGE CLERK HALL: There 20 are two new costs associated with 21 this that I do just want to point 22 out. One is security, which is 23 incredibly important. I think 24 it's going be important for our 25 insurance renewal. That's come up -Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107 -

1	
2	at least the two years that now
3	I'm working on the second renewal
4	for our Village insurance. Cyber
5	security is something that's come
6	up both years and we are not where
7	we need to be.
8	So I think it's going to be
9	really important. It's \$39 a
10	month for this added security.
11	And then there's additional cost
12	of \$10 a month, which is for the
13	redirect fee, so that we're the
14	community while we allow them to
15	get used to .org to .gov.
16	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
17	Although that eventually we can
18	not pay that.
19	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Exactly.
20	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
21	And it's not that much; and the
22	.gov is free.
23	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Correct.
24	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
25	mean, because I think we're
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1	
2	currently paying for our .org,
3	which it probably is not very much
4	money.
5	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah,
6	correct. Any other questions for
7	the first part of this long report
8	of mine?
9	(No response.)
10	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay.
11	So next I'm going to get into our
12	public assembly applications
13	received for this month. So the
14	first one is from the Dances in
15	the Park Committee for the Annual
16	Dances in the Park Concert Series
17	to run every Monday at Mitchell
18	Park from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.
19	beginning on July 7th through
20	August 25th for the regular part
21	of the concert series, and also to
22	host the Battle of the Bands on
23	Monday, September 1st from 6:00 to
24	9:00 p.m.
25	As you all are aware, last year
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1	
2	we hosted the first Battle of the
3	Bands, which was really popular,
4	very successful night. So we're
5	looking to do this again. The
6	reason or part not the reason.
7	A cool part of Battle of the Bands
8	is the winner of the Battle of the
9	Bands gets one of the coveted
10	spots. There are limited Mondays
11	throughout the summer and we get a
12	lot of requests for bands. So
13	Battle of the Bands we just
14	thought was a cool way to get new
15	bands and into the lineup.
16	Next we have a public assembly
17	application from Floyd Memorial
18	Library to host the annual Brady
19	Rymer kids' concert in Mitchell
20	Park on July 15th from 6:00 to
21	8:00 p.m. This applicant is
22	requesting a waiver of the \$250
23	application fee.
24	Next up I have a public assembly
25	application from Relief Hose
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1	
2	Number 2 and Phenix Hook and
3	Ladder to host the annual Carnival
4	at the polo grounds from July 1st
5	through July 5th with the daily
6	hours of operation from 6:00 to
7	11:00 p.m. Fireworks have been
8	schedule for Wednesday, July 2nd
9	and Saturday, July 5th both at
10	10:00 p.m.
11	The next application is from
12	North Fork Kid Connect. Justin
13	Smith, Andrea Malinowski, myself,
14	and Destiny Salter. As the Board
15	is aware, I am a founding member
16	of this organization. So I just
17	want to put that out there to the
18	public and the Board as a
19	reminder.
20	We are looking to host weekly
21	basketball clinics for kids
22	between the ages of 8 and 18 years
23	old. The proposed schedule for
24	the clinics will run for six weeks
25	beginning the week of July 7th
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1	
2	through the week of August 11th.
3	We are requesting the full week,
4	however, that is not what will
5	actually be used.
6	So for the first four weeks in
7	you'll we're looking to host
8	JV-aged kids, so middle school and
9	high school kids, for four days
10	out of the week. The schedule is
11	still the schedule is still
12	being worked out because everyone
13	who will be participating in
14	facilitating this, they're all
15	volunteers and these will happen
16	during a normal workday.
17	So the two weeks in August will
18	be for the littles, so elementary
19	aged kids. So 8 through, I'd say,
20	12.
21	We are looking to have the park
22	the basketball court from 9:00 a.m.
23	to noon to allow for either two or
24	three hours in addition to the
25	clean up. We are requesting a
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1	
2	waiver sorry, we, this is
3	it's awkward to present this to
4	the Board because it is an
5	application that I'm on.
6	The applicant is waiver of \$50
7	application fee.
8	Next we have the application
9	from Kim Loper from Harbor Pet to
10	host the North Fork Dog Dock
11	Diving Weekend at polo grounds on
12	June 7th and June 8th from 9:00 a.m.
13	to 5:00 p.m. This is a
14	family-friendly event and will
15	have an entry fee.
16	This is scheduled to include
17	food trucks and beverage venders.
18	This applicant is requesting a
19	waiver of the alcohol prohibition
20	to allow vendors to sell craft
21	beer and local wine.
22	The next application Brian
23	Hanson of All League Basketball
24	I'm sorry, Baseball, excuse me.
25	To lost a children's baseball
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1	
2	clinic at the polo grounds ball
3	field. The baseball clinic will
4	take place on July sorry,
5	between July 21st through July
6	sorry, August 1st; Monday through
7	Friday. So it's a two-week
8	timeframe from 8:00 a.m. to
9	2:00 p.m.
10	Next is Clinton Memorial and
11	Coming to the Table has submitted
12	an application to host the annual
13	Juneteenth Celebration and Parade
14	on June 28th from 10:00 a.m. to
15	6:00 p.m. This year's celebration
16	will, again, include a road
17	closure for the parade.
18	The route has been outlined in
19	their application and also shared,
20	as other applications, with the
21	police chief and the Board. The
22	police chief has given his thumbs
23	up for their parade route. Let's
24	see, the celebration will
25	condition into Mitchell Park where
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1	
2	there will be dancing, music, and
3	other activities for the public.
4	Next is a application from the
5	Railroad Museum of Long Island to
6	host a free five-part concert
7	series called Concert in a Boxcar
8	from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. on the
9	following dates: May 25th,
10	June 15th, July 13th,
11	September 21st and October 12th.
12	The final public assembly
13	application is from Rena Wilhelm
14	on behalf of the Greenport State
15	Park Inc. to host the annual
16	National Get Out and Skate Day at
17	the Greenport Skate Park on
18	June 21st, from noon to 4:00 p.m.
19	And then finally I have a
20	resolution requesting an amendment
21	of a prior public assembly
22	application. So the family of
23	William Swiskey submitted a public
24	assembly application to host a
25	Celebration of Life at Fifth and
	Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107

1	
2	Sixth Street Beach. They are
3	requesting to change the date to
4	June 21st with a rain date of
5	June 22nd.
6	As the Board, I think, is aware
7	the family purchased a bench which
8	is at the beach, Fifth and Sixth
9	Street, so that's why they would
10	like to hold the celebration of
11	life there. They have family
12	coming into town and it's a more
13	appropriate time for their family
14	to be here in June as opposed to
15	May.
16	And below this in my report is
17	just a list of contracts and
18	agreements the Mayor has signed,
19	legal notices that have gone out,
20	and that concludes my report.
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
22	only have one other and I'll be
23	getting more of the information,
24	is every year on Memorial Day
25	there is the blessed the
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1	
2	service that's down at the
3	Railroad Dock where the community
4	marches from behind the arcade and
5	goes down to the railroad dock and
6	they have a service, and then
7	march back to the firehouse.
8	I have the application here. I
9	just have to do a cover letter for
10	it because I received a call from
11	the Linda Goldsmith wanting to
12	know how to get this set up and I
13	told her that we needed to fill
14	out mass assembly permit
15	application because it does
16	involve closing the road to do the
17	march early in the morning.
18	Because it goes from like 8:00 to
19	about 8:30, 9:00. I think we've
20	all participated in it in the past.
21	So I will be sending that to the
22	clerk and sending it out to
23	everybody to get a resolution on.
24	I apologize, I just wasn't able to
25	get it to her yesterday and today
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1	
2	I needed to get some further
3	information from the applicant or
4	from Linda Goldsmith.
5	This has always been a Village
6	event where it's always been
7	arranged through the Village. So
8	that's the other reason why I'm
9	presenting it for a resolution for
10	next week. But I will get an
11	e-mail out late tonight after this
12	meeting or early tomorrow morning.
13	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Morning.
14	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah,
15	probably early morning. And that
16	would be an event date of May 26th
17	and it's been a tradition that's
18	been in this Village for, I
19	believe, 30 years.
20	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah, I
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
22	Because they do ask for an
23	amplifier you know, to borrow a
24	PA system and some other things
25	down at the dock.
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1	
2	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Yeah,
3	they I think it's great that
4	this is being presented as a
5	public assembly application
6	because I you know, there are
7	many beautiful traditions here in
8	the Village where I think the
9	intent is pure, but if it does
10	require work from Village staff,
11	it is appropriate to go through
12	the public assembly application
13	process even for these long
14	beloved traditions because it's
15	very difficult to pull the pieces
16	together on the back end if it's
17	not present in this way, so thank
18	you for taking care of this
19	application.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: All right, on
22	that note, we're going to need to
23	change things up because we are
24	45 minutes late for a call with
25	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: I told
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1	
2	her until approximately. I can
3	step away and call her.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: I already
5	did. I told her 30 minutes ago
6	that we were running late and we
7	would be 8:15. So what I'm going
8	to suggest we do is that we take a
9	break from the public meeting, we
10	go into Executive Session for
11	advise of counsel, labor counsel,
12	and then we can go back into the
13	public meeting thereafter.
14	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Just
15	on that, I'm not sure Jay is able
16	to do video after stopping it. We
17	had this come up with Zoning Board.
18	tried to have it him come up after
19	going into Executive Session, but
20	he wasn't able to do it.
21	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: That's
22	concerning because you guys have
23	paused for Executive Session in
24	the past.
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, but we
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1	
2	don't tape.
3	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: That's
4	my point. He should be able to
5	pause.
6	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
7	We usually don't have much of a
8	meeting after.
9	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
10	Right, exactly.
11	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY JOHNSON: So
12	we just take notes.
13	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: No, no,
14	no, that's not my point. My point
15	is the pause and the start.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
17	Right, it should be functioning.
18	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
19	Yeah, it would be great if it did.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: There he is.
21	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: You
22	can ask.
23	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Jay, we
24	have a question about are you able
25	to pause the video.
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1	
2	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: Can't pause.
3	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Okay.
4	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: Because it
5	breaks it up. You'd have to have
6	two entries in. I spoke to Brian.
7	I think what we're going to do is
8	I can either cap or shoot a sign
9	that says in recess or executive
10	and kill the sound so we're not
11	seeing or hearing anything that's
12	happening.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Why can't you
14	just turn it all off and then
15	start a part two?
16	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: Can't turn
17	it off because that would break
18	the file.
19	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: Part of
20	the integrated system.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: And the
22	alternative would be that we add
23	on some of these things to the
24	beginning of next week's meeting.
25	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: It's
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1	
2	your meeting, Mr. Mayor.
3	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: The
4	rest of the whole meeting?
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: So close the
6	meeting, do the Executive Session
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, we're
8	not closing it. We're going into
9	Executive Session.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Right, yeah,
11	that's what I meant.
12	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: An
13	alternative is if you want to do
14	this outside. We can step away.
15	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Do it
16	outside?
17	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: The
18	Executive Session, yes.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: You mean go
20	to Village Hall for
21	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
22	Well, no, just get you know,
23	because that way the camera stays
24	on, and when we come back, we're
25	you know, it continues to
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1	
2	record. Obviously nothing will be
3	here. We won't be present during
4	Executive Session. We'll come
5	back and go on, but this way
6	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm just
7	concerned Executive Session might
8	last 45 minutes.
9	TRUSTEE ROBINS: That's not
10	good for me, Brian. I can tell
11	you.
12	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: I can
13	shoot a sign or cap the lens and
14	kill the sound.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm just
16	saying I'm thinking it might be
17	impractical to try and do
18	everything tonight at this point.
19	Any thoughts?
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I think we
21	should do the Executive Session.
22	But maybe we break it up, do some
23	of the material, some of the items
24	now, some at the next meeting.
25	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: How
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1	
2	about this, can we text the
3	counsel and let them know we're
4	running late?
5	MAYOR STUESSI: Can we go
6	over to Village Hall for Executive
7	Session?
8	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Sure.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay, so
10	let's do that and then we can see
11	what the time is and start again
12	then. Make sense?
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Will these
14	people all wait for us?
15	MAYOR STUESSI: I doubt it.
16	AUDIENCE MEMBER: Jim just
17	said he could cap the lens.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: But that's
19	not the issue. We're going to
20	come back. So the question is, do
21	you want to come back? I'd be a
22	glad to text you.
23	AUDIENCE MEMBER: I'd be
24	happy to stream it at home, but it
25	would be nice to know when you
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1	
2	think you're going to come back.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: I wish I
4	could tell you. Like I said,
5	probably 45 minutes.
6	AUDIENCE MEMBER: No problem.
7	I'll have the laptop on.
8	MR. SALADINO: Didn't the
9	Board always go into Executive
10	Session at the end of the meeting
11	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, but we
12	have
13	MR. SALADINO: and we left?
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, but we
15	have a call with somebody that was
16	supposed to happen 45 minutes ago.
17	All right, so I'm going to make a
18	motion to go into Executive Session.
19	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
20	Before you do that, I mean, do we
21	want to reach out to counsel and
22	advise that it may be another who
23	know, it will be a while longer
24	and can you wait?
25	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
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1	
2	I think
3	MAYOR STUESSI: I'm concerned
4	about what needs to be discussed
5	and being able to do it in a
6	timely manner.
7	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Okay.
8	Alright, so do it.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah.
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I think we
11	need to do it.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Sorry, what?
13	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: So then
14	we're going to have to kill the
15	video and it won't be able to
16	start again.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I'm
18	going to ask a question. Jay said
19	something before that I'm not
20	quite sure everybody understood.
21	Is there do you have the
22	availability of posting something
23	on there right now that keeps the
24	video live and getting rid of the
25	sound, correct?
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1	
2	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: The
3	problem is the system, the
4	Granicus system has to keep going.
5	It doesn't break. The old system
6	did. So what we discussed the
7	other day, if this is going to
8	work, is I can shoot a sign that
9	says, in recess or Town Board or
10	whatever, kill the audio.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
12	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: So they're
13	just seeing that sign and not
14	hearing anything.
15	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: For
16	live? You can do that live?
17	THE VIDEOGRAPHER: It would
18	still be progress.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I'm
20	just asking.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Mary Bess,
22	it's two minutes to walk to
23	Village Hall. I think that makes
24	the most sense so we're certain
25	that we can have
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1	
2	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Can
3	you do that Julia? You just said
4	something about
5	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I can't
6	right now. I'm having an issue
7	with my hip.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: You don't
9	think what?
10	TRUSTEE ROBINS: I don't
11	think I can go down the stairs
12	right now.
13	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
14	Candace says we don't have to go
15	upstairs.
16	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: No,
17	nobody's in Village Hall. We can
18	do it the clerk's office.
19	MAYOR STUESSI: We can do it
20	on the ground floor.
21	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
22	Julia just said she can't right?
23	Trustee Robins can or can't?
24	VILLAGE CLERK HALL: She said
25	she doesn't want to go upstairs.
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1	
2	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: She's
3	having trouble.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Let's go to
5	Executive Session so we can break
6	this and not continue on. So make
7	a motion to go into Executive
8	Session.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: For?
10	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: But
11	we're going to come back on video
12	later.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: for advise
14	of labor counsel and potential
15	sale of a Village property.
16	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
17	Second.
18	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
19	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
20	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Aye.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: Aye.
22	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Aye.
24	MAYOR STUESSI: Motion carries.
25	This portion of the public meet
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1	
2	something now closed.
3	(Whereupon the Board recessed
4	to Executive Session and Trustee
5	Robins did not return for the
6	remainder of the meeting.)
7	MAYOR STUESSI: All right,
8	I'm going to make a motion to go
9	back in the public meeting.
10	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Second.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
12	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Aye.
14	MAYOR STUESSI: Aye.
15	TRUSTEE ROBINS: Aye.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Aye.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Motion carries.
18	Adam, would like to go through
19	your report, please?
20	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
21	Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I have a
22	few resolutions I will start with.
23	My first is to appropriate light
24	fund reserves to fund the repairs
25	at the light plant generator. The
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1	
2	Board has been provided
3	documentation on this.
4	My second resolution is to
5	appropriate sewer funds reserves
6	to fund the repairs to the pumps
7	and a generator at wastewater
8	treatment plant.
9	And my next resolution it to
10	appropriate electric fund reserves
11	to fund monthly power invoice.
12	The following resolution is to
13	adopt the 2025/2026 tentative
14	budget. Depending on the Board's
15	input, this may alter the current
16	tentative budget and this
17	resolution next week may read
18	adopting 2025/2026 as amended,
19	depending on the Board's input
20	over the next week.
21	To continue, my next resolution
22	was previously tabled. It's to
23	approve the attached card only
24	policy for the Village of
25	Greenport Carousel. I did learn
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1	
2	that we do have the ability to
3	accept payment by cellphone tap.
4	The attached policy was updated to
5	reflect that, as well as change
6	wording to allow for all cards and
7	not just credit cards per the
8	Board's comments at the last
9	meeting.
10	Similarly, this next resolution
11	was also tabled last month,
12	approving attached revised
13	Railroad Dock Application Rules
14	and Regulation. Last month the
15	application was separate from the
16	rules and regulations in the
17	agenda. I felt they should be one
18	and the same. So the application
19	will be handed out with the rules
20	and regulation in one packet if
21	approved.
22	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
23	have one question on the revised
24	Railroad Dock Rules and Regulations.
25	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes.
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1	
2	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I'm
3	assuming that that was done
4	in-house. Has anyone approached
5	the actual users of the dock as to
6	review those rules and regulations
7	to see if they're actually logical
8	or fundamental or usable or
9	actually can be done?
10	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
11	Well, I know that the rules and
12	regulations were provided by legal
13	counsel. I don't believe that
14	anyone's reached out to the docket
15	tenants in regards to this.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
17	think it would behoove us to do
18	that because I've been reading
19	some of it and some of it is not
20	practical. And it's not me that
21	should be doing that. It should
22	be representatives from that to
23	take a look at it. So that's
24	going to be my suggestion. You
25	know, some of it is I can

1	
2	really can answer some of it, but
3	some of it is only those who are
4	operating those size vessels can
5	really answer to.
6	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
7	Sure. Well, we can attempt to get
8	feedback over the next week.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
11	If we're unable to do so or get
12	adequate results from them, I
13	suppose it will be have to tabled
14	if the Board wishes.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Just for
16	public disclosure, Mary Bess,
17	you're a tenant at the Railroad
18	Dock?
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
20	That's correct. That's why I'm
21	saying that I can't that's why
22	I said I can't answer for some of
23	it. I just I feel that they
24	should have an opportunity to look
25	at it. Years ago we had an actual
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2	dock committee that did oversee
3	the activities down there. That
4	hasn't been in existence for a
5	long time.
6	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, we have
7	Trustee Brennan who's the chair of
8	the Harbourfront Committee and I know
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I did
10	participate in the I did review
11	the revised regulations and I know
12	that it also involved Marina
13	Manager Rick Albanese as part of
14	that conversation. So there was
15	more oversight on it. It was not
16	just done by counsel or by the
17	treasurer.
18	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
19	Right, no, I know. But I just
20	think that the actual users should
21	have
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, I'm
23	not a user of that dock.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Right.
25	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
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2	was going to ask a similar
3	question just about if we've
4	reached out to current users about
5	the pricing, because I know a
6	little bit. It hasn't changed in
7	a long time, but we are, a pretty
8	high percentage amount, we're
9	changing it.
10	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes.
11	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
12	So just to get like if we're
13	getting feedback anyway, that might
14	be good feedback also to get just
15	so see. Because we don't want
16	like everybody to just leave, right?
17	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Sure.
18	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: I
19	mean, I don't think that's going
20	to happen.
21	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I would
22	just address that. So Rick
23	Albanese did the research on what
24	comparable rates were and I
25	think speaking for myself, I
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2	was not in agreement. I think we
3	could have raised it more
4	aggressively. Because there seems
5	to be a lot of room between what
6	we're currently charging and what
7	the market might bare.
8	Rick felt strongly about where
9	it landed because he was sensitive
10	to not increasing it too much
11	because I think he had a feel for
12	what would be acceptable. It
13	absolutely is 100 percent increase
14	but on a dollar you know, it's
15	still that not that much in actual
16	dollars. It's still a great price
17	for a dock rental in my mind.
18	But I am a little uncomfortable
19	with how low it is. So I would
20	like to suggest that we consider,
21	if we're going to consider only
22	raising to \$20 a foot, I would
23	like to somehow incorporate that
24	we have escalation steps built
25	into it so that we attack this
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2	over two or three or four or
3	five years.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, you had
5	mentioned that at the last meeting.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, so I
7	think that would help the Village
8	with its finances. I think it
9	would help the treasurer, and I
10	think it would avoid a situation
11	where we let it lie and we forget
12	about it and we don't address it
13	next year and too many years go
14	by. I think we need to be more
15	aggressive in stepping up into a
16	more competitive rate. That would
17	be my suggestion.
18	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: I
19	agree.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I'd
21	be interested to know which
22	facilities that Rick reviewed
23	because some of you know, I
24	would like to know the areas. I
25	don't know if he did he reach
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2	out to just local dockage for the
3	commercial fishing fleet or did he
4	reach up and down the whole east
5	coast?
6	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
7	It's my understanding he did both.
8	He did select some docks within
9	the general area of the North Fork,
10	as well as down the East Coast.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
12	Because if you're talking about
13	the New Bedford rates and
14	Fairhaven rates and New Jersey
15	rates, they have completely
16	different facilities that are
17	offered and the rate is reflective
18	in that.
19	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Yes.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: So
21	that's why I'm asking. Personally
22	I know what the those fees are in
23	these different areas and so
24	that's why I'm asking.
25	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
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2	Okay. Yes, a lot of the fee
3	structure for other commercial
4	docks had a lot to do with the
5	amenities they offer of which we
6	do not. The price point that we
7	selected for this current increase
8	does reflect that information.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
10	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
11	It's still considerably lower than
12	the majority or all of the other
13	dockage facilities we looked at.
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: He did,
15	Mary Bess. He did factor in
16	his explanation, he did take into
17	account the difference in amenities
18	and what was being provided.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Because
20	we require higher insurance rates,
21	higher insurance coverage than
22	some of the other ports up that
23	are up and down. And to be honest
24	with you, to just be normal
25	liability on a vessel of that size
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2	is \$40,000 a year just to start
3	out. So that's the other reason
4	why I'm curious as to see what he
5	did. I stayed out of that
6	conversation.
7	It was asked of me and I said I
8	can't get involved in it. So
9	here's some names of people that
10	you could contact, but I would
11	like to kind of, you know, as I
12	said, years ago the \$10 a foot was
13	started because the dock wasn't
14	getting any fees and there was
15	only personally us there and
16	that's why we offered it, at the
17	time, to do the \$10 a foot.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: That was
19	13 years ago.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: That
21	was 13 years ago, yeah. I'm not
22	disagreeing with it, okay, but
23	that was that was then. Okay?
24	But I also know that in Rhode
25	Island, they charge if Mark
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2	unloads in Rhode Island in Point
3	Judith, just to walk into the
4	harbor or ride into the harbor,
5	they get a daily fee a monthly
6	fee for being there, but they have
7	parking for their crew. They have
8	parking for themselves. They have
9	gear storage. They have all of
10	that that's attached to that fee.
11	So that's the reason why I'm
12	asking.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: Wasn't the
14	fee like \$80 a foot more on
15	average?
16	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Some of
17	them were like \$160 a foot. So
18	Rick, in his explanation
19	because I'm not familiar with what
20	you're talking about and all the
21	different amenities he was
22	heavily factoring and
23	acknowledging what we're providing
24	is different than other places.
25	And he was trying to do like a
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2	comparable like a real estate
3	comparison. So I don't know if
4	you're satisfied. Maybe you'd
5	like Rick to summarize this or
6	have a conversation. I know you
7	said you're trying to stay out of
8	it.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
10	he could actually actually
11	probably what would be best is
12	that he maybe goes over it with
13	Nathan and then Nathan can tell me
14	over of the dinner table what the
15	conversation was so that it's not
16	a conflict.
17	MAYOR STUESSI: Maybe what
18	would be better is we simply have
19	a simple summary put together
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
21	MAYOR STUESSI: that's
22	shared with the Board. Then we
23	can discuss it at our next
24	meeting. I think for the benefit
25	of the public, that's the best

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2	thing to do.
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, I
4	think so.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay,
6	but the rules and regulations, I
7	would like to get that brought to
8	the attention of the users down
9	there so that they can take a look
10	at it, okay?
11	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM: Sure.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: That's
13	something we can ask Rick to do?
14	MAYOR STUESSI yes.
15	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
16	To continue my Work Session,
17	utility billing is on time.
18	I did want to briefly talk about
19	the CDBG, Community Development
20	Block Grant. Currently we have
21	funds set aside form our CDBG 2023
22	year, which was set aside for
23	sidewalks on Adam Streets. We do
24	have to exhaust some of these
25	funds by June 30th, so we will be
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2	looking to do so. So I'm hoping
3	to cut a PO this fiscal year after
4	we receive some updated quotes.
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Out
6	of curiosity, originally one of
7	the CDBG grants was to include the
8	sidewalk along this side of 4th
9	Avenue here, but there was a big
10	tree there that was everybody
11	was having heart failure.
12	I think they've cut the tree
13	down. It would be nice to
14	continue the sidewalk that ends
15	and maybe redo the driveway going
16	out of the firehouse because right
17	now, the equipment, I believe we
18	have to change some of the parking
19	around it, but, Patrick, remind
20	me, they have issues trying to get
21	out of the back from the garage.
22	The big building in the back, they
23	have issues trying to get the
24	equipment to go out the back
25	entrance?
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2	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Of what,
3	I'm sorry.
4	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: The
5	fire trucks, and the equipment on
6	4th Avenue, they have trouble with
7	the curbing there.
8	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
9	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: If we
10	could use some of that money to
11	put the sidewalk all the way down
12	because there is a handicap ramp
13	at the end that they is put in,
14	but they didn't put the rest of
15	the sidewalk along there because
16	there was this huge tree there,
17	which I think is now gone.
18	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
19	To alter the 2023 funds would
20	require a budget modification
21	within CDBG. Considering our
22	current timeline and a deadline of
23	June 30th.
24	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It
25	won't make it.
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2	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
3	I don't know if we can do it for
4	2023 funds, but that's definitely
5	something we can look at to alter
6	our 2024 funds.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
9	Or even the 2025, which are still
10	being processed. So that's not
11	out of the question for this CDBG
12	year, I think we it would be in
13	our best interest to move forward
14	with that.
15	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, and the
16	other thing I think we need to
17	take a look at is relative to
18	priorities, there's a lot of
19	traffic over at Adams Street,
20	especially at the bus station
21	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Yeah,
22	no, no
23	MAYOR STUESSI: in
24	particular isn't as handicap
25	accessible as it should be. It
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2	one of the worse pieces of
3	sidewalk in the whole Village.
4	So, you know, that makes a lot of
5	sense and it's tied into what it
6	is right now.
7	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
8	To continue, significant
9	collections.
10	Approximately \$86,000 in rent
11	for the month of March.
12	And property tax collected
13	through March 2025, \$1,405,629.99.
14	That does reflect the entirety of
15	our fiscal year collections
16	including water/sewer relevy's and
17	penalties. So that number will
18	not change until our next tax
19	billing cycle in May, next month.
20	Also significant collections,
21	CHIPS funds. We got our
22	reimbursement for the pavings on
23	Atlantic, Bridge, Manor, Munsell
24	and Sterling in the amount
25	\$328,373.24. Those funds will go
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2	right back into repairing other
3	streets around the Village.
4	Significant payments:
5	Corazzini Asphalt and the NV-5
6	Consultants are both related to
7	the North Ferry. These are
8	already in process to be 80 percent
9	reimbursed through the DOT.
10	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Do
11	either one of these, Corazzini,
12	have any change orders to it?
13	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
14	I believe there were change
15	orders. Not I don't believe if
16	was specific to this invoice.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
18	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
19	This is invoice number one.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Oh,
21	okay.
22	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
23	I just received Invoice 2 and 3
24	today. I believe there was one on
25	there, but I will have to review
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2	it and I'm happy to do that for you.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Yeah, I had
4	sent a note to the Board earlier
5	today, we're going to be
6	presenting change orders relative
7	to that change for the addition of
8	the wider truck lane, as well as
9	some site things in our next
10	meeting.
11	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: All
12	right.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: That's all
14	being summarized right now.
15	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I have a
16	question on this. Why does the
17	contractor provide us with their
18	payroll data?
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
20	Certified payroll.
21	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
22	Certified payroll.
23	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It
24	has to go along with the
25	MAYOR STUESSI: Women,
	Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107

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2	minority.
3	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Women,
4	minority, it's part of it.
5	MAYOR STUESSI: It's tracked
6	every single week, what
7	percentage.
8	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
9	It's required for our reimbursement
10	as well.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: They're
12	actually exceeding it by a pretty
13	large number.
14	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay. And
15	does an arrangement like this
16	where it's a contractor and a
17	municipality, does a contractor
18	have ability to put liens for
19	failure to receive payment?
20	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: A
21	public lean?
22	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
23	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: I
24	believe so.
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So do our
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2	pay so the pay requisition wags
3	pretty detailed, but I didn't see
4	a lien waiver in there, so
5	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It's
6	part of the contract, isn't it?
7	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
8	It's likely part of the original
9	contract, not on a per invoice
10	basis, but perhaps Brian.
11	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: I
12	would have to see the contract.
13	MAYOR STUESSI: That's my
14	recollection, you guys signed off
15	on it, was it was in the main contract.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: It
17	was in the main contract.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Meaning
19	what, when they receive payment,
20	they're waiving liens? So like in
21	the private sector, I would expect
22	the contractor to acknowledge that
23	they've waived liens when they
24	submit a pay rec. So I'm just not
25	familiar with how it works in
	Flynn Stenography & Transcription Service(631) 727-1107

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2	municipality.
3	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
4	It's usually the same, but we may
5	have a provision in the contract
6	that provides something else.
7	That's why I'd want to see the
8	contract.
9	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay. It's
10	just something to think about.
11	MAYOR STUESSI: That's a good
12	point.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: All right.
14	VILLAGE TREASURER BRAUTIGAM:
15	My last two significant payments
16	were for serial bond interest from
17	2024 in the amount I'm sorry,
18	2014 in the amount of \$17,675.
19	That was for the sanitary pump at
20	waste water, some curbs and paving
21	we did.
22	And the 2021 serial bond
23	interest in the amount of
24	\$46,371.88 was a serial bond
25	payment for the marina electric
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2	upgrade, the sweeper, and other
3	upgrades to our electric system.
4	That concludes my report. Let
5	me know if you have any questions.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: I just have
7	a comment. I just want to go back
8	to something. So we discussed the
9	dock rules and regulations and
10	Trustee Phillips had some
11	concerns. The Mayor pointed out
12	that you were basically disclosing
13	that Trustee Phillips is a tenant.
14	So my question is for counsel.
15	How much can Trustee Phillips
16	participate in a discussion around
17	this? I would expect you to speak
18	up if there was a cut off in terms
19	of what's appropriate because
20	while her concerns may be
21	legitimate, she's participating in
22	a conversation that biases the
23	conversation. So is that okay?
24	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR:
25	I'll discuss it with Trustee
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2	Phillips.
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay.
4	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: But
5	yes, I understand what you're
6	saying and I understand, you know,
7	the whole point of recusing one's
8	self from discussions is to avoid
9	not just an appearance, it's to
10	avoid the conflict, and it's to
11	avoid, as you say, your investment
12	in a position creates the very
13	reason why you have potential
14	issues. So I'll have a discussion.
15	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay, thank
16	you.
17	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
18	the other issue
19	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: I'm
20	not suggesting that what I'm
21	saying is that each time, unless
22	there's a you know each time
23	that somebody has to make a
24	decision on their own as a Board
25	member as to whether they would
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2	step aside from a discussion is
3	that person's decision. That's
4	why I'm saying that.
5	Not that there's I'm saying
6	that there's something wrong that
7	I would discuss with her. Just to
8	you know, if there's something
9	somebody has an issue on in terms
10	of a potential conflict that I
11	have the conversation with that
12	particular Board member.
13	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah, so I
14	understand that and that's why I'm
15	not suggesting that Trustee
16	Phillips errored. That's why I'm
17	asking you.
18	VILLAGE ATTORNEY STOLAR: Okay.
19	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
20	just to be clear, okay, in the
21	past, when it comes to the
22	discussion of the final
23	discussion, I have always recused
24	myself and actually, at times,
25	walked away from the table and do
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2	not vote on it.
3	My suggestion tonight was to
4	reach out to those who are
5	actually using the dock to take a
6	look at the rules and regulations
7	because I'm sure it has not been
8	presented to them and I think in
9	all fairness it should be
10	presented to them to take some
11	type of comment on it to see if
12	it's workable. And that's my
13	that's the only discussion your
14	probably going to hear from my
15	mouth.
16	MAYOR STUESSI: Well, you did
17	make some comments, in all fairness,
18	relative to fees and whether they
19	were appropriate or not.
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: I
21	asked what the research was.
22	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. I
23	just I was uncomfortable, which
24	is why I suggested disclosure
25	because I think each of us as
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2	individuals, as I understand, has
3	the obligation to disclose, but
4	not the obligation to recuse.
5	So, you know, it's obviously a
6	sensitive subject. You're
7	representing the Village Board,
8	but then you're also representing
9	yourself and if we
10	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: No,
11	actually I'm not representing
12	myself because the permit is not
13	in my name. The permit is not in
14	my name, okay? The permit is in
15	my husband's name; not my name. I
16	have nothing do with the Illusion.
17	Everyone assumes I do, but I
18	don't. So
19	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: But we
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS:
21	Let's let's my suggestion is
22	is that I want it I want the
23	information reached out to those
24	who actually use the dock to take
25	a look at it to make sure that
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2	it's being fair to them and fair
3	to the Village at the same time
4	and protecting both sides.
5	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: That's not
6	an unreasonable suggestion.
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Okay.
8	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: But we all
9	know that the concept of
10	disclosure and recusal, the
11	disclosure in particular, extends
12	to family members and associates
13	and business partners and things.
14	So I don't really accept that
15	explanation.
16	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
17	as I said, Trustee Brennan, I have
18	always recused myself when it
19	comes to the vote or when it comes
20	to the nitty-gritty of discussion.
21	I have lived through it umpteenth
22	years. So I'm sorry if everyone
23	is uncomfortable that I'm
24	married let's just move on,
25	okay? I will make sure it's done
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2	properly.
3	MAYOR STUESSI: All right,
4	the last item for this evening,
5	we're going to carryover some of
6	the other items into the beginning
7	of next week's Organizational
8	Meeting and Regularly scheduled
9	meeting is:
10	Resolution Number 04-2025-1.
11	This is a resolution awarding the
12	Village of Greenport Wave
13	Attenuator Splash Board
14	replacement on the East Pier at
15	Mitchell Park bid to S. Heaney
16	Marine Construction Incorporated,
17	the low bidder, at a price of
18	\$118,300 per the bid opening on
19	April 14th Monday, April 14,
20	2025, and authorizing Mayor
21	Stuessi to sign the contract
22	between the Village of Greenport
23	and S. Heaney Marine Construction
24	Incorporated. So moved. Is there
25	a second?
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2	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON:
3	Second.
4	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Discussion.
5	So I reached out to the Marine
6	Manager Rick Albanese, but he was
7	unavailable. I don't know if he's
8	out on leave or something.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: He's dealing
10	with well, I don't want to
11	disclose.
12	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah,
13	that's fine. I want today get a
14	little bit more information about
15	the proposal and about the history
16	of the prior wave wall. Trustee
17	Phillips might know something
18	about this, about when that one
19	went away, why it was
20	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: My
21	understanding is two, three years
22	ago it was starting to fall apart
23	and it had been so bad that pieces
24	were breaking off of it. It
25	wasn't exactly the best wood being
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2	used for it, to be honest with
3	you. There had be patches put
4	into it. There have had boat that
5	hit it when they came into the
6	dock, they didn't dock very well.
7	And then it just got to be to
8	the point where it just, it was
9	just breaking apart. That was the
10	biggest reason and they had pieces
11	of wood floating in the water.
12	And then also there was issues of,
13	from my understanding, some of the
14	planking started to separate and
15	part of that was because the wave
16	walls were deteriorating. So it
17	was decided at that time to take
18	them out, which probably was it
19	should have been replaced as soon
20	as it as soon as they were
21	removed, they should have been
22	replaced, but that didn't take
23	place, okay?
24	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: So my
25	understanding is this wave wall is
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2	for the East Pier; is that correct?
3	MAYOR STUESSI: Yes, and so
4	the reason the wave wall was
5	installed on that pier was to
6	prevent all the wave action
7	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Inside.
8	MAYOR STUESSI: coming
9	into the marina. And one of
10	biggest complaints we get, outside
11	of what was a bigger issue and it
12	wasn't this past summer, which was
13	noise, that was managed a lot
14	better last summer and the prior
15	summer than it had been in years
16	past, was the wave action that
17	comes into the marine with a lot
18	of people there staying there the
19	overnight.
20	It's particularly bad for
21	smaller boats, not an issue for
22	180-foot yachts, but, you know,
23	and this is yo know, we've been
24	seen it in docker reports and I
25	don't recall the exact timing, but
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2	I want to say I thought the wave
3	wall was in complete disrepair
4	somewhere around four years ago or
5	so and just sort of falling apart
6	because it hadn't been maintained.
7	And this was something that was,
8	you know, really important to Rick
9	and we've been trying to figure it
10	into the budget to get it done.
11	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yeah.
12	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Well,
13	actually when they took the.
14	Wave the last pieces of it
15	out, he had fully expected the
16	Board, at that time, to go out to
17	bid and put them back in. But
18	there was a decision at the time
19	with the previous administration
20	that they weren't going spend that
21	kind of money. So that's that
22	was part of the problem.
23	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Okay.
24	Well, I trust that the marina
25	manager knows what he needs and he
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2	feels like this is important to
3	our customers as well as
4	protecting those floating docks
5	from, you know, getting beat up.
6	My concern here is that I would
7	imagine that the wave wall puts
8	stress on the piers and I don't
9	know if the piers have been looked
10	at to consider whether adding this
11	wave wall is going to impact the
12	integrity of the pier.
13	For example, the West Pier, as
14	it leaves the park, has a
15	crossbracing between the pilings
16	and it's completely rotted out for
17	the first 50 feet from the land
18	going outward. So in a case like
19	the West Pier, I would be
20	reluctant to add any kind of
21	additional structures to it that
22	would cause it to move or
23	something like that.
24	So what I'm suggesting here is,
25	if we move forward with this, I
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2	don't want it to be done in
3	isolation. I think we need to ask
4	somebody, an engineer, a dock
5	builder, or someone, or this
6	contractor to do some kind of
7	assessment of the other conditions
8	under the East and West Pier, all
9	right, so that if this is likely
10	to impact stability of the
11	structure, we're going to need
12	to
13	MAYOR STUESSI: I think
14	that's a fair point. We can get
15	some we can get some proposals
16	pretty quickly on that and get
17	somebody to take a look at that.
18	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: That's what
19	I would recommend.
20	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay. So I
21	will amend this to approve,
22	subject to a satisfactory report
23	from a marine engineer or a dock
24	builder; would that suffice?
25	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Yes.
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2	MAYOR STUESSI: Okay, so moved.
3	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Second.
4	MAYOR STUESSI: All in favor?
5	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
6	TRUSTEE BRENNAN: Aye.
7	MAYOR STUESSI: Aye.
8	DEPUTY MAYOR PHILLIPS: Aye.
9	MAYOR STUESSI: Motion passes.
10	All right, long night. Thank
11	you, everybody, for your patience
12	and for anybody watching from home
13	for enjoying the break. I think
14	Jay was doing shadow puppets on
15	the screen. And we'll look
16	forward to seeing everybody next
17	Thursday for our Organizational
18	Meeting and regularly scheduled
19	meeting.
20	I make a motion to adjourn the
21	meeting. Second?
22	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Second.
23	MAYOR STUESSI: So moved
24	or all in favor? Sorry.
25	TRUSTEE DOUGHERTY-JOHNSON: Aye.
